SENATOR ROBERT M. LA FOLLETTE DEAD

Members Amundsen Polar Flight Reported Safe

WISCONSIN SENATOR DIED IN WASHINGTON SHORTLY AFTER NOON

Prominent Figure in National Politics for Many Years Succumbs to Heart Failure After Short Illness

Washington, June 18.—Senator Robert M. La Follette for many years a stormy petrel in American politics died here today.

Death resulted from heart failure brought about by a general breakdown and an attack of bronchial asthma.

The Wisconsin Senator and late Independent Presidential Candidate for President began failing in health even before the 1924 campaign. Several weeks ago he contracted a severe cold which developed into asthma. His heart, which had been unable to stand the strain, gave way during the night, and he sank rapidly after daylight today.

Although they realized the seriousness of Senator La Follette's condition, members of his family had hope until today that he would recover. Last night his physicians said he was resting easily, but nevertheless he took a quick and decided turn for the worse in the night hours and hope abandoned.

To the last, however, he insisted on cheerful reports being given out as to his illness, and it was not until yesterday that it was admitted his condition was serious.

After the storm of his long career, he passed away very quietly surrounded by members of his family. He was conscious almost until death, but for several hours had been unable to speak only in whispers to those about him.

Shortly before the end he mustered all his waning strength in a brave attempt to murmur a last word to those at his bed side, then he lapsed into unconsciousness and without any evidence of pain passed almost immediately from life.

Mrs. La Follette and their two sons and daughters were close about him in the sick room throughout the morning, and until death. It is the present plan to take the body to Madison for burial.

WILLIAM AND MARY COLLEGE VISITED BY BIG FIRE TODAY

Penniman Building Destroyed at a Loss of Approximately \$50,000

Williamsburg, Va., June 18.—About forty students at the William and Mary College, summer teachers institute, were driven into the open by fire which early today destroyed the Penniman building, adjoining the dormitories in which they slept, at a loss of approximately \$50,000. The main dining hall of the institution caught fire, but only slight damage was done. The origin of the fire has not been determined.

To Hold Meetings to Seek Wage Increase From 200 Railroads

Cleveland, Ohio, June 18.—Chairman's Association of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, and the Order of Railroad Conductors will hold joint divisional meetings in November to consider the proposition of seeking a wage increase from approximately 200 railroads in the United States for trainmen and conductors, William George Lee, President of the Trainmen announced today.

The amount of the increase to be asked was not announced but Mr. Lee said the wage reduction to railroad men in 1921 amounted to about 12 percent, or approximately 64 cents a day, that the increase last year amounted to approximately 5 percent, and that the requesting for an increase would probably be at least enough to make up the 1921 reduction.

Indicates Economy Program's Saving to Exceed \$100,000,000

Chicago, June 18.—Some indication was given today by Brigadier General Henry M. Lord, director of the Federal Budget, that the economy program's saving for the fiscal year ended June 30 would exceed \$100,000,000.

FAIMAN CALLED AS COURT'S WITNESS SHEPHERD TRIAL

Launched Immediately Into Accusation of Accused Man After Being Asked Two Questions of Identification

Chicago, June 18.—His sponsorship relinquished by the prosecution, which for many weeks has had him under close guard as the proclaimed chief witness, Charles C. Faiman, was called as a court's witness today in the Shepherd murder trial. He took the witness stand for direct examination by Judge Thomas J. Lynch shortly after 11 o'clock.

The step was taken over a bitter protest of the defense which argued that the move would prejudice the jury.

Faiman, a dapper little blonde man, launched immediately into his accusation of Shepherd after Judge Lynch had asked him two questions of identification. Faiman talked in a barely audible voice and glanced nervously from the Judge to the jury and then to the lawyers. He shifted about in the witness stand as he recited his testimony.

After telling the court that he knew Shepherd and had had considerable dealings with him, Faiman launched into the story of his dealings with Shepherd on which the state has said it depends upon the conviction of Shepherd.

Thrice previously he had told a story that he gave Shepherd typhoid germs and taught him how to slay William N. McClintock with them, for a promise of \$100,000 from the \$1,000,000 estate the youth had willed to Shepherd. Faiman was indicted for the murder of McClintock along with Shepherd.

Shepherd said he intended to take a course in criminal bacteriology. Shepherd is a lawyer. The witness added that Shepherd went to see him on germs and was shown them on a slide.

The defendant said he would return, testified Faiman, and upon the second visit displayed especial interest in typhoid and tuberculosis germs.

Shepherd asked him if a person could be given germs and was told they could be introduced in food or in cold water, said Faiman, adding that Shepherd wanted to know that if the fact that germs had been fed a person could be revealed in a post mortem examination.

Says Italy Willing to Enter Negotiations Refunding War Debt

Washington, June 18.—Notification of Italy's willingness to enter upon formal negotiations for the refunding of its war debt to the United States is understood to have been given to Secretary Kellogg today by Ambassador De Martino.

Kennedy's Decision Will Be Delivered Federal Court Today

Cheyenne, Wyoming, June 18.—Judge Edward B. Kennedy's decision in the Governor's suit for annulment of the Mammoth Oil Company's lease on the Teapot Dome Naval Oil Reserve, will be delivered in Federal Court here today. Judge Kennedy so notified counsel for the defense and that Mammoth Oil Company and other interested Sinclair Corporations.

The suit was tried last March, and was taken under advisement March 26. The government seeks annulment of the Teapot Dome Lease on the ground that it was obtained through collusion and fraud, and that there was no authority from congress for the Department of Interior to make the lease.

Drunken Auto Driver Runs Over Woman

Mamie Tyson, Negro, in Hospital as Result of Being Run Down by Rufus Flemming

Mamie Tyson, colored, is in a local hospital suffering from a broken arm and other injuries received when she was run down by an automobile this afternoon and Rufus Flemming, of Rocky Mount, traveling salesman, driver of the car is in jail here pending the outcome of her injuries. The accident occurred about two o'clock on the Greenville-Ayden highway about two miles from this city.

According to officers who made the arrest, Flemming was so intoxicated at the time that he remembers nothing of the accident and denies that he ran over anybody.

According to two negroes who were eye witnesses to the accident, Flemming was driving toward Greenville and was swerving from one side of the road to the other. The woman was walking along the border of the highway two feet off the left hand side of the pavement when Flemming car swerved over to that side, ran over her and continued on its way. The two negroes, who were traveling in a car just behind Flemming, followed him into town and notified officers of the accident, and Flemming was of the accident, and Flemming was immediately taken into custody.

The negro woman was rushed to a local hospital where the full extent of her injuries has not yet been determined. Physicians stated that she was suffering from a broken arm and bruises but an X-ray examination was necessary to determine if there were other injuries.

Funeral services will be conducted Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with interment taking place in the Carney burying grounds on the Pacolus road, four miles of Greenville. Mrs. McGowan was beloved by a host of friends for her lovely disposition and strong christian character. She will be greatly missed by people throughout her community. The deceased is survived by her only child, Mrs. Alfred Worthington with whom she has been making her home for the past several years.

Revenue Officer Captures Still Near Simpson

Revenue Officer John Snell, of Plymouth, Deputies Paramore, of Grimesland, Harris, Hodges and Mitchell, of Washington, on Tuesday made one of the biggest hauls in several months, when they captured a still a short distance below Simpson on the farm of Mr. David Elks. Mr. Elks, denied any knowledge of the still, but the revenue officer however, issued a warrant for his arrest as he was owner of the land on which the still was found.

The still had five fermenters with a capacity of 4000 gallons, one steam boiler and a 200 gallon kettle, 1600 gallons of mash were poured out. A 30 gallon barrel of whiskey was found in a hedge near the house. From all appearances the still had not been in operation for several days.

In Edgecombe 350 cattle comprising 178 herds of cattle have been tested without the finding of a single reaction or suspect. In Nash the same result obtained during the testing of 395 cattle comprising 214 herds.

Raleigh, June 18.—Samuel L. Roger, former director of the census, and at present Secretary of the Salary and Wage Commission, has suffered a stroke of apoplexy, it was announced at the office of Governor McLean today. It was added that Mr. Roger's condition was "Not at all encouraging." He is at his home in Franklin, N. C., where he has been seriously ill for several days.

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WANTED—THE SPIRIT OF TAFT AND WILSON

Wilson's policy in Mexico stands out in striking contrast with the latest bully and bluster policy announced at Washington last week.

Every now and then the propaganda to carry the American flag to the Panama Canal looms up in one form or another. Few of these propagandists are as frank as the late Henry Watterson, who in 1913 declared that the United States ought to annex Mexico and every Central American state. He believed the people in those countries were incompetent to govern themselves and that Manifest Destiny pointed to their being incorporated into the United States. There are people who have the same avj'd eyes on Mexico but who lack the courage of their greed for lands belonging to others. Colonel Watterson had no monetary interest and was not speaking for the men who had, some by trick and some by honest means, obtained valuable oil and mineral concessions in Mexico. The "star-eyed goddess" of expansion moved the brilliant Kentucky colonel to his imperialistic policy. Desire for profit for themselves or to enrich others is responsible for most of the trouble this country has had with Mexico. The big concessionaires resented Wilson's refusal to recognize Huerta, the murderer of Madero. Most of them wanted to deal with a thing like Huerta or a smooth traitor to his country like Diaz. Most of the troubles in Mexico were caused by the policy of Diaz in parting with the valuable oil, mineral and other public funds to foreigners for bribes to himself or inadequate compensation to his country. The people who obtained these concessions at a song have injured the just rights of Americans and others who honestly acquired title to property in Mexico. If there had been no giving away or selling for next to nothing of Mexico's patrimony to foreigners, it would have been easy for the United States and

Mexico to have adjusted their differences. Oiaz's policy, when it was fully realized by Mexicans, evoked their righteous wrath. They rallied under Madero to save their country from looters. Madero was hated by grafters in and out of Mexico, and unfortunately while honorable and patriotic, lacked power to rule. Huerta was the creature of blood and iron and those who wished to restore the concession barter policy of Diaz. But for the courageous attitude of Wilson, the Mexicans would have been restored to perpetual serfdom under greedy exploiters, most of them from other countries. No policy of Wilson was so bitterly attacked—partly by honest imperialists like Watterson, partly by those who had the habit of criticising all he undertook, and chiefly by the well-oiled agencies of the oil concessionaires.

Last week Secretary of State Kellogg issued a blunt and insulting note to Mexico. If it had been sent to a great power, the world would have stood aghast at its brutality and lack of the decent proprieties of diplomacy. It was none the less indefensible because sent to a weak neighbor nation, lacking the military power to make their vigorous protest of the insult effective.

What the administration at Washington needs is the spirit of Taft, who when urged to high-handed measures in Mexico said he should "use all patience possible, with prayer, that some power will arise in Mexico to bring about peace throughout that troubled country," and he added: "But I have no sympathy—none at all, and the charge of cowardice does not frighten me—with that which prompts us for purposes of exploitation and gain to invade another country and involve ourselves in a war, the extent of which we could not realize, and the sacrifice of thousands of lives and of millions of treasure."

In the same spirit—and Secretary Kellogg should bear in mind that noble utterance—Mr. Wilson said: "If I am strong I am ashamed to bully the weak. In proportion to my strength in my pride in withholding that strength from the oppression of another people." Again he said: "I hold it as a fundamental principle that every people has the right to determine its own form of government; and until this revolution in Mexico, until the end of the Diaz reign, 80 per cent of the people of Mexico never had a 'look in' in determining who should be their governors or what their government should be. Now I am for the 80 per cent. It is none of my business, and it is none of your business, how long they take in determining it. . . . The country is theirs. . . . I am more interested in the fortunes of oppressed men and pitiful women and children than in any property rights whatever."

If some such breath of consideration of weak peoples could emanate from Washington now, how refreshing it would be!—News and Observer.

GERMAN COURT SAYS JUDGES MAY GO TO SLEEP WHEN BORED

Berlin.—A judge who was found napping has given rise to a far reaching controversy in Germany. In the course of events this question was referred to the German Supreme Court at Leipzig, which came to the strange decision that his honor may safely take his little snooze now and then, for in passing judgment it is his body, not his mind, which is the principal factor concerned.

As was to be expected, this decision has again evoked heated discussion among the best known jurists in the country. Prof. I. Goldschmidt, the legal authority at the Berlin University, expresses his opinion thus:

"One cannot expect a judge to give his undivided attention to the proceedings. He is obliged to sign documents, to receive messages and to answer numerous whispered questions during the trial. But if it is positively proved that he has been asleep, the case becomes prohibitive for sleep signifies loss of consciousness, and also irresponsibility."

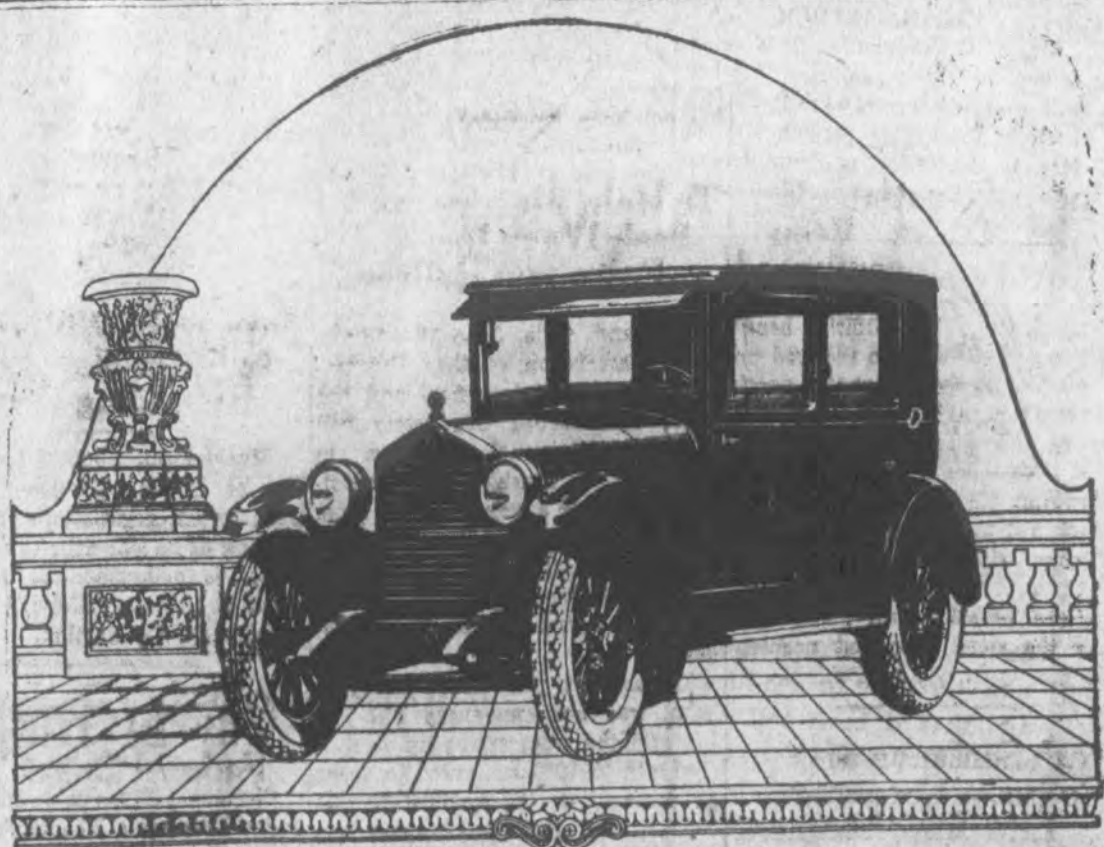

WELL BUILT HOUSES GERMAN PRINCESSES WOULD SAVE LIVES LEAD SIMPLE LIVES IN TORNADO SECTION IN THEIR ADVERSITY

Champaign, Ill.—If engineering science were applied to the design and construction of dwellings and school houses they could easily and inexpensively be made proof against the devastation of tornadoes such as recently visited the five middle western states, according to C. C. Williams, head of the department of civil engineering of the University of Illinois.

Even frame and stucco houses can be built sufficiently strong to withstand the force of a tornado. Mr. Williams said. The stresses in a frame dwelling due to wind are calculable at all critical points and the strength of timber and the holding power of the nails are well known, so the entire structure admits of scientific design comparable with a riveted steel building.

"That dwellings, school houses and churches readily collapse under such a storm is due to the fact that the design and details of framing, anchorage and ties have been left entirely to the tradesmen, who has little knowledge of the character of stresses set up inside the structure that he is building," Mr. Williams declared. "He merely erects one part on top of another, with toe-nails at best. Like a pile of child's blocks, and when the wind comes the pile offers very little resistance to the destructive force."

"Even architects have been engrossed in the appearance and convenience of dwellings to the exclusion of careful thought to the stability. They have unfortunately accepted the tradesman's framing and details."

"A study of the design of a frame dwelling shows that a well sheathed house of average size can be made proof against a tornado at an expenditure of less than one per cent of the total cost of the house."

"Man is continually combating the destructive elements of nature. Medical science has largely removed the scourges of disease. Tornadoes are no more a visitation of providence to which man must supinely submit than were the plagues of the Middle Ages. Engineering science, if applied to the design and construction of such buildings as dwellings and school houses, is amply able to protect human life from wholesale destruction by wind and the failure to take advantage of this fact in the conservation of human life is a relic of moral inertia fitting the age of smallpox and the black death."

The Rubber Situation
about a year ago crude rubber sold

the British colonies by an increasing graded tax on all exports above a certain quantity. It also provides for increasing or diminishing this quantity as the price of rubber rises or falls in London. The higher the price, the greater the quantity, and consequently more rubber is exported.

During 1924 the prevailing low prices caused diminished exports under the Stevenson plan. This year's brisk demand combined with low stock in London has resulted in the present high price of rubber. The American rubber industry needs a steady supply of raw material and if the British overreach themselves in rubber restrictions, our manufacturers will undoubtedly establish independent sources of production. The Stevenson plan stimulates production in territory outside the British Empire.

At a recent conference in Washington Secretary Hoover stated that the present high price of crude rubber will make profitable the chemical reclamation of used rubber and that our domestic consumption can be supplied up to 40 per cent from this source.

C., where he was born in 1841. He began his service in the War Between the States at Bethel and surrendered with General Robert E. Lee at Appomattox.

Capital punishment in North Carolina is mentioned in the Constitution, which names four offenses, including murder, burglary, arson and attacking a woman, adding: "And these only may be punishable with death, if the General Assembly shall so enact."

The State Constitution provides

for the separation of men and women prisoners in all penal institutions of the State.

The three North Carolina signers of the Declaration of Independence at Philadelphia, July 4, 1776, were: William Hooper, Joseph Hewes and John Penn.

The State Board of Elections is composed of five members, appointed by the Governor for terms of three years. Not more than three of the members shall be of the same political party. The Board was created by an act of the General Assembly of 1901.
