## SUNDAY SERVICES IN CHAUTAUQUA TENT SHORT AND GOOD

One Thousand Splendid People Participated in Worship and Listened in Hushed Awe to "Everyman"

The religious play "Everyman" is a sermon dramatized. The Vivian Players contributed this offering to the large community church service yesterday. The worshippers numbering one thousand also constituted the choir. Mrs. H. H. Settle volunteered her splendid services at the piano. W. H. Stout was in charge. The service used was the Chautauqua Vesper service.

The time of the play is about the fifteenth century the setting is a church. God sends his messenger to "Everyman" warning him that he brought on the long journey to give a reckoning to the Most High.

Death is the messenger who spares none but demands that all must go to give the reckoning. Death encounters "Everyman." He warns him and urges him to prepare to go before his God and render an account. "Everyman" pleads for time.

"Grant me, O death a respite that I may balance my book of record. Give me but another day that I may seek companionship for the long journey." But Death is inexorable.

Then "Everyman" looks in the audience and sees his old friend Jollity. He hears him singing merrily. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday every day for jollity and folly. He pleads with Jollity to go with him on the journey to the great reckoning. But Jollity laughingly retorts that he leaves him at the grave. Good fellowship also is approached, but he too will not go through the perils which death entails. Then relatives come to "Everyman" and they are approached. "Will thou go with me to the day of reckoning and they with one accord spurn his invitation. Friendship, jollity, friends and relatives failing him, "Everyman" remembers that he has wealth. Perhaps he can bribe death. But Death is adamant. Demanding that "Everyman" go before his God at the appointed time to make his reckoning.

Wealth and folly failing, then "Everyman" remembers his good deeds. Perhaps good deeds will go with him and make intercession before the most high at the reckoning. But good deeds of itself is too frail. (Continued on page four.)

## State Salary and Wage Comm. Will Standardize Hours

Raleigh, June 22.—It became known today that the State Salary and Wage Commission will standardize hours to be worked by state employees in addition to classifying these employees, and outlining basis of compensation. It was not announced what the number of hours would be, but it was suggested that the hours observed by Federal officers might be followed.

Also it was learned the commission will make recommendations as to sick leaves, vacation periods, and other leave-of absences.

## Shameen in a State of Siege

Canton, June 22.—Shameen, the artificial island which is the Canton Foreign settlement, today was in a state of siege. Two gun boats, one British and one French, held commanding bases in the creek, separating Shameen from the city. All approaches to the island were fortified with piled up sand bags, and quick firing guns, testifying the preparedness of the foreign forces for emergency. All Europeans have been warned not to enter Canton, itself. In Shameen it is believed they will be safe. The placing of two gun boats is supposed to make impossible any landing by Chinese on the island.

A fresh consignment of French sailors arrived this morning, and took up headquarters in Shameen. Some Chinese say that much of the anti-foreign feeling is especially strong against Chinese and British Nationals and their interest. The American's report receiving better treatment.

## DOROTHY PERKINS GIVEN FROM FIVE TO FIFTEEN YEARS

Convicted of Killing Thomas Templeton; Will Serve Term in Auburn Prison

New York, June 22.—From five to 15 years confinement in Auburn prison, was the sentence imposed today upon Dorothy Perkins, convicted of killing Thomas Templeton, Jersey City war veteran, and her suitor.

The girl appeared entirely composed as Judge McIntyre delivered the sentence, and later walked steadily away from the court room. "I feel very sorry for you," the Judge said. "I do not want to add any more anguish to what you have already suffered, but you did a heinous wrong; you have led a very bad life for one so young."

Although many letters have been received concerning the case, he said, not one of them suggested the girl should be let off without punishment.

## ONE KILLED WHEN OFFICERS SEARCH AUTO FOR LIQUOR

Authorities Making Careful Check-Up of Shooting Affray in Which Leonard Triplett Was Killed

Blowing Rock, N. C., June 22.—Authorities today are making a careful checkup of conflicting details of a shooting affray in Watauga county, in which Leonard Triplett, 20, was killed after officers halted two automobiles on the road to Blowing Rock in search of contraband liquor.

Henry W. Wooten, 40, Deputy Sheriff, of the county, and Former Chief of Police of Blowing Rock, was held in Boone county after his surrender following the occurrence, two miles northwest of here. A preliminary hearing in the case was scheduled for today, at which the testimony of eye witnesses was expected to be given.

The shooting occurred after Wooten and Chief of Police, John V. Bauguss, had halted a small roadster occupied by Triplett, and two companions. Wooten stated in the jail at Boone that the officers had information that the party was bringing liquor into Blowing Rock. Finding no whiskey in the car occupied by the Triplett party, the officers moved on to a second automobile, he said. It was during the raid on this vehicle according to Wooten, that Triplett and his companions came up and attacked him. Wooten is then alleged to have fired the shot that killed Triplett. The alleged attack on the officers was denied by Triplett's two companions. The body was brought here for burial. Triplett was a man of good character here, who had not, it is said, been arrested at any time.

## NEGRO SHOTS AND KILLS HIS FATHER

Jury Finds That Willie Barrett Killed Father in Self Defense and Exonerates Him for the Deed

Ivey Barrett, negro, residing near Farmville, was shot and killed yesterday by his son, Willie Barrett, when in an intoxicated condition, he went home and proceeded to "wage war" on entire family. The coroner's jury returned the verdict: "that said deceased came to his death from gun shot wounds in the hands of Willie Barrett, his son, and after having all the evidence presented, the jury finds that Willie Barrett was justified in shooting said deceased and we exonerate him for the deed."

According to information, Ivey Barrett left his home yesterday and called on a woman friend. His wife not liking the idea of being neglected in such manner, had investigated affairs and upon the return of her husband gave him a tongue lashing for not lavishing his affections upon her and her only. Becoming angered at her attitude, Barrett drew a large knife from his pocket and threatened to cut her head off. A daughter who was listening to the "family quarrel" (Continued on page 2)

## EDWIN F. LADD DIES IN BALTIMORE

Senator From North Dakota Died at 10:20 O'clock This Morning

Baltimore, June 22.—Senator Edwin F. Ladd, of North Dakota, died here at 10:20 o'clock today.

Washington, June 22.—With the passing of Senator Ladd, the Republican and Seargeant Block in the Senate suffered its second serious loss within four days. By coincidence, the death of the North Dakotan occurred on the day of the burial of Senator LaFollette, whose policies had been followed on so many occasions. Together they had gone through the 1924 Independent Campaign against the constitutionality taken over their party and together they later were read out of the party by the Republican organization of the Senate.

Still another member of the dwindling LaFollette block, Senator Brookhart, of Iowa, has a stubbornly supported election contest pending against him and may be deprived of his Senate seat at the next session. The decision of the Senate Republican Regulars to shear the LaFollette followers of their rank, cost Senator Ladd the chairmanship of one of the

## FAIMANS TESTIMONY AND CHARACTER IS ATTACKED TODAY

Witness Testifies That She Did Not Believe Faiman On Oath; Contradicts Statements Made By Faiman

Chicago, June 22.—The defense in the William D. Shepherd murder trial today attacked the testimony and character of the state's star witness, Charles C. Faiman.

Mrs. Luella M. Rhubella, for two months business manager of Faiman's school, The National University of Sciences, testified that she did not believe Faiman on oath, that she never saw a letter from Shepherd to Faiman, although she kept the files and that she never had seen Shepherd at Faiman's school.

Faiman previously had testified that Shepherd wrote a letter inquiring about a course in bacteriology, obtaining typhoid germs and was instructed how to use them to slay Billy McClintock, millionaire foster son, who had made a will in which Shepherd was named chief beneficiary.

Miss Rhubella said she had removed all "dead wood" from the letter file well before the date of October 1924 that the alleged Shepherd murder was mentioned as being in the Faiman school records and that no such letter ever was seen. Faiman paid her salary with four checks, which were returned to her, Mrs. Rhubella said. She was arrested recently and fined for disorderly conduct, she admitted upon cross examination, but said her arrest was caused by a rental agent who wanted her apartment.

William W. O'Brien, of the defense counsel, brought out that he paid Mrs. Rhubella's fine because she thought that she was being prosecuted.

## PROCTOR MEMORIAL CHURCH OF CHRIST DEDICATED SUNDAY

Dr. Perry Case Preaches the Dedication Sermon for the Christian Church, of Grimesland

The Proctor Memorial Church of Christ, of Grimesland, was dedicated yesterday with Dr. Perry Case, of Wilson, preaching the dedicatory sermon. An interesting musical program featured the services. Another feature of the day was the dinner which was served in the grove opposite the church. A capacity congregation was in attendance.

The church was erected a few years ago at a cost of about \$35,000. Up to a few weeks ago that amount with the exception of between \$12,000 and \$13,000 had been paid. Messrs. J. O. and W. E. Proctor, of Grimesland, held a mortgage for this amount, and desiring to see the church dedicated, stated that they would cancel the mortgage, thereby making the dedication services possible. In yesterday's services the mortgage was burned in a small receptacle.

In appreciation for this wonderful gift and for interest and work of Messrs. Proctor in the church, the church membership, announced through their pastor the Rev. Warren Davis, that the church was being dedicated as the Proctor Memorial Church of Christ.

The Disciples of Grimesland organized the church in 1892 and from that time to the time of the erection of the new church occupied a small building which long ago proved too small for the fast growing membership.

The new building is one of the handsomest churches, for the size of the town, in this section of the State. It is modern in every particular and bespeaks for the Christian denomination of Grimesland, a great work in service for the manner.

Dr. Case's sermon was both inspiring and interesting. He took for his subject "Building," basing his remarks on Matthew 16:18: "And I say unto thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

People from practically every section of the county were in attendance, and nearly every town was represented. Several members of the local Christian church also attended and enjoyed the services.

## Coolidge to Address Meeting Government Business Organization

Washington, June 22.—Ready to proceed to the summer White House at Swampscott, Massachusetts, President Coolidge will fulfill his last engagement here by speaking tonight to the semi-annual meeting of the Government's Business Organization. In this address Mr. Coolidge is expected to set forth in some detail his hope for future tax reductions, and plans for future Government economy. The address will be delivered early in the evening and will be broadcasted by radio stations, WCAP, WEAS, WJAR, WEEI, WOC, WSAI, and WOC.

Practically all urgent business has been disposed of by the President and he spent today receiving callers as usual and clearing up last minute details. He meets tomorrow morning with the cabinet, at probably the last regular session of the organization until the fall. A bride and groom will accompany President and Mrs. Coolidge on the trip. James Haley, of St. Louis, who has accompanied Mrs. Coolidge as a secret service representative since she entered the White House, returned to duty after a two day leave of absence, bringing a bride, formerly Miss Evan Gline J. Holler, of this city.

# WOMEN OF WEALTH GET NEW THRILL IN DRIVING 4 HORSS

London.—Coaching has not diminished by any means in England because of the popularity of the automobile. This form of sport appears to appeal even more than formerly to the women of today, and there has been a move on foot recently to admit women members to the Coaching Club, as they have never had a coaching club of their own. Women have long been eligible for competitions, however, and have successfully appeared in coaching and harness classes at horse shows for many years.

Coaching enthusiasts say that the appeal of the sport is more potent than ever, as women realize that they show to much better advantage upon a coach than seated in an enormous automobile, often partly hidden from view. While women here have figured in the coaching world chiefly as passengers, nevertheless there have been, and are, notable women whips.

Coaching, or at least driving one's own coach, is an expensive amusement today, though no more so than the ownership of a fair sized yacht. A coach at the present time costs from \$3,500 to \$6,000. A good horse may be had from \$750 to \$1,750, but the cost of a perfectly matched team is out of all proportion to the individual value of the four horses.

Although the season, which opened with the Coaching Club's meet in Hyde Park in May, and extends for three months, is short, running expenses are very high as compared to pre-war days.

The majority of whips in England are taught to drive from childhood. Good "driving hands" are most important. In the absence of this gift, no training can make a thoroughly accomplished whip. But, given "hands," steady nerves, imperturbable temper, patience and skilled tuition, a woman, taking up four-in-hand driving for the first time may acquire reasonable proficiency in three to four months. Four-in-hand driving appears easy, say the experts, but it demands consummate skill, while the physical and nervous strain is by no means light.

## WILD BEASTS OF GREENLAND COME SOUTH FOR SUMMER

Oslo, Norway.—Ten musk oxen, brought from Greenland recently on a sailing vessel, are spending the summer on Kijholmen Island, off the west coast of Norway. It is hoped they will become used to the climate of northern Europe. The flesh of these animals makes excellent eating, as arctic explorers can testify, and there is always a demand for them in zoological gardens.

The animals wander at will about the island, finding an abundance of food in the grasses and rough herbage. They still resent the approach of human beings, however, and when danger or disturbance is sensed the bulls form a protective ring about the cows and snort violently.

The most anxious time for those interested in the experiment will be during the summer. The natural habitat of the musk ox is among the bleak regions of arctic America, and it is possible that they will not survive a more southern summer. There is also danger that they will bring about their own deaths through eating too greedily of the richer grass of Kijholmen.

## CHAPTER VIII—Continued

For three days we made our way up this tunnel of hazy green sunshine. On the longer stretches one could hardly tell as one looked ahead where the distant green water ended and the distant green archway began. The deep peace of this strange waterway was unbroken by any sign of man.

"No Indian here. Too much afraid. Curupuri," said Gomez.

"Curupuri is the spirit of the woods," Lord John explained. "It's a name for any kind of devil. The poor beggars think that there is something fearsome in this direction, and therefore they avoid it."

On the third day it became evident that our journey in the canoes could not last much longer, for the stream was rapidly growing more shallow. Twice in as many hours we stuck upon the bottom. Finally we pulled the boats up among the brushwood and spent the night on the bank of the river. In the morning Lord John and I made our way for a couple of miles through the forest, keeping parallel with the stream; but as it grew ever shallower we returned and reported, what Professor Challenger had already suspected, that we had reached the highest point to which the canoes could be brought. We drew them up, therefore, and concealed them among the bushes, blazing a tree with our axes, so that we should find them again. Then we distributed the various burdens among us—guns, ammunition, food, a tent, blankets, and the rest—and, shouldering our packages, we set forth upon the more laborious stage of our journey.

An unfortunate quarrel between our peepers marked the outset of our new stage. Challenger had from the moment of joining us, issued directions to the whole party, much to the evident discontent of Summerlee. Now, upon his assigning some duty to his fellow-Professor (it was only the carrying of an aneroid barometer), the matter suddenly came to a head.

"May I ask, sir," said Summerlee, with vicious calm, "in what capacity you take it upon yourself to issue these orders?" Challenger glared and bristled. "I do it, Professor Summerlee, as leader of this expedition."

"I am compelled to tell you, sir, that I do not recognize you in that capacity."

"Indeed!" Challenger bowed with unwieldy sarcasm. "Perhaps you would define my exact position."

"Yes, sir. You are a man whose veracity is upon trial, and this committee is here to try it. You walk, sir, with your judges."

"Dear me!" said Challenger, seating himself on the side of one of the canoes. "In that case you will, of course, go on your way, and I will follow at my leisure. If I am not the leader you cannot expect me to lead."

Thank heaven that there were two sane men—Lord John Roxton and myself—to prevent the petulance and folly of our learned Professors from sending us back empty-handed to London. Such arguing and pleading and explaining before we could get them mollified! Then at last Summerlee, with his sneer and his pipe, would move forwards, and Challenger would come rolling and grumbling after. By some good fortune we discovered about this time that both our savants had the very poorest opinion of Dr. Hiltzworth of Edinburgh. Thenceforward that was our one safety, and every strained situation was relieved by our introducing the name of the Scotch zoologist, when both our Professors would form a temporary alliance and friendship in their detestation and abuse of this common rival.

Advancing in single file along the bank of the stream, we soon found that it narrowed down to a mere brook, and finally that it lost itself in a great green morass of sponge-like mosses, into which we sank up to our knees. The place was horribly haunted by clouds of mosquitoes and every form of flying pest, so we were glad to find solid ground again and to make a circuit among the trees, which enabled us to outflank this pestilent morass, which dripped like an organ in the distance, so loud was it with insect life.

On the second day after leaving our canoes, we found that the whole character of the country changed. Our road was persistently upwards, and as we ascended the woods became thinner and lost their tropical luxuriance. The huge trees of the alluvial Amazonian plain gave place to the Phoenix and coco palms, growing in scattered clumps, with thick brushwood between. In the damped hollows the Manilla palms threw out their graceful drooping fronds. We traveled entirely by compass, and once or twice there were differences of opinion between Challenger and the two Indians, when, to quote the Professor's indignant

words, the whole party agreed to "trust the fallacious instincts of undeveloped savages rather than the highest product of modern European culture." That we were justified in doing so was shown upon the third day, when Challenger admitted that he recognized several landmarks of his former journey, and in one spot we actually came upon four fire-blackened stumps, which must have marked a camping-place.

The road still ascended, and we crossed a rock-studded slope which took two days to traverse. The vegetation had again changed, and only the vegetable ivory tree remained, with a great profusion of wonderful orchids, among which I learned to recognize the rare *Notonia Vexillaria* and the glorious pink and scarlet blossoms of *Cattleya* and *Odontoglossum*. Occasional brooks with pebbly bottoms and fern-fringed banks gurgled down the shallow gorges in the hill, and offered good camping-grounds every evening on the banks of some rock-studded pool, where swarms of little blue-backed fish, about the size and shape of English trout, gave us a delicious supper.

On the ninth day after leaving the canoes, having done, as I reckon, about a hundred and twenty miles, we began to emerge from the trees, which had grown smaller until they were mere shrubs. Their place was taken by an immense wilderness of bamboo, which grew so thickly that we could only penetrate it by cutting a pathway with the machetes and billhooks of the Indians. It took us a long day, traveling from seven in the morning till eight in the night, with only two breaks of one hour each, to get through this obstacle. Anything more monotonous and wearying could not be imagined, for, even at the most open places, I could not see more than ten or twelve yards, while usually my vision was limited to the back of Lord John's cotton jacket in front of me, and to the yellow wall within a foot of one on either side. From above came one thin knife-edge of sunshine, and fifteen feet over our heads one saw the tops of the reeds swaying against the deep blue sky. I do not know what kind of creatures inhabit such a thicket, but several times we heard the plunging of large, heavy animals quite close to us. From their sounds Lord John judged them to be some form of wild cattle. Just as night fell we cleared the belt of bamboos, and at once formed our camp, exhausted by the interminable day.

Early next morning we were again afoot, and found that the character of the country had changed once again. Behind us was the wall of bamboo, as definite as if it marked the course of a river. In front was an open plain, sloping slightly upwards and dotted with clumps of tree-ferns, the whole curving before us until it ended in a long, whale-backed ridge. This we reached about midday, only to find a shallow valley beyond, rising once again into a gentle incline which led to a low, rounded sky-line. It was here, while we crossed the first of these hills, that an incident occurred which may or may not have been important.

Professor Challenger, who with the two local Indians was in the van of the party, stopped suddenly and pointed excitedly to the right. As he did so we saw, at the distance of a mile or so, something which appeared to be a huge gray bird flap slowly up from the ground and skim smoothly off, flying very low and straight, until it was lost among the tree-ferns. "Did you see it?" cried Challenger, in exultation. "Summerlee, did you see it?"

His colleague was staring at the spot where the creature had disappeared.

"What do you claim that it was?" he asked.

"To the best of my belief, a pterodactyl!"

Summerlee burst into derisive laughter. "A pterodactyl!" said he. "It was a stork, if ever I saw one."

Challenger was too furious to speak. He simply swung his pack upon his back and continued upon his march. Lord John came abreast of me, however, and his face was more grave than was his wont. He had his Zeiss glasses to his hand.

"I focused it before it got over the trees," said he. "I won't undertake to say what it was, but I'll risk my reputation as a sportsman that it wasn't any bird that ever I clapped eyes on in my life."

So there the matter stands. Are we really just at the edge of the unknown, encountering the outlying pickets of this lost world of which our leader speaks? I give you the incident as it occurred and you will know as much as I do. It stands alone, for we saw nothing more which could be called remarkable.

The Reflector is in no way responsible for the subject matter of this editorial. In the absence of Mr. Whichard, Jr., I have gratefully accepted the offer to fill this space.

Greenville has listened to five noted lecturers during the past week. These orators have discussed questions of social and national import. Education, war preparation, life's viewpoint and individual development have been named as subject matter. Considerable discussion has been provoked, among the citizens and comparisons have been made. The merits and demerits of these lectures and lecturers are legitimate topics of talk. Nothing can be decided or executed until definite opinion has been shaped therefore this provocation of intelligent thought among the people will not bear fruit for some time. But it is germinating. This shattering of the nerve power and wearing away of magnetism and vital fluid comes from the speed at which our present economic and social life is set. But for food, clothes and shelter, demand that we stay at the task and so life is robbed of much happiness.

The answer is obvious. If we are to overcome this condition and find a common impulse for co-operative action there is but one of two things to do. Either to seek respite in new environment and thought or to bring new environment and thought to Greenville.

The lucky ones go to conventions, Aweddings, health resorts, fishing trips and there re-create the shattered hopes and ambitions. But to the great mass who cannot indulge in these things, Chautauqua brings new thoughts with its lecturers, new environments with its entertainments.

If Chautauqua does one little bit to make life better for a few then its purpose has been achieved and the committee has spent well its time, efforts and money.

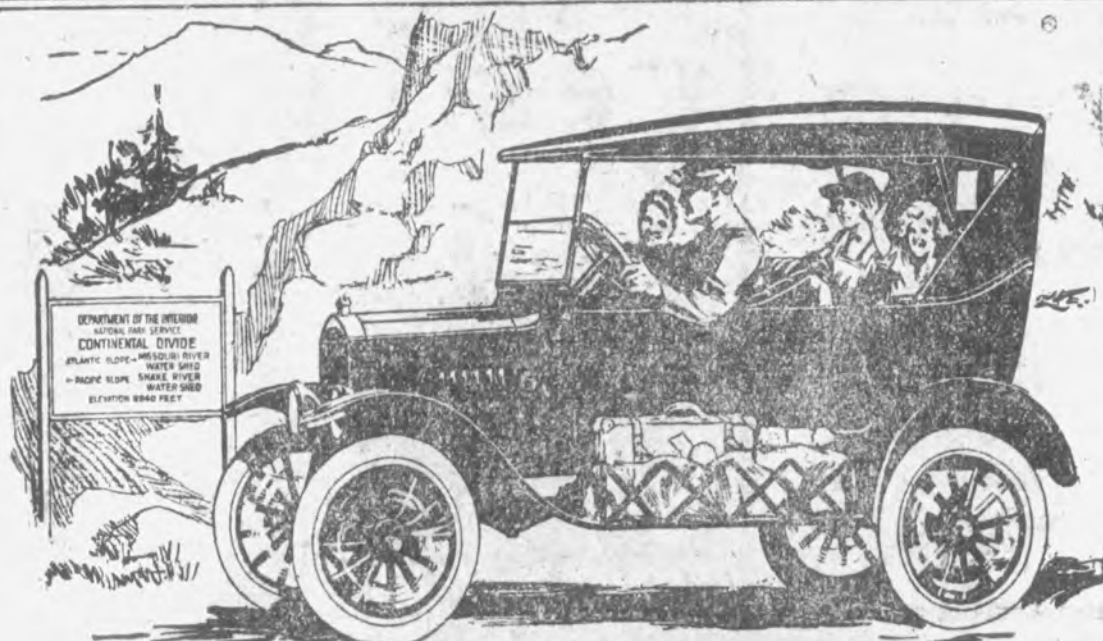

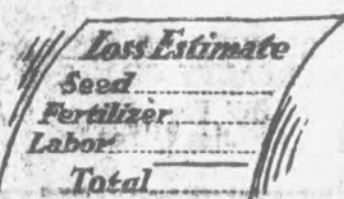

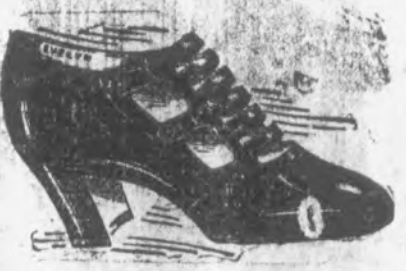

Saturday by Walter Krauser, one sentenced to hang with Grant, but later granted a new trial. Grant was very weak from the wounds in his neck and chest, and physicians insisted on a blood transfusion. "I will be dead in a little while if you will let me alone," said the wounded prisoner, "so why prolong my life when it is going to be taken away from me anyhow?" The doctor pleaded, but Grant refused the transfusion.  
Grant, who insisted he was innocent and that Krauser alone was guilty of the killing of Policeman Ralph Saunders, in a hold-up in 1922,

probably would have been pardoned, or his sentence commuted to life imprisonment if Krauser escaped the gallows in his second trial, which was set for this week. The Supreme Court had allowed Krauser a retrial, but refused a second hearing for Grant.

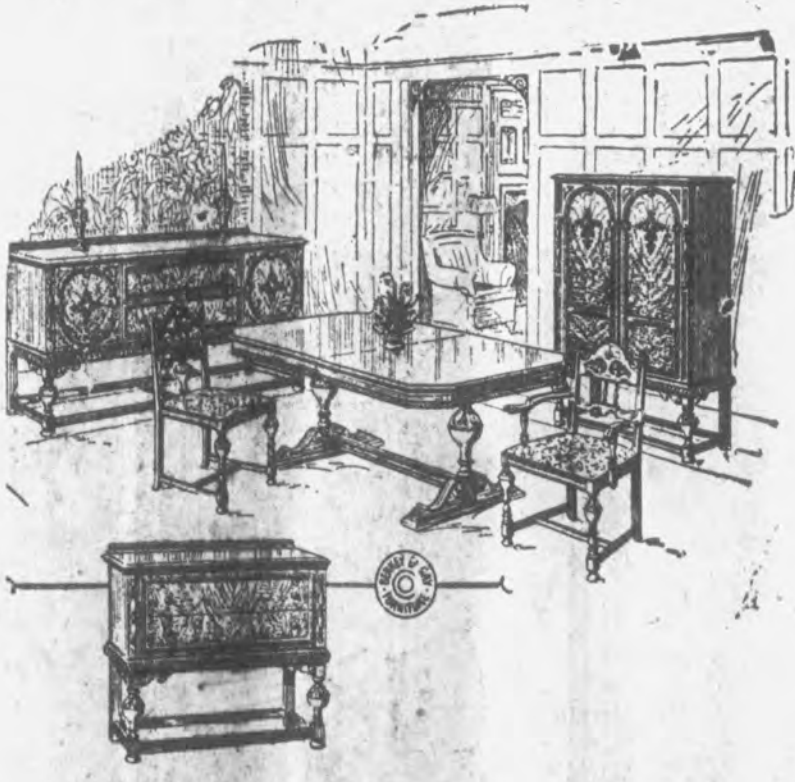
