Agent J. L. Hassell has been notified that the big cars containing the tent, piano, seats and paraphernalia for Chautauqua will arrive in Greenville on train number three on June 14. Chairman George Clark who is in charge of hauling and lighting has made plans for speedy erection and illumination.

The two play companies carry a large quantity of scenery and costumes but they cannot carry furniture which is necessary and this service is being rendered by Taft Brothers from their excellent stock. Indirectly Accuses Reichman
of Having Profitted for His
Attorneyship for McClintock Estate

Chicago, June 12.—Ultior purposes imputed to Alexander Reichman, Co-guardian with Mrs. Julia Shepherd of William N. McClintock, for whose alleged murder William D. Shepherd is on trial here, were brought into the open today when Reichman was so bitterly assailed upon cross examination by William S. Stewart, of the defense counsel, that four times the witness begged Judge Thomas Lynch for protection from these insinuations. Stewart indirectly accused Reichman of having profitted from his attorneyship for the McClintock \$1,000,000 estate, which was willed to Shepherd by young McClintock. McClintock died of typhoid germs December 4, and Shepherd is accused of having caused his death by having administered typhoid germs.

"How much did you have when you came here from Iowa?" asked Stewart, and when Robert E. Crowe, State's attorney objected, Stewart told Judge Lynch that he wanted to show when this man came here he did not have a dime, and he got rich after he began handling the McClintock estate. Mr. Crowe insisted that Reichman was one of the leaders of the Chicago Bar, and afluence was a legitimate result of his ability as an attorney. The first motion of the proposed suit by the McClintock cousin, to break the will, was made when Reichman said he knew a suit was contemplated, but denied he had interest in it.

MUCH SPECULATION OVER THE FUTURE OF GOVERNOR SMITH

Reports That He Plans to Retire
from Politics to Write
and Recoup Fortune
Causes Much Concern

New York, June 12.—Speculation was rife over the future of Governor Smith, owing to reports that he plans to retire from politics to write and recoup his fortune.

While he characterized as a "pipe dream" published statements that he would return to private life when his present term expires, and accept an offer of \$50,000 a year from the New York World to write on political and humanitarian topics, the discussion of possibility for him in this connection continues. The New York Times today tells of reports that he has not abandoned hope of winning the Democratic Presidential nomination of 1928, and that he believes he will be in the strongest position to make the fight again if he combines authorship with his present position of leader. In New York State Democratic circles, some of his supporters have advised him to seek a seat in the United States Senate when his present term as Governor expires, but he is said to be convinced that as Senator he would have difficulties in remaining a national figure.

WOODFIN FOUND NOT GUILTY MURDER

Federal Prohibition Agent Was
Charged With Murder of
Grover C. Bradley; Jury
Delivered 4 Hours

Raleigh, June 12.—The Federal jury sitting on the case of the State of North Carolina against William E. Woodfin, Federal Prohibition agent, charged with the murder of Grover C. Bradley, returned a verdict of not guilty late last night after deliberating for four hours.

CAILLAUX URGES ECONOMY AT MEET OF FRENCH CABINET

Ministers Promise to Trim Expenses to Utmost So France Can Live Within Income

Paris, June 12.—Finance Minister Caillaux today urged a policy of economy at a meeting of the French Cabinet, and the ministers promised him they would trim expenses to the utmost. M. Caillaux said France must live within her income and must get that income by taxation, else if she expected the world to have confidence in French finance.

UNITED STATES TO PLAY NO PART IN SECURITY PACT

Determined to Avoid Any Complications in Europe

Washington, June 12.—The United States will play no part in the Western European Security Pact now under consideration by the allied Governments and Germany adhering to its determination to avoid any connection with possible complications in Europe, the Washington government has no desire to accept the duty of custodian of the treaty as suggested by Germany. The proposal that the United States hold as trustee the commitment of the foreign powers effecting the agreement was contained in the Berlin government memorandum of February, suggesting the pact and published last night in Berlin.

It was made clear here in a state department announcement that no such proposal has been received and that none is expected in view of this government's known attitude. Although the United States presumably would merely take charge of the completed treaty, even this, it is held, might lead to differences which the administration has no wish to encounter.

French Reply Will Be Sent to Berlin Early Next Week

Paris, June 12.—The French reply embodying the reaction of the allied powers to Germany's proposal for a security pact, will be sent to Berlin early next week, providing Italy, as expected, approves the terms promptly.

PAYS PENALTY FOR MURDER OF NEGRO IN CHAIR TODAY

Two Other Executions Are Postponed When Prisoners Are Granted Reprieve and Extended Clemency

Raleigh, June 12.—Will Williams, negro of Scotland county, was electrocuted here at state's prison today for the murder of Frank Green, a negro farmer. A vigorous effort for clemency had been exerted by those who had interested themselves in Williams' behalf. After investigation had been made by Pardon Commissioner Sink, the Governor announced he would not interfere with the execution.

Three electrocutions had been set for today, but Governor McLean last night announced the reprieve of Chestnut Evans, charged with the murder of Arthur L. Joyner, Hollister taxi driver, until September 2, to look further into the case. The Governor also extended clemency in the form of postponed execution date to Alex Rodman, in Mecklenburg county, who was to have died today for the murder of John Festerman, of Charlotte.

SCOPES COUNSEL GETTING READY FOR EVOLUTION TRIAL

Visits American Museum of National History and Brushes Up On Intricacies of Rise of Man

New York, June 12.—While John T. Scopes, high school teacher, was returning today to Dayton, Tenn., counsel were brushing up on the intricacies of the rise of man, and there was much discussion over the part radicals are playing in arrangements for the defense of Scopes on a charge of violating the Tennessee State law against teaching evolution. Clarence Darrow, Bainbridge Colby, and Dudley Field Malone, of the counsel visited the American Museum of Natural History, and saw in the hall of age of man specimens showing the evolution of man and the evolution of horse. They conferred with Professor Henry T. Osborn, noted authority on evolution, and President of the Museum, who promised aid in lining up scientific witnesses. FRANCE - SPANISH CONFAB WILL OPEN MADRID NEXT WEEK

Will Arrange for Joint Action Against Abd E. Krim, the Rifian Chief

Paris, June 12.—The Franco-Spanish conference to arrange for joint action against Abd El Krim, the Rifian chief, will open in Madrid on Wednesday, it is officially announced.

On the same day Premier Painleve is expected to appear in the French Chamber of Deputies when he will probably tell what he saw during his recent visit to Morocco and what he has decided to do.

MISSING WITNESS SHEPHERD TRIAL APPEARS TODAY

Robert White Enters the Court Room and Reports to Assistant State's Attorney

Chicago, June 12.—Robert White, long missing witness in the Shepherd trial, unexpectedly walked into the court room and reported to Joseph Savage, Assistant State's Attorney. "Here I am, Mr. Savage," said White, who was immediately rushed to the office of the State's Attorney. He was accompanied by his wife and two children. "I am here to fight this thing to a finish, there is more to White stated.

Painleve Starts for French Rifian Front Today

Fez, French Morocco, June 12.—Paul Painleve, the French Premier, started for the French Rifian front this morning after having discussed military campaign plans most of the night with Marshal Lyautey, Governor General of French Morocco.

Ingretre Reaches Greenland Sea in Search Amundsen

Aboard the S. S. Ingretre in the Arctic Circle, June 12.—The Ingretre bearing Lieutenant Lutzw Holm, and his little band of flyers northward to search for the Amundsen Polar Expedition today was plowing the desolate Greenland sea, the only speck of life over that watery waste. Her position when last taken was approximately 440 miles from Ad-vent Bay, which she is expected to reach tomorrow.

REPORT OF MUSCLE SHOALS COMM. TO BE READY IN NOV.

Will Give President Time to Study Recommendations and to Touch on Problem in Message to Congress

Washington, June 12.—Assurance was given today to President Coolidge by Chairman McKenzie, of the Muscle Shoals Commission, that a final report would be in the Executive hands early in November. This would give the President time to study the Committee's recommendation, and to touch on the Muscle Shoals problem in his annual message to Congress.

MMr. McKenzie said the Commission would assemble late in September at Muscle Shoals to inspect the Government power and nitrate producing plant there. After the inspection, the commission will return to Washington to hold its daily sessions, preparatory to framing its report.

Mr. McKenzie said the Commission thought it advisable to make a personal inspection of the Muscle Shoals property, but was determined not to go on a junketing trip. He also declared that the commission, in avoiding lengthy hearings of additional testimony, would seek to prevent any individual from gaining personal publicity through his appearance before the commission when he really had nothing of value to offer in the way of suggestions.

To development and benefit the South, it was said, by assuring adequate power for all line of business and industrial activities. Mr. McKenzie reiterated that he believed effort should be made by the government to lease on advantageous terms the power and nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals.

AN INCREASING DEFICIT IS SHOWN IN STATE FUND

Governor's Figures Show a Deficit of \$9,583,885.92 on May 31

Raleigh, June 12.—The General fund of the state of North Carolina continues to show an increasing deficit, a statement issued last night by Governor McLean indicated. The May expenditures were greater than the income and the deficit reached \$9,583,885.92, on May 31, 1925, the Governor's figures show. The budget commission of last January 1st, had estimated that the deficit would reach \$9,515,787.63, by July 1.

The statement also showed that the state bonded and current debt totaled \$14,868,000 on May 31. This was divided between the bonds issued in the amount of \$93,868,000, and short term notes totaling \$21,000,000. Both the bonds issued and the short term obligations were for the general fund, highway fund, and school building fund.

BELGIUM AERO CLUB STILL CLAIMS RACE

Unless Proof of Contrary is Forthcoming Belgium Claims Gordon-Bennett Race

Brussels, June 12.—Unless proof of the contrary is forthcoming, the Belgium Aero Club is abiding by its decision that the Veenstre, piloting the balloon Prince Leopold, won the Gordon-Bennett balloon race, which started from here last Sunday. Four balloons, including one of America, the Good Year Third, were disqualified for landing on the ocean and the charge was made that Veenstre also had landed on the sea coast and had to be aided to land, which would have been a violation of rules of the race.

American Missionaries Ordered to Return From Hau Kau, China

New York, June 12.—American missionaries and their families in the Hupeh province have been ordered to return to Haukau, China, immediately according to cablegrams received today by the Episcopal Missionary Headquarters. The message said "Situation serious. Women, children and Missionaries have been ordered by this report." About 50 American missionaries and their families were scattered about the Province.

Issues Statement Regarding America's Attitude to Mexico

Washington, June 12.—The administration will support the government of Mexico only so long as it protects American lives and American rights and complies with its international engagements and obligations. Secretary Kellogg declared today in a formal statement.

ETERNAL CITY BECOMES
EXPENSIVE LIVING PLACE

Rome.—Rome has climbed to a place beside Moscow and New York among the most expensive cities in the world, according to official statistics. These show that since the beginning of the Holy Year the monthly index figure of living costs has steadily mounted. During March the index figure jumped almost three percent, but tourists and residents agree that their personal statistics showed a greater increase.

Travelers lament the palmy days of a few years ago when Italy was famous for its cheap living costs, and assert that the sky-rocketing prices force them to revise their estimates of expected expenses and to alter their plans for further traveling.

But the brunt of the increase is borne by the Romans, who have to pay twice as much, and sometimes three times as much, as last year to maintain their homes. And when explanations are asked, the shopkeepers invariably answer smilingly: "It is the Holy Year."

FILIPINO SAILORS ENLIST
IN INSULAR COAST GUARD

Manila.—With the organization training of the officers and crews of the insular fleet of coastguard cutters along military lines, approval of which has been given by Governor General Wood, department heads and Brigadier General Rafael Crame, chief of the constabulary, are laying a modest beginning for a future Philippine navy.

Brigadier General Crame, with the approval of Secretary of the Interior Felipe Agoncillo, recently authorized the transfer of arms and other military equipment for use of the coastguard sailors, the men having volunteered to furnish their own uniforms. At present the coastguard force consists of 300 officers and men. Although the sailors are not required to perform military service, it is said all have volunteered to do this additional work both aboard ship and ashore.

FASCISTS EXPRESS GREAT
FAITH IN DEFINITIONS
OF THEIR CREED

Rome.—The extent to which ardent Fascists have accepted their political creed as an all-encompassing repository of almost religious devotion, was illustrated by a recent competition conducted by a Roman newspaper, for a short, apt definition of Fascism.

The winning definition was "Fascism is the spirit of the free communities of Italy under the aegis of Imperial Rome." The minor prizes were carried off by contributors who saw in Fascism all of the material and spiritual splendors usually associated with Utopia or with the heavenly reward held out by religion to the good and the pure.

To her pictures and story, Miss Clemens adds a charming personality, a clear, penetrating voice, the attractiveness of youth, the culture of a college woman, a wealth of Clemens humor, a fresh and original style, and a sympathetic understanding of her audience. MOSCOW SEEKS FOREIGNERS
TO REBUILD ITS DWELLINGS

Moscow.—American contractors are invited by the Bolshevik government to rebuild ruined or dilapidated buildings in Moscow. In return for this work the government offers the Americans possession of the restored buildings for rental purposes for a period ranging from ten to 40 years. At the end of that term the buildings automatically become the property of the government.

As the Soviet government has no immediate means of its own to build new dwelling houses, office buildings or other structures, it has adopted the expedient of having foreigners or Russians who possess the necessary means take over ruined or partially damaged buildings for reconstruction purposes. These are renovated entirely at the expense of the contractor, his only compensation being the privilege of renting.

JAPANESE PLANT GARDENS
AS MODELS OF PERFECTION

Seattle.—Japanese look upon a garden as a picture, beautifully designed and framed, much as the Occidental looks upon a painting. Prof. Takuma Tono, landscape ar-

chitect of Waseda University, Japan, told Seattle on a lecture tour of the United States. Professor Tono is a graduate of Cornell University.

"Our Japanese gardens are entirely different from garden sin any other part of the world," Mr. Tono said. "In all western nations the garden is considered a collection of rare and beautiful plants, flowers, shrubs and trees, rather than the picture for which the Japanese strive. Japanese gardens are more naturalistic than architectural."

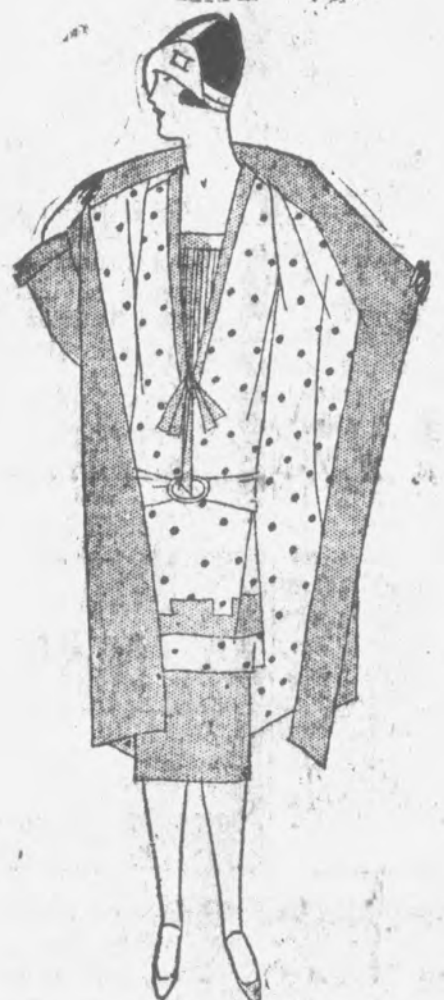

GOOD PRICES INCREASE

PROFITS OF CANADA'S FARMS

Ottawa.—Higher prices for grain, field crops, livestock and poultry increased the wealth of Canadian farmers \$142,782,000 in 1924 over the previous year's total, and the gross agricultural wealth amounted to \$7,506,257,000 last year, compared with \$7,363,475,000 in 1923, according to compilations of the Dominion department of agriculture.

Total agricultural revenue to Can-

adian farmers last year, it is shown, was \$1,453,368,000. This was a gain of \$108,272,000 over the 1923 total. Field crops, valued at \$995,236,000 constituted the largest item in the return, followed by dairy products at \$234,000,000.

TOKYO PLANS TO SELL GOOD MEALS AT COST

Tokyo.—The Social Affairs Bureau of the Tokyo municipality is planning the construction of 16 public eating houses in different parts of the city. Each building will cost about 50,000 yen. These dining halls when completed, will be under the direct control of the bureau.

The meals served will be extremely simple, but well-cooked, and will be offered at cost price. The bureau has been operating a number of these

dining rooms successfully, the patrons being mostly office clerks and workmen.

JAPANESE DIVERS TRAVEL FAR TO RECOVER SUNKEN TREASURE

Tokyo.—A party of Japanese, including expert divers, expects to leave soon for Port Said to engage in salvaging the government transport, Yasaka Maru, which was sent to the bottom of the Mediterranean by German submarines during the world war. The transport had on board gold bullion valued at \$500,000.

The Japanese will attempt also to salvage the British liner Egypt, which was sunk by submarines near Marseilles with \$1,000,000 aboard.

THE MEMORIAL COIN

Active interest in the sale of the Memorial coins authorized by the United States Government for the construction of the great memorial at Stone Mountain to the Confederacy places the South, and particularly North Carolina, from which went more Confederate soldiers than from any other Southern State, in a position that we must act with enthusiasm and great generosity or be placed in an awkward light before the whole country.

That the United States Government, acting through a Republican President, and a Con-

gress Republican in both branches should have made this beautiful and noble expression of respect for the Southern Confederacy would have been looked on 20 years ago as preposterous. Nothing has been done since the strife between the States that so splendidly expresses a united country as this authorization by the United States Government of the sale of a Memorial coin honoring upon its very face Lee and Jackson and all the Confederate soldiers.

The coin is a beautiful one, with a likeness of Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson upon it and with an inscription: "Memorial to the Valor of the Soldiers of the South."

We must forget any difference over the sculptor selected to build the Memorial. The South must buy these coins promptly and generously or be discredited before the whole country. The coin is good for 50 cents. It is being sold for \$1. The difference will go to build the Memorial. Every man and woman and child in the South who honors Lee and Jackson and respects the valor and courage and sacrifice of the soldiers of the Confederacy ought to purchase at least one of these coins. The association ought not to have trouble in selling them. The people ought to step forward with enthusiasm, crowd to the banks and arrange to buy the coins. If this is done, coupled with the honor done the Confederacy by the Government of the United States, it will constitute the noblest expression of appreciation of these heroic men the world has ever known.—Charlotte Observer.

ENGLAND MUCH DISTURBED OVER SHORTAGE OF COTTON

Manchester. — Pessimistic views on the future of the cotton industry in Lancashire have been expressed in various quarters here. Viscount Leverhulme recently warned the country of what would happen in the event of a shortage of cotton supplies, and went so far as to say that it was possible to calculate the time when America, from which most of Lancashire's supplies were drawn, would consume as much cotton as she could produce.

This warning is now echoed by Captain G. S. Burnham in a book on "Cotton Growing in the British Empire and Exotic Countries."

"There is a world shortage of millions of bales of cotton of the American varieties," the author says. "This shortage and prohibitive prices confront the Lancashire industry, and that of all other countries, with a crisis of which the gravity can only be compared with the cotton famine brought about by the American Civil War."

Captain Burnham attributes the "appalling disaster which has over-

taken the cotton growing industry in America" to the ravages of the boll weevil. "The problem which Lancashire and all countries have speedily to solve is," he says, "where is the American type of cotton, at economic prices, to come from?" and he supplies the answer that it must come principally from the new cotton fields of the British Empire, "but only gradually."

Germany Could Use 9,000,000 Beds
Berlin.—Sofia Goetze, of the German Welfare Institute, believes that for hygienic, moral and social reasons every man, woman and child should have his own bed. She estimates that in Germany 9,000,000 beds are needed to bring about this condition.

CAVES OF KENTUCKY GREATEST IN WORLD SCIENTISTS BELIEVE

Frankfort, Ky.—The largest and most extensive caves in the country and perhaps in the world are found in Kentucky, according to Dr. W. D. Funkhouser, zoologist at the University of Kentucky, who with the cooperation of Dr. Willard Rouse Johnson, state geologist, has made exhaustive studies over several years.

Declaring that these caves hold many secrets of old and even prehistoric days, Dr. Funkhouser said Kentucky is neglecting a great opportunity to contribute to the field of science, which European explorers, coming to this state, might grasp by "bringing to light important data which have been for years within our reach, but for which we have neglected even to search."

Dr. Funkhouser was Governor Field's scientific representative at the time of the Floyd Collins tragedy at Sand Cave. The military court of inquiry, appointed by the governor, has just declined Collins to have been imbedded in Sand Hole instead of a cave. Its official report declared Mammoth Cave, for the establishing of which as a national park a movement is under foot, and other caves "are safer than Main Street."

Mentioning Mammoth Cave, Crystal Cave, Onyx Cave, Colossal Cavern, Horse Cave, and Grand Cave, Dr. Funkhouser said "none of these caves has been entirely explored and their extent is problematical."

"Most of them extend for miles under the surface of the earth—passage after passage, chamber after chamber, with branches in many directions, offering rare displays of stalactites and stalagmites and dazzling surfaces of crystal and ornamental rock."

In virtually all parts of the state, wherever limestone of any thickness and purity occurs near the surface, the men have found large subterranean caverns, besides thousands of smaller caves and "sinks," which often are the entrances to caves.

Most of these caves have been formed by the dissolving out of the beds of soluble limestones by underground waters.

"They are inhabited today by foxes, coons, skunks, and bats," Dr. Funk-

houser said "and are used as places of hibernation by snakes, lizards, and hosts of lower forms. In former years the bears and wolves made them their dens and dragged the carcasses of their prey into their gloomy recesses to be devoured."

"Today the cattle seek the cool mouths of the caves to escape the heat and flies; a hundred or more years ago the buffalo used them for the same purposes as is mutely testified by their bones."

"The caves also have a very interesting fauna of their own, consisting of the blind fish, blind crickets, blind crayfish, peculiar spiders and distinct species of salamanders which are found in large numbers far underground but never on the surface."

In the recent second digging to extricate Floyd Collins' body from Sand Hole, after the state had closed its efforts, a large family of vicious snakes were found squirming and wriggling crazily about 50 feet down and the diggers finally killed them near Collins' underground tomb. Their presence so far underground was unaccounted for by the diggers.

Protected from influences of air and water, bones which have been found are a valuable record of ancient fauna, said Dr. Funkhouser. In one cave near Lexington, the bones of coons, foxes, wolves, groundhogs, skunks, a bear, a deer, and a human being were accidentally discovered.

"Rock houses" or great overhanging ledges of rock which, like caves, afford animal shelter, were likened to those in France and Spain as having the most satisfactory evidences of the existence of primitive man during the glacial period and it has been pointed out that Kentucky occupies "in this country the same position relative to the southern ice limit as do those countries in Europe, thus suggesting that similar archaeological data might be obtained by a study of our caves."

ENGLISH CLIMATE RAVAGES RECORDS OF EARLY GREECE

Oxford, Eng.—English damp and cool smoke, which have been so destructive of all ancient stone monuments and inscribed stones imported from Egypt, Asia Minor and the East, are gradually but surely defacing the fine Attic lettering of the Parian Chronicle, the key to the Greek Chronology.

This block of white marble was set up in the Island of Paros about 268 B. C., apparently by some private patron of poetry and the arts. The opening inscription, along with the

boats and take to canoes. At this
point they say good-bye to civiliza
tion and disappear into the won
known.

CHAPTER VIII

"The Outlying Pickets of the
New World"

Our friends at home may well
rejoice with us, for we are at our
goal, and up to a point, at least,
we have shown that the statement
of Professor Challenger can be
verified. We have not, it is true,
ascended the plateau, but it lies
before us, and even Professor
Summerlee is in a more chastened
mood. Not that he will for an in
stant admit that his rival could be
right, but he is less persistent in
his incessant objections, and has
sunk for the most part into an ob
servant silence. I must hark back,
however, and continue my narra
tive from where I dropped it. We
are sending home one of our local
Indians who was injured, and I am
committing this letter to his charge,
with considerable doubts in
my mind as to whether it will
ever come to hand.

When I wrote last we were about
to leave the Indian village where
we had been deposited by the Es
meralda. I have to begin my report
by bad news, for the first serious
personal trouble (I pass over the
incessant bickering between the
Professors) occurred this evening,
and might have had a tragic end
ing. I have spoken of our English
speaking half-breed, Gomez—a
fine worker and a willing fellow,
but afflicted, I fancy, with the vice
of curiosity, which is common

enough among such men. On the
last evening he seems to have hid
himself near the hut in which we
were discussing our plans, and, be
ing observed by our huge negro
Zambo, who is as faithful as a dog
and has the hatred which all his
race bear to the half-breeds, he was
dragged out and carried into our
presence. Gomez whipped out his
knife, however, and but for the
huge strength of his captor, which
enabled him to disarm him with
one hand, he would certainly have
stabbed him. The matter has end
ed in reprimands, the opponents
have been compelled to shake
hands, and there is every hope
that all will be well. As to the
feuds of the two learned men, they
are continuous and bitter. It must
be admitted that Challenger is
provocative in the last degree, but
Summerlee has an acid tongue,
which makes matters worse. Last
night Challenger said that he
never cared to walk on the Thames
Embankment and look up the
river, as it was always sad to see
one's own eventual goal. He is
convinced, of course, that he is
destined for Westminster Abbey.
Summerlee rejoined, however, with
a sour smile, by saying that he un
derstood that Millbank Prison had
been pulled down. Challenger's
conceit is too colossal to allow
him to be really annoyed. He only
smiled in his beard and repeated,
"Really! really!" in the plying
tone one would use to a child. In

deed, they are children both—the
one wisened and cantankerous,
the other formidable and overbear
ing, yet each with a brain which
has put him in the front rank of
his scientific age. Brain, charac
ter, soul—only as one sees more of
life does one understand how dis
tinct is each.

The very next day we did ac
tually make our start upon this
remarkable expedition. We found
that all our possessions fitted
very easily into the two can
oes, and we divided our per
sonnel, six in each, taking the ob
vious precaution in the interests
of peace of putting one Professor
into each canoe. Personally, I was
with Challenger, who was in a
beatific humor, moving about as
one in a silent ecstasy and beam
ing benevolence from every fea
ture. I have had some experience
of him in other moods, however,
and shall be the less surprised
when the thunderstorms suddenly
come up amidst the sunshine. It
is impossible to be at your ease,
it is equally impossible to be dull
in his company, for one is always
in a state of half-tremulous doubt
as to what sudden turn his for
midable temper may take.

For two days we made our way
up a good-sized river, some hun
dreds of yards broad, and dark in
color, but transparent, so that one
could usually see the bottom. The
affluents of the Amazon are, half
of them, of this nature, while the
other half are whitish and opaque,
the difference depending upon the
class of country through which
they have flowed. The dark indi
cate vegetable decay, while the
others point to clayey soil. Twice
we came upon rapids, and in each
case made a portage of half a mile
or so to avoid them. The woods
on either side were primeval,
which are more easily penetrated
than woods of the second growth,
and we had no great difficulty in
carrying our canoes through them.
How shall I ever forget the solemn
mystery of it? The height of the
trees and the thickness of the
boles exceeded anything which I
in my town-bred life could have
imagined, shooting upwards in
magnificent columns until, at an
enormous distance above our
heads, we could dimly discern the
spot where they threw out their
side branches into Gothic upward
curves which coalesced to form
one great matted roof of verdure,
through which only an occasional
golden ray of sunshine shot down
wards to trace a thin dazzling line
of light amidst the majestic ob
scurity. As we walked noiselessly
amid the thick, soft carpet of de
caying vegetation the hush fell
upon our souls which comes upon
us in the twilight of the Abbey, and
even Professor Challenger's full
cheated notes sank to a whisper.

Alone, I should have been ignorant
of the names of these giant
growths, but our men of science
pointed out the cedars, the great
silk cotton trees, and the redwood
trees, with all that profusion of
various plants which has made
this continent the chief supplier
to the human race of those gifts
of Nature which depend upon the
vegetable world, while it is the
most backward in those products
which come from animal life.

Vivid orchids and wonderful col
ored lichens smoldered upon the
swarthy tree-trunks and where a
wandering shaft of light fell upon
the golden allamanda, the scarlet
star-clusters of the tacsonia, or the
rich deep blue of ipomaea, the ef
fect was as a dream of fairyland.
In these great wastes of forest,
life, which abhors darkness, strug
gles ever upwards to the light.
Every plant, even the smaller
ones, curls and writhes to the
green surface, twining itself round
its stronger and taller brethren
in the effort. Climbing plants are
monstrous and luxuriant, but oth
ers which have never been known
to climb elsewhere learn the art
as an escape from that somber
shadow, so that the common net
tle, the jasmine, and even the
jacitara palm tree can be seen
circling the stems of the cedars
and striving to reach their crowns.
Of animal life there was no move
ment amid the majestic vaulted
aisles which stretched from us as
we walked, but a constant move
ment far above our heads told of
that multitudinous world of snake
and monkey, bird and sloth, which
lived in the sunshine, and looked
down in wonder at our tiny, dark,
stumbling figures in the obscure
depths immeasurably below them.
At dawn and at sunset the howler
monkeys screamed together and
the parakeets broke into shrill
chatter, but during the hot hours
of the day only the full drone of
the insects, like the beat of a dis
tant surf, filled the ear, while noth
ing moved amid the solemn vistas
of stupendous trunks, fading away
into the darkness which held us
in. Once some bandy-legged,
lurching creature, an ant-eater or
a bear, scuttled clumsily amid the
shadows. It was the only sign of
earth life which I saw in this
great Amazonian forest.

INSTALLMENT TWENTY

IMPROVED EQUIPMENT MAY SEND BUILDINGS UP TO SIXTY STORIES

Cleveland.—Building owners and
managers, faced with improvements
in mechanical equipment which pro
spect a new type of office building that
can raise its head to 60 stories, will
give this feature prominent discus
sion when they meet in convention
here.

Another project of growing impor
tance is that of the skyscraper gar
age, according to Lee Thompson
Smith, president of the National As
sociation of Building Owners and
Managers. The availability of park
ing facilities may soon become a de
termining factor in the selecting of
offices, in view of the growing popu
larity of automobiles as a means of
transportation, said Mr. Smith.
"With downtown land values at
high rates it is obviously impossi
ble to provide free parking space," he
declared. "The provision of parking
space is a definite service that is
worth a charge. This brings us
squarely face-to-face with the ques
tion of garages, upon which their ten
ants have first call. These garages,
without use of elevators, run up to
eight stories.

"We have recently formed a com
mittee which is devoting much time
to the study of this important prob
lem, and it is hoped that this com
mittee at the convention will be able
to give the membership of the as
sociation a definite recommendation for
meeting this problem since rental
values are being affected in many
cities by the availability of parking
facilities."

The convention also will consider
the extension of the building plan
ning service of the organization, which
provides for the architects and own
ers of prospective buildings the ben
efit of the experience of the leading
managers of the nation in planning
their buildings.

"The building planning service,"
said President Smith, "has taken the
guesswork out of office building con
struction. Its advent marks the de
parture of the old type of office build
ing monument built to gratify the van
ity of a firm individual of wealth,
without thought to its economic sound
ness."

Advance registrations indicate that
there will be at least 700 building
owners and managers present.

Plan to Make Tiber Navigable.

Rome.—Much discussion has been
revived concerning the making of the
Tiber river navigable from the Medi
terranean as far as Rome, at least
for freight barges and small tugs.
Proponents of the plan argue that the
growing population of the capital is
beginning to tax the railroads be
yond their capacity to bring food
and other supplies. If grain and
heavy materials could be brought
from the sea by water it would re
lieve the railroads of a tremendous
burden, and might even make prices
slightly cheaper.
