

EVOLUTION TRIAL
OCCUPIES CENTER
OF STAGE TODAYCase of John Scopes Placed in
Hands of Rhea County
Grand Jury For Second
Time

Dayton, Tenn., July 10.—The case of John T. Scopes, charged with violation of the Tennessee Law against the teaching of evolution in the public schools, was placed in the hands of the Rhea county grand jury for the second time here today.

When court convened for the trial of the 24 year old school teacher, Attorney General Arthur T. Stewart asked that the grand jury be summoned. Judge Raulston informed the grand jury men that some questions had arisen as to the legality of the indictment against Scopes and the case would be given grand jury consideration again. The point at issue was the contention that 30 days had not elapsed after the call for the special session of the grand jury and the meeting of the body.

A last minute change in counsel for the defense was indicated by failure of John L. Godsey, Dayton attorney, to appear with other lawyers in court after his absence from a conference of defense attorney's last night had been regarded as significant. While Godsey told the Associated Press he had no statement to make at this time, he said he would not appear in court with other defense counsel.

He said, however, he did not wish to harm the defense case. He declined to discuss his reason for the action, although it is known that Godsey had from the beginning desired to have the trial of the case confined to the constitutional questions involved.

The grand jury retired to consider the case submitted by the state after the judge had read practically the same charge as he had delivered to the first grand jury which indicted Scopes. The court then ordered a recess of one hour while the grand jury deliberated.

Attorneys for John T. Scopes, charged with violation of the Tennessee law against teaching of evolution, made their position plain as favoring the introduction of scientific witnesses after their client was placed on trial here today. State attorneys were prompt to make the announcement of the defense contention with an announcement of a contrary position. Clarence Darrow, of the defense, soon after a second indictment had been returned to replace the technically imperfect first document, stated to the court that he and his associates regarded as competent scientific testimony that the theory of evolution does not contradict the divine story of creation.

This was made by a statement from the state that the prosecution would contest the introduction of extraneous evidence and would insist that such scientific evidence in this case would be incompetent.

A conference of attorney's failed to result in a decision, the discussion reaching into a side issue involving the question of whether the matter should be argued before or after a jury was drawn.

Judge John T. Raulston, presiding, indicated that he favored selection of a jury first and finally adjourned the morning session of the court until after noon with instructions to the sheriff to have 100 extra jury men present when the court reconvened.

TRADE COMMISSION
DISMISSES ACTION
TOBACCO COMPANIESComplaints Were Made in Con-
nection With Charges of
Price Fixing in Tobacco
Industry

Washington, July 10.—The Federal Trade Commission has dismissed 10 complaints in connection with charges of price fixing in the tobacco industry, which named the American Tobacco Company and various jobbing organizations.

The commission in issuing the orders said the practices complained of had ceased early in 1922. A letter from the American Tobacco Company was quoted as saying that the various cases "were never started until after the American Tobacco Company had ceased all activities proper or improper, which are complained of."

Commissioners Thompson and Nugent dissented from the report.

TAX LAW EFFECTS
REDUCTION ONE HALF
AMOUNT PLANNEDDesigned to Reduce the Levy
On the People for \$400,000,-
000; Total Receipt \$2,584,-
010,847

Washington, July 10.—The present tax law, designed to reduce the levy on the people for \$400,000,000 has effected a reduction by only a little more than one half that amount. It is indicated in Treasury Internal Revenue figures for the fiscal year 1925 giving the total tax receipts as \$2,584,010,847.

A total for the fiscal year 1924 was \$2,796,179,288, and a reduction of \$212,168,499 shown for the six months of 1925 during the lower tax rates were operative leads treasury officials to believe the new law will fail to reduce the tax burden by the sum originally contemplated. The figures give indication also that tax reduction efforts to be made in the next congress will have as a goal at least \$200,000,000 and Senator Watson, of Indiana, announced last night that he would favor cutting the sum from the tax load.

The mine sub-committee of six reached this decision at a morning meeting in advance of the opening of actual negotiations this afternoon.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY
SYSTEM PROPERTY
VALUED \$251,538,900Interstate Corp. Commission's
Figures Much Below Those
of the Corporation

Washington, July 10.—A tentative valuation of \$251,538,900 was announced today by the Interstate Commerce Commission for the property of the Southern Railway System, and proved to be a figure much below the estimate placed on its property by the corporation itself. The system has outstanding capital issues against its property with a par value of \$423,476,478, while the booked investment account is \$387,922,214. The commission found that the Southern operated 5,812 miles of main line, which it owned, and used in addition to it operation approximately 3,000 miles of line owned by other corporations. The principal significances of the valuation figures announced today lies in the fact that they will serve as a guide for rate making purposes. In addition to this the government is entitled to recapitalize under the terms of the transportation act, one half of the annual earnings which any railway may make in excess of a fair return on its valuation.

The announcement today of the valuation for the Southern at a figure of \$130,000,000, below that company's book investment account covering its own property is expected to initiate a controversy which may be pushed into the Federal court.

POETRY-TEACHING METHODS
INEFFECTIVE, SAYS LIBRARIAN

Seattle, Wash.—To combat a dislike for poetry because of the way it is taught in some schools, children should be given the idea that poetry is something to love without any thought of school rooms or marks or so many lines-by-the-day for a gold star, declared Margery Doud of the St. Louis Public Library, before the annual meeting of the American Library Association today.

"Many teachers extract all the magic and illiveness from poetry in their teaching of it, and it is the few who, by interpretation, make it the more beautiful and full of meaning," she said. "There is a preventative opportunity here for librarians and to seize it we must saturate children with poetry to the point of involuntariness before the wrong kind of 'educator' can begin his destructive work."

"We cannot guarantee to the children who come to libraries that the apparent world will not be dull for them, but we can give them a hint of an inexhaustible world of their own. It is only by familiarizing children with the look and sound of poetry in a way so simple that they cannot help but understand it, that we are to gain their confidence for further poetic adventuring."

M'LEAN DISCUSSES
ADVANCED PROGRAM
N. C. REFORESTATIONDeclares That Commercial Ex-
ploitation in Past Has Meant
Destruction Instead of
Conservation

Asheville, July 10.—Forest fire prevention and other methods looking to the conservation of present forest land must continue to be the matter of primary consideration in the state forestry policy, declared Governor McLean today in addressing the opening session of the North Carolina Forestry Association in annual convention here. Governor McLean was the principal speaker on the morning program, and discussed at length the necessity of forest conservation. Reforestation of denuded areas, and a strong educational campaign throughout the state to make people see the danger of destroying forests without proper replanting.

"The protective system of the state this year suffering inadequately 25 counties, should be extended to all parts of the state, but even this can not succeed without an accompanying campaign of extensive education," said the Governor. He also advocated that the land owners replant their own land and stated that the educational value of such a planting program would be worth more than its cost.

Today's session was the 15th convention of the association, which will end tomorrow. The business sessions will close today, but tomorrow will be devoted to a trip through the Pisgah Forest, and other forest areas around Asheville in company with the society of American Foresters.

Asheville, July 10. — Discussing "An Advanced Program of Reforestation for North Carolina," Governor A. W. McLean today told the North Carolina Forestry Association, in session here, that "commercial exploitation in the past has meant destruction instead of conservation." He urged a campaign of education against forest fires, to be carried on through educational institutions. "Such occasions as Arbor Day, American Forest Week, etc.," he said, "should be emphasized; while courses in biology, in history, in economics, and in agriculture in our colleges should all find a place for the important subject of forestry."

The Governor asserted that he was willing to stake his reputation "on the statement that if the forests of this state are properly protected from fire for the next 25 or 30 years, our timber crop will be worth much more than our cotton crop."

Dealing with what he termed "exploitation," the Governor declared:

"For example, I call attention to the once magnificent long leaf pine forests, which for a long time were one of the most attractive and valuable natural resources of our eastern sections. No one can contemplate the progressive destruction of our forests for the past fifty years without a feeling of deep discouragement. It seems to me there should be no further delay in providing a more effectively policy of forest protection and reforestation."

The Governor called attention to former pleas for conservation and reforestation made by him.

During his address, the executive urged "a broader forestry policy."

BOY SCOUTS OF CHINA
AND JAPAN TO MAKE
EXCHANGE CAMP VISITS

Tokyo. — Fifty Boy Scouts from Japan will go to China this summer to spend several weeks in camps there. At the same time some two dozen Chinese Boy Scouts will come to Japan for a visit. This plan of exchanging Boy Scouts with various countries has aroused considerable enthusiasm among the Scout leaders here.

It was stated that the Boy Scout organization of Hungary has begun negotiations with the Japanese organization with the view of exchanging visits. The Hungarian Scout officials propose to send 50 Boy Scouts to Japan next year if a return visit of Japanese Scouts can be arranged for the following year.

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WAR ON CARELESSNESS

A war against carelessness and the utter disregard for public safety as urged by Mr. R. S. Bonsh in an address before Standard Oil representatives here last night is at present a duty that confronts our entire community and state and drastic measures must be taken if the value of human life is to be realized. The careless and reckless person is not only a danger to himself but a menace to his community and it is the duty of everyone not only to exercise care at all times but to see to it that the other fellow is likewise careful. Accidents in this community have illustrated that in many instances innocent persons suffer as a result of some other's carelessness. Recklessness and carelessness

breed accidents resulting in injured persons who are a liability to the community. Therefore as a business proposition as well as a moral and Christian duty it behooves every person to practice care and see to it that the other fellow does likewise.

FIRE LIABILITY COMMUNITY PROBLEM

Fire Insurance companies have made it their concern to reduce destruction by fire, but it really is a matter for community action, since it affects every municipality and individual.

"It is the individual, as a rule, who, by carelessness, ignorance or crime, is responsible for the beginning of a fire, and the community which condones his act by permitting the existence of hazardous conditions in home, school or factory is the primary agency, which is really derelict in its responsibilities," says H. A. Smith, President of the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

All possible avenues of approach should carry the doctrine of fire prevention to the general public and to the various organizations of a business or social nature which make up our communities, enlisting the support of educational institutions and commercial bodies, to the end that each shall pay its part in properly protecting the citizens of the community from fire loss.

It is not too much to assume that the devastation of the flames would have compelled the Federal and State Governments to enact laws for the suppression of fires and punishment of those having them, as in France, had not the private business of fire insurance made the reduction of fire waste its voluntary contribution to the public welfare.

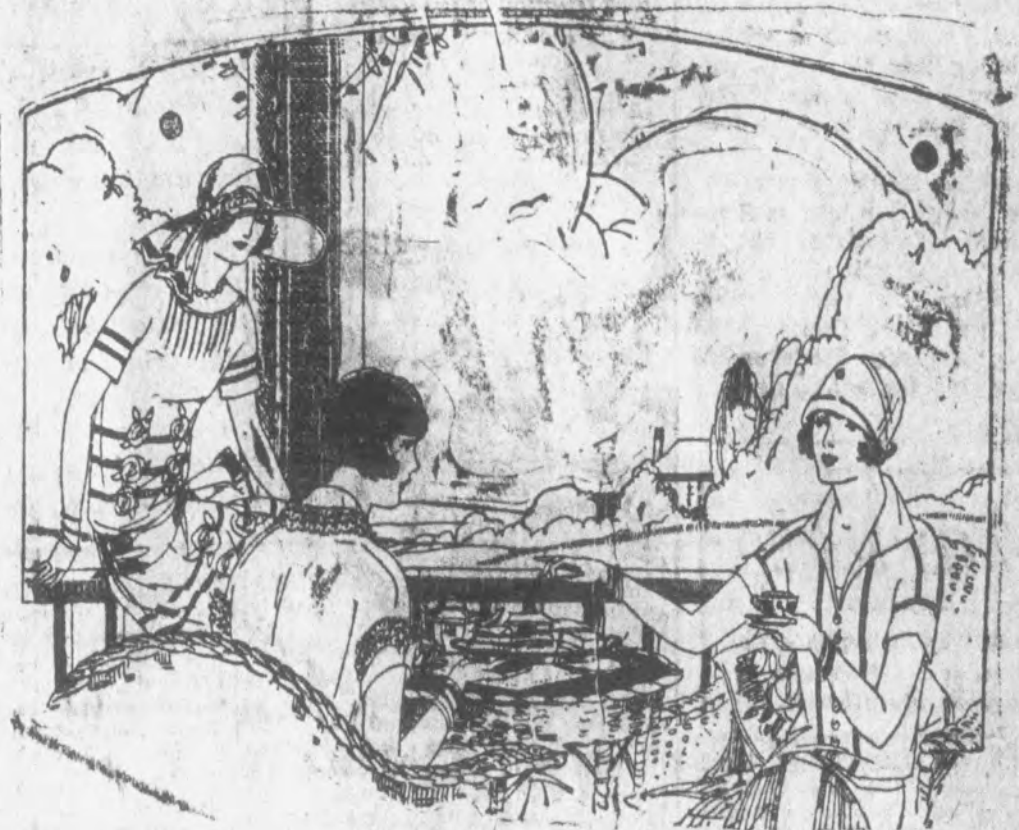
