CHAUTAUQUA HERE WILL GET SPECIAL ADDITIONAL TALENT

The Northwestern University Dramatists Precede Dr. Pearson; Six Local Thespians Will Aid Dr. Poole

Notwithstanding the exceptional dramatic and musical presentations offered, along with the unprecedented list of nationally famed lecturers which are to delight Chautauqua visitors this season additions have been made which will give local talent an opportunity to shine. Special dramatic interludes will also be given by students of the Northwestern Dramatic School. There will be no additional charge for admission to those who hold season tickets.

Dr. Frederic Poole, whose lecture on the second afternoon deals with the marching millions of yellow hordes, has brought back with him from China many costumes and exhibits which require the services of six local people in order to effectively present the dramatic possibilities of his travelogue.

Three young ladies and three young men will be asked to take part. Those willing to don the strange beautiful costumes and appear on the platform with Dr. Poole should send their names to Supt. Matthew Wayman.

Miss Ernestine Forbes who was selected to assist Miss Marie Shaw the Junior leader has responded to an urgent invitation to join the Swarthmore staff of junior leaders and has gone to receive her final instructions before launching into her summer work in other states. The Swarthmore Chautauqua Association is particularly anxious to have the third afternoon lecture by Dr. Frank Pearson attended by the largest audience ever known in Greenville. Single admissions to the plays "The Next Best Man," and "The Rivals" will be one dollar. Single buyers who will pay two dollars for the two plays will have to take their chances on getting seats. Austin has kindly taken over the task of handling the tickets and programs at the Eastern Carolina Teachers' College. JAPAN TO BUILD SHRINES THAT FIRE CAN'T DESTROY

Tokyo.—The cult of Shinto is no exception to the modernization wave which has been sweeping over Japan since the great earthquake of 1923. At a recent meeting of the Shinto Shrine Reconstruction Committee held at the Home Office, it was decided that those shrines destroyed by the earthquake fire should be rebuilt of fire-proof materials. In Tokyo and vicinity 193 Shinto shrines were destroyed. The estimated cost of reconstructing these has been placed at 4,562,168 yen.

SEARCH CONTINUES FOR PARTICIPANTS OF GUN BATTLE

Blood Hounds Being Used in Search for Jim Carter and Charlie Green, Negroes

High Point, June 11.—Police and county officers continued their search today for Jim Carter and Charlie Green, negroes who are alleged to have taken part in the gun battle Tuesday night in which Charles J. Reeves, a policeman, and a negro were killed and three men were wounded. Blood hounds are being used in the search, but they lost their trail late yesterday after carrying the officers several miles into the woods south west of the city.

At a local hospital today, it was stated, that the condition of policeman Frank G. Claywell, who was wounded in the battle, was not so favorable.

DECLARES SHANGHAI SHOULD BE RESTORED NORMAL CONDITIONS

Such Action Would Facilitate the Negotiations Regarding the Situation Which Peking Gov. Desires

Peking, June 11.—The Chinese Foreign Office, in a note today to the Foreign Diplomatic Corps, protested the latter's argument that the Foreign Police at Shanghai only acted defensively in firing upon Chinese demonstrators there recently.

The Foreign office note declared that the authorities of the foreign concessions at Shanghai should proceed at once to raise the state of siege existing there and should disembark all foreign troops, disarm volunteers, and police at Shanghai and liberate all prisoners. It was said all institutions that have been closed or occupied by foreign forces should be restored to their normal condition so that order might be accomplished as soon as possible. This action, the note said, would facilitate the negotiations regarding the Shanghai situation, which the Peking Government desires to undertake. The note declared it was impossible to admit the responsibility for the deplorable occurrences at Shanghai as being brought about by the Chinese demonstrators.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH EXTENDS CALL TO DR. ALFRED MILLER

If Call Is Accepted Dr. Miller Will Take Up Pastorate Here on September First

The membership of the Eighth Street Christian Church, after the regular mid week prayer service last evening, extended a call to Dr. Alfred R. H. Phillips, of Nebraska, to accept the pastorate of the church on September first.

Dr. Miller visited Greenville during last week and on Wednesday evening preached in the Christian church. He made a most favorable impression and pleased the large crowd which heard him.

Dr. Miller is a graduate of Drake University, Iowa, and also a graduate of the Divinity School of Yale University. He possesses an attractive personality and is a splendid speaker. At present he is supplying for the summer months, a church in Montana.

If Dr. Miller accepts the call he will take up his work on September first. Until then, Rev. Mr. Phillips of Maclefield will continue to supply.

The golf tournament for the President's Cup was finished yesterday afternoon after a week's intensive play on the course of the Greenville Country Club. The President's Cup is a handsome silver trophy which was presented to the club last year by Mr. H. A. White, President of the club, and is played for annually. Strating with a field of thirty-eight golfers a week was consumed in elimination. W. W. Lee and Roy Batchelor reached the finals which was won by W. W. Lee after a hard fought match.

The President's Cup Tournament is handicap play and to be successful the winner must play steady, consistent golf well within reach of or better than his handicap. Mr. J. S. Ficklen was winner of last year's cup. Mr. Lee, the present winner, fought his way up from the bottom round by playing golf consistent with his handicap. It is an honor well deserved and a just source of pride to any local golfer.

American Gun Boat of S. China Patrol Fired Upon Today

Canton, China, June 11.—The American gun boat, Pampanga, of the South China Patrol, was fired upon today while conveying a launch to the Canton Christian College. The gun boat returned fire, but no casualties were reported.

Japan Promoters Radio.

Tokyo.—The Japanese authorities have agreed upon an inauguration committee of 40 to proceed with the organization of the proposed Radio Corporation of Japan, which is to establish permanent radio communication with the United States on an extensive scale. The committee will be composed of several representatives of the finance and communications departments. The people's side will be represented by Viscount Shibusawa, Baron Togo and 20 other promoters.

DECLARES PRESENT INCOME TAX LAW IS DISCRIMINATORY

General B. Winston Addresses the National Association of Credit Men

Washington, June 11.—The present income tax law discriminates against productive wealth and favors idle wealth, General B. Winston, under secretary of the treasury, declared in a prepared address today before the convention of the National Association of credit men, and it is because "Congress has refused to reach the abuse of having a type of security, the ownership of which would exempt taxation." "The exemption securities in this country now total more than \$13,000,000,000," he declared, predicting that the total would reach \$15,000,000,000 before any constitutional amendment to change the situation becomes effective. "The means of tax avoidance available to the wealthy," he said, "are so many, that to try to close them all by statute would sharply put business in a straight jacket."

"The economically unsound basis of our taxes, our excessive income tax rates," Mr. Winston stated, "encourage unproductive investment of capital and discourage business. This unnatural diversion yields no revenue to the Government and is costly to industry. Excessive war rates cost the tax payers \$2.00 the government gets one and the other is thrown away."

HAYNES COMPLETES FOURTH YEAR AS PROHIBITION COM'R.

Observes Anniversary Optimistic of Complete Defeat of Rum and Drug Bootleggers

Washington, June 11.—Roy A. Haynes today completed his fourth year as Prohibition Commissioner and Administrator of the Harrison Anti-Narcotic Act and he observed the anniversary with an optimistic statement of prospects for ultimate and complete defeat of rum and drug bootleggers.

It has been a hard fight, said the commissioner, who took office 18 months after National Prohibition became effective, and while many obstacles to successful enforcement had been overcome, still others were looming up to present new problems.

U. S. Marines Go To Protect American Christian College

Hong Kong, June 11.—United States Marines have been landed on Honan Island in the Pearl River near Canton to protect the American Christian College.

SELECTION OF JURY IN SHEPHERD TRIAL BEEN COMPLETED

Enters Second Stage With Opening Arguments and Testimony of Few State Witnesses

Chicago, June 11.—The trial of William D. Shepherd, for the murder of his millionaire foster son, William N. McClintock, entered its second stage today after the jury had been completed yesterday after 24 days of selection. Opening arguments and placing of a few state witnesses on the stand constituted today's program.

The prosecution depends upon circumstantial evidence and corroborated testimony of Charles C. Faiman, self termed accomplice of Shepherd in the killing of the millionaire youth. Faiman has testified that he supplied typhoid germs and taught Shepherd how to kill McClintock with them on the promise of \$100,000 from the youth's estate, of which Shepherd had been made chief beneficiary in a will Shepherd drew for the youth to sign a few months before he died.

TWO KILLED TODAY WHEN CARS COLLIDE

W. E. Cross, of Ashboro, and Wiederman, of Gloverville, Meet Death When Car Goes Over Embankment

Fayetteville, June 11.—W. E. Cross, of Ashboro, 44, a Warrant officer of the 17th Field Artillery of Fort Bragg, and Manager of the 17th division base ball team, and Sergeant Harry J. Wiederman, of Gloverville, N. Y., of the team were killed instantly this morning when the car that they were driving was struck by another car and crashed down a high embankment near the bridge which divides Cumberland and Hoke county, on the Raeford road. Several members of the teams obtained injuries.

Discuss Issuance of 4,000,000 Francs Special Bank Notes

Paris, June 11.—Finance Minister Caillaux and the Finance Committee of the House of Deputies today discussed the Judiciary issue of 4,000,000 francs in special bank notes to meet the heavy retirement of National defense bonds this year. Caillaux explained that nothing resembling inflation had entered his mind. The bank notes would be issued such conditions that they would be returned to the Bank of France without delay and would be guaranteed by ample reserve, the nature of which has not been disclosed. No decision has been reached regarding the issue.

DECISIVE ACTION AGAINST RIFFIAN FORCES IMMINENT

Spain to Land Force of 20,000 in Attempt to Seize Naval Base of Allucemas

Fez, French Morocco, June 11.—Decisive action against the invading Riffian Tribesmen is regarded here as imminent owing to Spain's intention to land a force reported to number 20,000 men in an attempt to seize the naval base of Allucemas, now held by the Moors. Abd El Grim is expected to oppose the Spanish attack to the utmost and apparently is preparing the engagement. He has withdrawn to the North, a number of his best troops, where a counsel of war is reported in progress. If these movements are confirmed, it is thought the French will abandon the defensive attitude they previously have observed, and will assume the offensive.

HEARINGS ON RATE INCREASE TOBACCO TAKES PLACE TODAY

Railroad Witnesses Defend Proposal While Producers and Shippers Will Protest

Washington, June 11.—Railroad witnesses at the Interstate Commerce Commission hearing today defended proposals to increase the rate on tobacco from Carolina and Virginia producing territory to New Port News and Norfolk.

Fred Dalton, General Freight Agent, of the Norfolk and Southern, declared that investigation into costs and earnings in the tobacco movement had convinced him that rates much higher than those now in effect, or those proposed, would be justified. Tobacco producers and shippers were prepared to following up with a protest against any increase.

Present rates from Wilson, N. C., to New Port News on unmanufactured tobacco are 36 cents per 100 pounds, Mr. Dalton explained, while the railroad proposed to make the rate 41 cents per 100 pounds, both figures applying to shipments for export. When the railroads filed the increases several months ago, the commission suspended them and instituted an investigation which culminated in the hearings today.

PYTHIANS TO HOLD 1926 CONVENTION IN GOLDSBORO

Retiring Grand Chancellor Giles, Presented With a Gold Watch

Winston-Salem, June 11.—That the officers of the law should exercise every precaution and prudence in the administration of their duties, and the appointing powers should give deep consideration to the naming of officers, was the sense of a resolution adopted this morning by the North Carolina Grand Lodge Knights of Pythians here. The resolution deplored the violation of laws of the state of North Carolina, declared even more serious was the violation of the law by those sworn to uphold it. The interference with travelers by parties without warrant of insignia "and the unlawful entry of private homes were declared a violation of rights." The resolution closed with a plea to the appointing powers to "put no men in office dealing with the personal rights, privileges, and liberties of people who are without full knowledge of his authority and who is not prudent as well as fearless and competent to discharge his duties with full comprehension of the limit by his authority. Goldsboro was selected for the 1926 convention city of the Grand Lodge and the retiring of Grand Chancellor, Daniel F. Giles, of Marion, was presented with a gold watch. Reports of committees occupied most of the time and adjournment was taken shortly afternoon.

Prosecution Rests Case Against Dorothy Perkins Today

New York, June 11.—After recalling one more witness today to corroborate previous testimony that 17 year old Dorothy Perkins had confessed to shooting her former sweetheart, Thomas Templeton, the prosecution rested its case. There was a possibility that the jury might have the matter when adjournment was taken tonight. Mrs. Margaret Perkins, the mother of the defendant, was the first defense witness. She testified that the shot which killed Templeton was fired during a struggle between herself and her husband, but she could not say whether either of them or the daughter held the revolver at the time. "The father," she said, "was very excited and drunk and the other four men at the party had been drinking."

Nahan, Mass., Is Visited by \$450,000 Fire During Today

Nahan, Mass., June 11.—68 houses were destroyed by fire early today after flames broke out in a club house on Colby Hill here. Several garages and out buildings were also burned and it was believed the monetary loss would reach \$450,000.

France Intends to Take Steps Soon to Settle War Debt

Geneva, June 11.—It was understood here today that France Foreign Minister Briand conferring with Congressman Theodore E. Burton, of Ohio, a member of the American Debt Funding Commission made it clear that France intends soon to take steps to settle her debt with the United States.

Vital Statistics Swamp London.

London.—Somerset House, where are stored the vital statistics of London, uses colors to facilitate its filing system. The volumes on the various subjects each has a color; green for marriages, red for births, black for deaths, brown for wills and yellow for divorces.

The shelves are now so congested with 160,000,000 records that new quarters are being sought.

East Indian Rice Crop Large.

The Hague.—Reports from Java state that rice will yield a bumper crop this year in the Dutch East Indies. Notwithstanding that thousands of unemployed have deserted the cities to help bring in the crop there is still a dearth of coolie labor.

During the summer months while other cities about us are enjoying a half holiday one day in each week why not a similar holiday in Greenville? This is without question our dull season and little if anything in a commercial way would be lost by closing up the business establishments one afternoon each week. This holiday would give employees who now stay on the job long hours throughout six days to the week an opportunity to get that amount of rest and recreation that is necessary to every life and in return would render to the employers greater

profits in the way of more willing and courteous service.

The business men of our city would do well to give this question of a half holiday each week during the summer months serious consideration and make an effort to get together in establishing such a custom.

How the Cat Lost Its Tail

Morehead City, June 11.—Here is a tale of a cat: Visitors to Morehead City often are puzzled by the large number of bob-tailed members of the feline family. The other day a good lady asked a waterside habitude the reason for the phenomenon.

"It's this way, ma'am," the old salt replied. "Several years ago a stranger came to these waters in a row boat from the Lord knows where. He had with him several cats. A selfish and mysterious sort of fellow—a hermit. I reckon you up country people would call him—he built a shack on one of the little islands. There he sold fishing poles and bait to fishermen, and lived alone with his cats.

"Three or four years ago there came a storm. For days the man was cut off from the mainland. His provisions gave out. Help could not reach him and he could not leave the island. 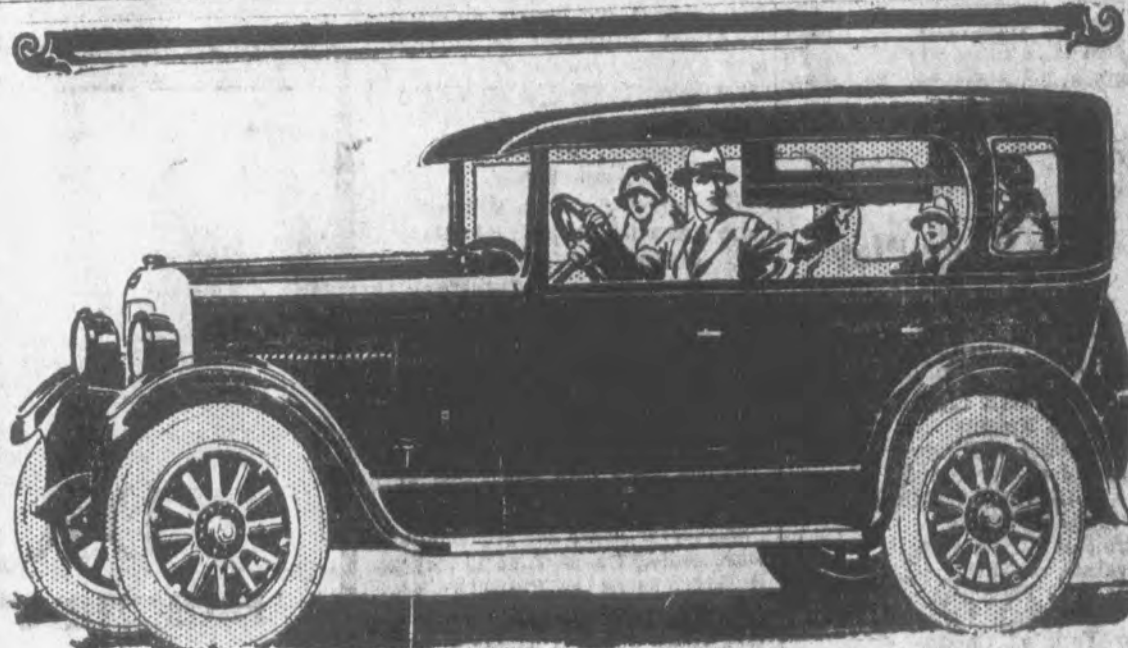
