men confided in the Pitt Community Hospital as a result of injuries received in Monday night's automobile wreck near here which took the lives of two other young men was reported by hospital authorities as follows:

Charlie Wells, the most seriously injured is suffering from a fractured right leg, and bad burns on his face and both hands. His condition is still considered dangerous.

The new fiscal year for North Carolina begins on July 1. On that date changes in the State's fiscal policy are to become effective, These changes include the executive budget law, which makes the Governor the financial head of the State, as director of the budget.

The State Board of Accountancy is composed of three public accountants and one attorney. They are appointed by the Governor for terms of three years, overlapping. They examine accountants desiring to be come certified public accountants.
