TUNNEY KNOCKS OUT TOM GIBBONS IN TWELFTH ROUND

Accomplishes What No Other Heavyweight Boxer Has Ever Been Able to Do

New York, June 6.—The shadow of a New York heavyweight who climbed to pugilistic fame, from the trenches of the World War, today stretched across the path of Jack Dempsey.

Gene Tunney has done what no other heavy weight boxer, not even Jack Dempsey, has been able to do—knocked out Tom Gibbons. After eleven rounds of fighting without thrills, the former E. E. F. heavy weight boxer sent the game veteran from St. Paul down for the count under a smacking right through the chin in the twelfth round.

The winner, whom Dempsey has promised to meet, fought well throughout the bout, but Gibbons appeared only a shell of the great boxer who stood off the champion at Shelby. While Gibbons was fighting his wife lay ill in a St. Paul hospital, and many said that worry over her condition had much to do with his defeat. Gibbons, however, said he had done his best, but it's best was not enough.

TOLL OF HOT WAVE AND STORMS HAS NOW REACHED 238

98 Persons Died Yesterday From Causes Traced to Torrid Weather East and West of Ohio

Chicago, June 6.—The toll of the hot wave accompanied by storms reached 238 today 98 having died throughout the country yesterday from causes traced to the torrid weather 69 being in the territory east of the Ohio and 29 in the territory west of there. In addition to these one death was reported from Montreal, Canada. At least two more days of the torrid weather are in prospect with a probability of the highest temperature at some points that has been recorded this year, the weather bureau predicts.

Marquette, Michigan with a temperature of 102 degrees was the hottest point in the central west yesterday and throughout Minnesota and North Dakota last night there were wind and electrical storms brought about by the torrid weather. However yesterday in Yellow Stone National Park the temperature was 38 with snow in evidence in certain sections of the park.

Each child will be assigned a definite day and definite hour. This assigned time will be indicated on a card given each child, and the parents are urged to note the time indicated on the card and see to it that the child reports at the proper time. The schools are not in session now and the success of the project, depends entirely upon the support which the parents of the town give it.

RICHARD LOEB IS SUFFERING FROM MENTAL BREAKUP

Physicians Say Condition Will Improve or Become Fatal- ly Within 48 Hours

Joilet, Ill., June 6.—Richard Loeb, the master mind who with Nathan Leopold, plotted the murder of Robt. Franks, is suffering a mental breakdown and is in a state, which according to physicians, will improve or terminate fatally within forty-eight hours.

The boy has recently suffered an acute attack of measles, which weakened him mentally and physically, and for two days he has been violent and has hurled objects at the guards and others who came near him.

Dr. Herman Adler, State Criminologist, has reported that the youth is in a "post infectious delirium." Dr. Adler is convinced that he is not feigning his illness.

SUPREME COURT TAKES UP HY WAY LOAN TEST CASE

Decision to Be Handed Down Before Court Adjourns June 24; Matter of Great Im- portance

Raleigh, June 6.—The Supreme Court today received for its consideration the test case brought from Johnson county involving the right of counties to loan money to the State Highway Commission to be repaid from funds available to the Commission at a later date. Attorney General Brummitt, had ruled that such procedure was illegal. The case is regarded as of great importance in road building circles. For five years the plan has been followed and approximately \$10,000,000 has been advanced to the Commission. A number of counties at the present time contemplate advancing funds for the building of roads within their borders, the Commission to repay the loans additional allotments from the state fund are on hand for these counties.

The court today received only the brief on the subject, there being no oral argument.

It was indicated that because of the importance of the matter, the decision would be handed down before court adjourns June 24, until the fall term.

Greensboro Leads State With \$13,176.39 for the Coal Glenn Relief Fund

Sanford, June 6.—Receipts of \$17,500 has been announced by J. W. Cunningham treasurer of the Coal Glenn relief fund for the aid of the sufferers from the recent explosion in the mine which took the lives of 53 men. Greensboro leads all the cities of the state with contributions of \$3,176.39 while Sanford led the smaller towns with contributions of \$2,000.

Coolidge Willing Call Conference in Effort Outlaw Gas

Washington, June 6.—President Coolidge is willing to call a conference of Nations in an effort to outlaw gas as a weapon of war if the Geneva Arms Traffic Conference fails to agree on the subject, but over night dispatches from Europe indicate that such a gathering will not be necessary. After hearing eloquent addresses by representative Theodore E. Burton, head of the American delegation, and Fall Boncour, of France, the Geneva conference last night voted to frame a special protocol banning the use of gas in war. The protocol would be submitted to all nations for signature. Mr. Burton announced to the conference that Mr. Coolidge stood ready to act in the matter, but he preferred that the delegates handle the gas question by special resolution based on provisions of a Washington agreement. He proposed immediate signature of it by all who could sign, but that it be left open for signature of all the world's governments.

Japanese Nonagenarians.

Tokyo. — In connection with the imperial gifts distributed to persons over 90 years of age, on the occasion of the royal silver wedding, the authorities found 19,500 persons in Japan who were eligible. Sixty per cent of these were women. Two women, 111 years of age each, held the longevity record.

CAMP GUARDS ARE HELD CHARGED WITH MURDER CONVICT

Coroner's Verdict States That Death of Negro Resulted From Whipping Adminis- tered by Guards

Rocky Mount, June 6. — W. C. Gulley and R. V. Tyler, road foreman and guard respectively, today face charges of murder growing out of the death of Joe Armstrong, negro convict, whose death a coroner's jury verdict stated resulted from a whipping administered by the foreman and guard. The warrants were sworn out for the two men this morning and they are being held without bail in the Edgecombe county jail pending a preliminary hearing which indications are will not be held for several days.

Coroner's Verdict.—The verdict of a coroner's jury holding responsible for the death of Joe Armstrong, negro convict, a whipping administered him by W. C. Gulley and R. V. Tyler, road foreman and guard respectively, who are being held, today is pending grand jury consideration of the charges. The inquest was conducted late yesterday at the prison camp road force just outside this city and was presided over by Dr. Henry L. Large, city health officer and acting coroner, who with two other physicians performed an autopsy over the body of the dead convict.

Immediately after the finding of the jury the two men who had been arrested when the negro died, were turned over to Sheriff Martin, of Edgecombe county, as it was in that county where the whipping is alleged to have taken place.

Evidence at the inquest was submitted by four road camp guards and one prisoner. They testified that the negro was severely beaten by both the accused men and then he had been hitched behind a pair of mules and dragged approximately 75 yards. The negro died soon afterward, the witnesses testified.

REV. LELAND O'BRIEN BECOMES PASTOR OF IMMANUEL BAPTIST

Will Preach His Initial Ser- mon Sunday Morning; Pub- lic Cordially Invited

Rev. Leland O'Brien arrived this week to assume his duties as pastor of the Immanuel Baptist Church. He will preach his first sermon Sunday morning.

Mr. O'Brien has been serving as pastor of the Mount Olive Baptist church for the past four years and comes to Greenville with the reputation of being one of the best young preachers of the Baptist denomination in this section of the state. He possesses an attractive personality and has already won a host of friends during the few days spent here.

Amundsen's Auxiliary Committee Asked to Take Charge of Search

Oslo, Norway, June 6.—Captain Amundsen's auxiliary committee in New York is to be asked to take charge of and co-operate with the Donald B. MacMillan American expedition in the work of searching off Greenland for traces of the members of the Amundsen polar flight. The decision was reached at a meeting of the authorities who will have charge of the Norwegian arctic expedition to search for Amundsen.

The French explorer Dr. Jean Pécot will be asked to search the territory around east Greenland while the Norwegian expedition abroad the Ingette will patrol the waters from Spitzbergen from which place the Amundsen expedition started. The Ingette is due to leave the naval station at Horten sometime today with two planes aboard to aid in the search.

SCHACHT DECLARES GERMAN BOILER MAY BLOW UP

Comments on Disarmament Note and Says Nerves of Germans Have Just About Reached the Limit

Berlin, June 6.—President Schacht, of the Reichbank, commenting upon the allied disarmament note today said: "Our nerves have just about reached the cracking point and unless the allied and associated powers listen to reason and abandon their policy of political heckling the German boiler may blow up."

"The Germans deny that we are guilty of building up armaments for aggressive purposes," one official stated adding "the allies first objected to our having an army for offensive purposes and now are opposing to let us have one entirely devoted to the nation's defense."

The allied note sets forth an extensive list of demands which must be fulfilled before the evacuation of the "Cologne bridgehead under the terms of the Versailles treaty will be considered justifiable. The chief demands include the reduction of the German military force to 100,000, suppression of the short term enlistment by which it is alleged that Germany has been building up a great number of trained men, radical modifications of the Reichswehr general staff, abolition of the military character of the security police and the reduction of the force from 180,000 to 150,000 and the wholesale destruction of a number of industrial plants held to be adaptable for the production of war materials.

New York, June 6.—While French newspapers view the allied note to Germany on the disarmament subject as seemingly courteous and perhaps affording too much opportunity for quibbling, Berlin dispatches express a feeling of disgust telling with ridicule and gloom in German official quarters. These circles declare the note is not only an indictment of Germany's good will to meet its treaty obligations but provides the Nationalists with fresh material for reactionary agitation.

An official spokesman is quoted as asserting that the allied demands are too humiliating for any nation to accept and that the government will certainly reject them. The Luther ministry, however, must be consulted by the Foreign Relations Committee together with the premiers of the federated states before framing its reply.

Financial Machine Built by Stinnes Shows Signs of Tottering

New York, June 6.—The Great Financial Machine built up by late Hugo Stinnes, German industrial and financial magnate is showing signs of tottering. It has been carried on by his heirs through a family council which he organized and familiarized with all angles, but the Stinnes concerned nevertheless has felt the loss of the master hand of its leader who died last year.

Surprises Manifested Over Statement of Stephani Yesterday

Washington, June 6.—Surprises were manifested in some circles over the statement of Finance Minister Stephani yesterday in the Italian Senate that Italy is not now in a position to fund its war debts. The minister declared that the condition of the Italian budget rendered inadvisable any attempt to handle its war obligations at the present time.

Jewelry and Clothes Valued \$10,000 Are Stolen Agnes Ayres

Hollywood, Calif., June 6.—A shabbily dressed gunman entered the home of Agnes Ayres, motion picture actress, here yesterday, locked the film star's negro maid in a closet and then leisurely ransacked the house of jewelry and clothes valued at \$10,000, police were advised today by Miss Ayres' husband. He said that he heard the cries of the imprisoned maid when he returned from his office late in the afternoon.

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FARMER STAND HIS GROUND

In the unceasing struggle between the individual and the corporation for industrial supremacy the farmer is one of the few of the former class who are successfully standing their ground. Organized enterprise, the co-

operation, the modern economic giant, has swallowed up many individual manufacturers and other producers, but the farmer has demonstrated that he is more than his equal.

The idea that the farmer is a slipshod business man is a delusion, W. I. Myers, Professor of Farm Finance of Cornell University, told a group of America's leading business men attending the annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. "The American Farmer," he said, "is the most efficient food producer that the world has ever known. The decrease in the proportion of workers engaged in agriculture from 87 per cent in 1820 to 26 per cent in 1920 is a concrete expression of this efficiency. In spite of this decrease in the proportion of workers engaged in agriculture, American farmers produce enough food and clothing for the nation and a large surplus for export."

This is one reason why the corporation, which has made individual enterprise a practical impossibility in many industrial fields, has never been able to overcome the farmer who is more efficient than the large-scale producer.

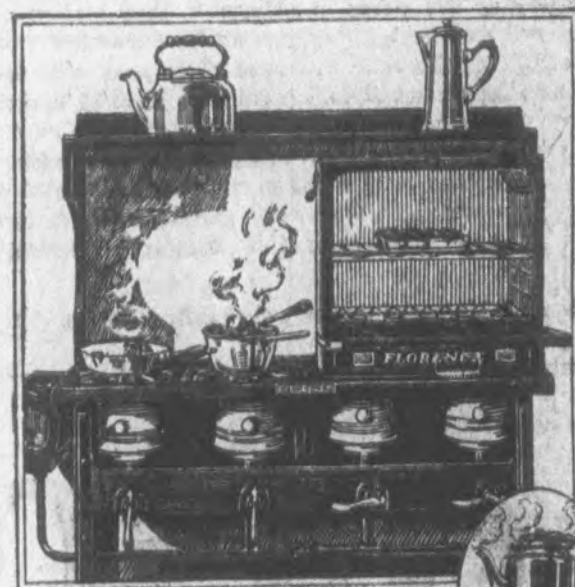
