prominent in North Carolina politics was born in Franklin, Macon county, N. C., December 31, 1859. He was s son of Clark Thornton and Margaret Louise Reid Rogers. He was educated in the public schools of Franklin and went through high school there.

Mr. Rogers was married to Miss Mamie Williams Addington, of Frank lin, on Ded mber 31, 1889, his thirtieth birthday. At the age of 19. he had entered the respectable having ness in his home town of Franklin.

In 1882, Mr. Rogers entered the political world by becoming clerk of the superior court of Macon county He held that office until 1893, when he resigned. He was collector of internal revenue for the Western North Carolina District from 1895 to 1897.

From 1899 to 1911, Mr. Rogers was a member of the North Carolina State Corporation Commission. He was appointed director of the census by President Wilson, on March 15. 1915, and served until the expiration of the latter's second term.

Mr. Rogers was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South a trustee of the Children's Home at a truste of the Children's Home at Winston-Salem and an organizer and director of the Bank of Franklin. He was a member of the American Statistical Association, the National Press Club and the Masonic Fraternity. He was a democrat.

During his residence in Washington, Mr. Rogers lived at 3610 Macomb St., N. W.




