RELIEF EXPEDITION GOES IN SEARCH OF **AMUNDSEN PART**

Insetre Proceeding Toward Spitzbergen Today to Search for Missing Explorers

Aboard the S. S. Ingetre by Wireless to The A. P., June 8 .- At 9:30 this mrning the Ingetre carrying the Norwegian Government Amundsen relief expedition, was proceeding toward Spitzbergen; at her maximum speed Two air planes were slung across the deck ready for instant service whenever needed. They will be used in searching for the missing explorers, who started for the North Pole from Spitzbergen in two flying boats May 21. The airmen, who are to pilot the sea planes in search of Amundsen, are Norseman, whose con rtant thought is the hope of rescuing Amundsen, although they admit that to find him now would be a tremendous piece of luck. Lieutenant Lutzow Holm, leader of aviators told the Associated Press that his intention was to explore along the edge of the Arctic ice pact to the North East of the Dane Island. Lieutenant Holm's assumption is that if Amundsen is returning on foot from the pole toward his original base, he will naturally make for the nearest landing, which would be Spitzber-

DECLINING AT RATE \$12,000,000 YEAR

Receipts at Fifty Selected Posts offices for May Total \$27,454,861

Washington, June 8 .- Postal revenues, instead of being boosted as contemplated in the increase postage rates which became effective April 15, are declining at the rate of more than \$12,000,000 a year. It was indicated today in the summary of the receipts for May.

Receipts at fifty selected post offices for May total \$27,454,861 as compared with \$29,083,231 for April and \$29,085,090 for March. These offices, which turned in more than one half of the country's postal receipts, reported a decrease of more than \$20,000 for each business day as compared with March, when the old rates were in effect.

Postal officials are awaiting the June reports which are expected to show whether the decrease is temporary. A summary of the situation will be completed for presentation to the Joint Congressional Postal Committee, which will have their opening hearing here July 20, looking to a permanent revision of rates to meet the \$68,000,000 salary increase voted employees by the last

WHAT TIME PUBLICITY!

We have done everything under the authority we had except to give the matter publicity.

That is the confession of the State Commissioner of Public Welfare, revealing knowledge that conditions in the convict camp which last week bred barbarism and murder were intolerable and had been so far a long period. It is the confession that the department stopped short of the one remedy which above all others will cure the evil out of which the state's new shame was born.

Everything except publicity!

TRUSTEE'S SALE OF LAND.

A year ago, six months ago, a week ago, even, a clean, frank statement of conditions in the prison camp might have stirred the sentment of the men responsible, the indignation of the authorities in charge of the

camp, and the malice of those who have been for a long time eager to discredit the Department of Public Welfare. But, it would also have aroused the people of Nash and Edgecombe counties to the point of demanding that humane treatment be accorded prisoners within their boundaries. It would have prevented the atrocity at which we shudder.

The Department of Welfare hesitated short of the best, the surest, and oftentimes the only remedy. There were promises and assurances. There was no publicity. Most of Nash and Edgecombe counties and the rest of the state rocked along in sweet innocence of the tortures inflicted on helpless, ignorant men in the name of the law which they, in some slight fashion, had violated.

Now there is publicity!

Now Nash and Edgecombe counties all of North Carolina and the rest of the nation know. They know that here in a state, hearlded as a progressive among the progressives, a state of Christian people, a shameful thing that in our confidence we would have said could not happen, has happened. They know that for months and years intolerable cruelties have been inflicted on men sent to prison for the protection of society and their own reformation. They know that an ignorant negro is dead, clubbed to death and dragged behind a mule in the vicious loosening of the passions of two convict guards. They know that these two guards must answer for their crime before a judge and a jury, but they know, also, that North Carolina must answer before the bar of enlightened Christian intelligence throughout the world.

What price publicity? What time publicity!




