SENATOR ROBERT M. LAFOLLETTE DEAD

Members Amundsen Polar Flight Reported Safe

WISCONSIN SENATOR SHORTLY AFTER NOON

Prominent Figure in National Politics for Many Years Succumbs to Heart Failure After Short Illness

Washington, June 18.—Senmany years a stormy petrel in American politics died here today.

Death resulted from heart failure brought about by a general breakdown and an attack of bronchial asthma.

The Wisconsin Senstor and late, Independent Presidential Carididate for President began failing in health even before the 1924 campaign. Several wacks ago he contracted a severe old which developed into Asthma. Ris heart, which had been unable to stand the strain, gave way during the night, and he sank rapidly afterday light today.

Although they realized the serieusness of Senator LaFollette's condition, members of his family had hope until today that he would recover. Last night his physicians said he was resting nearly, but nevertheless he took a quick and decided turn for the worse in the night hours and hope abandoned.


