New York Police
Attempting to End
War Chinese Tong

New York, Aug. 27.—New York police are attempting to end the war of Chinese Tong in the east and middle west where five Tong men have been assassinated.

While Tong leaders were closeted with police here yesterday a Hip Sing was murdered in Baltimore. He was the first Hip Sing to die, the others killed in New York, Chicago, Minneapolis and Pittsburg having been killed.

Tong leaders promised the police headquarters here today to try to end the war. They agreed to cease hostilities in New York pending a final settlement and another meeting was arranged for tomorrow. Telegrams were sent summoning the National On Leongs President and Secretary from Detroit.

On Leong Representatives claimed the war had reached such a state that higher officials of the Tong were needed to handle the situation. The National President of the Hip Sing and local officers came to police headquarters under heavy guard, but the leaders of the two Tong would not meet at the same table. Without the chief of the On Leongs, it was said it would be futile to promise that killings in other cities would stop. Police and prosecutors warned the Tong men that indictments for conspiracy and murder probably could be returned.

Meanwhile the police of a dozen cities sought to prevent further outbreaks.

Cooper Found Not
Guilty on Charge
of Manslaughter

Rocky Mount, Aug. 27.—A jury in Nash County Superior Court last night returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of George M. Cooper, former guard at the Rocky Mount road district prison camp, charged with manslaughter. The charge was the outgrowth of the staying a year ago at the camp of a negro prisoner. Cooper pleaded self-defense.

Four Drowned When
Row Boat Capsizes

Richer, N. Y., Aug. 27.—Two men and two girls were drowned, and one man swam to safety when their row boat capsized in a heavy sea on Lake Ontario near here today.

Seven Men Killed
When Boiler Explodes

Uniontown, Ala., Aug. 27.—Seven men were reported killed today when a boiler at the Ginery of Archer & Epps exploded at Dayton near here. Charles J. Buchanan and six negro men, as yet unidentified, were the victims.

UHL AND LEWIS IN
CONFERENCE TODAY

Chairman of Citizens' "No Strike" Committee Goes Into Conference With President of U. M. W.

Washington, Aug. 27.—With government officials adhering with a hands off policy with respect to the Anthracite dispute, the one hope of averting shut down in the Anthracite fields on September first rested today in the efforts of the Citizens' committee of that region to bring the operators and miners into conference again.

Convinced that no efforts on its own part would avail to prevent suspension of work in the mines, the government is taking stock of the hard coal supply and available substitutes, and officials intimate that a plan already is being considered to put guard the public against an actual coal shortage. Tentative estimates show the above ground supply of Anthracite to be sufficient to meet normal requirements until December.

After the operators had announced agreement to its proposal for a resumption of negotiations, John H. Uhl, chairman of the Citizens' "no strike" committee of north-eastern Pennsylvania went into conference early today with John Long Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers of America at his Philadelphia headquarters.

Greece Will Declare
Its Inability to Pay
War Debt at Present

London, Aug. 27.—A dispatch to a daily telegram says the United States recently presented to Greece a demand for settlement of that country's debt to it. The Greek government, although recognizing the American claim, will declare its inability to pay the debt at the present time, the Greek Budget being overburdened with urgent obligations in connection with the settlement of the refugee situation.

The correspondent says it is understood the Greek government authorized its minister in London to sign an Anglo-Greek convention providing for payment of the war debt, the terms of which were settled long ago by former Finance Minister Soudouros.

DENTIST COMMITS
SUICIDE IN JAIL

Dr. Thomas W. Young on Trial for Murder of Wife Hangs Himself in Cell

Los Angeles, Aug. 27.—Dr. Thomas W. Young, dentist on trial here for the murder of his wife and the burying of her body in a cistern, killed himself in the county jail here early today.

County jail employees discovered the dentist's body hanging in his cell by a piece of wire. He had been dead for some time when the body was found.

Dr. Young was on trial for the murder of his wife and jurors in the case were ordered at the close of court yesterday to make a visit to the suburbs today to visit the cistern beneath which Mrs. Young's body was found. Two acquaintances of the defendant yesterday had testified that he had offered them \$500 each if they would testify they had seen Mrs. Young alive and well, but in flight from her husband, several weeks after February 21. They said the offer was made prior to his arrest and the finding of the body and that he had told them he needed the testimony in an alienation of affection suit he planned to file against his father in law, Frank W. Hunt.

Toulon, France, Aug. 27.—The battle ship Paris, the most powerful unit of the French Navy, is to sail from Toulon tomorrow under sealed orders. Her destination is reported to be Syria.

MEXICO WILL BEGIN
PAYING NATIONAL
DEBT ABOUT SEPT. 1

San Antonio, Texas, Aug. 27.—Mexico will begin paying her \$500,000,000 national debt owed chiefly to the United States about September 1, Arthur M. Elias, Consul General for Mexico at New York, and Financial agent for that Government said here today.

CRITICISES THE
CONDUCT DARROW
IN SCOPES TRIAL

Chief Justice Marshall Declares Clarence Darrow Should Receive Condemnation of Members of Bar and Bench

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 27.—The conduct of Clarence Darrow in the Scopes trial at Dayton Tennessee was pointed to today by Charles T. Marshall, Chief Justice of the Ohio Supreme Court as an example of the "unethical practitioner" which should "bring upon him the condemnation of all self-respecting members of the bench and bar."

The Chief Justice's criticism was made in an address to 200 law students sworn in as attorneys here.

"The law of that case was plain and simple" he said. "Neither the indictment nor the statute under which the indictment was framed contained any mention of evolution, neither did that in the remotest degree involve nor necessarily provoke any discussion of the theory of evolution."

"The statute provides that it would be unlawful for any teacher in any public school of the state to teach that man has descended from a lower form of animal or any theory that he denies stories of the Divine creation of man. That the forbidden doctrines were so taught was freely admitted by the defendant. No defense was therefore opened except that of the constitutional validity of the law."

And yet Darrow sought to brow beat and to bluff the judge into admitting expected evidence upon the soundness of the theory of evolution.

SAYS NO EFFORT
MADE TO ESTABLISH
GUILT OF NURSES

Secretary Wilbur Expresses His Disapproval of the Recent Court Martial Proceedings in Which Nurses Were Acquitted

Washington, Aug. 27.—Secretary Wilbur again has expressed his disapproval of the recent court martial proceedings in which two navy nurses were acquitted on charges of illegal importation of liquor on a transport by admonishing Lieutenant Andrew Gordon of the Marine Corps for his conduct as Prosecuting Attorney in the trial.

Failure of Lieutenant Gordon to present to the court statements in his possession for the two nurses, Miss Ruth H. Anderson and Catherine Glyancy, drew the chief criticism from the secretary. He also disapproved the prosecutors failure to cross examine Miss Anderson and concluded that it is "perfectly apparent that there was no effort on your part to establish the guilt of the accused."

Before taking this action in a letter yesterday, the Secretary had previously disapproved the acquittal verdict in this case, but this had no punitive effect as the verdict is final. His letter to Lieutenant Gordon will be filed with his records.

Counsel Mrs. Briggs
Enters Plea Guilty
Forcible Trespass

Lexington, Aug. 27.—A plea of guilty to forcible trespass was entered in Superior Court here today by counsel for Mrs. Barnwell C. Briggs, of Rocky Mount, after evidence had been concluded in the case charging her with involuntary manslaughter. The case was the outgrowth of the death of Reese James, a school boy who died as a result of an automobile collision near here October 3, 1924. A compromise was also reached in a civil suit against Mrs. Briggs but the sum involved has not been announced.

GOV. AL SMITH IN
THICK OF FIGHT
MAYOR NEW YORK

Gives Up Vacation to Work for Walker Against Mayor Hylan for the Democratic Nomination

New York, Aug. 27.—Governor Smith today was in the thick of the fight for Mayor of New York. Having given up his vacation in order to work for state Senator, James J. Walker, a Tammany candidate against Mayor Hylan for the Democratic nomination, the Governor came from the Capitol at Albany to plunge into a contest which both Democratic and Republican spokesmen freely say is a fight between Smith and Tom R. Hurst.

Tonight the Governor will invade Brooklyn, the home borough of Mayor Hylan. At a Walker rally he is expected to express views on political questions regarding Mayor Hylan, who the other day made the political pot boil with an attack on the Governor as an ally of the traction interest seeking higher fares.

The Mayor at the same time attacked Walker with offers to his support of the underworld and a wide open town.

Thorntons Given
Maximum Penalty
for Assault on Boy

Smithfield, Aug. 27.—Marvin and Mann Thornton today were being held in jail in default of \$10,000 bond each required for their appeal from sentence of two years each on a charge of assault. Found guilty yesterday of an assault upon Herbert (ainey, 16, they were given the maximum penalty in Superior Court here.

The case was the outgrowth of an attack upon the boy by the two men during which they were alleged to have set his clothes on fire and fastened him to a burning stump.

DIRECTORS APPROVE
LUKEMEN'S DESIGN
CONFED. MEMORIAL

Design Submitted in Form of Sketch Modeled in Plaster Which Will Be Enlarged Immediately

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 27.—Official approval of Augustus Lukeman's design for the central group of the Stone Mountain Memorial was given today by the board of directors of the Association at a special meeting here. The design was submitted in the form of a sketch modeled in plaster, which will be enlarged immediately to the dimensions of a master model which will require five or six weeks.

The design contains several of the Confederate army with two subsidiary figures, representing the high officials of the Confederate army with two subsidiary figures representing the flag bearers. Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederate and Commander in Chief of the Southern forces is the first to be seen on the left of the group. He is in civilian garb and wearing a riding cap. Next is General Robert E. Lee, commander of the armies in the field, astride his famous horse, "Traveler." Stonewall Jackson is next to Lee mounted on "Old Sorrell." General Jackson wears the uniform of a Lieutenant-General and a riding cape flutters over his shoulders. Next to order left to right are the two flag bearers and to the right of them are four Confederate Generals, who will be selected by a Historical Commission composed of State Historians of the 13 Confederate States. The figures of these generals are sketched in the group in the position they will occupy.

All figures in the general group are in motion so that there is a great deal of life given to the carving and when the monument is carved in the side of the mountain they will appear to be riding across it.

Mr. Lukeman explained that the group was designed so as to fit the previous work done and will necessitate no carving away of granite to make the mountain ready to receive it.

AMERICAN LEGION
POST ORGANIZED
IN WILLIAMSTON

Names Post for John W. Hassel, First Martin County Boy to Lose Life in Service

Williamston, Aug. 27.—The ex-service men of Martin county and Williamston at a meeting held last night in the Mayor's office, organized a local post of the American Legion, naming the post for John W. Hassel, the first Martin county boy to lose his life in the service.

Several out of town Legionnaires were on hand to assist with the organization of the Post, election of officers and the proper installation of same. Among those who were present were Captain W. C. Rodman, Messrs. Webster, Hodges, Jones and several others from Washington. Arthur B. Corey, First District Committeeman, from Greenville, and W. T. Acree, from Bethel, were also present and assisted in the organization of the Post. Much enthusiasm was shown by the local ex-service men, and there is no doubt but much good can be done by the banding together of these men who have already shown to their fellow-men that their patriotism is limited only by their life.

SCHLICHTERS MAY
ESCAPE PRISON BY
PAYING \$12,000

Sentenced This Week by Judge Dunn to Serve From Two to Five Years for Violating Banking Laws

Henderson, S. C., Aug. 27.—Arthur B. and Charles M. Schlichter, former president and cashier, respectively, of the defunct bank of Hollister, in Halifax county, may escape prison terms by paying to the bank's receiver \$12,000.

Found guilty last week of violating the state's banking laws, sentence was withheld until this week. A. B. Schlichter was sentenced by Judge Albion Dunn to serve three to five years in state's prison, while his son C. M. Schlichter was given a sentence of two to three years. The men were held responsible by the court for \$24,000 of the bank's funds and the sentences were suspended upon a payment of the money to the receivers for the institution.

\$12,000 was paid by them immediately after being sentenced and they were given until January 1927 to make good the balance.

Ku Klux Klan Holds
National Council at
Buckeye Lake, Ohio

Buckeye Lake, Ohio, Aug. 27.—A discussion centering around the subject of the right of peaceable assembly constituted the most important interest before State and Regional heads of the Ku Klux Klan, who are holding their National Council here. Other topics for discussion included "Separation of Church and State" and "Deportation of Criminal Aliens."

News of the meeting under the text of the resolution adopted yesterday is being despatched by an Imperial officer. He alone is empowered to tell of what goes on behind the carefully guarded doors. Under the resolution any other member that tells anything that happens at the meeting is threatened with banishment from the Klan.

Germany Will Be
Represented in the
Jurists Conference

Paris, Aug. 27.—Ambassador Von Hoesch today handed to Foreign Minister Briand Germany's reply to the French Security note. The reply agreed to continue its negotiations for a security pact and announces that Germany will be represented in the conference of Jurists to be held in London to consider the question.

M'LEAN CALLS A
SPECIAL TERM TO
TRY W. B. COLE

Richmond County Court Will Convene On September 28 to Try Cole on Charge of Murder; Judge Not Named

Raleigh, Aug. 27.—W. B. Cole, rich Rockingham mill owner, will be brought to trial for the murder of W. W. Ormond, former sweetheart of Cole's daughter, at a special term of the Richmond County Superior Court called by Governor McLean yesterday for the week beginning September 28. No judge has yet been designated by Governor McLean to preside over the term.

Governor McLean stated that he was not calling a special term for the trial of Cole but was merely complying with the statute and calling the term at the request of Judge P. A. McElroy and Solicitor Don Phillips.

"I will not designate any judge at the suggestion of either side," Governor McLean said, however, when asked about the Cole case. "I mean no reflection on Solicitor Phillips. I told him that I would not and he agrees with me."

Governor McLean stated that he has the highest regard for Judge T. J. Shaw, of Greensboro, who was suggested by Solicitor Phillips.

Judge M. V. Barnhill of Rocky Mount, is the only judge on the Superior Court bench who has a vacation week during the week beginning September 28. He has just finished five straight weeks of court and this week is the only vacant week for him between now and Christmas.

Governor McLean can appoint some lawyer from another county as an emergency judge to hold the term or he may call upon the emergency Judge Oliver H. Allen and Judge George H. Brown to hold the term. Judge William A. Hoke, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, was asked by the Governor yesterday if he could hold the term. Judge Hoke stated that he was afraid that on account of some treatment which he must take for his health he would not be able to do so.

Governor McLean expressed his regret that the former Chief Justice, who is now an emergency judge, could not hold the court. Solicitor Phillips originally requested that a special term be called for the week beginning September 21. James H. Pou, senior counsel for the defense, protested to the calling of the special term on the grounds that at that time he would be busy with the defense of Jesse Wyatt, former police captain here, who goes on trial at the September term of the Wake County Superior Court for the murder of Stephen S. Holt, prominent Smithfield attorney. The special term called yesterday will begin just one week before the regular October criminal term of the Richmond County Superior Court which convenes on October 5.

The Wyatt case in which Mr. Pou is engaged has been set for Tuesday of the second week of the September term of the Wake County Superior Court, which is September 22. Wyatt has already entered a plea of not guilty to the charges against him, but the trial of the case is expected to consume almost the entire week. Mr. Pou will have to leave Raleigh almost immediately after the Wyatt trial to take part in the defense of Cole.

Great popular interest is centered around the trial of Cole because of his wealth and standing in the community. Ormond, whom Cole killed, was an ex-service man and the son of a Methodist minister. Ormond and Miss Elizabeth Cole became sweethearts while Ormond's father, Rev. A. L. Ormond, of Nashville, was pastor of the Methodist Church in Rockingham. Bad blood developed between the two men which ultimately resulted in Cole's shooting Ormond to death while the latter sat in his Ford near Cole's office on the principal street of Rockingham on August 15.

A BILL NYE MEMORIAL

The dedication of a memorial window and tablet to Bill Nye yesterday in Fletcher, N. C., takes place on the seventy-fifth anniversary of his birth. It is almost thirty years since, after long service as a staff contributor to The World, Nye died near Asheville. The memorial is another evidence of the genuine hold gained upon American affections by the group which included Nye, Josh Billings, Orpheus C. Kerr, Petroleum V. Nasby and Artemus Ward. Except for Ward, their books are forgotten. Only an occasional witicism is remembered. Probably older readers alone will recall how Nye directed subscribers to the office of his journal, the Boomerang, "go down the alley, enter the stable, twist the gray mule's tail and immediately take the elevator;" or how he wrote from a New England lecture tour that "I wore a plug hat, but conversed freely with the common people." Yet the reputation of the group will long endure. Trained for the most part on the frontier—Nye was reared in Wisconsin and became a Wyoming editor—they expressed an elemental humor which was sane and racily American. The Ring Lardners of today are their direct heirs.—N. Y. World.

JAPANESE EXPERT WILL TEACH AMERICANS HOW TO EAT RICE

Tokyo.—Dr. K. Sugimoto, a rice expert attached to the Tokyo Nutrition Laboratory, one of the three special scholars of the Rockefeller Foundation said that one of his missions abroad would be to teach the people of the United States "how to eat rice." He has been making a special study of the nutritive value of rice for the past five years and has experimented on 30 persons.

Here it is: First, a picture that over fifteen million persons have seen must have something vital about it.

Second, an American picture that all nations have seen and applauded must have something fundamental about it.

Third, a picture that nine years after its production can pack the Great Capitol Theatre in New York with 74,000 persons in two weeks, and the vast Auditorium Theatre in Chicago with 107,000 persons in three weeks has something tremendously human about it.

Fourth, a picture that a President of the United States wept with, and that the Supreme Court of the United States cheered has something basically American about it.

Fifth, a picture that is crowding the theatres of the country with more millions a decade after its production has something important about it.

That is why I am once more offering the Americans of this city an opportunity to bring their families to see "The Birth of a Nation."

300 Acres Purchased for Proposed National Park in Western Car.

Asheville, Aug. 27.—(AP) Purchase of 300 acres of mountain land for presentation to the federal government to be used in the proposed national park in the Great Smoky Mountain area marks the beginning of a campaign to secure lands for the park.

Two hundred acres have been bought by the directors of the Asheville chamber of commerce, and announcement of this purchase was quickly followed by one stating that the Asheville Citizen had purchased 100 acres for the same purpose. Now civic organizations all the way from Asheville to Murphy, 116 miles away, are agitating the question of buying land for the park. And plans are being laid, it is said, for a statewide campaign.

The proposed park is expected to embrace about 1200 square miles, following the Great Smoky divide between Tennessee and North Carolina, and to contain within its borders mountain peaks having the highest average altitude anywhere in the east. It is said that it will also contain the largest single area of virgin timber in Eastern America.

The indifference, or opposition, which was at first manifest, has entirely disappeared throughout the western part of the state, it is said, and enthusiasm for the park is growing rapidly. Leading lumber companies operating the section are giving the plan their support, it is stated. Lumbermen are quoting as saying that there remains sufficient timber in western North Carolina, in addition to the area to be embraced by the park, to keep them busy many years.

The Great Smoky Mountain area is said to contain the greatest variety of wild flora and fauna anywhere in the Southeast, as well as striking scenic beauty. The average altitude of the section proposed for park purposes is said to exceed 6000 feet, many peaks running up even higher.

The subject of a national park in Eastern America has created wide interest throughout entire western North Carolina, and there has been much speculation, ever since the question began to be agitated, as to what location would be chosen. Natives of western North Carolina have contended for many months that the Great Smokies offer exceptional advantages for park purposes. The large stand of virgin forest, the wide variety and beauty of plants and flowers, and the fact that much of the land is not inhabited and is used only for timbering purposes are among the arguments advanced in favor of the Smoky Mountain area.
