JUDGE DUNN RAPS DRUNKEN DRIVERS IN CHARGE TO JURY

Declares Drunken Automobile Driver Is Greatest Menace te Life and Property

Elizabeth City, June 16 .- A ringing denunciation of drunken automobile drivers coupled with the warn ing that if convicted they could look for little mercy at the hands of the court, and advocacy of the application of the eight hour law to the conduct of North Carolina's courts as the best means to clear the congested dockets, marked the charge delivered to the grand jury Monday morning by Judge Albion Dunn in spening a week's criminal term of Superior Court here,

"The man who buys liquor, drinks it, and then drives an automobile on a public highway is a terrible menace to life and property," Judge Dunn declared. "He will be given a just and fair trial in this court, but if convicted, he may know now that he is going to reap the whirlwind he has sown." Judge Dunn then cited several recent automobile accidents in the State, attributed partly to liquor, which have resulted in fatalities. "Such drivers should be placed where they will be unable to operate a car for some time to come," he concluded.




