SANTA BARBARA ISSUES APPEAL TO COUNTRY FOR \$22,000,000 RELIEF FUND

Physically Prostrated as Result of Violent Tremors Which Started Yesterday Morning; Nine Killed With Large Number Injured

Santa Barbara, June 30.—Santa Barbara today through its clearing house association issued an appeal to the nation for a \$22,000,000 earthquake fund and to bankers and clearing houses of the country for a \$20,000,000 loan reconstruction fund.

Santa Barbara, June 30.—This emergency headquarters manned by Associated Press staff writers and telegraph operators filed a steady stream of news on the sea side earthquake throughout the day and the night giving the best available data on deaths and material loss to the community. From here the staff men went out into the stricken area to get the facts to the outside world.

When night fell came a new problem visited them for there were no lights. This obstacle was overcome by backing an automobile up to the door of the Associated Press Bureau and stringing a wire with a tiny bulb attached to the machine battery to the operating table.

A hot June sun rose today on a physically prostrate city by the blue Pacific which throbbed nevertheless through every pile of her earthquake debris with the indomitable spirit of reconstruction.

The death list indicated that nine victims had paid with their lives in the earthquake tremors which started yesterday morning at 6:44 and continued until early this morning at various intervals. In the hospitals lay 30 injured while no check has been possible of those treated for injuries in their homes.

State street, the main artery of the town, presents a desolate appearance. In front of one shop lay what was left of a small automobile with blocks of stone weighing 400 or 500 each which had crushed it flat, and in the fall had ground out the life of William Proctor, a window cleaner, who had just driven up to his early morning job when the first shock came.

Across the way stood a five ton truck shattered under a similar avalanche of stone and material. In the crumpled ruins of the exclusive hotel, Arlington, the mecca of world travelers for years, the fall of a tank containing 6,000 gallons of water had swept to their death Mrs. Henry C. Perkins, an aged millionaire widow of Burlington, Iowa, and Bertram B. Hancock, son of a wealthy Los Angeles real estate dealer. The latter escaped with three broken ribs and scalp wounds, after falling and sliding three stories to the ground from the room between that in which his son met his death.

Back of the hills, the old mission of Santa Barbara founded by the Spanish fathers, who came with the conquistadores to the new world still stood in part defying the earthquake. It has gone through a similar quake in the eighties and was rebuilt only to suffer a similar fate yesterday.

The mission's tower with its sweet-toned bells crashed while a kneeling congregation was within. Then the congregation walked out of the wreckage led by the priest.

Now and then a new tremor has made itself felt a reminder of the terrifying quake that started the work of damage and the pick and shovel squads have paused for a moment, moving away from the swaying piles of wreckage, awaiting passage of the quake before resuming their work. In very rare instances did the men, women and children of Santa Barbara spend last night within doors. Many whose homes were wrecked were forced to sleep in the open. Others slept on their lawns from choice, not knowing when a fresh tremor might bring their ceilings down. A fact which stood out was the absence of any serious fire, which in earthquakes elsewhere usually had added to the horrors. The leading bankers and business men of Santa Barbara planned to meet again today and outline plans for reconstruction. Last night they raised \$10,500 in the uncertainties of the situation.

Earthquakes Continue to Rock the Ruins of Santa Barbara

Santa Barbara, June 30.—A violent earthquake struck this city at 1:22 this morning. This was the heaviest shock since the heavy quake of yesterday morning.

Again at 4:39 o'clock a.s. sailors began to disembark from the battleship Arkansas, to aid in the relief work. A severe quake again rocked the ruins.

ANXIOUS TO MAKE INCOME RECORDS EASY AS POSSIBLE

Internal Revenue Officials Consider Means by Which Income Tax Records May Be Easy for General Public

Washington, June 30.—Internal Revenue officials are considering means by which the study of income tax records may be made as easy as possible for the general public.

In view of the Supreme Court decision holding publication of these returns to be legal, the Bureau of officials have under consideration a plan that provides a duplicate set of records into which those who so desire may delve at their leisure during the houses the government offices are open.

Last year when the records were made public restrictions were thrown about it then in which they might be inspected so that the operation would not interfere with the work of the collector's offices.

Some officials here believe that the work of putting this year's list in to shape for release to the public may be completed before August 1. It is the intention to make them public simultaneously in all collector's offices and the course will necessitate holding up some of them which are now complete.

AVALANCHE FROM CHIEF MOUNTAIN EXPECTED DAILY

North End of Mountain Creeping Slowly Down Upon the Gros Ventre River Valley

Jackson, Wyo., June 30.—The north end of Chief Mountain is creeping slowly down upon the Gros Ventre River Valley and crumbling as it goes.

Moving down upon the river on a front of several miles at a rate of speed that is almost perceptible, forest rangers and ranchers declare it will create a great basin as it blocks the canyon through the river valley.

They believe that the section of the Great Mountain was jarred loose by the earth quake shocks which were felt here Saturday and that the result will be an avalanche greater than that which occurred last Tuesday when a section of Sheep Mountain at a point below Chief Mountain fell into the river and caused it to form a lake. When the expected avalanche occurs it will dam the river to such a height that once the basin is filled the stream will have to find a new outlet. Below the Sheep Mountain dam the river is dry and all irrigation operations are at a stand still.

Mr. D. L. Turnage, president of the club then addressed the club on the recent International Rotary Convention. His report was supplemented by brief remarks by others who attended the convention and all these talks were interesting and gave the other Rotarians an idea of just what takes place at the International Conventions.

The guests of the evening were Rotarians Harvey Meyers, Edmund Harding, Frank Cox and Lee Stewart, of the Washington Club.

Falls From Second Story to the Ground, Receives No Injuries

Says "Blow Out Shot" Or Defective Powder Cause Mine Disaster

Raleigh, June 30.—"A blow out shot, possibly defective powder, and carelessness in properly placing the shot or blast" were assigned as the cause of the mine disaster in a report public today in Coal Glenn Mine, May 27, in a report made public today by Frank Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing. The report contained data showing that out of 53 persons, 52 were Americans, and one German, 38 married, and 79 children were made fatherless, said the report.

ASSOCIATED PRESS SENDS FIRST REPORTS SANTA BARBARA DISASTER

Santa Barbara, June 30.—From a Bismay shack eight to fourteen feet furnished with five small empty packing cases and a make believe table of discarded boards to which an Associated Press wire had been hooked hastily, the first direct news of Santa Barbara disaster went to the world shortly after noon yesterday.

HAM-RAMSEY PARTY HOLDS A FAREWELL SERVICE IN RALEIGH

Attended by Large Delegations From All Parts of State; Testimonials Feature the Service

Raleigh, June 30.—"What has precipitated this criticism on us in this State is that the friends of those who are teaching this damnable theory of evolution are determined to defend their friends at any cost," declared M. F. Ham, evangelist who during the past four years has held revival services at towns throughout the state, in a farewell talk last night in the City Auditorium to delegations from all the cities in which he has preached.

The meeting was largely devoted to testimonials from converts of the Ham-Ramsey party in all sections of the State with Mr. Ham making a short speech of farewell and encouragement at the close of the meeting.

The meeting centered around an attack on the critics of the evangelists and particularly on the phrase "The Prophet Ham" which was stated to have been made in an attempt to ridicule Mr. Ham and his meetings. "I'll stand face to face with God at the day of judgment," declared Mr. Ham, "and let him say whether we introduced these people to God or tried to get them to follow us."

Delegations from Burlington, Goldsboro, Wilson, Smithfield, Elizabeth City, New Bern, Fayetteville, Greenville, Henderson, and Durham were present in addition to a large crowd from Raleigh. The audience filled the orchestra and dress circles and a large crowd also sat in the galleries.

Mr. Ham stated that he was leaving the State for a year after the close of the meeting in Smithfield next Sunday but that he was not afraid to come back and hold meetings in every town in the State He declared that he wanted his enemies to know where he was going so they could follow him and attack him. It helps he said. He is going first to his home in Kentucky. In the fall he will open a meeting in Greenville, S. C., and will return for one Monday meeting at Burlington during the stay in Greenville.

Henry Ford Does Not Submit Tender For Shipping Vessels

Washington, June 30.—Bids from 20 individuals entered were opened by the fleet corporation today for sale of 200 shipping board vessels for scrapping, but the name of Henry Ford who had been mentioned as a prospective bidder did not appear.

No explanation was available as to why Mr. Ford, who had indicated an intention of bidding, did not submit a tender, and Chairman O'Connor said he had received no communication from the manufacturer on the subject. The bids will be tabulated and analyzed but will not be acted upon until after the return from the Pacific Coast next week of President Palmer of the Corporation. Whether Henry Ford later will bid for the vessels to operate in connection with his manufacturing business was a question which Chairman O'Connor indicated probably would be answered soon.

J. T. SCOPES GOES INTO SECLUSION

School Teacher Around Who Evolution Trial of Tenn., Law Centers, Among the Missing

Dayton, Tenn., June 30.—John T. Scopes, around who the evolution trial of the Tennessee law here were centered, today was among the missing. Sought last night by those interested in the defense of the case presumably for a conference, Scopes could not be found, and today he had not yet been located. The young teacher stepped out yesterday when he went to Chattanooga by automobile. So far as can be learned no word has been received from him since his arrival there. The disappearance was not unexpected. Scopes previously had told newspaper men that he would go into seclusion until the trial, and news had been spread that he planned to go to his home in Kentucky. The past six weeks in Dayton have been to Scopes a continued effort to elude photographers and news paper men.

Plymouth Vermont, June 30.—The condition of Colonel John Coolidge was so satisfactory today that the President decided to return to Swampscott without delay. Preparations were made for a departure shortly before noon and the entire trip was to be made by motor.

Approximately 300,000 Cars Have Been Licensed; Auto Registration Dept. Announces Extension of Time

Raleigh, June 30.—Automobile owners who under the law are required to carry new license tags on their cars starting tomorrow have been granted a week's extension. It was stated at the Automobile Registration Department today that approximately 300,000 cars had been licensed and that the probable total during the coming fiscal year would be 2,425,000.

Total collections for the fiscal year ending today had not been compiled this afternoon. It was stated that the total on automobile licenses and the gasoline tax for the year just ended would be nearly 10,000,000.

Farmers Kill Bear In Stokes Section

A belated story of an exciting bear chase resulting in the death of the bear in the Stokes section of the county a week ago last Saturday reached us today. According to the report the chase furnished plenty of excitement for the neighborhood for awhile and many persons took part. "Brer Bear" put in his appearance at the lower end of J. A. Whitchard's field shortly before 9 o'clock in the morning and his presence was discovered by Mrs. Andrew Whitchard and one of her children who quickly spread the alarm. Mr. V. Keel jumped into his car and rushed to Mr. Freeman Tetterton to procure dogs while others rounded up the neighborhood for the chase. By nine o'clock the hunters were off and Brer Bear's race against fate was begun. Around the field and through the woods the race continued for more than an hour and ended only when a bullet from the rifle of Mr. Henry Gurganus brought the bear to a halt near the portion of the branch known as Bull Ridge water hole. Mr. J. A. Whitchard, despite a crippled foot, had taken part in the chase with no weapon but an open pocket knife, and was the second of the hunters to reach the spot where the bear fell.

The quarry proved to be a black bear weighing 84 pounds and all were well pleased with the success of the morning's chase. News of the bear had reached Bethel shortly after the chase was begun and several persons from that place who came over to take part arrived too late for the fun for "Brer Bear" had already met his doom by the time they reached the scene of action.

olina is the best part of the country in which to live considered from every angle and that Greenville offers advantages equal to the best and better than the rest, yet we appear satisfied in our knowledge of these things and make no effort to let the outsider know what we have to offer him as prospective resident of our community. When prospective home-seekers from other parts of the country begin their move southward they will no doubt purchase their tickets to points that have let the world know they are on the map and the towns that have kept quiet and made no effort to gain a place in the public eye will be left behind in the march of growth and progress.

If Greenville is to continue to grow and prosper, outside population and industries must be brought in and without a Chamber of Commerce or other commerce body to put Greenville on the map there is no hope that such prospects will ever know that we are here. United action is needed and unless Greenville gets together to sell the community to the outside world we will soon find ourselves left behind.

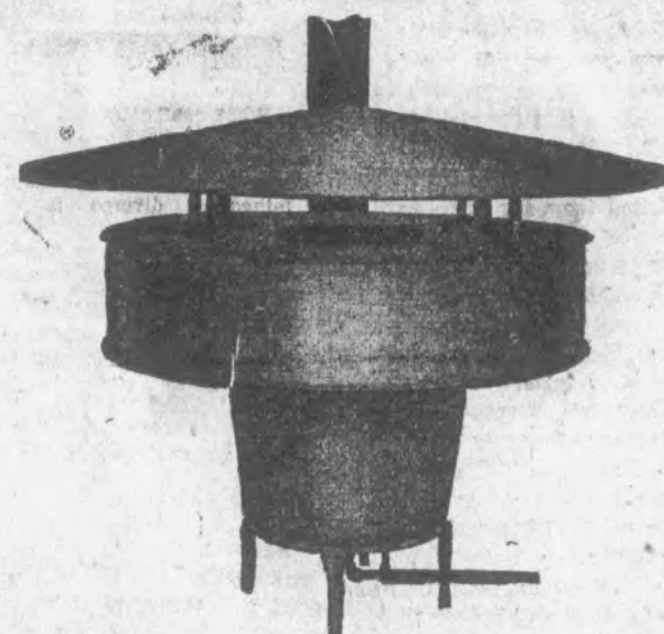
