## DRY AGENTS SEIZE 6,000 BARRELS BEER IN SINGLE MONTH

East Flooded With Real Beer To Quench Thirst of Those Deprived of Liquors by Blockade.

New York, Aug. 14.—Supposedly defunct breweries in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and the Middle West are flooding the east with thousands of barrels of real beer to quench the parched throats of those whose hard liquor supply has been cut off by the government rum blockades which practically encircle the country.

Divisional prohibition chief, Robt. Q. Merrick, declares that in the last thirty days more beer of illegal alcoholic contents has been seized than in the preceding six months.

The three car loads of beer from Pennsylvania seized here yesterday brought the total for the last month up to 6,000 barrels with a value of about \$100,000 at the source, and approximately twice that amount at the bootleg market.

The shortage in hard liquors caused by the disposal of the rum fleets, and the government's vigilance on the Canadian border and Gulf of Mexico, is attributed in part for the demand on beer.

## WILCOX NOMINATED FOR THE SENATE AS COOLIDGE CHOICE

Coolidge Republicans Nominated Peter Wilcox to Run Against Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., for Senate.

Oshkosh, Wis., Aug. 14.—Roy Peter Wilcox of Eau Claire, a lawyer, was unanimously nominated as the Coolidge Republican candidate for United States Senator to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Robert M. LaFollette, of Wisconsin. He will go to the polls in opposition to Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., who has announced his candidacy for the office. Both men will run on the Republican ticket.

The nomination of Wilcox by the Coolidge Republicans came after a day's speech making and corroborations in which all factions of that wing of the party in Wisconsin worked in harmony. Only one formal ballot was taken late last night.

## Expert Advices Planting Turnips For Dairy Feed

West Raleigh, Aug. 14.—In a further attempt to aid dairymen and livestock growers in securing adequate feed for their animals this fall, despite the effects of the prolonged drought which cut the hay yields in Western and Piedmont North Carolina, John A. Ray, dairy extension specialist at State College, advises the planting turnips.

"The hay crop is short not only in North Carolina but over the entire country," says Mr. Ray, "and prices for hay this fall will be high. The corn crop in Piedmont and Western North Carolina seems to be a practical failure. Therefore, there will be a shortage of silage. There is no better dairy feed than turnips. They are relished by cows and when fed at the rate of 20 to 30 pounds per day, they will reduce the hay needed without affecting the milk flow."

Mr. Ray recommends the Cow Horn and Pommeranian White Globe as the best, high yielding varieties to plant. If these are sown soon, he says they will make a yield of from six to eight tons especially if the land is well prepared and is fertile. "Turnips should be harvested before frost," Mr. Ray said, "and stored in the cellar or killed in a bank like sweet potatoes. They should be cut into small pieces with a spade before feeding, to prevent the cows from choking on the whole root, and should be fed right after milking, to prevent any bawls that might be imparted to the milk."

## PRES. COOLIDGE TO DISCUSS BELGIAN DEBT SITUATION

Commission Negotiations Suspended Pending Conference President and Secretary Mellon.

Washington, Aug. 14.—The debt negotiations between the United States and Belgium were suspended today pending a conference to be held Monday between President Coolidge, Secretary Mellon and Senator Smoot, representing the American Debt Commission.

Secretary Mellon will leave Washington tonight and tomorrow they will meet in New York and proceed to Plymouth, Vermont, where the President will be visiting his father.

The American commission desired to lay the whole matter before Mr. Coolidge prior to a resumption of the negotiations with the Belgian Commissioners next Tuesday.

Brussels, Belgium, Aug. 14.—In ministerial circles an effort is being made to represent the status of the Washington negotiations of Belgium's debt to the United States as formal, although the conversations have been suspended while the Belgian delegates await further instructions from their government. Official spokesmen pointed out that the failure to adopt first suggestions should not be taken to much to heart.

## Department Prepares Soil Map Durham Co.

Washington, Aug. 14.—The report of a soil survey of Durham County, North Carolina, made by the Bureau of Soils, United States Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with the State of North Carolina, has been published and is now available. It is announced here by the federal department.

The report of the survey contains a detailed color map of the county, showing the extent and distribution of the various soil types. It contains thirty pages of text descriptive of the various soils and discusses their capabilities.

Tobacco is listed as the principal crop of Durham county, cotton, also, is listed as a cash crop but the acreage devoted to it is shown to be comparatively small.

"Peanuts could be successfully grown," it is pointed out. "Considering the soils, climate, and other natural advantages, the transportation facilities, and the convenient markets, there is every reason to believe that great advancement can be made in agriculture in Durham county."

## Number of Farms in United States Show Decrease of 30,000

Washington, Aug. 14.—There were 30,000 fewer farms, or a decrease of one half of one percent, in the United States last year as compared with 1923, and a reduction of land in crops of 1,200,000 acres, or one-third of one percent, the Department of Agriculture has announced, following a survey. Of the decreased crop area, approximately 1,000,000 acres were used for additional pasture land.

The survey showed, it was pointed out, that some farmers in nearly all parts of the country were extending the cultivated area by either clearing, drainage or dry farming, but that for the country as a whole many more farmers were allowing plow land to be idle.

The decrease in the number of farms, though small, was found to be quite general in central and Southern Georgia and southeastern Alabama, where it ranged from 1 to 10 per cent; in much of Michigan and Missouri, where it averaged 2 per cent; in most of Colorado; in South-eastern Idaho and eastern Washington, where it ranged from 1 to 5 per cent.

Increase in the number of farms, however, was notable along the northern and western margin of the cotton belt, where the boll weevil infestation was less severe than to the south in the lower coastal plain of the Carolina, in Southern Florida and Texas.

## ACTION DEFERRED SANITARY CUP LAW

Soda Dispensers Anxious To Cooperate in Move For Better Health Conditions.

The Pitt County Board of Health met in its office in the court house in adjourned session at 3 p. m. Tuesday, August 11th. Drs. Dixon and Wooten and Messrs. Clark and Fitzgerald were present.

The purpose of this meeting was to consider the advisability of passing ordinance relating to the use of sanitary drinking cups at all fountains in Pitt county. Upon invitation of the Board of Health, the proprietors of these fountains met in session with them. After considerable discussion, it was very evident that the proprietors of fountains were extremely anxious to make these fountains sanitary in every respect. On a motion of Dr. G. G. Dixon, seconded by D. M. Clark, the following motion was adopted; that because of the very evident desire on the part of the soda dispensers of Pitt county to make their fountains sanitary, that action by Pitt county Board of Health regarding use of sanitary drinking cups be deferred for ninety days, and that in the meantime, said dispensers work out in conjunction with the health officer, an ordinance that would be acceptable to 80 per cent of such dispensers, and that such ordinance be presented to the Pitt County Board of Health at its regular meeting on the first Monday in October.

The Board of Health was very much pleased with the attitude of the proprietors of the fountains. They will get all the co-operation necessary in safe-guarding the public health.

## Chicago Authorities Seize \$50,000 Jewels Belonging to Prisoner

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 14.—\$50,000 worth of jewelry was seized here today by Federal Authorities, who opened a safety deposit box rented by Kitty Gilbooley, arrested recently as the head of a Narcotic Syndicate. It was a discovery resulting from Mrs. Gilbooley's arrest that the way was paved for the arrest of Colonel William G. Beach, former head of the Government local Narcotic Squad.

## MAIL TRUCK DRIVER ADMITS KNOWLEDGE ROBBERY PLANNED

Youth Admits He Had Been Informed Robbery Was to Be Staged But Denies Any Implication.

Rewanee, Ill., Aug. 14.—Joseph Jackson, 29, driver of a Government mail truck, which was robbed of a sack of registered mail here yesterday, has admitted today that he had knowledge that a robbery was to be staged. He is being held on a charge of conspiracy to rob the mails and is to be questioned further.

Jackson told authorities that he was approached two weeks ago by a man who gave the name of Phil Robinson, and at that time learned that a robbery was planned. He said Robinson was the man who held him up yesterday. Jackson maintained that he was not implicated in the robbery. It is not believed that the value of the loot will total more than \$5,000.

## MAC MILLAN PLANE DAMAGED BY STORM DURING YESTERDAY

Artic Expedition Establishes Intermediate Operating Base At Flagler Fjord Ellesmere Island.

Washington, Aug. 14.—With one of its planes temporarily out of commission, the MacMillan Arctic Expedition is going ahead with the other two to establish an intermediate base at Flagler Fjord, on Ellesmere Island, about 100 miles from Etah, Greenland, the main base.

The airplane NA-2 was damaged by Etah during a storm yesterday. She was put aboard the steamer Bowden to be repaired.

The Flagler Fjord was decided upon for the sub base between Etah and Cape Thomas Hubbard, where the advance flying base will be located. It was planned to place supplies there last night.

## DECLARES SECURITY PACT NEGOTIATIONS MORE FAVORABLE

Sir Frederick Maurice Makes Declaration at Round Table Discussio non Limitation Armaments.

Williamstown, Mass., Aug. 14.—The method now being adopted to negotiate the security pact is more promising than any that has yet appeared for the ultimate limitation of armaments, Sir Frederick Maurice of London, said today at a round table conference of the limitation of armaments at the Institution of Politics. "The present method is for the negotiations by a limited number of states of one special problem, not the problems of the whole world at one gulp, and then submission of an agreement to the League of Nations," he said.

"The machinery of the League of Nations is not at present such as to make it possible to draft treaties of this nature on matters that really affect the vital interests of nations." The best way to proceed is along the lines which France, Germany, Belgium and Great Britain are proceeding now.

The League of Nations machinery is said to be defective because it was virtually impossible in the assembly's short annual sessions to discover the flaws in a bill or treaty, to make the necessary changes and to secure a general agreement. Sir Frederick recalled the reason for Great Britain declining to ratify the protocol of 1924, which was ratified by France and certain other nations. He pointed out that the desire of Great Britain in regard to security agreements was a general guarantee and that of France was for specific guarantees.

London.—Lord Glenconner, England's most eligible bachelor in the eyes of society mothers with marriageable daughters, is engaged to Miss Pamela Paget, the younger daughter of Sir Richard and Lady Muriel Paget. He is 26 years old, very wealthy and inherited many business interests as well as the famous Tennant collection of pictures, a part of which sold for \$1,000,000 two years ago.

## STATE VISITED BY HOTTEST WEATHER OF THE SUMMER

Charlotte Reported 100 Degrees Yesterday, Raleigh 96 Mercury Today May Go Higher Than Yesterday.

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—All North Carolina today continued to swelter following the hottest night of the summer at Raleigh and other points. Last night's minimum at Raleigh, the United States Weather Bureau reported, was 78 degrees. This followed a torrid day with a record making maximum of 96 degrees here. Charlotte's maximum was 100 Wilmington 94, and Asheville 94. Rains occurred yesterday, the weather bureau reported, as far south as Virginia. No rain was reported in North Carolina, and the whole state was under a blanket of heat.

Little relief was promised today, the weather man said. "At eight o'clock the thermometer at Raleigh registered 82 degrees as compared with 74 at the corresponding hour yesterday. Two hours later the thermometer had risen nine degrees to 91, and the weather bureau reported that a maximum of 100 today would not occasion any surprise."

## DRAW TEN YEARS FOR PLOT KIDNAP MOVIE ACTRESSES

Trio Had Planned to Kidnap Jackie Coogan, Pola Negri, Mary Pickford and Several Others.

Los Angeles, California, Aug. 14.—Ten years to life imprisonment for plotting to kidnap Mary Pickford faced Claude Holcombe, and Charles Z. Stephens, today as a result of their conviction in superior court.

A third defendant, Adrien Wood, was acquitted last night, but did not escape a warning from several jurors who as they left the court room after returning the verdict, told him he did not realize "how close he came," and to be more "careful of his associates in the future."

Neither Miss Pickford, nor her husband, Douglas Fairbanks, were present when the defendants heard their fates. Both had testified that they knew nothing of the kidnapping plot, save what detectives told them. Defense counsel indicated today that another trial would be asked. The three defendants were arrested May 30, last, after six weeks of investigation. Detectives declared that they had listened in on conferences in which the trio talked of kidnapping Jackie Coogan, Baby Peggy, the grand children of Edward L. Doheny, Pola Negri, and finally Mary Pickford.

## MACEDONIAN FIGHTER KILLED IN ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE PRISON

Skopje, Serbia.—Serbian newspapers announce the death of Angelko Nikoloff, for 20 years an active fighter in the ranks of the Macedonians. Two years ago Nikoloff was sentenced to imprisonment having received commutation of the original death sentence.

Recently when he was assigned to hard labor he escaped from the police man who was guarding him, taking the guard's rifle. After six days he was recaptured, but in another attempt to escape was killed during an interchange or rifle shots with the police.

## Children of Zoologists Wed.

Berlin.—The names of two families noted in the zoological and animal world were united here recently with the marriage of Hildegard Hagenbeck, daughter of the celebrated Hamburg animal collector, to Heinz Heck, son of the director of the Berlin Zoo. Both children were born in a zoological garden and both grew up among wild beasts.

## DROP OF ONE CENT IN GASOLINE PRICE ANNOUNCED TODAY

Tank Wagon Price in North Carolina Under New Reduction Will be Eighteen Cents Gallon.

New York, Aug. 14.—Another reduction of one cent a gallon in the tank wagon price of gasoline through out its territory was announced today by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, making new quotations in Baltimore, Washington, D. C., and New Jersey 17 cents; Virginia, Maryland, West Virginia, and North Carolina 18 cents, and South Carolina 18 1/2 cents. All grades of gasoline for export except United States Navy grade also were cut one half cent a gallon.

The Standard Oil Company of Louisiana also reduced prices three cents a gallon in Louisiana, Arkansas, and Tennessee. New prices in Louisiana at filling stations were 19 1/2 cents, and tank wagon 16 1/2 cents. The prices in Tennessee and Arkansas vary according to the amount of state taxes.

## Cotton Consumption For Year Shows Big Increases

Washington, Aug. 14.—Cotton consumed during July totaled 483,898 bales of lint and 62,513 of lintless compared with 493,765 of lint and 60,577 of lintless in June this year, and 347,099 of lint and 41,632 of lintless in July last year, the Census Bureau today announced. Consumption during the cotton year which ended July 31, was 6,131,349 bales of lint and 651,065 of lintless compared with 5,680,554 of lint and 536,638 of lintless for the year which ended July 31, 1924.

## Cotton Crop Last Year Was 15,635,674 Bales

Washington, Aug. 14.—The total supply of cotton for the cotton year 1924-25 ending July 31, was announced today by the census bureau to have been 15,635,674 bales and the distribution was 15,824,304 bales which is 198,630 bales more than the supply, due principally to the inclusion in the distribution items of the city crop which consists of rebaling samples and picking from cotton damaged by fire and weather.

### "JUST AS GUILTY"

That the purchaser of illicit whiskey is as guilty of breaking the law as the person who dispenses the contraband goods is the attitude that is being taken by the people of this state with regard to bootlegging and the action of Judge Stack in fining a defendant \$25 dollars for buying liquor no doubt meets with the approval of the state as a whole.

In commenting on the occurrence and commending the Judge for his action the News and Observer says

"Men who pass as reputable citizens and tempt the covetous to break the law by buying liquor from them are given stern denunciation in Judge Stack's court. 'Mr. Clerk' his honor said at Wilkes court, 'enter a fine of \$25 against this defendant for buying liquor. The man who buys liquor is just as guilty as the man who sells it. In fact if people would quit buying it the market for it would be destroyed and they would stop making it.' L. J. Hampton, writing to the Winston-Salem Journal, says:

"Raymond Gregory was the lad who was

fining \$25 for buying blockade liquor. That was a sad blow to blockaders and rum-runners. It was something unusual and therefore unique in the annals of illicit decisions in the country and to say it made a deep impression is to state the case mildly. Raymond got 90 days suspended sentence for possession of the illicit fluid. Judge Stack's straightforward way of handling the case made the throngs sit up and take notice.

It is the buyer who prides himself that he is in a very different class from the moonshiner and the bootlegger. Judge Stack brings him face to face with his criminal action and his participation."

### SUGGESTIONS IMPROVE RADIO RECEPTION

A few simple suggestions from radio engineers as to the value of overhauling and putting in first class shape, radio equipment for summer use, have materially aided in overcoming static trouble. The further suggestion that radio users, during the summer, take advantage of programs from broadcasting stations nearer home instead of trying to get China or Timbaktu has increased the use of radio equipment and added greatly to the pleasure of listeners.

Announcement is now made that it is virtually assured that the radio audience in the United States may nightly listen to radio programs broadcasted from England in the late fall and winter of this year, as the result of an agreement made between the British Broadcasting Company and the Radio Corporation of America. This will give further incentive to radio fans to perfect and tune up their equipment for the winter programs. In commenting on the arrangements, David Saroff, of the Radio Corporation of America says:

"I am confident of the ultimate technical success of international broadcasting and its unmeasured possibilities for public usefulness as an instrument of international goodwill and world peace."

He also berated the lawyer who saved his neck. He has no choice now, however, but to keep his head on for a commutation represents a sovereign act and may not be annulled.

Leest had previously waived the right of appeal and insisted on being executed. In the meantime, and unknown to him, his counsel had petitioned for commutation, which was granted. The moment Leest heard of the change in sentence he be-

came very much incensed and immediately wrote the following petition to the minister of justice:

"I won't accept this pardon and insist on having my head chopped off under all circumstances. It is I who have the right to decide about myself and not any lawyer. He is altogether too odious."

### AIRPLANE AND CAMERA AID IN ANNUAL CROP CENSUS

Columbus, O.—Successful experiments with an aerial camera to determine if crops can be readily distinguished from high altitudes offer the means of supplementing the regular crop census every five years with a supplemental census every summer in the opinion of C. J. West, statistician of the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics here.

Mr. West recently returned from McCook field, Dayton, where, in the company of army pilots, he surveyed farm lands at an altitude of 5,000 feet and by means of a powerful camera developed at McCook field obtained 60 photographs.
