New York, July 2.- In answer to statements of Edward L. Dohen's that fear of danger of war in the Pacific prompted his part in the Naval Oil leases, the New York Times today publishes comments of Government counsel in the oil lease protecttion, and of other officials connected with the case.

Mr. Doheny declares that the war danger was kept secret because of cials were afraid of wrecking the Washington Arms Conference. But both Atle Pomerene and Owen J. Roberts, said the main treaties resulting from the conference were signed and ratified by the Senate before the first contract with Mr. Doheny was signed.





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
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
