Winston Churchill, as British Chancellor of the Exchequer, has reached a tentative agreement with France whereby the latter will pay 62 millions each year on its war debt to Britain. Senora Martinez del Rio, one of the richest and most beautiful women in Mexico City, has decided to enter the films. Hugh McQuillan, famous pitcher of the Giants, out of the game since a mix-up with his wife, has sued the New York team for \$4,338, his salary for the balance of the season. 
