COMMENCEMENT OF GREENVILLE HIGH SCHOOL IN PROGRESS

Rev. Dan Iverson Delivered Inspiring Sermon to Graduating Class; Closing Exercises Tomorrow

Tomorrow morning at ten o'clock in the auditorium of the High School Building will be held the graduating exercises of the members of the Seventh Grades of the Greenville Schools. At that time they will be received into the High School and awarded certificates. There will be music by the Glee Club, the High School Orchestra, and then a short address. The program will only last about thirty minutes.

Tomorrow evening in the High School auditorium at 8 o'clock will be held the graduating exercises of the class of 1925, bringing to a close one of the best years, if not the very best, in the history of the local schools. The annual address to the members of the graduating class will be delivered by Mr. Gilbert T. Stephenson of Raleigh, North Carolina. Mr. Stephenson is a banker by profession, but finds time enough from his work to take a great interest in the school and church affairs of the state. He is a graduate of Wake Forest College, and a member of the Board of Trustees of that institution. He is an attractive public speaker and is often called upon. He is a prominent member of the Kiwanis Club of Raleigh and takes an active part in the work of that organization. In addition to the address of Mr. Stephenson, there will be three special numbers by the High School Glee Club under the direction of Miss Eugenia Thomas. Also there will be one instrumental trio by members of the High School orchestra. The award of diplomas will be by Mr. J. B. Winslow, acting chairman of the school board. The President of the School Board, Mr. J. L. Little, and the Vice-President Judge H. W. Whedbee are both confined to their homes on account of sickness. Supt. J. H. Rose will award the honors for the year and Mr. Davis, Principal of the High School will announce the winners of the John Edwin Scoville Memorial Cup.

Seats will be reserved until eight o'clock for the parents of the graduates. The program will begin promptly at 8 o'clock and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Baccalaureate Sermon
A message of unusual spirituality and sincerity was brought to the Senior Class of Greenville High School last night when the Rev. Dan Iverson of Tarboro, N. C., addressed the class in the first of the programs given as part of the closing exercises of the local school. Mr. Iverson's message was marked by its simplicity and depth of feeling and made a profound impression not only on the members of the class but the parents and friends of the graduates who crowded the high-school auditorium.

The High School Glee Club showed to special advantage in the rendition of three numbers which were prepared for the occasion under the direction of Mrs. Eugenia Thomas of the high school faculty. The club showed ability in each of its numbers but Gounod's "Jerusalem, O Turn Thee" was especially well received. Washington, June 1.—Oregon lost in the Supreme Court today its fight to compel children to attend the public schools.

THOS. R. MARSHALL DIED EARLY TODAY WASHINGTON, D. C.

Was Vice-President During the Wilson Administration; Will Be Buried at Marion, Ind.

Washington, June 1.—Thomas R. Marshall, war time Vice-President of the United States, died here today. He passed away at the New Willard Hotel where he had been ill for several days with a cold and heart trouble.

The end came unexpectedly as the former vice-president had shown improvement during the week he had been confined to his hotel room, and plans had been made for his return to his home in Indianapolis some time this week.

Accompanied by his wife, Mr. Marshall came to Washington a week ago today. Upon his arrival he went directly to the hotel complaining of great exhaustion. When physicians were summoned, it was found he had suffered from a heart attack. He regained strength gradually and soon was in such a condition that it was possible for Mrs. Marshall to leave his bedside.

Death resulted from a recurrence of the heart attack, which he suffered a week ago.

Tentative plans were made for the burial at Marion, Indianapolis, near his father and mother, and a foster child who died recently.

When the end came the former vice-president had been sitting up in bed reading from the Bible, to which he had turned throughout his life for consolation and guidance and into whose passages he often delved in his office adjoining the Senate Chamber in moments when his presence was not required as presiding officer. Only a nurse was at his bedside, Mrs. Marshall being in an adjoining room. Suddenly slumping down upon pillows he passed away without a word and apparently without pain.

Upholds Trade Ass'n. Method Corp. Within Great Industries

Washington, June 1.—The trade association method of corporation within great industries was upheld by the Supreme Court today over the protest of the Federal Government. Laying down principles of far reaching importance to the business world, the court decision, that neither the Cement Manufacturing Protective Association nor the Maple Flooring Manufacturing Association was invalid to the Anti-trust laws. The operation of these two associations had been declared by government counsel to be similar and typical of a movement against great business concerns pooling at interests in violation of the Sherman Act under the guise of merely exchange trade information. With that contention, the Supreme Court disagreed in holding that both associations were operating lawfully.

Dr. William Black Conducting Revival Services Holly Wood

Dr. William Black, of Charlotte, well known evangelist, is conducting revival services at Holly Wood School House near this city. The first services of the revival were conducted yesterday with a large attendance. The revival services will continue through this week and next and two services will be held daily at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. Mr. Burr, evangelistic singer, is aiding Dr. Black in the services. Both Dr. Black and Mr. Burr are well known by the people of this community by reason of having conducted revival services here in the Presbyterian and Methodist churches.

Condition of Weeks Reported Today As "Not So Good"

Boston, June 1.—Secretary of War, Weeks, who was operated upon for gall stones at the Massachusetts General Hospital last week, passed a restless night, and his physicians announced today his general condition was "not so good."

PRES. COOLIDGE IS PERSUADED TO RIDE IN PRIVATE CARS

To Assure Complete Protection Officials Urge President Not to Ride in Regular Train

Washington, June 1.—Stressing the necessity of adequate safety precaution and facility, operating officials have persuaded President Coolidge to do his train riding in a special train, or private cars rather than share the regular accommodation of other passengers. Complying with suggestions from officials of the railroads, the president will travel in a private train to St. Paul, Minn., where on June 8 he is to deliver an address at the Norse-American Centennial. It is probable also that a special car will be used when Mr. Coolidge goes to Swampscott, Mass., late in June on his vacation.

When the President and Mrs. Coolidge went to Chicago several months ago, they rode a regular train. It was pointed out at the time that a considerable saving in traveling expenses was affected, but railroad officials emphasized the difficulties in assuring complete protection for distinguished passengers, and also in operation of the train.

One other trip is scheduled for Mr. Coolidge before the White House is moved to New England. Next Wednesday he will motor to Annapolis to address the graduating class at the academy.

Meanwhile the president is making every effort to put affairs of his office in such shape as will permit him to leave for Swampscott as soon after June 22 as possible. On that date he will address the semi-annual business meeting of the government. It is planned to arrange for the handling here of much of the routine business of the White House after the president leaves.

Adverse Report Looked for Property Leasing of Power Muscle Shoals

Washington, June 1.—An adverse report on the property leasing of the power at Muscle Shoals, Ala., is expected to be recommended to the War Department by the Muscle Shoals Commission.

This is the sentiment of members of the commission now in Washington, who also have been in touch with other members. The War Department sometime ago asked the advice of the Commission with regard to the proposed leasing of the power. The Commission's answer will be drawn up at a meeting called by chairman McKenzie for June 10, in this city. Investigation of Muscle Shoals property has led to the conclusion that the new power, expected to be available by July 1, as a result of work on the Wilson Dam, will not be ready until at least November 1. By that time the commission is expected to have drawn up its report on the disposition of this property and it will be submitted to Congress in December.

Ion Perdicaris Died In London Today

London, June 1.—Ion Perdicaris, whose capture by the Moroccan Bandit, Raisuli, in 1904, created international crisis involving the American Government and the Sultan of Morocco, died today at his home near here. An American citizen, although a resident of Morocco for 20 years, Perdicaris was taken from his home in the outskirts of Pangir, together with his English stepson, and held by Raisuli for ransom. The bandit demanded the payment of \$50,000 and also certain political communication. After fruitless conferences between the bandit and efforts of the Sultan, a landing party was prepared and Secretary of State, Hay, issued his famous dictum, "Perdicaris alive, or Raisuli dead."

Three days later the Sultan agreed to meet the condition, and the two men were set free.

SIX MEN DIE IN MINE ACCIDENT

Birmingham, June 1.—Six white miners were killed early last night in a mine accident at Piper, Alabama, reports to the Little Cababa Coal Company, owners of the mine here said. Death is believed to have been caused by an accumulation of afterdamp in an unused heading of the mine, which the six men were exploring. There was no explosion.

SHANGHAI RIOTING SPREADS BUSINESS SECTION OF THE CITY

Rioting Started as a Protest Against Conviction of 17 Chinese Workers in a Japanese Mill

San Francisco, June 1.—Rioting in Shanghai, which resulted in 16 deaths Saturday when students stormed a police station, spread to the business section of the Chinese city today, according to cables dispatched, and 20 additional demonstrators were wounded by the police. The rioting started as a protest against the conviction in the courts of 17 Chinese workers in a Japanese cotton mill, for participation in a strike disorder. Shanghai dispatches said a troupe of American cavalry and a company of volunteer corps, armed with rifles and rifles began patrolling the districts as the Chinese police were withdrawn.

BARACA PHILATHEA STATE CONVENTION BE HELD RALEIGH

Sessions Will Open Thursday Night, June 11th, and Continue Until Sunday Night

Raleigh, N. C., May 30.—The Baracas and Philatheas of Raleigh are making elaborate preparations for the entertainment of delegates and visitors to the "Silver Jubilee" session of the Baraca-Philathea State Convention, which will begin its sessions at the Tabernacle Baptist Church, Thursday night, June 11th and will continue daily sessions until Sunday night. The opening session will be featured by an address of welcome by Governor A. W. McLean, and the key-note address of the convention by Robert N. Simms, organizer of the first Baraca Class in the South and teacher for nearly twenty-five years.

Rev. Morece F. Ham, the noted revivalist, will preach a special sermon to the convention at the City Auditorium, at 2:30 Friday afternoon, June 21st. The Ham-Ramsey party has hosts of friends in this section who will welcome an opportunity to hear them again, and it is expected that the auditorium will be packed to its capacity.

Hon. Jeremiah Daniels, former Secretary of the U. S. Navy, will be the principal speaker of the great mass-meeting Sunday afternoon, June 14th, at the Tabernacle Baptist Church. His subject will be "The Challenge to Christianity." Mr. Daniels is one of the foremost Sunday school teachers and Christian laymen in the State, and his message on this occasion will be an inspiration to Sunday school workers who hear him.

The Tabernacle Baptist Church is planning to install a radio broadcast station, and expect to have it in operation in time to broadcast the convention program. Definite announcement will be made later through the press.

Among the social features of the convention will be an informal reception to the visitors on Thursday night, a sight seeing tour of the city Friday afternoon, which is made possible by the civic club of Raleigh, a banquet on Friday night.

Music will be a feature of the convention, and the addresses will be interspersed with several special

BETHEL SCHOOLS CLOSE SUCCESSFUL SESSION ON FRIDAY

Dr. M. C. S. Nobles Delivers Graduating Address; Fourteen Diplomas Delivered by Mr. Page

Bethel, N. C., June 1.—The Bethel community is somewhat aglow with praise for the successful school year which has just closed. Under the very able guidance of Professors E. B. Page and R. N. Grimes the school has undoubtedly experienced one of its greatest years. In the high school the work done has been of such a grade as to place the community forever in debt to the very strong staff of teachers.

The commencement exercises began three weeks ago when the primary and grammar grade departments gave their programs on successive Friday nights. This was done in order not to interfere with the school work for a single day. These programs were pronounced great by the Bethel people. The music class, under the direction of Miss Mary Kenney and Mrs. E. B. Page, also gave a program which was greatly enjoyed.

Thursday evening of this week, however, saw the seniors adorn their best frocks and white trousers for the purpose of "getting off" the graduation exercises. This part of the program was preceded by the junior play, Seventeen, which was given Wednesday evening by the junior class. All of this, however, seems to take a place—not in the background, to be sure—but at least to one side of the class day exercises.

The program on this Thursday evening began with a song by the class of 1925. As the seniors came on the stage the people were treated with a rare sight, for the woodland decorations and scenery—a very expensive gift of the outgoing class—was used to great advantage. The class took its place on the stage and proceeded with its program, including Salutary by James Smith; History by Camille Staton; Explanation of class colors and flower by Hortense Lewis; Oration by Martin L. Carson; Statistics by Annie Dare Hooker; Poem by Doris Whitehurst; Last Will and Testament by Effie Martin; Gifforian's speech by Ronald Redict; Class Prophecy by Elizabeth Harper; President's address by Hubert Burroughs; Class song worded by a member of the class, Elizabeth Andrews.

Perhaps the most striking part of this program was that of the Prophecy. The members retired from the stage, and the class prophet, as she foresaw each one ten years hence, called each individual on the stage again dressed as he would appear a decade later. This was indeed very interesting and provoked many laughs from the audience. This program was declared a very great success.

Another evening of pleasure, however, awaited the school patrons on Friday evening, for on this evening the senior class was to lower, officially, the curtain of high school life. A more fitting lowering cannot be found, for who denies the ability of Dr. M. C. S. Nobles of the University of North Carolina on such occasions? Dr. Nobles "ably" did his part. His address was full of humor and good advice to graduates as well as patrons. He was introduced by J. A. Staton after the Rev. Leland Smith of Memorial Baptist Church, Greenville, had delivered the invocation.

After Dr. Nobles' speech Supt. E. B. Page delivered the diplomas. After the awarding of these diplomas, the class valedictorian, Frances Barnhill, very ably delivered her address. This act rung down the "Finis" of the high school class of 1925; however the Bethel community is looking to them for things even greater than the programs which they so successfully rendered during the past two days.

REV. FRANK D. DEAN DELIVERS SERMON TEACHERS COLLEGE

Sunday's Program of Commencement Featured by Baccalaureate Sermon and Vesper Services

Sunday morning in the Auditorium of East Carolina Teachers College, Rev. Frank D. Dean, of Wilmington, N. C., preached the commencement sermon to the largest graduating class in the history of the college. The text of the sermon was "And Christ increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man," and the theme of the discourse was Living a Religion.

The sermon was a masterly effort, and the immense congregation, overflowing the auditorium and filling all available space in the halls and corridors, by its silence and rapt attention, paid high tribute to the speaker and his subject.

Mr. Dean, with his earnestness and simple eloquence, won his way straight to the hearts of his audience, and few sermons ever delivered here have so pleased the college and city hearers.

Special music was furnished by the Y. W. C. A. choir, with a solo by Miss Catherine Grantham, and special violin selections by Miss Gorrell and Miss Wedmore.

The evening service was an innovation for Teachers College commencement: A Vesper service in the grove on West Campus. There is no more beautiful spot in the state for such a service. A natural amphitheatre, heavily wooded, where thorns and can see and hear comfortably, was the scene of this service. The weather was ideal and conditions perfect for making the service a success, and the scene will live long in the memory of all present.

The dusk of the woods, the quiet of the evening, the hush of the assembled worshippers and the voice of the violins as the strains of "Hark, Hark My Soul," silenced the voices of the birds.

The exercises were of a responsive nature, Miss Ella Outland, acting as the leader. Mr. Dean was the speaker, and as in the morning service special music was rendered by the Y. W. C. A. choir, Misses Gorrell and Wedmore with the violins.

As the service drew to a quiet close and the choir, singing, slowly wound its way up the sloping hillside, the mocking birds began their vespers adding the last touch to the impressiveness of the scene.

Monday noon will be the occasion for the Alumnae banquet, and already hundreds of former students are on the hill. Monday night will be given the Alumnae Recital, and Monday afternoon class day exercises of the Senior Classes, both Professional and College.

Mack Shirley Is Shot and Killed By Zeb Moore

Mack Shirley, 19, negro, was shot and killed yesterday by Zeb Moore, 12, at the home of Moore who lives on the farm of Mr. Joe Parker, three miles of Farmville. The coroner's jury returned the verdict that Mack Shirley came to his death from gun shot wounds in the hands of Zeb Moore while being handled in a careless and unthoughtful way. They recommended that Moore be held on a manslaughter charge to be given a hearing in Juvenile Court.

Zeb Moore who is only 12 years of age in his statement to the coroner's jury declared that he did not intend to shoot Shirley but was only playing with the gun. It appeared from other evidence produced that no gurrel had taken place and no words exchanged other than that Moore went in the house got the gun and shot Shirley. The shot took effect in the left temple, death being instantaneous.

In this morning's session of Juneville Court, Zeb Moore was found guilty of manslaughter and given into the custody of the sheriff to be held until the Judge of the Juvenile Court can decide on a reformatory to which to send him.

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BACK TO THE FACTS

In view of the time that has elapsed since the oil leasing scandals were brought to light and the efforts of the Dohenys and Sinclair now to cover up the same with the assertion that the charges were "born of politics" the New York World in reviewing the facts lest the nation forget, says:

"Because of his indictment again by a Washington Grand Jury Edward L. Doheny finds occasion to declare that the oil cases were 'born of politics.' Of late Harry F. Sinclair and some of his spokesmen have talked in much the same way. If Albert Bacon Fall were not courting obscurity he would probably make the same declaration.

"Neither Fall nor Sinclair nor Doheny desires to discuss plain facts of record. Because of repeated delays in the courts they hope that the public may have forgotten the facts.

So now it looks worth while to appeal for sympathy as victims of 'politically inspired charges.'

"The truth is that no word of the leasing of Teapot Dome to Sinclair reached Congress until it was brought to the attention of the Senate by Senator Kendrick of Wyoming. Then Senator LaFollette dug deeper into the mystery. It was not a question then of fraud and corruption but of complete reversal of the conservation policy of Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson by a Secretary of the Interior from New Mexico who had been hostile to the general policy of conservation.

"It was more than twenty months later that evidence of dishonesty was exposed by the Senate Oil Investigation Committee under Senator Walsh's leadership. It was not until Fall and Doheny were caught in a network of lies that the delivery of the black satchel with \$100,000 in bills from the oil man to the Secretary of the Interior was revealed. It was not until then that the relations of Fall and Sinclair and his agents were brought to light. The Continental Trading Company deal was not heard of until even later. It was kept out of the Teapot Dome trial at Cheyenne this spring because well-known oil men whom the Government wanted as witnesses had placed themselves beyond reach of the United States Courts. But it will be gone into again in all its bearings, including the transfer of Liberty bonds to Fall, before these cases end.

"If Doheny or Sinclair or any other participants in the naval oil reserve leases can derive consolation from repeating that the oil cases were 'born of politics' or 'politically inspired,' there is nothing to rob them of that consolation. But they will need a better defense than that when they face criminal charges in the courts."

After court the Mayor took up with the officers the question of better enforcement of the law against persons under 16 years of age operating automobiles, and instructed them to enforce this law rigidly by not only placing the operators under arrest, but by also obtaining warrants for the parents for allowing them to sto violate the law. This is a

State law and it provided that the parents, guardian or other persons responsible for the child and who allow them to operate motor vehicles are also guilty. The police officers replied that in many instances in which they suspected that the operators were under 16 years of age, the parents would inform them that the child was 16, and for this reason the arrest would not be made. Of course the parents are in the best position to know the age of their children, and we hope they will not misinform the police, as such a course would only tend to encourage in the child a disrespect for law and order, in which event the parents would be aiding and abetting to that extent and if the child thus encouraged violates other laws and brings trouble to the parents, there is no one to blame but themselves. However, it might be added that in case of an accident or injury, and it were proven in court that the child was under 16 years of age, there would of course be no question about their liability, both criminal and civil.
