NEWMYER DELIVERS REQUESTS NORMAL ANNUAL ADDRESS TO COMPETITIVE BASIS NEWSPAPER MEN FOR COAL INDUSTRY

Reports Concerning Future of Newspaper Dom. and Its Accomplishments Feature the Morning Program

Federal Trade Comm. Makes Request in Effort to Assure Adequate Supply at Reasonable Prices

Asheville, July 6.—The annual report of Arthur G. Newmyer, president, concerning the future of newspaperdom in the south, and accomplishments of the past, was one of the features on the program this morning at the Southern Newspaper Publishers Convention at Grove Park Inn. It is the 23rd meeting of the organization, and when the gavel of Mr. Newmyer fell for the morning business session, there was large representation present from fourteen Southern states.

Pointing out to Southern newspapers the opportunities and possibilities for the future and reviewing the past performances marked the high spots of President A. G. Newmyer's annual report to the members of the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association in session here.

Mr. Newmyer said Southern newspapers from the established custom of solely reviewing past performances and deemed it his duty to place before the members freely and frankly his impression of the possibilities for future Southern newspaper endeavor, and direct the attention of the members to certain obstacles, as well as opportunities. He added, however, that the time has come when only through plain, open, unflinching of all phases of our present organization situation can we intelligently instruct our incoming officers as to the course you have your association to pursue in the future.

The Association itself has an opportunity to double its membership and thereby increase its scope of service, he declared. All papers in the growing southern section—working in a common territory and facing kindred customs, people and problems—naturally have delayed missions and methods, and each one needs the S. N. P. A. for its particular ability to assemble, study and spread facts for and from the South. He pointed out that the territory covered by the Association represents fourteen Southern States ranging from Virginia through to Texas and Oklahoma. In this area are found 31 million people, 455 English language newspapers, of which 115 are morning dailies, 340 afternoon papers and 197 Sunday morning editions. The circulation of these papers is approximately four million and covers twenty million of people.

One hundred and ninety of these papers are members of the S. N. P. A. and 82 of them are likewise members of the American Newspaper Publishers Association. From this it can be seen, he added, "that one third of the membership support two major newspaper organizations which in candor makes for certain duplication of effort and of assessments. He urged each member to support "first and foremost" his own newspaper association and to instruct incoming officers to meet with a committee of the A. N. P. A. to arrange a plan of co-ordination "whereby both groups will draw the strength each undeniably possesses" and will use it to the "maximum efficiency" but with logical assessments. He encouraged all members able to do so, to belong to both associations, saying the A. N. P. A. acts as a clearing house, filling a vitally important need. The established nationwide influence is tremendous, he added.

Captain Granston Williams who became manager of the association in the last year came in for a certain amount of praise as did Walter C. Johnson, treasurer. Mr. Newmyer told the members they must invest more to reap greater returns.

The battle against the second increase was described as the serious problem confronting the association this year. He called attention to the great amount of work done by the association last year in helping to keep rates on a reasonable basis, and stating that thousands of dollars had been saved the newspapers through this medium.

Another problem facing the body committees who have "served so well" is that of the Printer's School. The faithful "past year."

Washington, July 6.—Congress is asked in a report by the Federal Trade Commission to take steps to restore Anthracite industry to "normal competitive basis" and thus assure adequate supply at reasonable prices.

The report, dealing with past high prices of the fuel, viewing "persistent efforts of the department of Justice, to disintegrate Anthracite combination" has been successful to a large degree and suggested similar action by Congress to obviate high premiums, prices in times of actual or anticipated shortage. Complete respiration of competition in the industry, in the opinion of the Commission would be preferable to price regulation.

Of the 88,000,000 tons of anthracite mined annually, 70 per cent was said to have been produced by eight large companies now or recently owned by, or affiliated with railroads, and that the remainder was produced by 100 independent companies. The Commission reported that the railroads coal companies published prices periodically, but they failed to reflect current changes in supply and demand while the independents simply took the highest obtainable.

FOURTH OF JULY TAKES HEAVY TOLL DEAD AND INJURED

At Least 117 Celebrants of Annual Holiday Dead, With 175 Injured

New York, July 6.—At least 117 celebrants of the fourth of July week-end in the east are dead, and 175 injured. Restrictions on old fashion ways of celebrating held deaths by fire works to 12, by motor accidents to 34, while 44 are known to have perished when a Boston building collapsed upon more than 100 dancers in a cabaret. Twenty-five were drowned. Airplanes killed two. About 145 of the injured were automobilists.

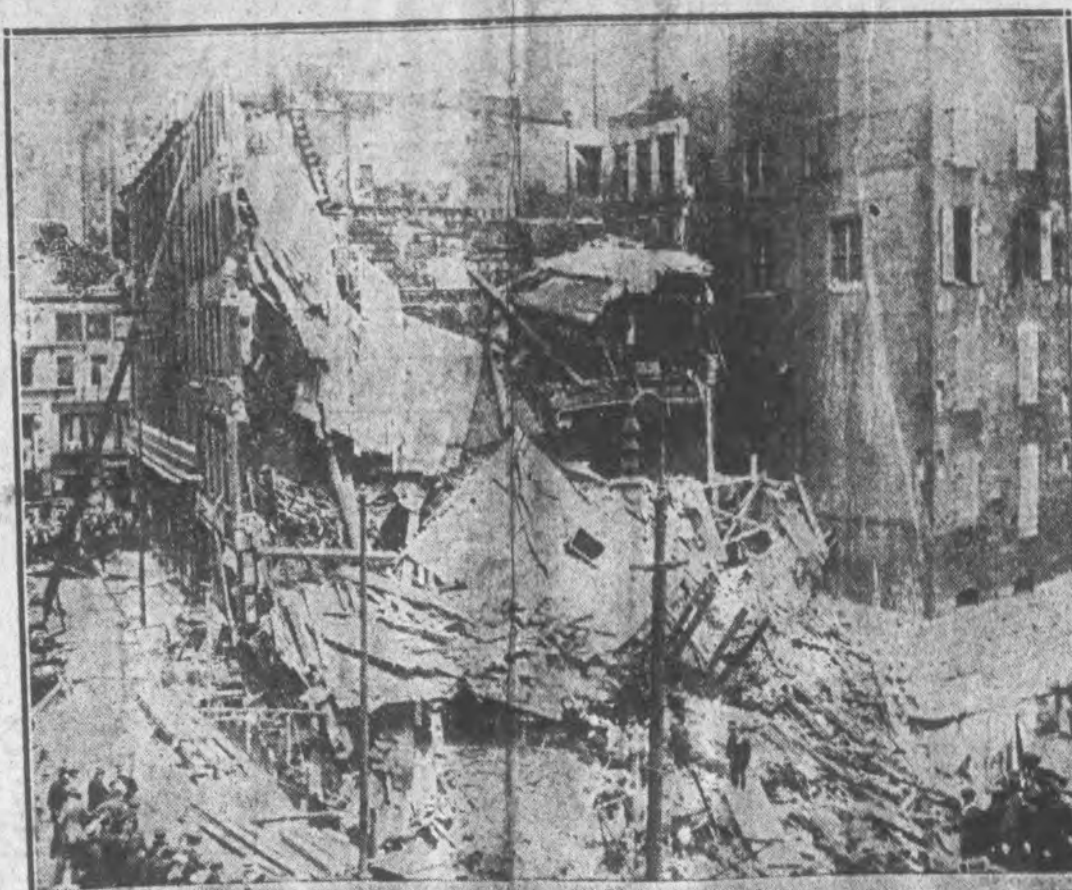

Fatal Boston Crash—NTL

GEN. TO BE GIVEN SUPREME COMMAND OF FRENCH FORCES

Will Be Taken From Marshal Lyautey and Given to Gen. Guillaumat

Paris, July 6.—Supreme command over the French forces opposing the Rifian at Morocco is to be taken from Marshal Lyautey, the Governor-General, and entrusted to a general who will leave France immediately for the front. This decision, which is subject to ratification by the Cabinet today, was reached at a council of war held last night under the chairmanship of M. Painleve, the Premier and War Minister. The step is being taken, it is believed, to allow Marshal Lyautey freedom in carrying out his administrative and political duties.

The man selected for the post is understood to be General Guillaumat, commander-in-chief of the allied operation of the Balkans during the World War.

Dispatches from Fez reported the situation on a highly pessimistic light, with wholesale defections of hitherto friendly tribesmen, and insufficiency of French troops to hold the long line against Abd El Krim drives in the direction of Fez and Taza.

This caused such a stir in Paris that Premier Painleve issued an explanation note, declaring that "public opinion ought not to allow itself to be disturbed by such episodes, which are customary in colonial wars."

Chief Counsel for Scopes Visits Cookeville Today

Cookeville, Tenn., July 6.—Cookeville was the object of apprehensive glances from Dayton today with the presence here of Dr. John R. Neal, Chief Counsel for John T. Scopes, indicating an effort for the defense to seek transfer of the evolution case from State to Federal Courts.

Dr. Neal was prepared, it was believed, to ask Judge John J. Gore, of the United States District Court, to issue a temporary restraining order against prosecution of the case against Scopes in Tennessee courts.

Speaking regarding the Federal intervention in the case, Dr. Neal said, "When we can sustain the unconstitutionality of the Tennessee evolution law, it will forever remove any possibility of a similar law in any other states in the United States."

First Rotor Yacht on Trial.

Potsdam.—The world's first rotor yacht was a feature of the exhibition for aquatic sports held recently. It made a trial trip each day of the exhibition on Templin Lake and performed satisfactorily.

Bavaria Seeks First Auto Road.

Munich.—The government has asked the diet to appropriate \$370,000 for the first automobile road in Bavaria. The proposed road would be 15 miles long, connecting Munich and Starnberg.

LEONARD ADDRESSES DEMONSTRATION OF LOCAL MERCHANTS FERTILIZER WILL BE GIVEN ON TUESDAY

Merchants Now in Process of Perfecting a Merchants' Association

Mr. Paul Leonard, Secretary of the North Carolina Merchants Association, addressed a number of Greenville merchants at a meeting held this morning in the Pythian Club rooms here. The local merchants are now in the process of perfecting a Merchants' Association, here and this occasioned the visit of the State Secretary.

Mr. Leonard, in his talk, set forth the work that was being accomplished by the state association and the local associations throughout the state and urged the merchants here to put their shoulders to the wheel to put the organization of the local association over. He explained the many advantages of a merchants' association both to the merchants and the community in which such association operates.

About thirty local business houses have already signified their desire to become members of the association and on next Thursday morning a meeting will be held for the purpose of adopting by-laws of the association and transacting final business of perfecting the organization.

Inquest Into Death of Maddox Found To Be Unnecessary

Rock Hill, S. C., July 6.—Coroner McCortle, of York County, today decided that an inquest into the death of Albert Maddox, Hydro Electric power operator, of the Southern Power Company, would be unnecessary. Maddox died Sunday afternoon after being unconscious since Thursday when he was found at the Company's development product seven miles from Rock Hill.

A private investigation by the Coroner revealed the fact, he stated, that Maddox was struck by a belt on the pump at the dawn, which threw him with force down an embankment near the machine, fractured the base of his skull. Two marks were found on the dead man's body. One on his left side of his neck and one of his arm, were caused by the belt, Coroner decided.

Results of July 4 Defense Test Muster To Guide War Dept.

Washington, July 6.—Conclusions reached by the general staff officers assigned to study the results of the July defense test muster, will largely guide the war department in deciding over a future defense test policy and seeking its authorization by Congress. With complete reports on the second nation wide defense test expected to be in their hands within two months, the experts will then begin their analysis of the results with particular attention to the question whether future tests should be held on a fixed date for the country as a whole, or whether they should be split up both as to time and military areas.

All Pitt County Farmers Invited to Attend the Demonstration on Farm of Mr. Levi Pierce, Near Ayden

A demonstration of the effects of the various kinds of fertilizers used on tobacco will be given at the farm of Mr. Levi Pierce next Tuesday afternoon, July 7, at 5:00. These various kinds of fertilizers were put under the tobacco by County Agent, R. B. Reeves. All farmers and any others interested in fertilizers are invited to be present at the demonstration.

The following men who are experts in tobacco growing will be present: Dr. W. W. Garner of the Bureau of Plant Industry and head of Tobacco Investigation Work, Washington, D. C.; Prof. N. F. Pate, Agronomist, N. C. State College, Raleigh, N. C.; and Mr. H. A. McGee, Extension Specialist in Tobacco Culture Oxford, N. C. In addition to these men, representatives of some of the leading fertilizer companies of America will be present.

The farming industry of this section is very fortunate in securing the services of these experts who will be prepared to give any information desired relative to tobacco. The importance of fertilization and the effects of the different kinds of fertilizers will be carefully explained and demonstrated.

Don't forget the time, next Tuesday afternoon from 5 to 6 at the Levi Pierce farm, three miles west of Ayden. Some valuable information relative to tobacco raising will be available to all who attend.

Japanese Have Air Bomb Test.

Tokyo.—A three-day air-mobbing exercise recently was held over Tsuru, a suburb of Kangawa. Two planes were employed, each carrying 22 bombs weighing 300 to 400 pounds.

The object of the exercise was to study various relations between the reaching point of bombs thrown from airplanes, and the speed as well as direction of the winds, also to improve bomb throwing devices abroad fling machines.

44 BODIES TAKEN FROM WRECKAGE OF PICKWICK CLUB

Throng of "Night Before the Fourth" Revelers Buried With the Collapse of Boston Building

Boston, July 6.—The 44 bodies were taken from the wreck of the Pickwick Club, once gay night resort, early today, just 50 hours after the throng of "night before the fourth" revelers were flung down and buried with the collapse of the building.

All night long the search had gone forward. Under the concentrated glare of dozens of arch lights and an army of men who had patiently, brick by brick, stick by stick, worked their way down through the mass of debris, pausing now and again to lift another unfortunate.

By this morning they had found nearly all. "Ellie's" body, Miss Ella Cauley, was brought out pitifully bruised. In her dress they found the money for which she had smiled away the broad bandings of the guest that she might realize her hope of marriage and a home. Frank Tillo, and Neddo Flanagan, who had many local ring battles, were found. Inspector Benjamin Alexander, of the Boston Police, who had sought to add another arrest to the several made at the club, died in the wreck. Some of the bodies found were persons paying their first visit to the club. Others were those of habitués.

A laborer searching the ruins was arrested early today when his companions reported to the police that he had been retaining money which he found among the debris. At the station he gave his name as Angelo Cook. He had \$29 in his pockets.

The last body taken from the ruins, that of a man, was partially identified as Francis Driscoll, said to be a labor organizer.

The members of the grand jury visited the scene of the disaster at noon under the guide of district attorney. The grand jury were admitted to the ruins while many workmen were searching for bodies of victims believed to be still buried, and begun a study of the structure of the wrecked building.

Mayor Curley had paid a visit to the ruins earlier in the day. The grand jury will hear witnesses later in the day.

TWO MISSING MEN FOUND HAND CUFFED AND TIED TO A TREE

Dr. William D. Mason and Lawrence Bowman Kidnaped and Held Captive for Ten Days

Chattanooga, June 6.—Sheriff Tom Selman this morning began an investigation into the story told by Dr. William D. Mason, local Veterinarian, and Lawrence Bowman, alleged feudist and aid of Federal Prohibition officers, that they had been kidnapped on Signal Mountain and kept captive for ten days. The two men, who disappeared on June 23 were found yesterday morning by Jim Thomas, mountaineer who was hunting stray dogs, handcuffed and tied to a tree in the wilds about 15 miles from Chattanooga.

Bowman and Mason were in a serious condition as a result of their experience. Bowman said they were driving along the road at night and were set upon by five men wearing tow sacks on their heads, overpowered and taken into the woods.

Bowman and Mason had been lured to the mountain by a fake telephone message and were returning home when attacked. The disappearance was discovered the following day when Mason's car was found on the mountain with blood stains on the running board and containing the hats of the vanished men. Possessors immediately took up the search and combed the mountains, including the place where Bowman and Mason were found, bearing out the statement of the victims that they had been moved to a different tree each night of their captivity. Sam Godsey, a Deputy Sheriff of Sequatchie County, in a statement issued last night, said that the whole affair was a frame-up designed to injure him and that Bowman and Mason had plotted to make it appear that they were dead in order to engage in whiskey without interference from the law.

Godsey also said that William E. Grubb, Federal Prohibition official, was shot and Benton Godsey, a few weeks ago was engaged in liquor running and served notice on the government agency that he intended to clear the mountains of moonshiners.

Sheriff Selman this morning declared that the whole story of the kidnapping appeared absurd, and that he intended to get at the bottom of the case.

PROPER USE OF HANDS AND FEET FIGURE IN LANDING SCREEN JOBS

Hollywood, Cal.—Hands and feet, how and when they move, are attracting the casting directors of one film studio here, rather than faces and their expressions.

Almost any person can be taught to register certain standard emotions, such as grief, joy and fear, according to Director Robert C. Vignola, but only a real actor knows what to do with his hands and feet and how to do it naturally.

The result has been that Vignola and his staff now are directing their first inquiring glances no higher than the waist lines of film applicants. If the hands and feet, extremities make good, then the faces are considered.
