Demand for Credit
Reserve Bank Increased
Between Apr 15 May 15

Richmond, Va., June 2.—The demand for credit at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond increased materially between April 15 and May 15, it is indicated in the monthly review just issued. This was attributed to crop planting.

The volume of member banks borrowing at the Reserve Bank rose from \$40,652,000 on April 15 to \$46,201,000 on May 15, and member bank reserve deposits were reduced during the same period from \$66,266,000 to \$60,824,000.

The volume of Federal Reserve notes in actual circulation decreased from \$75,350,000 on April 15 to \$73,352,000 on May 15, the need at this season being for bank credit rather than currency.

As a result of the changes in the items mentioned, the cash reserves of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond dropped from \$94,039,000 on April 15 to \$83,684,000 on May 15 and the ratio of cash reserves to combined note and deposit liabilities declined from 64.90 per cent to 60.77 per cent.

N. C. STATE NURSES
ASS'N. IN CONFAB
ASHEVILLE TODAY

About 200 Nurses From All
Parts of State in Attendance;
Splendid Reports Feature
the Session

Asheville, June 2.—Reports from district and state officers featured the initial business session this morning of the North Carolina Association holding its annual conference here. About 200 nurses from all parts of the state were present. Miss Blanche Stafford, of Winston-Salem, president of the association, is presiding.

The Asheville district reported that a lot has been purchased upon which it is planned to build a nurses' home. Charlotte also reported an active program for the year with 58 new members added, while Greensboro reported the completion of a year book with the state laws in it and other matters of interest to that district.

the demand for credits was much more marked this year in the Fifth District than was the case in the spring of 1924, the volume of credit outstanding at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond is smaller now than on May 15, 1924, an apparently paradoxical condition made possible by the low point to which credit demand sank in mid-winter.

"On May 15, 1924, member bank borrowing at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond totaled \$58,223,000, compared with \$48,201,000 on May 15 this year. The member bank reserve deposits rose from \$60,601,000 to \$60,824,000 during the year, and the cash reserves of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond increased from \$83,387,000 to \$83,684,000, both gains being little more than daily fluctuations. The ratio of cash reserves to note and deposit liabilities combined rose from 59.15 per cent on May 15, last year, to 60.77 per cent the same date this year.

"Between February 15 and May 15 this year, member bank borrowing at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond rose approximately \$23,000,000, and the Reserve Bank's reserve ratio declined 23.88 points, while between the same two dates in 1924, member bank borrowing increased only \$12,000,000 and the reserve ratio declined 11.60 points. Outstanding loans to member banks a little more than doubled between February 15 and May 15, this year."

Norwegian Gov. to
Send 2 Seaplanes to
Search for Amundsen

Oslo, June 2.—The Norwegian government has decided to send two seaplanes to the Arctic Circle preparatory to a search for the Amundsen-Ellsworth flying expedition to the North Pole, which started from Spitzbergen on May 21, and has not been heard from since.

It was announced today that the government has selected the ship Ingette to transport two sea planes toward the arctic from whence they will undertake a search for the explorers. She probably will sail for the ships on Friday. Official announcement of the Norwegian Government's decision to send two planes in search of Amundsen was made this afternoon. The general opinion was expressed here that Amundsen was unable to return by air and that he would proceed on foot to Cape Columbia or Spitzbergen.

Chinese Gov. Protests

Peking, June 2.—The Chinese government through its foreign office here today protested in a note to other powers against the violence used in suppressing student demonstrations at Shanghai. The protest, sent through Italian Minister Ceruti, Chief of Foreign Ministers at Peking, declares that the students are young men of good families, unarmed, full of patriotism, and should not be treated as common malefactors.

Marcelles, France, June 2.—Police searched communists centers here today and announced they found a quantity of anti-militarist pamphlets and letters said to have come from Toulon and described as giving exact information regarding men and material sent by France to Morocco.

COUNTRY DWELLERS WITS

Gloucester, England.—Contrary to general belief, persons living in the country have the greatest amount of brains as compared with city dwellers, according to E. F. L. Wood, British minister of agriculture. "I want to combat a delusion of the city and town folks," said Mr. Wood speaking in Gloucester recently, "that the country child, man or woman is less clever and intelligent than his brothers and sisters in the congested districts. The truth is that agriculture and the things associated with it demand a greater measure of intelligence, enterprise and grip than the work done by the thousands of townsmen."

FINALS OF SALEM
COLLEGE CONDUCTED
AT NOON TODAY

Robert L. Strowd Donates \$6,000 as Permanent Memorial Fund to Aid Deserving Students

Winston-Salem, June 2.—The 135 annual commencement exercises at Salem College were concluded at noon today with an address by Governor McLean and presentation of diplomas to members of the Senior Class and honor graduates.

It was announced that Robert L. Strowd, of Chapel Hill, had donated \$6,000 to the college to establish the Mary Louise Strowd permanent memorial fund to aid deserving students. Mr. Strowd presented this fund as memorial to his daughter, Mary Louise, who was a student at Salem College, graduating in 1914 as President of her class. She later returned as teacher of English and died in 1918.

In his address, Governor McLean discussed political economy and education in general.

Chinese Students
Fire Upon Unit of
U. S. Volunteer Corps

Shanghai, June 2.—Chinese students of participants today fired from base tops in three directions into the Shanghai streets upon a unit of the American Volunteer Corps, shooting Thomas G. McMartin in the back and killing the horse upon which he was riding.

America and other foreign units returned the fire of the Chinese. Machine guns were mounted quickly in the streets and sent shots in the direction of structures from which the Chinese started firing. The number of casualties are not estimated. The shooting of the American, who is a corporal in the Volunteer organization attempting with other foreign units to restore order in Shanghai, marked the first use of rifles by the Chinese since the demonstration started Saturday, as a protest against the conviction of 17 Chinese strikers who left Japanese owned spinning mills near Shanghai. The last outbreak occurred Saturday afternoon.

Several lesser frays were developed tonight in other sections of Shanghai.

Condition of Cotton
Crop 76.6 Per Cent
of Normal on May 25

Washington, June 2.—The conditions of the cotton crop was 76.6 percent of normal on May 25, compared with 65.6 a year ago, and 72 the ten year May 25 average, the Department of Agriculture today announced. Acreage figures will be announced next month when the first forecast of production will be made.

Condition of the cotton crop by states follow: Virginia 72, North Carolina 74, South Carolina 71, Georgia 78, Florida 88, Alabama 80, Mississippi 84, Louisiana 80, Texas 70, Arkansas 86, Tennessee 82, Missouri 77, Arizona 90, New Mexico 85, Oklahoma 86, California 98. All other states 90.

Washington, June 2.—Condition of the cotton crop of May 25 reported today by the Department of Agriculture as 76.6 percent of normal, is the highest on that date since 1918.

The French suggested that Morocco be included in the African Zone, to which shipment of arms would be prohibited under the proposed agreement.

Boston, June 2.—Secretary of War, John W. Weeks, who was operated on last Wednesday at the Massachusetts General Hospital for gall stones, was somewhat better this morning, said a bulletin issued by his physicians. However, his condition was described as still "not entirely satisfactory."

Italians Told to Behave.
Rome.—A stern warning against attempting to enter the United States by illegal means has been issued to prospective Italian emigrants by Senator Luigi Luiggi. He has pointed out the severe steps taken against clandestine immigrants by the American authorities, and has urged prospective emigrants either to await their turn in the quota or, better still, to go to France or Argentina.

WASHINGTON PAYS
TRIBUTE TO MEMORY
THOMAS MARSHALL

Funeral Services for War-Time
Vice-President to Be Held
Saturday Morning in In-
dianapolis

Washington, June 2.—Shocked by the suddenness of his passing, Washington took full advantage today of its brief opportunity to honor the memory of Thomas R. Marshall, war time vice-president, who died here yesterday.

Only one funeral service will be held late today before the body is taken back to Mr. Marshall's native state of Indiana, but the nation's tribute will be paid in that brief space. Surrounded by high officers of the government, in which the kindly man occupied such an important role during the eight historic years, the funeral services will be held at the New Willard Hotel here where the death occurred. President Coolidge will attend in behalf of the people.

Funeral services will be held by the Rev. Dr. Charles Wood, of the Church of the Covenant where the Marshall's attended during their residence in Washington. The journey to the Marshall home in Indianapolis will then be started, the train leaving at 6:30 o'clock. It is expected that Indianapolis will be reached shortly before noon tomorrow.

Continuing the watch she has kept at the bedside of her husband while he struggled to overcome a severe cold and attending exhaustion, Mrs. Marshall will make the trip home with the body. Although the shock of the death of her husband rendered more poignant to her because she had until the final moment rejoiced in his apparent recovery, she has bravely stood the event. The funeral services will be held at the Marshall's home on Sunday morning by the Scottish Rite Masons.

LAWYER MISTAKEN
FOR RUM RUNNER IS
SHOT BY DETECTIVE

Stephen S. Holt, ex-Smithfield
Shot and Killed By Jesse
Wyatt, Captain of De-
tectives

Raleigh, June 2.—Solicitor William F. Evans, stated at 2:30 this afternoon that a bill had been sent to the Wake county grand jury, now in session, charging Jesse L. Wyatt, Raleigh plainclothes policeman, with the murder of Samuel S. Holt, of Smithfield, on the Raleigh-Smithfield highway yesterday afternoon. The solicitor at the same time, stated that he had preferred no charges against Chief of Police J. W. Bryan, who was in company with Wyatt when he shot Mr. Holt.

Raleigh, June 2.—Jesse Wyatt, Captain of the plain clothes squad of the Raleigh police force, is held in state prison without bond for action of the Wake county grand jury, and Steven S. Holt, prominent lawyer of Smithfield, is dead as the result of the action of the police officer yesterday afternoon in firing on an automobile in which the lawyer was a passenger. Captain Wyatt testified at the Coroner's jury late yesterday that he thought the machine contained liquor runners and that it failed to halt when he ordered it to, and he fired. A search of the automobile revealed no liquor.

The killing occurred late yesterday when Mr. Holt was returning to his home near Smithfield from the session of North Carolina District Court here. He was accompanied by others, who had attended court, the car being driven by Dock Woodard. Wyatt and Chief of Police, J. Winder Bryan, of Raleigh, were on the Garner road testing out police motorcycles. Seeing two automobiles they testified at the Coroner's inquest that Wyatt suspected they might be liquor runners. Wyatt further testified that one of the cars started away and he called on it to halt. The order, he said, was not obeyed, and he fired at the tires of the car. The bullet passed through the rear curtain of the automobile and into Mr. Holt's brain, causing almost instant death. Wyatt claimed the bullet had bounced from the concrete road and struck the lawyer.

Neither of the officers were in uniform and a search of both automobiles failed to reveal any traces of liquor. Wyatt surrendered following the killing and was placed in the Wake county jail. Subsequently he was removed to the state prison for safe keeping. Holt is survived by a widow and three children.

Navarro to Be Given
'Dummy Diploma' With
Annapolis Graduates

Washington, June 1.—The Navy Department's publicity scheme to have Ramon Navarro, movie actor, line up with the Graduates at Annapolis next Wednesday and receive from President Coolidge a dummy diploma, the whole event to be filmed will go through as scheduled so far as Secretary Wilbur is concerned. "I regard the matter as settled," the secretary declared. Adding that he had not planned to talk with the president about it. At the White House it was said some officials were dubious about a plan to involve the president in a publicity venture. Naval officers declared the Annapolis film would serve a good purpose in giving the public a better understanding of the navy.

Lieut. Fred Rohow
Found Guilty Today
of Possessing Liquor

Norfolk, Va., June 2.—Lieutenant Fred M. Rohow, of the Naval Transport Beaufort, was found guilty today of possessing liquor aboard a ship in violation of service regulations. He was acquitted of three other charges growing out of the raid of the vessel when she docked here from the West Indies on February 24.

OUTLAW CABIN IN NEVADA TURNED INTO RADIO CHURCH

Tonopah, Nev.—In the hills near the new gold camp of Gilbert, 30 miles from here, is an old stone structure known as the Outlaw's Cabin. It has stood for 50 years or more. Many tales are told of this rendezvous of the desperadoes who once infested the desert country. It was here they gathered to plan their stage hold-ups and periodic raids on the scattered settlements—or to divide the booty, an occasion that often ended in a bloody fight. Many bullet scars in the walls and dark streaks on the floor testify to the former character of the place.

Recently the name of the cabin was changed to the Radio Church. The discoveries of gold in the surrounding hills lately, bringing a stampede of prospectors, provided a new use for the old landmark. Every Sunday evening it is filled with those who listen in on a sermon delivered several hundred miles away.

Some of the grizzled old-timers are a bit bewildered at the rapid march of progress, but gradually they are becoming used to radio talks and concerts in remote places, to prospecting with an automobile instead of with a string of burros.

ELECTRIC WIRE FINDS ORE

THIRTY FEET UNDERGROUND

Stockholm.—By their unique electrical prospecting methods, Swedish mining engineers have located for the government valuable ore fields in the northern part of the country. The newly discovered deposits contain copper, arsenic, zinc and even gold in small quantities.

These successful methods of location are based on the greater conductivity of beds of ore than of the surrounding rock. At one point a deposit of copper pyrite was located 30 feet down under a sandy plain nearly two miles from the nearest ore-containing boulders. At another place a mother lode containing 7 percent of copper was found under a frozen lake, below 30 feet of water and ten feet of mud. The Lundberg Nathorst method utilizes electrically charged wires laid in shallow trenches. Through a telephone the prospectors literally "listen out" the presence of ore. The Sunberg system is independent of galvanic contacts with the earth, and depends entirely on electro-magnetic phenomena.

These two methods have now been combined and under the direction of Swedish mining engineers electrical prospecting is being carried out in different parts of the United States, Canada, South Africa, Spain, Finland, and Norway.
