FUNERAL SERVICES FOR E. B. FICKLEN CONDUCTED TODAY

Prominent Tobacconist Died on Monday, May 11th in Brussels, Bel- gium; Service Con- ducted From Presby- terian Church

Funeral services for Mr. Edward Bancroft Ficklen, who died in Brussels, Belgium, on Monday, May 11, were conducted from the Presbyterian Church this morning by the Rev. W. R. Harden and Dr. J. N. H. Summerville, of New Bern, assisted by the Rev. S. K. Phillips, of Fayetteville. Interment followed in the Episcopal cemetery. The services were attended by a number of friends from this and adjoining states and the large and handsome floral offering attested the popularity of the deceased.

Edward Bancroft Ficklen was born at Red House, Buckingham County, Va., May 22, 1868. In 1890 he was married to Miss Myra Skinner, of this city. He was one of the most popular and prominent tobacconists in this state and was held in high esteem by a host of friends, not only in this state, but throughout adjoining states.

At the time of his death, he accompanied by Mrs. Ficklen and Mrs. Hattie Skinner, was touring Europe on a combined business and pleasure trip. Upon their arrival in Brussels, he suffered a stroke and died within a few hours. His body left Brussels on the following Thursday and arrived in New York last Saturday.

The deceased was an active member of the Presbyterian Church, the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade, the Tar River Lodge Knights of Pythias and several other organizations. He was the founder and president of the E. B. Ficklen Tobacco Company and was vitally interested in the progress of tobacco industry.

Mr. Ficklen is survived by his wife, two sons, Mr. James Ficklen and Mr. Louis Stuart Ficklen, one grand son, James Ficklen, Jr., and a sister, Mrs. L. C. Arthur, Mrs. B. W. McGeeley and Mrs. Nannie Jeter, of Greenville; Mrs. Hunter Marshall, Sr., of Charlotte; Mrs. Elizabeth Myers, of Decatur, Ga.; one brother, Rev. James B. Ficklen, of Decatur, Ga.

EVOLUTION IS CHIEF TOPIC CONVERSATION IN DAYTON TODAY

Grand Jury Meets to Take Action in the Tennessee Evolution Case

Dayton, Tenn., May 25.—Evolution was the chief topic of conversation here today as a Rhea County grand jury assembled to determine whether John T. Scope, teacher of science in the county schools was to be indicted for alleged violation of the Tennessee law prohibiting teaching of evolution in the public schools.

Others interested in the problem of caring for the crowds anticipated for the trial of the case, which is yet 30 days off if the grand jury returns a bill of indictment, turned their attention to the development of such plans as of being evolved.

Chief among these was one for the abandonment of the court house for the trial and the erection of a temporary structure in the baseball park, which would have seating capacity of 20,000 persons. Judge T. Raulston has indicated informally that he would not object to such a procedure.

Before he entered the court room today, Scope, who was being held for action by a magisterial triumvirate at a preliminary hearing two weeks ago, said he expected to be indicted and was prepared to continue the case through higher courts of the state, and into the United States Supreme Court, if need be.

GRIFFIN HAS LOST RIGHT OF APPEAL

Failed to File Appeal Bond When Notice of Appeal Was Entered

Raleigh, May 25.—Henry D. Griffin, for whose release a bond in the sum of \$50,000 had been signed, has lost his right of appeal, Judge Sinclair and Solicitor Gilliam have ruled. It was pointed out that he failed to file the bond required by law when the notice of appeal was entered.

Griffin has served less than two weeks of a 30 year stretch lying before him. He was sentenced after being convicted of having participated in the mutilation of Joseph Needie man.

GERMANY READY FOR SUPPRESSION USE OF POISON GAS

Announces That She Will Participate in Any International Conference for Sup- pression of Chemicals and Poison Gas War- fare

Geneva, May 25.—Germany announced today that she was ready to participate in any international conference agreement for complete suppression for the use of chemicals and poison gas warfare.

Germany's announcement was made by Herr Von Eckardt at a meeting of the military and Naval Committee of International Conference for Control of Traffic in Arms, which is considering the American Proposal or insertion in the proposed convention of a clause prohibiting the use of poison gas.

PUBLISHING INCOME TAX LISTS UPHELD BY SUPREME COURT

Declares Newspapers Not Guilty of a Viola- tion in Publishing In- come Tax Lists Avail- able to Public Inspec- tion

Washington, May 25.—Newspapers which published last fall lists of income tax payers and the amount of tax each paid, were upheld in doing so today by the Supreme Court. The court declared the newspapers were not guilty of a violation of the law in publishing income tax lists made available to public inspection by the collectors of Internal Revenue.

The cases appealed were those won by the Kansas City Journal Post and the Baltimore Post, in the lower courts which withheld that any law prohibiting publication of information which Congress had delivered the Internal Revenue Bureau to make available for public inspection, would not be unconstitutional. This contention, the Supreme Court in effect upheld.

Body of Earl of Ypres Was Taken To London Today

Beal, England, May 25.—The body of the Earl of Ypres, formerly known as Field Marshal French, who died here Friday, was taken to London by motor hearse today. The removal of the coffin from the chapel in the Beal Castle, where the Earl had lived, was conducted without ceremony of any kind. Two nurses, who had attended the Field Marshal during his last illness, were the only persons to accompany the body across the draw bridge at the castle. Outside the walls a great silent crowd including many wives and mothers of the men who fought under Field Marshal French, saluted as the coffin

WHITE TO RETURN TO CHICAGO FOR SHEPHERD TRIAL

Missing State Witness Says He Will Return If "Given Protection"; Second Week of Se- lecting Jury Gets Un- derway

Chicago, May 25.—Reports that Robert White, missing state witness, in the William D. Shepherd murder, was in Philadelphia and intended to return to Chicago, "if given protection" created interest here as defense and prosecutor prepared to continue the task of selecting a jury. Apparently authentic word of White's whereabouts came to the Herald and Examiner in a special delivery letter from Philadelphia. The signature of which was declared to be identical with that affixed by White to the application for the rental of an automobile in which he and his family departed.

White, who had been reported seen in Florida and elsewhere last week, was considered one of the state's chief witnesses. He was expected to repeat on the witness stand his assertions that he had seen Shepherd studying germs in the science school of C. C. Faiman, also under indictment in the case.

The writer denied that he had said \$25,000 was offered to him to leave Chicago, but declared that he was compelled to leave to "save my life and family's."

With only four jurors selected after a week's effort, which was attended by two minor sensations, the disappearance of White and the state ment of Phillip Barry, a prospective juror involving James C. Callan, a politician, it was learned that precaution of an unusual nature would govern every act of the state's attorney in future conduct of the trial. State's Attorney Crowe, said that every man picked up by him would have to undergo a most careful investigation. Every safeguard will be about the state's witnesses, it was stated.

TWO ADDITIONAL EARTHQUAKES IN TOYO-OKA SUNDAY

More Than Two-Thirds of City Is In Ruins; 3,000 Houses Destroyed; Earthquakes Fol- lowed by Fire

Pesko, May 25.—An official pre-fectural report today from three towns, Toyo-Oka, Kinokuni, and Minato Village, shows that 278 persons were killed and 526 injured as a result of the earthquake and fire Saturday. The same report shows 444 houses collapsed as a result of the earthquake and 2,324 houses were destroyed by fire.

Tokio, May 25.—Two additional violent earthquakes added to the terror of the thousands of refugees at Toyo-Oka last night; after shocks of the trembler of Saturday in the Tajima district, in which approximately 300 persons were killed, and 1,000 were injured.

Official relief agencies continued to minister to the panic-stricken populace in the devastated rural area, which had not been visited by an earthquake for 400 years. More than two thirds of Toyo-Oka, a town of 7,000, are in ruins as a result of the fire that came in the wake of the trembler, according to word received at the home department from the local Toyo-Oka Governor. The number of houses destroyed will exceed 3,000.

Although a number of banks in the area have closed temporarily, the Finance Department has cabled commissioners abroad that National Finances, or Economic positions of Japan will not be affected by the quake, as the damages are confined to a limited area in the most remote country districts of Japan.

Reports trickling into Osaka gave eye witness accounts of the scenes as horror that followed the trembler. The disturbance reached the full measure of its intensity with alarming swiftness, which gave residences of Toyo-Oka no chance of escape in the opened streets.

A number of persons were reported killed by boulders falling from hill sides. Inflammable Japanese houses burned like tinder. The water mains were buckled and severed and fire fighters were unable to halt the flames. The worst suffering and casualties, Osaka said, were caused by the fire which broke out after the quake.

MR. J. S. NORMAN DIES FOLLOWING A LONG ILLNESS

Funeral Services for One of Greenville's Most Prominent Citi- zens Conducted This Afternoon

Mr. Joseph S. Norman died Saturday night after an illness of several weeks. Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 5 o'clock from the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church by Rev. William P. Watkins, Jr., pastor of the deceased assisted by Rev. W. S. Harden, of the Presbyterian Church, and assisted by Rev. Leland W. Smith, of the Memorial Baptist Church. Interment followed in Cherry Hill cemetery.

Joseph S. Norman was born in Washington county, April 9, 1869, a son of the late Capt. Thomas J. Norman and Mary E. Norman. On June 21, 1897, he was married to Miss Mary Frances Daniels, of Pactious Township, this county. Shortly after their marriage they came to Greenville and have made their home here since that time, with the exception of one year spent in Hagerstown, Maryland.

The deceased was held in high esteem by friends throughout this state. He possessed a strong Christian character and was popular in the religious and business circles of this city. Mr. Norman was a loyal member of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church and attended its services as long as health permitted. He loved his church and was interested in its great work. He will be greatly missed in his church, his home and by a large number of friends with whom he came in contact daily. Although his friends and loved ones knew that he was very ill, his death was unexpected and has caused genuine sorrow.

Mr. Norman is survived by his wife, four daughters, Misses Dorothy, Mary Perkins, Frances and Elizabeth, two sons, J. S. Jr., and William Norman; three brothers T. S. and R. W. Norman, of Salisbury, G. B. Norman, of California, one sister, Mrs. J. H. Cobb, of Fairfax, Va.

The funeral services were largely attended and the floral offering was beautiful.

No News Received From Expedition to the North Pole

Oslo, Norway, May 25.—The Norwegian capital at 9:45 o'clock this morning still without news from Captain Roald Amundsen and his fellow adventurers, who left Spitzbergen Thursday in an airplane to attempt to reach the North Pole.

The dispatch added that: "Among members of the expedition a certain amount of depression prevailed because of Amundsen's fine appearance. If their flying boats were damaged, the members or the expedition will have a long and dangerous journey."

The weather is now cloudy with a raw temperature which has dropped to below zero. From the top of Amsterdam Island the Captain of the Farm saw open water to the Northward where the machines might have descended.

Homing Pigeons Aid Salesmen.
Oakland, Cal. — A well-known California corporation has installed pigeon lofts at Stockton, Santa Cruz, San Jose, Santa Rosa, Fresno and Marysville, and homing birds are to be used as message bearers. Salesmen with headquarters in the cities named will carry pigeons and release them to send in orders.

April Fire Losses Amount to \$437,995

Raleigh, May 25.—Fire losses in North Carolina for April amounted to \$437,995, it was announced here today by the State Insurance Commissioner. This was a decrease of \$150,000 as compared with April, 1924.

During April there were 203 fires in the State, said the commissioner. The property at risk was valued at \$7,689,835, of which \$4,489,710 was covered by insurance.

Of the total loss, \$362,112 resulted from 1 fires, in which individual losses were \$5,000 and over.

Some of the outstanding losses reported were as follows, State auto repair shops near Raleigh, \$50,000; Department store at Fuquay Springs \$33,000; chair factory at Thomasville, \$30,000; Camp Green garage and autos, near Charlotte, \$30,000; ice and power plant at Chadbourn, \$25,000; store and contents at Chapel Hill, \$25,000; business block at Dunn, \$18,000; store at New London, \$11,000; flour mill in Surry county, \$10,000.

There were 91 fires in town dwellings, resulting in a total loss of \$43,350 and 17 in rural dwellings resulting in a total loss of \$21,750.

TYPHOID CLINIC TO BE CONDUCTED IN COURT HOUSE

Will Be Open on Wed- nesdays and Satur- days From 9 a. m., to 4:30 p. m.; Typhoid Vaccine Given Free

The Pitt County Health Department has arranged to hold a clinic for typhoid fever treatment in the court house every Wednesday and Saturday beginning at 9 o'clock and closing at 4:30 o'clock. The Health Department is taking this step so that people of Pitt County can be inoculated against this dreaded disease which takes a toll of lives annually.

During the past year there were 78 cases of typhoid fever in Pitt county with 13 deaths.

The Bureau of Health Education of the North Carolina State Board of Health during last year for the first time in eight years showed an increase in the typhoid fever death rate over the previous year. The actual increase for the past year was eight deaths more than for the previous year. In 1923 there were 267 deaths in the state from this cause, the lowest number since accurate death statistics for the state have become available. In 1924 there were 275 deaths from typhoid reported.

Typhoid fever is one of the most easily preventable of all preventable diseases and an increase in it in all probability mean that there are many thousand of people in the state who are not taking advantage of available preventative measures.

A preventative of typhoid is available in typhoid vaccine, which is taken in three injections at intervals of one week. The immunity so gained is not permanent, but lasts for probably three years.

The typhoid vaccine is given absolutely free of charge by the Health Department.

Approves Partial Report on the Bills Overtures Committees

Lexington, Ky., May 25.—Reaffirming a previous deliverance, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the United States, approved the partial report on the Bills and Overtures Committee which held that "it is a settled doctrine of our church that women are excluded from licensure and ordination by the plain teaching of the scriptures, and therefore can not be admitted to our pulpits."

MAY COLD WAVE FOLLOWS A RECORD BREAKING H-EAT

While Chicago Experi- ences Coldest May 24 in History, San An- tonio Has Hottest May Day in 23 Years

New York, May 25.—An unprecedented May cold wave has swept the mid west and eastern sections of the United States on the heels of record-breaking heat. High wind, rain, hail and snow caused many Sunday shivers. Continued cold weather is forecast for today with slowly rising temperature for North Central states.

New straw hats and overcoats in combinations were numerous.

Pavements that were blistering hot Saturday were covered with snow yesterday in some sections. The mercury sank 47 degrees in 14 hours in New York. It dropped 66 degrees in 24 hours in Dubuque; 57 in 24 hours in Chicago; 49 in Cleveland; 48 in Philadelphia, and 52 in 48 hours in St. Louis.

Four deaths and a number of injuries were directly attributed to the heat and the subsequent rain, hail and snow. Property damage was estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. In Buffalo puddles formed by melting snow, were seen covered with ice in less than a day after the city suffered in a temperature of 90 degrees. Hail stones an inch in diameter shattered heavy plate glass window fronts in New York suburbs. Temperatures which were below the freezing point were reported from scores of cities. Chicago experienced the coldest May 24 in history of its weather bureau, 37. A snow fall in Portland, Maine, was at the latest May date that it has fallen there in 50 years.

Heat continued on the Sabbath in Texas. San Antonio with a temperature of 101 degrees had the hottest day in 23 years.

Continuous Firing Reported Cen. Sector of the Morocco Front

Paris, May 25.—Continuous firing is reported on the central sector of the Morocco front where the French are keeping in close contact with invading Rifians. Abd El Krim, the Rifian chief, is steadily reinforcing both wings of his front, but no further movement has been stated yet. The situation is likely to change now that the French reinforcements have nearly all reached the scene, and Lieutenant Daughram has been placed in command of the whole fighting area, with Generals Billotte and Count DeChambun under him.

General Daughram commanded the Morocco Division in the World War.

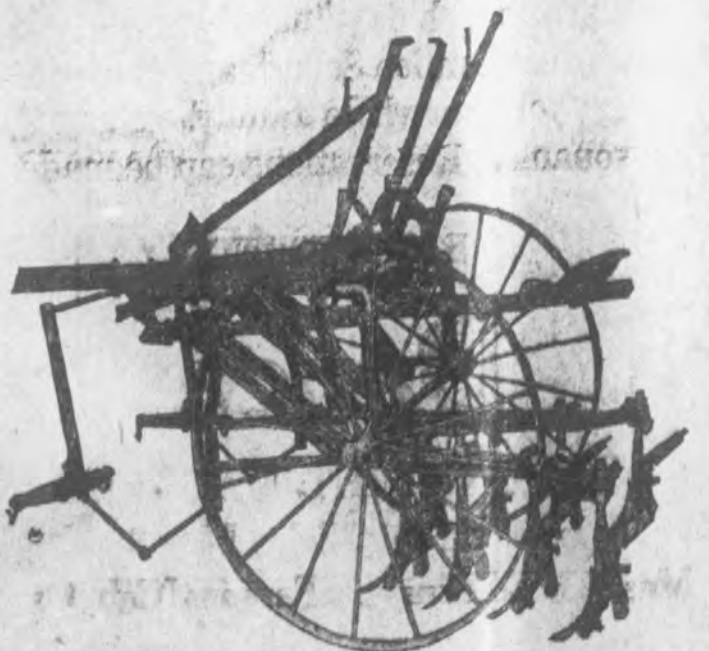
