FOUR WESTERN STATES SHAKEN BY QUAKE DURING PAST THIRTY-SIX HOURS

Gallatin Valley, Montana, Suffers \$500,000 Damage; City of Santa Barbara is Flooded and Most of Buildings on Main Street Demolished; Considerable Loss of Life is Reported; Los Angeles Reports No Damage

San Francisco, June 29.—The Cabrillo house at Santa Barbara, a big hotel, was destroyed in the earthquake, the Southern Pacific Company was advised here. Most of the buildings on State Street, the main street, were destroyed. The Gibraltar Dam, said by the company to be part of the city's water system, broke and emptied, the message said. The Cabrillo Hotel first split in two and then collapsed. No word was received as to deaths or injuries from any source. The Cabrillo hotel had accommodations for about 300 persons.

State Street is the main thoroughfare of Santa Barbara, which extends from the beach for a distance of several miles, and business buildings ranging in height from two stories to ten, line each side of the street. These buildings are of brick and concrete construction.

Hundreds of messages from eastern cities directed to persons in the earthquake swept area, were held up here by commercial telegraph companies this morning because all communication with the section had been broken.

Ventura, California, June 29.—The city of Santa Barbara is flooded as a result of bursting water mains, which cracked under the strain of an earthquake there this morning, according to eye witnesses who have returned here. Wire communications are entirely cut off.

San Luis Obispo, Calif., June 29.—A Southern Pacific relief train is leaving here today, 8:30, to assist at Santa Barbara. Reports received here by the Southern Pacific offices say that the railroad roundhouse, the city reservoir, and a tourist hotel and other buildings have been completely destroyed.

It was also reported that State street had been torn up by the shock. All lines are down, but additional reports were received from other small towns south of here to the effect that the shock had been felt, but without any serious damage in those towns.

Los Angeles, Calif., June 29.—A severe earthquake rocked Los Angeles at 6:43 this morning.

Down town buildings swayed considerably but the movement was slow and even, and there were no indications of damage, although the motion continued for more than an hour.

The earthquake continued at regular intervals, but all were slow steady and yet extremely severe movements. The earthquake was continuing at 6:56 o'clock. The shocks were felt in an unusual degree of severity at Magave and Lancaster, 100 miles north of here, according to operators of the Los Angeles Bureau of the power and light system.

Bakersfield, Oxnard, and Santa Barbara, to the north, and Calton, to the east, all reported that the earthquake had been felt but at this hour no reports of damage had come in to this office over the Southern Pacific.

The center of the disturbance seemed to be in Los Angeles, and to the north. Western Union and Pacific Telephone and telegraph wires west of Ventura in the direction of Santa Barbara, went dead during the earthquake and an hour later the companies reported they were not able to establish communication with Santa Barbara.

San Francisco, June 29.—An earthquake at 6:44 o'clock this morning caused the Southern Pacific Roundhouse at Santa Barbara, California, to cave-in, demolished the station at Goleta, nine miles north of Santa Barbara, and put all tracks out of operation.

FIVE INJURED WHEN CAR OVERTURNS IN DITCH NEAR CITY

Mrs. Luther Ausborn and Marjorie West Badly Injured While Other Members of West Family Slightly Hurt

Mrs. Luther Ausborn and little Miss Marjorie West are in the Pitt Community hospital suffering painful injuries, while Mrs. C. B. West and Misses Peggy and Maude Anderson West received minor injuries when their automobile overturned on the Winterville-Greenville highway Sunday afternoon.

The automobile was being driven by Mrs. Ausborn, who in an attempt to turn out for another car to pass, went too far off the pavement. When she tried to get back on the pavement the car skidded and turned over in the ditch.

Mrs. Ausborn suffered a broken right arm while her left arm was badly lacerated. Marjorie received bad cuts on her face and arms. Both of Maude Anderson's lower limbs were badly cut while Mrs. West and Peggy received bruises and a few cuts.

Reports from the hospital this afternoon state that Mrs. Ausborn is resting quietly and getting along as well as can be expected. The others are also getting along nicely.

TEN PERSONS HURT IN AUTO SMASHUP LATE YESTERDAY

All Occupants of Two Cars Receive Injuries When Cars Meet in Head on Collision Near Mildred

Ten persons are suffering injuries as a result of a head on collision, late yesterday on the Bethel-Tarboro Highway near Mildred. The injured included Hugh Caswell, Leon Martin, Mrs. Cora Barnhill and Mrs. Lena Andrews, of the Bethel section of this county, and six negroes who were the occupants of the other car.

According to information received here today Hugh Caswell, driver of one of the cars, attempted to pass another car on the road and crashed into the approaching car driven by Robert Ruffin, negro. Both the cars were badly damaged and all the passengers of both were more or less injured. All were taken to Tarboro for medical attention and several are still confined in the hospital today. Definite details as to the extent of the injuries of the victims could not be learned but several received serious injuries, the report said, Bell Williams, colored, being considered most dangerously hurt.

The negro occupants of the car driven by Ruffin were Bell Williams, Lillian Bridgers, Emma Barrett, James Williams and James Bridgers. There was no definite statement as to whether or the driver of either car was under the influence of whiskey but it was stated that whiskey was found in the wreckage of the car driven by Caswell.

YOUTH CONFESSES BURGLARY SIXTEEN CHARLOTTE HOMES

Relatives, and Others Say That Ralph Hollars, 17, Has Never Been Normal; Placed Under \$8,000 Bond

Charlotte, June 29.—Waving preliminary hearing, Ralph Hollars, 17-year-old youth of Charlotte, who, police say, has confessed to entering 16 houses and removing property valued at between three and four thousand dollars was bound over to court here today under an \$8,000 bond. He could not make bond and was placed in jail.

The youth is held on fifteen counts charging housebreaking and larceny.

Charlotte, June 29.—Ralph Hollars, 17, who police here say, has confessed to the burglary of sixteen homes in Charlotte during the past few weeks and removing jewels and other valuables estimated at between three and four thousand dollars in value, was to be tried in Recorder's Court here today. Relatives and others who had known him for years, came to his defense yesterday saying that he had never been a normal boy. His mother said he had been subject to nervous disorders from an early age and there by been prevented from attending school. The youth accompanied police officers to every house where he apparently did his best to recall which of the stolen articles were removed from each place.

Savings Deposits in 890 Banks June 1st Totals \$7,829,130,000

Washington, D. C., June 29.—The aggregate savings deposits reported by 890 banks distributed throughout the United States were \$7,820,000 on June 1, compared with \$7,790,730,000 on May 1 and \$7,311,316,000 on June 1, 1924, the Federal Reserve Board reported today.

The Board reported further that no significant changes occurred during May, all districts showing small increases except the Minneapolis district, which reported a slight decline. A comparison of savings deposits on June 1, 1925, with a month and a year previous is shown by Federal reserve districts in a table issued by the Board.

In the Boston and New York districts the figures represent only deposits in mutual savings banks; in all other districts where there are but few mutual savings banks, deposits of other banks are included.

In the Richmond district, including Virginia and the Carolinas, 87 banks reported as follows: June 1, 1925, \$347,000; May 1, 1925, \$344,482; June 1, 1924, \$369,589.

MOSS ELECTED TO HEAD KIWANIS 1926 Convention to Be Held in Montreal, Canada

St. Paul, Minn., June 29.—John H. Moss, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, is the new president of Kiwanis International. He was elected at the 9th annual convention held in this city during the past week.

Montreal, Canada, was chosen by the twenty-seven hundred voting delegates attending the convention, as the convention city for 1926. Others seeking the honors were: Boston, Mass., Memphis, Tenn., and Indianapolis, Indiana.

Trustees elected were: Ralph A. American, Scranton, Pa.; Raymond M. Crossman, Omaha, Nebraska; Charles W. Gold, Greenboro, North Carolina; A. Heber, Riverside, California; William C. Green, Fargo, North Dakota; and Michael Gorman, of Saginaw, Michigan.

President-elect Moss has been prominently connected with Kiwanis for the past number of years. He has been a trustee of International for the past 3 years, a member of the International board of finance, and was at one time district governor of the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan district.

Mr. Moss is also past potentate of the Aero Club and past president of the chamber of commerce, all of Milwaukee. In the business world he is one of the largest manufacturers of interior wood-work, conducting one of the largest plants in the country in Wisconsin.

A total of over six-thousand delegates and visitors attended the convention, this being the largest representation of Kiwanians ever to attend annual session.

Physicians Advise President That Father's Condition Is Improved; Second Operation May Be Necessary

Plymouth, Vermont, June 29.—Called to his old home here by the illness of his father, President Coolidge had the assurance today of physicians that the patient's condition was improved. Resting easier after drainage of the bladder through an operation performed yesterday, Col. John Coolidge, 80 years old, insisted that he would be on his feet again shortly, and urged the President and Mrs. Coolidge not to worry. His physicians, after admitting the possibility of a set back, said that if all went well the patient would be up and around again within three days.

The operation was an emergency one apparently clearing up an acute condition and it is possible that it may be necessary to resort again to surgery to give a permanent relief.

Accompanied by Mrs. Coolidge, the President hurriedly left the summer White House at Swampscott yesterday to be with his father. He already had sent his personal physician and a Boston Surgeon to the sick man's bedside.

TWO INJURED WHEN AUTOMOBILE TURNS OVER IN CREEK

Accident Occurred Last Night at Detour Bridge Near Grimesland; Chester McLawhorn in Hospital

Chester McLawhorn is in the Pitt Community Hospital with injuries the extent of which are yet unknown, and J. M. Doughtie received slight injuries last night when the car in which they were riding plunged through the rail of the detour bridge over Chicod Creek near Grimesland and landed in the creek nearly 20 feet below.

According to information the two men were returning to this city from Grimesland about 10 o'clock and failed to note the detour sign until they were very close to it. Dowdy, who was driving the car, succeeded in bringing the car upon the bridge but could not check his speed enough to take the curve in the bridge and the car plunged through the rail and turned completely over pinning McLawhorn beneath. Passersby helped to extract him from the wreckage and both young men were rushed to the hospital here where Doughtie's injuries proved to be only slight.

A report from the hospital today stated that McLawhorn was suffering from injuries to his head and chest but no definite statement as to the probable outcome of his injuries could yet be made. He was brought to the hospital in an unconscious condition last night and did not regain consciousness until this morning.

SIX NEGROES ARE ARRESTED CHARGE OF ROBBING STORE

Arrested in Kinston by Local Officers for Breaking in and Robbing Griston Store

Charlie Harvey, Kit Hill, Harold Dees, Will Lawrence, William Allen, Mack Staton, negroes, are in the Pitt county jail charged with breaking in and robbing the store of Mr. Vance Wall, Griston, on Friday evening. They were arrested in Kinston yesterday by Sheriff Jackson, Deputy Sheriff Pierce and Officer Sellers, arrested by the members of the Kinston police force.

The arrest followed good detective work on the part of Sheriff Jackson. A negro friend of Charlie Harvey's in trying to find something "fine" for his wife to wear, was shown a piece of silk by Harvey, who told him that he would sell it to him. The negro advised Sheriff Jackson of the proposed sale, and the Sheriff marked a \$5 bill, and sent him to buy the silk. With the evidence the officers went to the home of Harvey and after a thorough investigation found a suit of clothes and the marked money. Seeing that he was caught with the "goods on him," Harvey squelched on his pals and the other arrests followed. Three suits of clothes, six shirts, one hand bag and two pieces of silk were recovered.

INMATES OF STATE INSTITUTIONS WILL BE REQUIRED PAY

Recently Enacted Legislation Says Those Confined Must Pay When Financially Able

(By Associated Press)
Raleigh, June 29.—State institutions for the insane, deaf, blind and delinquent, under legislation enacted by the 1925 session of the General Assembly, are now making a charge for these students and inmates who are able to pay. Further, the law provides that should a person enter one of these institutions an indigent and later inherit or acquire money or property he would have to pay for his support or instruction as the case might be.

The Constitution provides that "the General Assembly may provide that the indigent deaf, blind and insane of the State shall be cared for at the charge of the State." In the next section, however, is the following: "It shall be steadily kept in mind by the legislature and board of public charities that all penal and charitable institutions shall be made as nearly self-supporting as is consistent with the purpose of their creation."

Advocates of legislation making a charge mandatory in every case where the inmate or pupil is able to pay, insisted that this was in line with the provision of the constitution declaring that institutions should be as nearly self-supporting as possible.

The institutions specifically named in the 1925 legislation include the State Hospital at Raleigh, the State Hospital at Morganton, the State Hospital at Goldsboro, the State Home and Industrial School for Girls and Women, (Samaritan) the Caswell Training School at Winston, The Stonehill Jackson Training School at Concord, the Carolina Training School for Boys near Rocky Mount, the Morrison Training School for Delinquent Negro Boys in Richmond County, the State School for the Blind and Deaf at Raleigh, the State School for the Deaf and Dumb at Morganton and the State Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis.

The law provides that the governing bodies shall fix, in their discretion, the cost to be imposed on each patient or student.

It is specifically provided, however, that at none of these institutions shall the policy of caring for the indigent free of charge to them be abandoned, although it is further provided that any person listed as an indigent who afterward acquires means of payment shall pay. Suit for the recovery of such pay may be entered in the Superior Court of Wake County, the law provides.

It has been pointed out that the charters of the original institutions for the care of the insane, that is, the asylums at Raleigh and Morganton made specific provision that preference was to be given indigents and that those who were able to pay should be made to do so.

These institutions, it is said, have charged for the support and care of persons who were able to pay, from that time to the present day. It is only the institutions later created that are said not to have carried out this policy.

Governor McLean recently announced that he intended to appoint a commission, headed by Dr. Watson S. Rankin, to look into the affairs of the Caswell Training School and to determine definitely what class of patients should be admitted there.

Whether the Governor later would conduct similar investigations of other institutions was not stated.

RADIO TO HELP SWEDES LEARN TO TALK ENGLISH

Stockholm.—In order to enable Swedish radio fans to enjoy better the programs sent out from American stations, a course in English will next fall be started by the official Swedish radio service. Later on other foreign languages will be taught but the start will be made with English. Captain George Reuterswärd, managing director of the Swedish radio organization, has announced.

The course will take the entire winter season. It includes lectures by professors and travellers and readings by authors of their own works.

Four Western States Shaken by Quake During Past 36 Hrs.

line at Naples, 15 miles north of Santa Barbara, it was reported by the Southern Pacific dispatch offices just before telegraph communication ceased.

All wire communication with Santa Barbara ceased after the shock and efforts are being made to ascertain whether any additional damage was done.

San Luis O'Bispo, California, June 29.—Wire communication between the city and Santa Barbara failed at 6:41 a. m., about the time the earth quake was felt in Southern California.

Helea Montana, June 29.—Residents of the Gallatin Valley, the apparent center of the earth quake which shook four states Saturday night and yesterday, remained out in the wide opened streets today looking back at about \$500,000 worth of ruins, the aggregate cost of the earth quake.

Santa Barbara, June 29.—All of the brick buildings in Santa Barbara were demolished this morning, including the Arlington Hotel, by the earth quake which swept the state and seems to have centered its ferocity on this city. Water mains and river reservoirs were broken and the city was partly flooded. Two fires started, but so far little damage has been reported done by these. The main street of the city upheaved and buckled at the force of the earth quake and as the water mains parted geysers shot up through the pavement.

It is said that there may have been considerable loss of life, particularly in the ruins of the Arlington Hotel, whose walls collapsed like egg shells. Accompanying the earthquake were tremendous waves, which rushed in from the bay and flooded the low lands. The largest building in the city, the Grenada, withstood the shock.

San Francisco, June 29.—Santa Barbara, the picturesque little city perched high above the Ocean in Southern California, suffered disaster, the extent of which had not been determined early this afternoon in an earth quake which was general over Southern California shortly before seven this morning, but which apparently struck lightly in other cities.

Communication with Santa Barbara was cut off immediately after the shock, but meagre reports filtering into San Francisco and Los Angeles within the next two hours said that most of the building on State street had been destroyed, one of them being the famous Arlington Hotel. There was no mention of loss of life or injuries.

Two other hotels were reported destroyed. Eye witnesses returned to Ventura from Santa Barbara reported that Santa Barbara water mines had burst and flooded the city. The earth quake was felt strongly in Los Angeles and Hollywood, and surrounding towns, but no damage was reported. The shock extended as far north as Gakersfield.

Santa Barbara hotels are filled with summer visitors at this time of the year, when the average population of the town is about 20,000 people.

San Francisco, June 29.—One report by the Southern Pacific Company here said that seven lives had been lost at Santa Barbara. Another message said that 27 lives had been lost.

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company received a message from its manager at Santa Barbara stating that brick buildings in the city had been demolished or badly damaged. The First National Bank and one school were destroyed, another report said, while a third was to the effect that seven persons were killed in the destruction of the Arlington Hotel.

The American Red Cross headquarters here was negotiating for all available army air planes to rush a fully equipped relief force to Santa Barbara.

San Luis O'Bispo, California, June 29.—A Southern Pacific Dispatch says that the loss of life and damage to buildings is much greater than the first indication. A number of small fires have broken out.

It is reported that the buildings of the Pacific South West Bank, the Commercial Bank, and the Potter Building were destroyed. These structures are on State Street.

San Francisco, June 29.—The Southern Pacific Railway Company reports 65 deaths in Santa Barbara as a result of the earthquake.

Direct telephone communication was established with Santa Barbara late this morning through Los Angeles and later from San Francisco.

First reports over the re-established wires showed casualties not so large as first reported.

San Francisco, June 29.—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company reported word this afternoon that another severe earth quake was felt in Santa Barbara at 10:15 a. m.

DR. BAILEY WILLIS PREDICTS EARTHQUAKE

Palo Alto, Calif., June 29.—Dr. Bailey Willis, noted Seismologist of Stanford University, who predicted an earthquake in the general region of Santa Barbara, is in that city. Dr. Willis, who is President of the Seismological Society of America, recently published an article to the effect that earth quakes north of Sanguan, Deautesta have relieved the eastern pressures in northern California, but that other pressures were accumulating in Southern California, which eventually would result in a big tremor. By a strange chance he left for Santa Barbara Saturday and was believed to be in the heart of the disturbance.

LIGHTNING FOREVER UNLEASHING STUDEND-IOUS STORE OF POWER

London.—Scarcely a second passes, year in and year out, winter and summer, when there are not at least 100 lightning flashes somewhere in the world, according to the recently issued Blue Book of the meteorological office of the British government service.

During a year, says the book, the world experiences 16,000,000 thunder storms, or an average of 44,000 a day. The amount of energy released by these flashes is too stupendous for the human mind to grasp, the book points out. It is suggested by the meteorologists that the water power of the earth, which has already been harnessed, he used as a measure. Figuring on that basis, it is estimated that double that amount is represented by one flash of lightning, consequently in any given second there is released from the clouds more energy than the world's water power stations yield in six months.

LONDON ADOPTS AMERICAN IDEAS IN HOUSEBUILDING

London.—The London county council is tired of the orthodox white or red brick house and is going to experiment with buff, brown, red and white colored concrete buildings.

The council's architect, G. T. Forrest, said recently there was something monotonous in a long series of dingy grey houses and, having noticed on a recent visit to the United States an attempt had been made to relieve this monotony by the use of colored materials, he intended to follow suit.

On the council's Becontree, Essex, estate, some 3,000 houses will be erected in which the American idea of mixed colorings will be adopted.

CALIFORNIA CLUB USES U. S. MAILS EXTENSIVELY

Los Angeles.—Approximately 3,000,000 pieces will constitute the outgoing mail of the Automobile Club of Southern California this year, it was indicated in statistics released recently by the headquarters of the organization. The figures were based on the amount of mail matter sent during 1924.

First-class letter postage of the motoring organization averages 3,500 letters a day. In addition 2,000 pieces of second-class mail matter and some 150 parcel post packages are sent, totaling for the daily outgoing mails an average of 5,650 pieces. The figures, allowing 300 working days in the year, revealed that the club sends out annually 1,695,000 pieces of mail.

However, this is but a fraction more than 50 percent of the total outgoing mail, for the organization sends out approximately 1,200,000 copies of its monthly magazine. In addition some 100,000 letters and packages are carried to 30 branch offices by the highway patrol fleet which the club maintains.

TOKYO SUICIDES INCREASE 300 IN YEAR, POLICE REPORT SHOWS

Tokyo.—During the year ended with March, there were 1,263 suicides in Tokyo, according to records of the Metropolitan Police Bureau. This was 300 more than the previous 12 months. Most of the suicides were because of jealousy or disappointment in love, it was stated.

The pistol was the least popular agency of self-destruction, two men and two women killing themselves by shooting. Poisoning was the means most frequently employed, 221 men and 271 women killing themselves in that manner.

SWEDES BENEFIT GREATLY FROM COOPERATIVE BUYING

Stockholm.—The daily wants of two-thirds of Sweden's population are now supplied through co-operative organizations, according to a

recently completed investigation by the governmental Board of Social Inquiry. To the Consumers Co-operative Society no fewer than 243,451 persons belongs, or 17 per cent of the entire population, but as each member represents a family, the total number of profit sharing customers is easily four times that figure. Two-thirds of the membership is made up of wage earners and the rest of small farmers, artisans and minor officials. The net profits for last year were \$370,329 of which 15 percent was added to the capital reserve. In 1909 the membership was but 65,590 and the number of branches has grown in 15 years from 376 to 880.

In addition to retail stores these co-operative organizations run bakeries, breweries, meat and sausage plants, shoe repair shops, dairies, coffee roasting mills, and one branch has a farm of its own. They also conduct savings banks and an insurance business.

The largest wholesale business in food stuffs in Sweden is now conducted by the Cooperative Wholesale Society, which also runs a flour mill, a margarine factory and a chemical plant. It also has a savings bank department with over 39,000 depositors. For selling agricultural products there are in Sweden about 650 co-operative dairies, whose principal output is butter, and about 30 co-operative slaughter houses, which butcher hogs and cattle delivered by members.

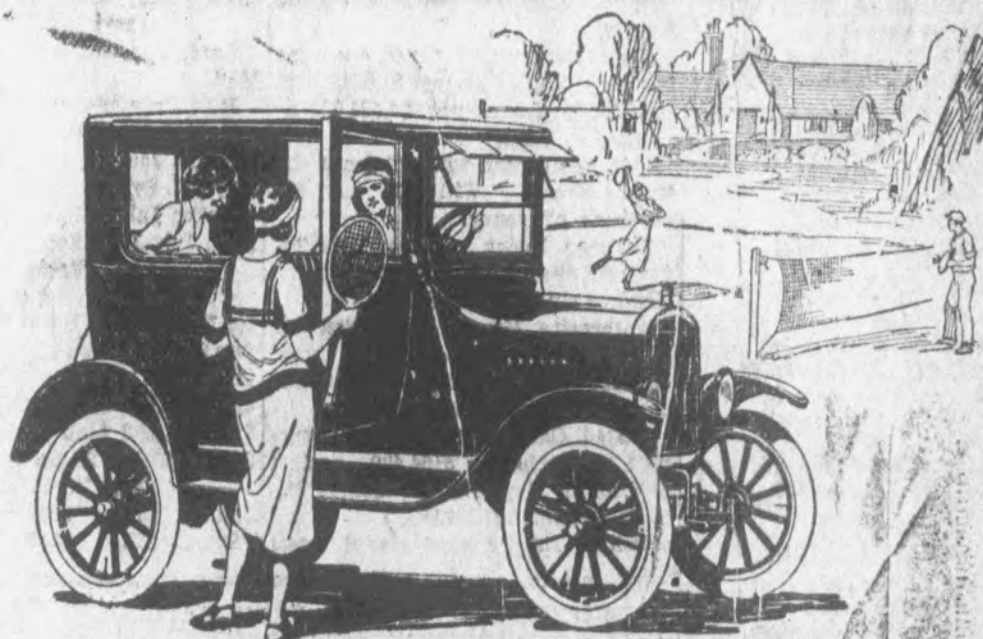
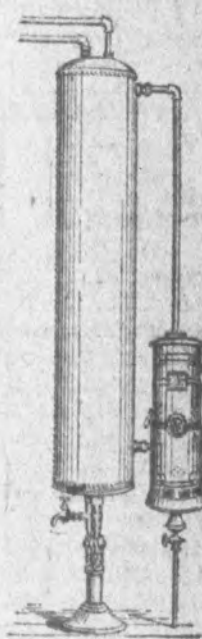
