Gallatin Valley, Mon-tana, Suffers \$500,000 FIVE IN Damage; City of San-ta Barbara is Flooded and Most of Buildings on Maine Street De-molished; Considerable Loss of Life is Re-ported; Los Angeles Reports No Damage

San Francisco, June 29 .- The Cabrillo house at Santa Barabara, a bis hotel, was destroyed in the earth quake, the Southern Pacific Company was advised here. Most of the buildings on State Street, the main street were destroyed. The Gebralta Dam, said by the company to be part of the city's water system, broke and emptied, the message said. 


