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STILL BUILDING SCHOOLS

January is six months away but already ten million dollars in loans have been asked for by counties of North Carolina for the erection of school buildings from State funds. This is twice the amount that the State will have to loan at that time.

Those who feared that North Carolina was going to slack up on its school building program were mistaken. North Carolina will not let it continue to erect school buildings, but it must do more than that. It must make the schools responsive to changing conditions that will require education suited to the solution of new kinds of problems.

Dr. P. P. Claxton, a native of this State and a former Federal Commissioner of Education, has pointed out that while material resources and the natural capabilities of people are constant, this is not true of education.

That is variable. Stating the problem algebraically, natural resources and natural capabilities may be represented by A and B while X represents education. Multiply natural capabilities by education and you increase natural resources or representing it algebraically A B equals X.

This is a rough way of stating the problem, but it is a fact that natural resources do remain stationary until they are utilized by human beings and that education is the great means of increasing the worth of material things. This is the least important thing about education though, but it is important because without material prosperity it is not possible to continue our great educational program.—News and Observer.

LET EVERYBODY PAY FOR POSTAGE

More power to the elbow of that potent organization, the American Farm Bureau Federation, when it advocates economy in the Post Office Department; particularly when it demands that Government departments shall pay for the postal facilities they use.

When postal employees were fighting for a living wage there was objection on the score of an expected deficit. There is a deficit; but it would be less by \$7,000,000 a year if the departments paid their postage bills as the rest of us do.

Good bookkeeping is the corner-stone of thrift. The Hon. Bardwell Sliote of Buncombe may be less eager to print his undelivered speech on evolution if \$311.12 must be charged against him, and paid by appropriation, for mailing it to Buncombe waste-baskets. It is not fair to expect the Post Office Department to work for nothing. Abolish the franking privilege and ways may be found to save some or all of that \$7,000,000.—N. Y. World.

PUBLIC FORUM

Editor of The Daily Reflector:

During the present epidemic of the enforcement of the almost forgotten Auto Dim Light Ordinance of the Town of Greenville it might be apropos to quote the following Statute Law covering dangerous lights on automobiles, for the consideration of those in authority, and for those who always like to comply with reasonable safeguards to other fellows without being driven to it by enforcement. To my mind the greatest light menace to drivers of autos at night is the unfocused, cocked up, brilliant beam, which strikes the oncoming driver right in the face, blinding him some distance down the road and keeps him blind until he has passed on or has been run into the ditch or compelled to stop. Automobile reflector lights properly set will not interfere with an oncoming driver, no matter how bright, if they are set with dim lights, when the reflectors are focused according to this law: "A motor vehicle of any kind operated on the public highways of the State shall not use any lighting de-

vice equipped with a reflector, unless the same shall be so designed, deflected, or arranged that no portion of the beam or reflected light, when measured seventy-five feet or more ahead of the lamps, shall rise above forty-two inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands all conditions of load. 1917, c. 140, ss. 14, 16, 1919, c. 292."

It is only a matter of a few minutes time to have the lights on an automobile set and adjusted in accordance with this law. Certainly, and I speak from experience, with the lights so adjusted a driver can see much better his own bit of road, and further he will not be a menace to any one, pedestrian or driver, from the standpoint of lights, and he will not endanger himself of running into unlighted objects on the roads and streets, as he does with dim lights.

With respects to the Board of Aldermen, the Mayor, and police of Greenville, I would like to say that I consider driving around town matter how bright, if they are set with dim lights, when the reflectors are properly adjusted, a greater menace to everybody concerned than the unfocused, cocked up, brilliant lights, because at least the driver behind

such lights can see what is in front of him. With dimmers on he cannot see, because, with the exception of a few blocks down town the streets are so shaded that the street lights are not effective. With traffic going both ways on a shaded street with dimmers on the autos, children playing in the streets, pedestrians crossing, and unlighted parked vehicles are all endangered as well as the drivers of automobiles to accidents of all kinds. So I submit this as a plea for better lighted automobiles with more attention to reflector focusing and angle setting of the light beam.
