RESTING ARLINGTON **CEME**TERY TODAY

No Definite Step Taken Toward a Memorial to Commemorate Services of the Dead Leader

Washington, Aug. 1. - A single wooden marker, set amid the withering clusters of blosson/s that hid his grave, alone marked today the last resting place of William Jennings Bryan in Arlington National Cemetery. Just over the hill crest, beneath which he sleeps, stands the row on row of white stones above soldier dead, who lost their lives in France: Closer above are the more imposing monuments of the officers dead with whom he keeps his last encampment, and all about are the signs of the orderly reverent care with which the nation surrounds the last sleep of those it has called to its service.

One day a stone memorial will be erected to tell in graving lettering that the Commoner lies here on this peaceful slope.

It is too soon for the stricken widow, the brother, and the children of the dead to have made their plans for the permanent testimony of their lave. Lewis Wants Anthracité Mine Operators Meet With Him to Negotiate New Working Agreement

Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 1 .- Calling for an end to three weeks of 'shadow boxing" and to "pleading a case before a jury of supernumeraries," John L. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers demands that the principal Anthracite Mine operatory meet him in conference Tuesday to negotiate a new working agreement. The virtual ultimatum was served by letter yesterday on Samuel D. Wayriner, chairman of the Anthracite Operators Conferences. Mr. Lewis demanded that Mr. Marriner and William J. Richards, President of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Corporation attend the conference because of the fact that the present operation committee, without exception, was composed of lesser executives with no ower to act.

Mr. Lewis's statement was taken o mean that if the recognized operators leaders failed to appear Tuesday, the mine workers would break negotiations with a possibility of suspension of work September 1.

LOOKING BACK AT THE END OF THE WAR

The report of a Reichstag committee upon the cause of Germany's defeat can only underscore confusions long since accepted. Germany lost her last hope of victory when Ludendorff's final stroke in July of 1918 carried him across the Marne but failed to give him Rheims. She lost her last hope of averting military defeat when the August operations showed 1,500,000 Americans in France, helping the Allies push toward the Vesle and preparing to wipe out the St. Mihiel salient.

It was the prime miscalculation of the German command, as the report points out, that it failed to realize how fast the United States might pour troops into France. It correctly predicted that the spring fighting would show fewer than 450,000 Americans there. Ludendorff loosed his thunderbolt at St. Quentin on March 21 and on April 1 there were only 320,000 Americans abroad. But the stream became a flood.
