## UNION SERVICE ON COURT HOUSE LAWN SUNDAY EVENING

"A Whole Life For Christ," Is Subject of Rev. L. E. Ballard in Last of a Series of Union Services

## Successful Week on Tobacco Market of South Carolina

(By R. W. McFarland).

Fairmont, N. C., Aug. 28.—The week just ended as a whole has been a very successful one for the farmers selling upon the auction markets of the entire South Carolina and border markets belt, and practically all the markets in this belt have had good sales in volume during the week. Fairmont, the "key market" of the belt, passed Friday evening the four million pound mark. By running "double headers" every day in the house having a "second sale," no block in sales has occurred thus far and the market has moved along like a piece of well greased machinery. The official figures up to Thursday night for the four days of the week are 1,056,234 pounds. Friday's sale they estimate from 250,000 to 300,000 pounds. Using the lowest estimate of 250,000 pounds for Friday, added to the official figures, its sales up to Friday night for the season are 4,015,734 pounds.

Average for the week \$21.98. Average for the season \$19.23. The warehousemen on this market state that only forty per-cent of the crop has been marketed, and if this be true the market will sell this season between nine and one-half ten million pounds. The market is very strong and active on all the good ripe types of tobacco. Very few wrappers have as yet shown up.

Both the Export and Imperial are buying this week more freely than at any time during the season and the Liggett & Myers Co., R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., Person-Garratt Co., W. T. Clark Co., China-American Tobacco Co., W. D. Thomas Tobacco Co., are still strong buyers.

It is expected that next week's sales will be still larger on this market.

## BOY SCOUTS TO TAKE A TRAFFIC CENSUS HERE NEXT TUESDAY

Highways Leading to City Will Be Checked in Effort to Ascertain Number of Visitors

Boy Scouts of Greenville will take a traffic census on all roads leading into the city on Tuesday, September 1st, which is the opening date of the local tobacco market. The purpose of this census is to get both an accurate count of the number of people attending the opening of the local market and to find out the how much traffic comes over the city, a large congregation is anticipated.

Troop One will take care of the Ayden and Farmville roads, Troop Two will check traffic on the Falkland road while the Silver Fox Patrol, the Battleaxe Patrol and the Panther Patrol all of Troop Three will check the Washington, Cox Mill and Bethel roads respectively. Taking of the census will be supervised by the Senior Patrol Leaders, Billy Brown of Troop One, Jack Tripp of Troop Two, Jake Skinner of Troop Three and Scoutmaster H. L. Macklen of Troop One who is connected with the County Highway Commission.

Considerable interest in this census has been shown by local men for the estimates of the number attending the opening of the local market in the past have been greatly varied to say the least. The motto of the Boy Scouts is "Do A Good Turn Daily" and in the taking of this census the Scouts are trying to do a Good Turn to Greenville and the surrounding community.

Winston Churchill, as British Chancellor of the Exchequer, has reached a tentative agreement with France whereby the latter will pay 62 millions each year on its war debt to Britain. ## SWEETHEART HELD FOR QUESTIONING DEATH OF FLYERS

Bodies of Schlegel, "Flying Bootlegger" and Harry Berzman, Gangster, Found Near Chicago Yesterday

Chicago, Aug. 29.—Pauline Livingston, pretty 24 year old former Nashville, Tenn., stenographer and sweetheart of Irvin Schlegel, "the flying bootlegger," was held today for questioning in connection with the finding of the bodies of Schlegel and Harry Herman, a gangster, near here yesterday.

Valuable jewels in her possession, some of which she said Schlegel had given her, were seized for checking against lists of stolen goods to determine whether any were profits in Schlegel's robbery and safe-blowing activities. Search of her apartment revealed no clues to the solving of the slaying or any traces of loot, which the police believe Schlegel had hidden. While investigators worked on the theory that the players were rival bootleggers, they also gave credence to a story that the killing resulted from a plot to steal a big army plane from Ashburn field. Armed guards watching the plane said no attempt at theft had been made.

A telephone message from Florence, S. C., to Mrs. R. Williams today announced that her brother, Mr. R. B. Jarvis, died suddenly this morning at 1:50 o'clock aboard a train enroute from his home in Sanford, Fla., to Greenville where he was to visit Mrs. Williams and other relatives.

The message gave no particulars other than that he died as the train neared Florence. Death was evidently due to heart failure as he was apparently in good health.

Richard Bronson Jarvis was born in this city on December 13, 1874, being the second child of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Jarvis. He was married August 19, 1908, to Miss Mary W. Tyree, of Leland, Fla. During the years spent here he won a host of friends.

Leaving Sanford, Fla., yesterday he was scheduled to reach Greenville at the noon train today. News of his sudden death was a great shock to his loved ones and friends.

The deceased is survived by his wife, two sister, Mrs. R. Williams, of this city, and Mrs. J. F. Komp, of High Point, one brother Mr. J. B. Jarvis, of New York.

## AUGUST TERM OF CIVIL COURT HERE CLOSED FRIDAY

Docket Cleared of Several Cases During the Five-Days' Session; Criminal Court Next Week

Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of civil cases, Judge Bond presiding, closed yesterday after a five days session. Criminal court, Judge Albion Dunn presiding, will convene Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

The following civil actions were disposed of:

A judgment of \$715 was awarded the defendant in the suit of T. H. Bowen and wife against L. F. Worthington. Bowen and wife contended that they had paid Worthington a note which was due him, while Worthington contended that he was still due the amount involved in the note. Two days were required to dispose of the case.

Arceny Moye vs. Morris Moye, Isaac Gardner vs. Sallie Gardner, Rose Moore vs. Jarvis Moore; Fannie Barrow vs. Sam Barrow were granted absolute divorces.

The court nonsuited the plaintiff in the suit of J. A. Griffin vs. S. A. Eure and others on a materialism lien.

M. G. Moye, voluntarily nonsuited his suit against the Pitt County Highway Commission for damages to his property.

The case of the Patsapo Guano Company vs. Meeks Merchantile Co., was nonsuited.

The jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant in the suit of Hopkins Tailoring Company against the Ayden Tailoring Company.

## Charges Al Smith With Beamirching William R. Hurst

New York, Aug. 29.—Mayor Hylan, accused by Governor Smith of "blind subservience to a super boss," charges the Governor with beamirching William R. Hurst, "the man who helped him enter the executive mansion at Albany."

The mayor replied over the municipal radio station last night to Governor Smith's initial speech in his primary campaign. In attempts to discuss Mr. Hurst, the mayor denied the governor's charges that he had conferred with Klan Republicans during the last Democratic National Convention.

"The governor," said the mayor "forgets the time when Tammany's greatest leader, Charles F. Murphy, convinced that Alfred E. Smith, as a candidate for Governor, would not have a chance in the world of being elected in 1913, appealed to me through another to see Mr. Hurst and urge him to have his newspaper support Mr. Smith's candidacy."

"Mr. and Mrs. Smith went to Mr. Hurst home and enjoyed Mr. Hurst's hospitality. In addition Mr. Hurst gave him his promise of support, and supported him in his newspapers, and Mr. Smith was elected when he would not have been, as Mr. Murphy admitted, without the help of Mr. Hurst."

"Mr. Smith has conveniently forgotten this, preferring now to beamirch the man who helped him enter the Executive Mansion at Albany."

"But Mr. Hurst has not changed. He is the same battler for the right of the masses and of all, and he has never asked any public office to do more than give a good government, an honest government, and a humane government."

Governor Smith continuing his campaign in behalf of state Senator Walker at the Tammany ticket last night referred to Mayor Hurst and said "the Mayor is the past grand master of the order of insinuation and innuendo."

## DEBT COMMISSION SETS GOAL CLEANUP WAR DEBT FUNDING

Wants Everything Cleared Up in Time for Action by the Next Session of Congress

Washington, Aug. 29.—The American Debt Commission has set a goal of cleaning up all war debt funding in time for action by the next session of Congress and to that end has made new progress in bringing the remainder of the smaller debtors to the point of negotiation.

With promise of action already given on the two larger loans yet unfunded, those of France and Italy, officials here believe the positive stand now taken to speed up action by the smaller war time borrowers will enable them to wind up the entire business of debt funding during the coming winter.

The first fruits of the new pressure being brought upon the smaller debtors is the information that Czechoslovakia, after plain notices from the United States that it desires such action without undue delay, will shortly send over its debt funding commission. The Greek government also has authorized its Minister here to open negotiations.

With an agreement near with Latvia and informal exchanges underway with some time with Estonia, and with action expected from Romania and Yugoslavia, and Liberia, the list of smaller debtors, whose obligations are yet unfunded, is completed. The Russian debt of more than a quarter of a billion dollars has virtually been written off as uncollectable and the relatively small debt of Armenia also does not figure in the program.

## Will Investigate Indictment of Walter L. Choen

Washington, Aug. 29.—Assistant Secretary Andrews has ordered special agents of the custom's service to start an immediate investigation of conditions in New Orleans, which resulted in the indictment of Walter L. Choen, negro collector of the port there, who with several others has been charged with conspiracy under the prohibition laws. The Assistant Secretary added he had telegraphed instructions to the agents to make a thorough inquiry and to report to him at the earliest moment. In the meantime Choen will be allowed to continue in office.

Mr. Andrews explained however that should the agents report disclosing corrupt circumstances Choen probably would be suspended. He added that his action would depend entirely on reports from the Federal Representatives and that thus far no official word on the incident had been received.

## RELATIONS TO BE RESUMED BETWEEN ENGLAND, MEXICO

Relations Were Severed in 1924 and Announcement of Resumption Creates Considerable Excitement

Mexico City, Aug. 29.—Announcement of resumption of diplomatic relations between Mexico and Great Britain, which had been suspended since June 1924, has created considerable excitement in Mexico. ## OPERATORS AND MINERS AGREE AS TO MAINTENANCE

The Mine Mule Expected to Forecast Whether Suspension Will Be Long or Short

Philadelphia, Aug. 29.—The mine mule in the next 48 hours is expected to forecast whether the anthracite suspension, which goes into effect Monday at midnight, is to be long or short. If mules are brought to the surface for the shut down, it will signify belief that the mines will be closed a considerable time. If mules remain below, sentiment will accordingly be seen to favor brief duration. Mules are to be brought to the surface in expectation of a long suspension in part of district one, the largest of the three union districts advice from Wilkesbarre says.

Shamokin, Pennsylvania, the head quarter of district nine report on the other hand, that mules there are to be left under ground unless there are stronger indications that Operators and miners have agreed, after a 24 hour deadlock, on terms of employment for the 10,000 maintenance men, who will remain in the mines to prevent flooding caves, and deterioration.

"In view of the present situation, the committee strongly recommends that the operators maintain a firm stand for arbitration of the present differences to prevent a recurrence, or interruptions such as the one about to start."

"It believes that any settlement effected should be of a permanent nature providing for a readjustment of a wage scale from time to time to allow prices for our product that will enable it to move freely in competition with other fuel."

The miners sentiment charged Inglis' proposal as calling for "a contract in perpetuity and for a sliding scale of wages." Both are held to be impossible. Miners in the anthracite regions already are moving their tools from the pit. Central Pennsylvania soft coal producers, meeting in Philadelphia, have laid plans to rush into the breach to be caused by anthracite suspension with an output of 5,000,000 tons of highly volatile bituminous monthly.

Philadelphia, Aug. 29.—Trusted Lieutenant's of both anthracite operators and miners began their departure today to take posts in the firing line in advance of the mine suspension ordered by the unions for Monday midnight. Activities slackened up on both sides for the weekend and advises from the anthracite region indicated that to some extent the walkout of the 158,000 mine workers already is underway.

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**OUR SATURDAY NIGHT  
MEDITATION**

"Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves  
together, as the manner of some is,"  
Hebrews 10:25.

I.  
"As the manner of some is,"—then  
neglect of attendance at Divine Service is not  
a new or a modern thing, but one of the old  
evils that crept into the Church even in the  
days of the Apostles.

The first disciples started out well. "They  
continued steadfastly in the Apostles' doc-  
trine and fellowship, and in prayers"—  
and they continued "daily with one accord in  
the Temple."

"The roseate hues of early dawn,  
How swift they pass away."

That wonderfully beautiful picture of a  
united and worshipful Church did not last  
long. In a few years it had become "the  
manner"—the habit, the custom—  
"of some" to absent themselves from the  
regular gatherings of the Believers; and the  
writer to the Hebrews points to them as ex-  
amples we should shun.

It would be an interesting research to ask  
of those "some" what influences had been  
brought to bear on their conduct; what tem-  
ptations had led them astray. We would very  
much like to know the cause of the quarrel  
between those two Christian women, Euodius  
and Syntyche, which ruined the usefulness of  
both in the Church at Philippi. Or, what  
changed the Colossian convert, Demas, when  
he reached the Imperial City of Rome, so that  
St. Paul wrote of him, "Demas hath forsaken  
us, having loved this present world."

But it will be more practical if we ask, of  
our own experience and knowledge, why  
"some"—why so many—"forsake  
the assembling" of themselves from the Ser-  
vices of the Church to-day, and if we are  
among them.

We shall find many excuses, and perhaps  
some true reasons. Excuses are always  
trivial and artificial. They are intended to  
deceive. They are "veiled lies." Like many  
manufactured articles they are made of shod-  
dy; slippery and intangible material. You  
can argue with a reason. You must stab an  
excuse; and if you do, you will find it is as  
hollow a pretence as the empty eye-sockets of

the fish that swim in the Cimmerian gloom of  
the underground lakes in the Mammoth Caves  
of Kentucky.

1. One of the excuses heard to-day for non-  
Church-going is: "The Church is for the  
rich and not for the poor. It always sides  
with the oppressor against the oppressed."  
Of course, this is a lie.

Ever since the Blessed Virgin sang the  
"Magnificat"—"He hath filled the hungry  
with good things; and the rich He hath sent  
away"; ever since our Lord read the Scrip-  
ture Lesson in the Synagogue at Nazareth:—  
"The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because  
He hath anointed Me to preach the Gospel to  
the poor;" the crowning glory of the  
Church has been that it is the most democra-  
tic of all the institutions the world has ever  
known! The people do not exist for the  
Church, but the Church exists for the people.  
Its organization is for social service—to help  
all men to live in the love and service of  
God. Every page of History witnesses to the  
fact that even in the Dark Ages, the true  
Church has fought and bled to maintain its  
democratic character; and anyone who today  
says "The Church is only for the rich," is con-  
victed by History of being an ignoramus.

2. Another excuse made is: "Church  
members are inconsistent. They do not live  
up to their professions. They are a set of  
hypocrites. We would rather do business  
with men of the world than with members of  
Churches. 'If you want a shark, go to the  
bay of the Church!'"

We may admit with sorrow that no one of  
us is as good as he might—as he ought to be—  
but that is no valid reason for Church ab-  
senteeism. There is no easier way, or more  
conclusive, of showing a stick to be crooked  
than by laying a straight stick alongside it.  
If this absentee is sincere he will come into  
the Church and try to set it right, rather  
than to hide, like a coward, behind the weak-  
ness of men.

3. We have heard it said that some do not  
attend Church because of the length of the  
Sermons. It is quite possible that a preacher  
may be like a camel—go a long way before  
he knows how dry he is! But it is a silly  
excuse after all. Three times a day, seven  
days to a week, we spend thirty minutes to  
feed and replenish the body. Six hundred  
and thirty minutes to keep up the body which  
will soon return to dust; yet thirty minutes is  
too long for the education and development  
of the immortal soul! There is something  
radically wrong with anyone who feels thus.  
It is evident they think more of this life which  
is transitory than of the life to come which  
is eternal.

4. The last excuse we shall notice is, "The  
Church is always begging for money." Of  
course it is. O wise Solon, can you tell me  
how any Church can function without fin-  
ances? True, the Gospel is free: "without  
money and without price." But the messenger  
must be fed and clothed, and "the workman  
is worthy of his hire." The snw on the  
mountain-top is free: but the pipe that con-  
veys the water of life to the thirsty in the  
city below costs money.

Besides, how much do you really give? The  
Jews gave ten per cent of all they possessed.  
If every Christian would give as generously  
as did the Jews, the Church would never need  
to beg. Its coffers would be full, and ample  
to meet all its needs.

Paris.—The memory of Louis Brail-  
le, the blind French servant who in-  
vented the system of raised point uni-  
versally used in the printing of books  
for the sightless, is to be perpetuated  
by the permanent Blind Relief  
War Fund changing its name to Amer-  
ican Braille Press for War and Civil-  
ian Blind.

This is an American corporation, is  
supported entirely by American funds,  
and its directors are all Americans.  
The printed matter for the blind is pro-  
duced by the society solely in France,  
but the output goes to all parts of the  
world.

The fund was organized during the  
war for the relief of soldiers and  
sailors who had lost their sight in  
fighting for the Allies. For two  
years the work has been entirely con-  
fined to printing books for the blind  
under the personal supervision of its  
president William Nelson Cromwell, of  
New York and Paris.

**PRESIDENTIAL PALACE  
AT TIMES WAS LIKE  
PRISON TO EBERT**

Berlin.—The late Friedrich Ebert  
did not always feel exalted in his  
position as president of the German  
Republic. An incident illustrating  
how the president felt at times is  
related in the diaries and memorirs  
of the late Minna Cauer, woman  
leader.

While visiting the President, Mr.  
Ebert complained that he never was  
able, in his position, to follow his  
own inclination, that he never could  
get away from himself.

"Circumspection, calmness and  
moderation in all things are three ob-  
ligations my position entails," he  
said.

"How do you feel, Mr. President,  
when you look back into the past  
from your splendid executive man-  
sion and this beautiful park?" Min-  
na Sauer asked.

"As in a prison," the first German  
president replied in a voice charged  
with emotion.

**AMUNDSEN'S BOOK  
REJECTED BY HIS  
GERMAN PUBLISHER**

Munich.—Roald Amundsen's lat-  
est book has been declined by the  
explorer's former publishers in Mun-  
ich. The manuscript was rejected  
because "Amundsen severed all con-  
nections with the German nation  
when, during the war, he returned his  
honorary membership of German so-  
cieties." The publishers in their  
statement conclude: "Not until  
Amundsen has made proper amends  
for his offensive behavior to Ger-  
many, the result of misrepresenta-  
tions by the anti-German press, will  
this firm consent to publish any  
more of his works."

Amundsen is scheduled to deliver  
a series of lectures in Berlin prior  
to sailing in September for Ameri-  
ca.

**Cotton Letter**  
What is the "bug-bear" which has so frightened those interested in cotton that they can no longer have confidence in optimistic thought concerning its value? Certainly the fear of a carry-over of three million bales cannot account for this strange phenomenon when 40 cents was freely paid with existing carry-overs of from six to nine million. It can certainly not be the fear of a yield from the growing crop of a few hundred thousand bales greater than the world's consumptive capacity, as measured by those whose vision a twelve-month back predicted 1,500,000 less than the figures recently published by Col. Hester.

Is there any reason to expect the consumers of the world to hold back their purchases when their financial condition is at the highest peak of ten years? After all, the present absence of interest in cotton is strangely at variance with the most spectacular industrial development of the generation; to say nothing of the optimistic view concerning almost, if not every other, commodity.

We are not among those who believe cotton is doomed to lower prices. We believe that we are close to a realization by the Trade that Cotton, relatively, is cheap, and we believe that with this realization will come optimism and with optimism the courage to acquire, which always accompanies it.—Hedgpeth & Co.

### SPITZBERGEN PEOPLE LIVE IN COMFORTABLE HOMES

Barentsburg, Green Harbor, Spitzbergen. — Travelers who imagine Spitzbergen to be inhabited by a few rough trappers and seal hunters, living on raw blubber in wretched hovels, are agreeably surprised at the comforts and even luxuries enjoyed at the different administration buildings at Barentsburg, Longyear City and Ny Alesund.

These local headquarters of the different coal companies are veritable havens of refuge to the few visitors who lack the comforts of the tourist steamers which run up to these ports during Spitzbergen's brief summer season, between July 15 and August 15.

There is no field here for the "drummer." All supplies are provided by the coal companies, and may be obtained at reasonable prices fixed for the common benefit by the company administrators.

Here in Barentsburg, all the houses which are of wood, as they are elsewhere in Spitzbergen, look trim and freshly painted. The local director's house, high up the mountain side, is easily the finest in the archipelago.

Steam-heated, with double doors and windows, music and billiard rooms, a well-stocked library, priceless furs on polished floors and old Dutch masters on the walls, Dresselhuys' far northern home appears as if it might have been bodily transplanted from the finest residential quarters of The Hague or Amsterdam.

### FORMER HEAD OF DISCOUNT BANK TO FACE FIFTH TRIAL

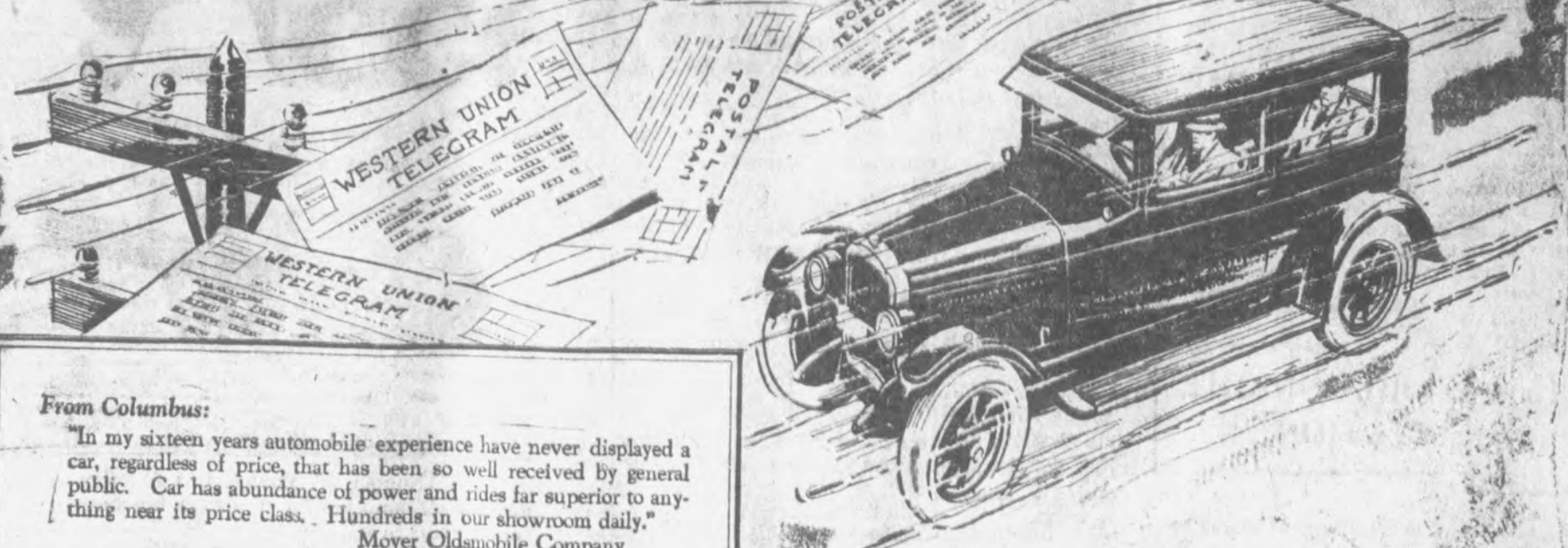
Cleveland. — Josiah Kirby, who faced four juries on charges growing out of the collapse of the Cleveland Discount Company, which he organized virtually singlehanded, will go to trial here again on a federal indictment charging use of the mails to defraud.

Twice juries that sat in judgment on Kirby disagreed and twice he was acquitted. In each case it was said that the defendant "sold himself" to the juries, it being freely admitted that the same personal magnetism and "super-salesmanship" which lifted Kirby from a penniless stranger in Cleveland to the head of the \$40,000,000 concern, helped to convince the jurors that he was innocent of the charge made against him.

Kirby has started in business in California, while the discount company is being reorganized by the receivers. The company was established in 1918 and \$14,000,000 of its preferred stock was sold throughout the state. Shortly after the company purchased the Rockefeller Building, the name of which was changed to Cleveland Discount Company Building, which it still bears.

Although French newspapers as a whole support women's right in general, the attempt by women journalists to obtain the right of joining the press club has been steadily frustrated off years. The question came before a general meeting of the club and the admission of women was defeated 78 votes against 48.

Dublin.—The Free State Army has 27 battalions of infantry, and it is now proposed that they shall be named after the most famous of the Irish clans, "O'Byrnes, MacMahons, O'Neills and others."  
There are enough clan names to go around, and it is urged that the new titles would encourage patriotic ideals among the soldiers. It is also proposed that some units should bear the names of great Irishmen of the past from Sarsfield to Collins.

Rollins College to Have Her Strongest Football Schedule

Winter Park, Fla., Aug. 29.—(AP) Rollins College will open her 19th year of intercollegiate football as the only member of the Southern Intercollegiate Association in Florida, and with one of the strongest schedules in her history. The Rollins "Tars" will be coached by Howard Talmann, thrice all-American football man.

Mississippians to Play N. C. During the Coming Season

Hattiesburg, Miss., Aug. 29.—(AP) The nine game football schedule that faces the State Teacher's College here reveals that the Mississippians will play no North Carolina college during the season.  
When practice begins on September 7, more than 40 men, including 10 last year men, are expected to report for practice. Old players expected back include Tucker, fullback; "Hi" Ferrell, halfback; Carter, guard; Wheeler, guard; "Doc" Johnson, tackle; Tally, quarterback; Felts, halfback and end; Blackwell, guard; and Ray Miller halfback.

Florida to Play N. C. 11 Oct. 24th

Gainesville, Fla., Aug. 29.—(AP) Florida's schedule contains a single game with a North Carolina eleven Wake Forest on October 24, here.  
Although Florida lost eight of her most brilliant players with the last season, Florida boosters are counting upon one of the fastest tenor the entire South. An even dozen dependable players are expected to return this season.

TAXES REVEAL ATHLETIC GROWTH ON WEST COAST

Los Angeles.—Rex Goodcell, collector of internal revenue, recently announced figures that show noteworthy progress during the last five years in the development of athletic activities in Southern California.  
The compilations revealed that there are 69 country and golf clubs in operation in this district, tax collectors from which amounted to \$545,887 during the fiscal year of 1924-25, as compared with \$179,183 in 1920, an increase of \$375,704, or 220 per cent. A 27 per cent gain over the fiscal year of 1924 was shown.  
Other amusements likewise increased in popularity. Indoor sports such as afforded by billiard and bowling halls and shooting galleries showed gains ranging from 25 to 46 per cent in 1925 over 1924. Riding academies increased 24 per cent and collections of tax on yachts and other pleasure craft advanced 107 per cent.

ITALIAN AUTHORITIES BAFLED BY MUMIFICATION OF WOMAN

Naples.—A striking example of the mummification of a human body by natural processes has been discovered at Natolia, in the province of Salerno, with the exhumation of the body of a local resident, Rosa Scarpa, who died in 1912. The body was found to be in a perfect state of preservation, even her clothes were in a sort of petrified condition, but retained their original colors.  
Thinking the mummification process might have been due to peculiar chemical qualities of the soil, the authorities ordered the opening of an adjacent grave, but the corpse in the latter grave had completely decomposed. This, therefore, led to the belief among devout natives that a miracle had been wrought.

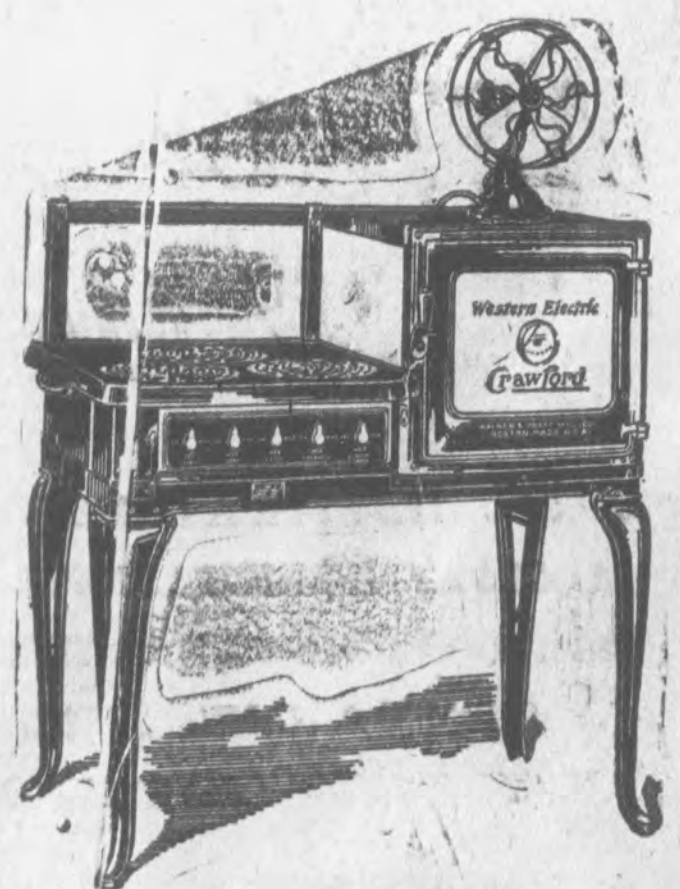

## TOKYO'S LOWER CLASSES SUFFER FROM THE IN- DUSTRIAL DEPRESSION

Tokyo.—The condition of the school children in the slum quarters of Tokyo recently has been attracting the attention of the newspapers. Owing to the industrial depression, the poverty of the lower classes is becoming more and more pronounced. It is said that hundreds of children attending the Temahime, Man'en and Hayashi primary schools have been going without lunch daily because of lack of funds. The teachers, learning of the situation, have been soliciting funds to provide the youngsters with food.

## PHONETIC SIMILARITY CAUSES CONFUSION IN TWO TOWNS

Amsterdam.—Confusion of the town names, Bayreuth, in Germany, with Beirut in Asia Minor, which led recently to erroneous reports that the Dutch government had decided to establish a consulate in Bayreuth instead of Beirut, recalled to the Algemeen Handelsblad that the two names had been confused once before in 1871.

On the latter occasion, the Oriental city was somewhat surprised to receive at the time a specially constructed machine which had been intended to animate a dragon in the Siegfried performance of "The Ring," in the Wagner festival at Bayreuth. The machine had been made by an English firm and as Bayreuth was a small and little-known town a shipping clerk through an error had been made in the spelling and that such a complicated bit of machinery could only be intended for Beirut.
