### M'LEAN ANNOUNCES FIVE PER CENT CUT IN STATE BUDGET

# Departmental and Institutional Heads Noticed to Furnish Estimates of Needs

Raleigh, May 21.-Governor Mc-Lean has notified heads of State Departments, institutions and agencies that, based on new estimates of revenue just received by him, it will be necessary to scale appropriations only 5 per cent at pre-ent. The Governor had previously announced that he anticipated a cut of seven per cent. However, following a conference with R. A. Doughton, commissioner of revenue he announced that the per centage of estimated reduction had been lowered two per cent.

Coincident with the issuance of his latest statement, Governor McLean notified all departmental and institutional heads to furnish him with estimates of their needs at the earliest possible moment.

The Governor, as director of the budget, under the legislation enacted by the last general assembly, will insist on a "balanced budget." He has announced that he does not propose to allow any branch of the State government mend more than it is allowed.

In his statement accompanying his final call for estimates from all branches of the State government, the Governor said:


