SAMUEL L. ROGERS FORMER DIRECTOR OF CENSUS IS DEAD

Was Member of State Salary and Wage Commission at Time of Death; Prominent in Politics

Franklin, N. C., June 19.—Samuel L. Rogers, 65, director of the United States Census under the Wilson administration and prominent in state and national politics died at his home here last night. One week before he had been stricken with apoplexy while enroute from Raleigh to his home. His condition gradually became worse, and the patient fell into a coma Wednesday from which he did not rally.

Mr. Rogers was appointed a member of the State Salary and Wage Commission early this year, and was in Raleigh in the interest of that duty when he became ill. He had served in various official capacities including clerk of the Superior court here, member of the State Legislature, and Collector of Internal Revenue. In 1912 he successfully managed the campaign of Senator Simmons in his race against Governor Kitchin for the United States Senate.

Samuel Lyle Rogers, director of the federal census bureau under President Wilson and for many years prominent in North Carolina politics was born in Franklin, Macon county, N. C., December 31, 1859. He was a son of Clark Thornton and Margaret Louise Reid Rogers. He was educated in the public schools of Franklin and went through high school there.

Mr. Rogers was married to Miss Mamie Williams Addington, of Franklin, on December 31, 1889, his thirtieth birthday. At the age of 19 he had entered the mercantile business in his home town of Franklin.

In 1882, Mr. Rogers entered the political world by becoming clerk of the superior court of Macon county. He held that office until 1893, when he resigned. He was collector of internal revenue for the Western North Carolina District from 1897 to 1897.

From 1899 to 1911, Mr. Rogers was a member of the North Carolina State Corporation Commission. He was appointed director of the census by President Wilson, on March 15, 1915, and served until the expiration of the latter's second term.

Mr. Rogers was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a trustee of the Children's Home at Winston-Salem and an organizer and director of the Bank of Franklin. He was a member of the American Statistical Association, the National Press Club and the Masonic Fraternity. He was a democrat.

During his residence in Washington, Mr. Rogers lived at 3610 Macomb St., N. W.

Following the adjournment of the 1925 General Assembly, Governor McLean appointed Mr. Rogers a member of the State Salary and Wage Commission. Work incident to that position was the last in which he engaged before he was stricken.

MILLIONAIRE LEAVES FUND TO ASSURE BETTER ROADS

Stockholm.—In one of the most original wills ever filed for probate in Sweden, a local millionaire named Carl Smith has directed that the bulk of his estate be devoted to the improvement of public highways and to the discovery of better methods of etching fish.

The money to be spent for the improvement of roads is to be administered by the Stockholm Automobile Club and used for such things as the construction of model highways and tests of paving materials, as well as for prizes to communities with good roads. The fishing fund is to be spent for the bettering of fishing methods so as to benefit the population of the Swedish skerries.

NEW REVENUE BILL WILL BE PRESENTED TO NEXT CONGRESS

Proposals Will Be for Blanket Decreases With a Maximum Sur Tax Ranging From 13 to 25 Per Cent

Washington, June 19.—The next Congress in its predicting efforts toward tax reductions will have before it proposals for blanket decreases with a maximum sur tax ranging from 13 to 25 percent if the early summer suggestions of Republican and Democratic leaders carry through to December. When the law members assemble again.

Chairman Green, of the House Ways and Means Committee, which will begin in the fall to work on a new revenue bill, is of the opinion that liberal, equitable reduction should be effected with a maximum surtax of 25 percent. The same figure has been suggested by Chairman Smoot, of the Senate Finance Committee. Senator Underwood, of Alabama, recently advocated a maximum of 13 percent and Frank W. Mondell, War Finance Corporation member, and former Republican leader of the House, has suggested 15 percent in a series of speeches in the mid west on tax repair. Treasury officials are said to favor a reduction to at least 20 percent.

Chairman Green disagreed with the opinion of Senator Smoot, which have been concurred in by President Coolidge that it might be well for the Federal Government to abandon its inheritance tax. The Senate Finance Committee proposed that inheritance levies be left to the states, and that they in turn leave the income tax field to the Federal Government.

STARTLING FACTS OF SWARTHMORE CHAUTAUQUA

(By MATTHEW WAYMAN).

Misunderstanding promotes ill feeling, fattens ignorance and creates suspicion. A clear statement of facts will wipe away any such condition. Therefore I want to publicly thank The Reflector staff and its owner, D. J. Whichard for our mutual confidence and their assistance to me during my stay in Greenville. This Chautauqua is a threefold proposition. There are three parties to the agreement. The association is a non-profit concern which undertakes to provide cities with a week of joy which shall be clean inspiring and entertaining. It has no great financial backing but goes into towns after these towns have agreed to take the Chautauqua. Briefly this is the plan.

Greenville likes Chautauqua. The people, hundreds of them, enjoy the programs. They want it. Therefore someone must take the financial responsibility. A committee is organized in the name of the town.

Greenville is included in the list of towns on the circuit. The Chautauqua costs approximately twenty-four hundred dollars. Of this amount the committee agrees to sell tickets totaling eighteen hundred dollars. The Association takes a chance of making up its loss by single admissions. If the singles total less than six hundred dollars the Association loses that amount. If the ticket sale is less than eighteen hundred the committee loses that amount. In each case it is a question of the people coming to Chautauqua in sufficient numbers. Like all good endeavors good men have to be on the committee and of course work together to make a success.

Last year more than 42000 guarantors signed for Swarthmore. More than 3,000,000 people attended the sessions. Many of the most noted artists and lecturers of the world were employed. A staff of thousands of people acted as executives.

This year the number of cities has grown. The guarantors have multiplied and consequently the cost of the programs is correspondingly increased. Dr. Paul M. Pearson the President of the Association is assured that next year's programs will surpass if possible those of all former years.

From a standpoint of inspiration and enjoyment nobody can estimate the value of Chautauqua or calculate the good done by the committee. But, just as our largest cities are giving freely of the best music, orators and inspiring thoughts, so the smaller cities like Greenville are giving these things in the hope that the future citizens may be better fitted to carry on the country after we are dead.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR LA FOLLETTE BE HELD MONDAY

Body Will Leave Washington This Afternoon for Wisconsin; Services to Be Conducted From Capitol

Washington, June 19.—The body of Senator Robert M. LaFollette will be taken late today to Wisconsin to rest for a time in the Capitol of the State he represented in Congress during seven terms.

A heart attack yesterday came after similar attacks on his vitality over a period of ten years, ending in its 70th year the career of "Fighting Bob," one of the outstanding figures in American politics and last year an Independent Candidate for President.

In a special car, the body will leave Washington at 3 this afternoon over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for Chicago. There the funeral car and another coach carrying members of the family and close friends will be made into a special train for the trip to Madison. The Wisconsin Capitol will be reached Saturday and on Sunday the body will lie in state at the Capitol where Mr. LaFollette served three terms as Governor. Funeral services will be held there Monday.

Realizing that the time had come when he no longer could retain his grip on life as he had done in past struggles, Mr. LaFollette yesterday rallied his waning strength to whisper a final message to the public through his son. He was at peace with the world, he said, although he believed there was a lot of work he still could do. I do not know how the people "will feel toward me, but I shall take to the grave my love for them, which has sustained me through life."

A little while later he murmured something to those grouped about his bed, but his words were muted by advancing death, and were not distinguishable. He passed away peacefully shortly after 1 o'clock. His passing brought from many other leaders who had stood both with and against him in his political battles, sincere expressions of sorrow and tribute.

SHIPPING STRIKE SPREADS HONG KONG

Chinese Students Also Strike and Decide to Send Committee to Hong Kong

Hong Kong, June 19.—The shipping strike spread to Hong Kong today. Chinese students here also struck and decided to send a committee to Hong Kong in connection with the proposed general strike movement.

British volunteers here were warned of the possibility of their early mobilization in view of the emergency.

FIVE FAR WESTERN TEAMS ENTIRE FOR POLO TITLE

Colorado Springs, Colo.—Preliminary play to the national polo championship will begin August 15 when five teams from the western Rocky Mountain division meet here in an elimination tournament.

From the teams entered will be selected a quartet to contest with the tournament winner of the eastern Rocky Mountain division, which will be determined at Fort Leavenworth, Kans., June 27.

Divisional winners will compete in the national inter-circuit tournament to be held at Philadelphia next fall.

The five teams entered in the western mountain section are: Broadmoor and Colorado Springs, both of this city; the army officers' fourth from Fort D. A. Russell, Cheyenne, Wyo., and Fort Meade, South Dakota; and the Wichita, Kans., quartet.

The Broadmoor team at present reigns a favorite, having numbered among its players several gathered from the famous Midwick team of Los Angeles.

LEASING OF TEAPOT DOME TO SINCLAIR UPHELD KENNEDY

Decision of Federal Judge Ab-solves Robinson, Fenny, Baine and Roosevelt From All Blame

Cheyenne, Wyo., June 19.—The leasing of the Teapot Dome to Harry F. Sinclair and his Mammoth Oil Company was upheld today by Federal Judge Thomas B. Kennedy, who rendered his decision in the annulment suit brought by the Government. "The allegations of fraud in the bill have not been sustained," Judge Kennedy ruled.

His decision reviewed testimony relating how Sinclair paid about \$1,000,000 to the Pioneer and Belgo Oil Companies for mineral claims they held in Teapot Dome, which Sinclair acquire in order to get a lease on the reserve.

The Continental Trading Company which the Government alleged was used as well as for passing liberty bonds from Sinclair to Fall, was organized Saturday and on Sunday the body said this decision. The decision absolved Admiral John K. Robinson, Chief of Naval Engineering; Edward C. Fenny, Assistant Secretary of the Interior; Henry Foster Baine, director of the Bureau of Mines; former Assistant Secretary Roosevelt, of the Navy, and several subordinates involved in the leasing negotiations, of all blame.

"The defended Mammoth Oil Company was the creature of Sinclair and should be held as responsible for all his acts," the decision said. The Secretary of the Navy was fully within his rights in acting as he did, having been authorized by the act of June 4, 1920, to "develop, conserve, use, and operate the Naval Oil reserve," Judge Kennedy held.

He ruled that the phrase "in his discretion" embodied in the law places no restriction on the manner in which the reserves were to be handled.

He further had "full authority to use, store, exchange, and sell all the crude oil royalties," Judge Kennedy held in deciding the Government's contention that the Secretary acted in dealing in commodities for a Government of a usurpation of Congressional authority for appropriating money for such dealings. The Government's bill of complaint was dismissed, every major contention in it having been denied in the decision.

Foreign Powers Offer Suggestions To China Gov't.

Peking, China, June 19.—The foreign powers today suggested to the Chinese Government to the undertaking of negotiations to settle both the questions arising from the recent disturbances in Shanghai, and also to discuss the broad aspect of conditions in China generally.

The Italian Minister representing also the other foreign ministers interested in the Chinese situation, made this suggestion personally to the Chinese Foreign Minister today. His expressed desire was that the negotiations dealing with all aspects of contributing to the unrest at Shanghai and consequently influencing conditions throughout China.

Belgium Ambassador Summoned to Discuss Payment War Debt

Brussels, Belgium, June 19.—The Belgium Ambassador to the United States was summoned by the Foreign Minister immediately upon his arrival here today for a discussion of the payment of Belgium's war debt to the United States.

Condition of Woods Remains Unchanged

Florence, June 19.—Reports from the bedside of Judge Charles A. Woods, of the United States Circuit Court of appeals, early today were to the effect that no change had occurred in his condition since late yesterday when physicians announced his recovery was impossible. Judge Woods is 73 years of age.

UNKNOWN ABYSSINA IMPORTANT FACTOR IN AFRICA'S FUTURE

New York—Abyssinia, the hermit nation of Africa, is the engine of international statesmanship, according to the official report of the Educational Commission to East Africa, which is now being distributed by the Phelps-Stokes Fund. The one great native empire of the African continent, Abyssinia has recently been admitted as a member of the League of Nations, although so little is known of it that the estimates of population range from 4,000,000 to 10,000,000.

Unconquered, unknown and undeveloped, Abyssinia is at once a country of great material resources and of serious and difficult problems, the report continues. "The most unique element in the position of the empire is its independence of European control. The remarkable agricultural possibilities, including almost half of the cultivatable soil of temperate climates in East Africa, must inevitably respond to the demand of the world for the necessities of life. The increasing facility of transportation and travel will necessarily compel the participation of this great empire in the economic activities of civilization."

"The geographical position of Abyssinia in northeast Africa with European colonies encircling its territory, nationalistic Egypt close at hand, and restless India not far away, all add to the impending character of Abyssinian possibilities."

"In the present awakening of Africa, and especially of East Africa, it seems certain that this great inland empire will be forced upon the attention of the world."

"The vital problem now confronting not only Abyssinia but also East Africa and the nations whose peace and prosperity are involved, is how and when that empire is to become a factor in world affairs. Shall it be by way of exploitation, whether by selfish classes within the empire or by ruthless rivalries of foreign agencies, thus adding another element of perplexity in international relationships? Or shall it be by way of international cooperation and the encouragement of the Abyssinians to adopt the processes of development based on sound economics, sound sociology, sound government and above all, sound education related to the physical welfare, the mental capacities and the moral and religious needs of the people?"

The successor to the famous Emperor Menelik who died in 1908, was deposed in 1916 for anti-Christian intrigue and a daughter of Menelik was named as empress with her kinsman, Ras Tafari, as prince regent and heir to the throne. This ruling family is commonly supposed to be descended from Solomon and the Queen of Sheba. The Abyssinians are Christians of the ancient Coptic Church. The masses are eager for education, but the patriarch is said to be unfriendly to the activities of missionaries of other faiths. On the other hand Ras Tafari gives every evidence of wanting to cooperate.

In summing up this "land of striking contrasts" the report says that the Abyssinians are "possibly the most capable of African people, certainly the most highly developed in native governmental and community organization, but among the most backward of all Africa in the benefits of sanitation and hygiene, almost entirely lacking in the advantages of school systems, strikingly barren of the necessities and conveniences of the civilized home, and remarkably separated from the stimulations and profits of international exchange. 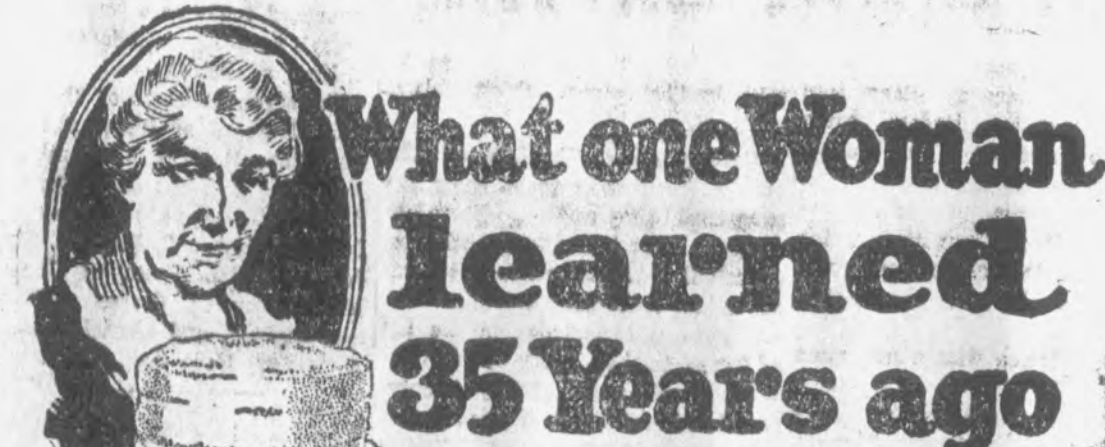

GIRL GOLF EXPERT
COUNTS DAYS UNTIL
SCHOOL BELL RINGS

Chicago. — Among the star golfers of America, there is a young one, Miss Miriam Burns of Kansas City, Mo., a student at Northwestern University, who has announced that as soon as she can get away from the classroom she will try to add to the laurels she has won on the links. Miss Burns, who is fair to look at, counts among the victories of her brief career in golf no less an honor than the western championship, which is contested by some of the best women golfers of the world. She lost that title last year at Onwentsia to the then national titleholder, Edith Cummings, but only after she had dis-

played wonderful golf in previous rounds over watery links, and largely because she had suffered from food poisoning the night before the final round.

The daughter of a civil engineer who got his training at Cornell and Stanford universities, Miss Burns apparently adopted the transit and level in lining out her golf shots, for they are straight and well gauged as to distance. She is not famous as a long driver or iron shooter, but she is almost always down the center of the fairway. She is not a spectacular approacher, using the run-up much of the time, but she is uncanny in her ability to chip and run the ball to within easy putting distance of the cup from the edge of the green, or even from 75 yards away.

On the green Miss Burns is excellent, although it was with the putter that she failed mostly in her losing match with Miss Cummings last summer. This defeat was particularly bitter for Miss Burns, yet she took it with the best of sportsmanship. It was bitter because she had been playing better than ever in her life, despite her recent sorrow over the death of her father, and because she was losing a crown that she so well earned the year before, defeating Louise Fordyce, Ohio champion.

It might be recorded that Miss Burns a few weeks later got even with Miss Cummings in the friendly manner of golf by defeating her in a 21-hole match during the national title tournament at Providence, R. I., and helping to pass the national crown to Miss Cummings to Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd.

Winnipeg, Man. — The domestic servant problem in Winnipeg has been materially relieved by the arrival of a batch of British girls, included among the large quota of settlers reaching here during the past few weeks.

While the majority of these domestics have remained in this city, a number have proceeded to different points in the west. The girls were brought to Canada under the auspices of the Salvation Army.

Statistics show that the population of western Canada has been augmented by more than 6,000 newcomers during May, the majority immigrating under the British Empire colonization scheme.

IF WE ARE TO SURVIVE

Each day it appears that the impossible mixture of gasoline and whiskey is more prevalent in the form of the drunken automobile driver and almost each day the number of dead and injured as a result of this over-growing menace mounts higher and higher. This great menace to the public safety has reached such great proportions that it is necessary that drastic steps be taken immediately to bring a halt to this wilful and unlawful destruction of life and property. Recent accidents here caused by drunken drivers have set forth clearly that an automobile with an intoxicated person at the wheel is not only a danger to the occupants of that car but to innocent motorists and pedestrians, as well as a danger to the lives and property of those who reside near our hard surfaced roads.

A person who will deliberately fill up on moonshine whiskey and then drive an automobile is a fit subject for either the insane asylum or the penitentiary and the law-abiding citizens of this state who desire freedom from the dangers of the drunken driver should band themselves together in a move-

ment to see that such drivers get their just deserts. Prominent jurists of the state are taking a definite stand in their attitude toward the drunken driver and with public opinion of the state behind them in their efforts to rid the State of this menace our highways can be made a safe place of travel.

DO IT NOW

Automobile licenses for the new fiscal year which begins on July 1 have been on sale here for several days, but according to Mr. J. D. Murphy, head of the Carolina Motor Club here, through which the licenses are distributed, only a few persons have yet availed themselves of the opportunity to procure their new licenses. With approximately five thousand automobiles in this country for which licenses must be procured in addition to those in adjoining counties for which licenses will no doubt be purchased here it seems that toward the closing days of the month there will be a grand rush for the license bureau and no doubt many will have to wait hours and hours owing to the last minute congestion.

An aid to those who must buy licenses Mr. Murphy sets forth just what information is necessary before licenses can be issued and he urges that everyone be in position to furnish this necessary information when they apply for their licenses in order to avoid delay. If you have never registered your title to your car it is necessary that this be done before you can get your license and the Motor Club is glad to aid you in securing your title. When you apply for your license know the make, motor number, serial number and model of your car and you will save valuable time. Have your information ready, avoid the rush by applying early and when the first of July arrives you will not be inconvenienced by being out of the use of your car or waiting your turn in a long line of last minute applicants.

The Motor Club is endeavoring to be of real service to motorists of this section but without your co-operation their efforts to help you will be in vain.

PARIS SALON OF 1925 SHOWS NORMAL TONE IN FRENCH PAINTING

Paris. — A wise old owl, in marble, standing just outside this year's Salon, seems to wink knowingly at arriving visitors, as if to hint to them they will find something new inside. The owl is a fine specimen of sculpture and as a symbol of the good sense that has prevailed in the selection of the pictures shown this year, he is regarded by critics as being right.

The choice collection of art the two leading societies got together is due, in the first instance, to the fact that the International Exposition of Decorative Arts drove them out of the Grand Palais. They took refuge in temporary barracks along the Seine, in the Tuileries gardens, where they have about half the space provided in their usual quarters on the Champs Elysees. Lovers of art say it was a happy accident. It raised the average merit of the canvases shown, accentuating the contrast between art of the classical school and the efforts of the modernists who have made of the Decorative Arts Exposition an affair which has incited sharp criticism and discussion.

There is a good deal of sunshine, lots of refreshing green, many pastoral studies that show a healthier selection of subjects, and a great deal less of the art that looks as if it had been put onto canvas with a spade. The subjects are not only more wholesome, but the technique is more in line with what the profane would think to be the proper way of making a picture look like the subject it is supposed to portray.

Doubled hair does not yet seem to have appealed to the artist. Portraits of women are painted with the full allotment of nature. The nude is discreet in point of volume, as well as in respect to treatment. There are some striking canvases in this department that will probably some day find their way into public galleries. That the influence of the war on art is waning is one of the lessons of the show. Military subjects are rare, and those that are shown are painted not to glorify heroism but to show the horrors of war. This is particularly noticeable in the sculpture section. In late years this department has looked like a large cemetery, most of the exhibits having been made to serve as monuments to the dead on the field of battle. This year there are very few pieces that suggest war or militarism.

The success that has followed the decisions of the jury in cutting down the show without doing injustice to any meritorious work, will, some of the critics believe, result in a continuation of the policy of more careful weeding than has prevailed of late years. It will also, they think, prove of great benefit to artists, inciting them to greater effort when it once again becomes certain that mediocre works will in future stand small chance of admission.

TRAVEL IN FOREIGN LANDS WEAVES BONDS OF AMITY

Rome.—Europe since the war has become a social melting pot for

Americans, much as America before the war was a racial and national melting pot for Europeans.

This is the opinion of a number of thoughtful Italians who have lived for considerable lengths of time in various parts of the United States and who have had extensive contacts with Americans abroad.

Life and travel in Europe, these observers declare, break down the sectional and social barriers between Americans who, in their native habitats, consider the democratic ideas of Jefferson and Jackson of purely historical interest.

Except for the so-called American aristocracy which has lived more comfortably in Europe than America ever since Tory-Whig days, almost all Americans abroad are mutually accessible. The "big man" from the small city is willing to accept as compeer the "little man" from the big city, and he sees no gap between himself and the lowliest of his towns men when there is the choice between him and a foreigner.

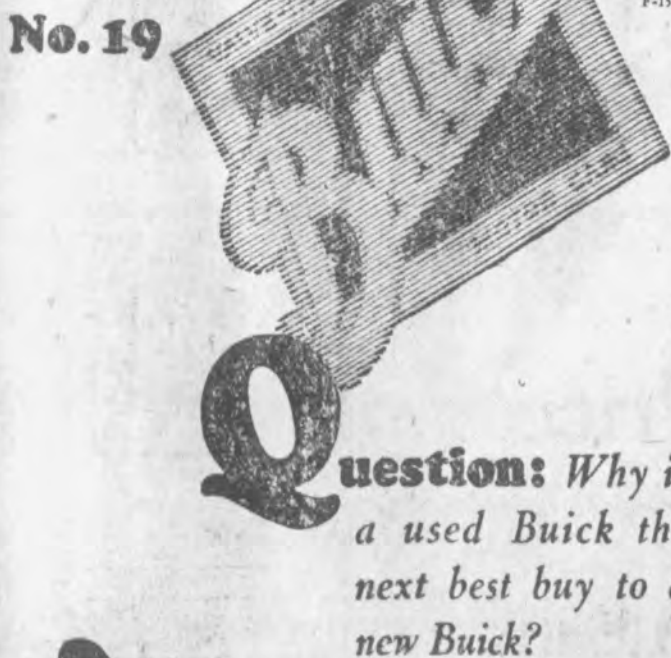


JAPANESE EARTHQUAKE, MAY.

ALASKA VOTES MONEY

TO IMPROVE AGRICULTURAL AND MINES COLLEGE

Anchorage, Alaska—An appropriation of \$163,360 granted the Alaska College of Agriculture and school of Mines by the territorial legislature which met last winter at Juneau, will enable several improvements, Judge Charles E. Bunnell, president of the institution, said here.

The appropriation provides for an addition to the main building, a dormitory to cost \$25,000 and a power plant. Requests for \$22,500 to be used in agriculture work and \$10,000 for school of mines extension work were denied.

The institution is at Fairbanks, farther north than any other of its kind in the world.
