

MURDERER ON TRIAL FOR LIFE TODAY

Block On Local Tobacco Market Now Cleared Up

**549,358 POUNDS
WEED SOLD TUES.
AVERAGE \$14.65**

Sales Blocked On Opening Day With More Than Three Quarters of a Million Pounds of Tobacco on the Floors; All Sales Finish Today By Mid Afternoon

With more than three quarters of a million pounds of tobacco on the floors of the local auction warehouses for the opening sales of the 1925 season yesterday 549,358 pounds of the weed were disposed of for a total of \$79,036.81 or an average of \$14.65 per one hundred pounds according to figures made public this morning by Mr. K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade. The above total is for the three warehouses where sales were completed and does not include approximately 50,000 pounds sold in the house where the sales blocked.

The grades offered on yesterday's sales were the poorest as a whole ever seen on the local market and the price was favorable in comparison to the average of \$16.85 on the opening sale last season taking into consideration the grades of the offerings.

No large amount of tobacco came in for today's sales and all sales were completed by mid afternoon. Farmers who witnessed the sales yesterday and today expressed satisfaction at the prices paid. Warehousemen here are setting fifty million pounds as a goal for this season and in view of the wide territory being served no doubt the goal will be reached. Prices today showed more strength and the offerings appeared to be of a better quality.

Negro and Three White Men Injured in Auto Accident Near Here

Heber Dunn, negro, is in St. Frances Hospital suffering from injuries to his head and body, while Joe Smith, Jesse Cox and Raymond Smith, white men are suffering minor injuries which they received today when an automobile, driven by Dunn, and of which the other men were occupants, was overturned on the Washington-Greenville highway about 4 miles east of this city.

According to information Dunn was attempting to take a curve when he lost control of the car, overturning same. Among the wreckage was found fragments of whiskey containers and it is alleged that Dunn was driving while in an intoxicated condition.

Negro Receives "Knock Out" Which Ends Dispute

Andrew Paramel, negro, is in the St. Frances hospital, suffering from injuries to his head which he received yesterday morning when he was struck by a piece of scrap timber in the hands of Roosevelt Murphy, negro. Murphy is being held in the city jail pending the outcome of Paramel's injuries.

Both negroes are employees of the Imperial Tobacco factory and Paramel received his "knockout" as the culmination of a dispute between the two negroes.

Attending physicians feel confident that Paramel will recover.

GREAT ANXIETY IS FELT FOR SAFETY OF FLAG PLANE

PN-9 Number 1, On Non-Stop Flight Runs Out of Fuel; Believed to Have Been Forced to Land Near Hawaii

Honolulu, Sept. 2. — (AP) Five men in a disabled sea plane drenched with tropical rains and hemmed in by tropical night in the mid Pacific such was the picture painted here today of the unfortunate end of the attempted non-stop navy sea plane flight from San Francisco to Honolulu. This gloomy view of the predicament of Commander John Rodgers, and his four aviators was based on official reports received last night from ships in the path of the big sea plane, PN-9, No. 1. The reports all yielded the same definite fact, that the aviators were lost and could not be located in the darkness. Throughout the night, however, plans for rescue of the aviators, should they be found alive, were brought to completion.

The island of Maui, nearest the Hawaii group to the point on which the plane was believed to have dropped into the Pacific, was designated as the rescue base. Air Plane, submarine and surface ships were ordered to start at day break on systematic search over that territory between the 21 and 23 parallels of latitude, and the 153 and 155 Meridians of longitude.

The PN-9, No. 1, with her sister sea plane PN-9, No. 3, left San Francisco Monday afternoon on a scheduled non stop flight to Pearl Harbor, Oahu. The number 3 plane gave up 300 miles outside of the golden gate because of mechanical difficulties, and the number one ship continued the flight.

Ten ships of the United States Navy had been assigned definite positions on the line of the flight and ship after ship was passed and attainment of the Pearl Harbor objective seemed only a matter of hours. Rising winds however, retarded the speed of the ship and forced extravagant use of the carefully rationed gasoline. Tuesday, shortly after noon, in Honolulu, Commander Rodgers radioed that his fuel was running low and two hours later after a number of messages saying it would be forced to land on the ocean, the sea plane radio was silenced.

By that time rain was falling steadily in the vicinity of the sea plane, and the ships which started out to rescue the stranded aviators found themselves hampered by the coming of night and lack of definite bearings showing the location of the lost plane. Navy officials expressed confidence that Commander Rodgers would do everything possible to save his ship and men, but admitted their anxiety of weather conditions.

THREE NAVAL SEA PLANES LEAVE TO LOOK FOR MISSING FLAG PLANE

STATE FEDERAL EMPLOYMENT BUREAU MOVED TO RALEIGH

Charlotte, Sept. 2. — Transfer of the State Federal Employment Bureau from Charlotte to Raleigh, was announced here today by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, and Director of the State Employment Bureau. The transfer is the outcome of difficulties between Mr. Grist and city officials following the removal by the State Commissioner of the man in charge of the Charlotte office and the appointment of someone who was not favored by the city officials. The city withdrew its support from the office and Mr. Grist announced he would remove it at once.

Full responsibility for the closing of the office here was placed by Mr. Grist upon the city administrators in a formal statement issued today. He said that the city officials had failed to co-operate in the undertaking. Floyd E. Walters, Superintendent of the Charlotte office will be transferred to the central office at Raleigh, where he will act as special agent in placing groups of laborers, the director added.

Prisoner Serves One Sentence Steps Back Into Hands of Law

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 2. — (AP) Having satisfied the law on one count, George Remus, bootlegger convicted, who is reputed to have made millions of dollars on wholesale liquor transactions sometime today was to step from the massive walls of the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary and back into the hands of the law. Three officers from Ohio were waiting to escort the Cincinnati capitalists to Dayton where serving of a year and a day in the Ohio prison awaited him for violation of the state prohibition law.

Dry Enforcement Functioning Under Re-Organized Forces

Charlotte, Sept. 2. — Prohibition enforcement in the Carolinas and Georgia today was functioning under re-organized forces as outlined by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Andrews, in his recent nation-wide campaign against liquor.

Ben C. Sharpe, prohibition director for the three states with headquarters here, yesterday announced the personnel of his staff which will begin work at once. Director Sharpe did not indicate whether Arthur B. Coltrane, former North Carolina Prohibition Chief, would be attached to his headquarters in the future.

ANTHRACITE REGION FEELS AFTERMATH OF MINE SUSPENSION

Business Paralysis Has Begun to Creep Down the Rails of the Roads Carrying Coal; 10,000 Railroad Employees to Be Out of Jobs

Philadelphia, Sept. 2. — (AP) The Anthracite region today began to feel the aftermath of the mine suspension, which for 24 hours has padlocked its basic industry and demobilized an army of 148,000 bread winners.

The business paralysis which the ten anthracite counties face indefinitely, began to creep down the rails of the roads carrying its coal. Out bound tonnage is practically cleared up and on its way to market. Inevitable orders for shut down of shop and lay off of shop men, car repairers, and train crews on mine runs, have begun to be issued.

Predictions that at least 10,000 railroad men would follow the miners into idleness by the end of the week because of the suspension, appeared justified in reports that Scranton, Penn., alone would have that many unemployed railroad men. The Delaware and Hudson railroad has announced the prospective lay off of 12,000 train men and the Lehigh Valley and other heavy tonnage roads are expected to issue similar announcements soon.

Union leaders of the three districts are engaged in smoothing out differences developing in connection with the work of the 10,000 maintenance men remaining in the mines by agreement with the operators. A noticeable movement of mine workers setting out in search of work in other fields developed today. Special excursion trains on various roads carried quotas of foragers as well as pleasure seekers.

Producers of smokeless coal in Central Pennsylvania, Maryland and Northern West Virginia are meeting here today to review plans they have announced for invading anthracite merchants and also for protection against freight rates, which they state will favor West Virginia non-union operators after October 15, which were recently granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

TO SEEK RAILROAD CONSOLIDATION FOR PERIOD SEVEN YRS.

Legislation to Force Consolidation Effecting Period of Seven Years in Next Session of Congress

Swampscott, Sept. 2. — (AP) Legislation to force railroad consolidation effecting a period of seven years will be sought by the administration in the next session of Congress.

Amendment of the Esch-Cummings act to this effect was agreed upon today at a conference between President Coolidge and Senator Watson, Republican of Indiana, and chairman of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee.

Senator Watson agreed with the President that approval of the Van Sweringen consideration scheme now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission, would clear the way for numerous consolidation. (Please Turn to Page Four)

TRAFFIC CENSUS SHOWS 8000 VEHICLES ENTERED AND LEFT CITY TUESDAY

The movement of traffic into and out of this city yesterday totaled more than eight thousand vehicles according to the traffic census taken by local troops of the Boy Scouts between the hours of six a. m. and six p. m. Automobiles composed about 75 per cent of the traffic while trucks and animal drawn vehicles about evenly divided the remaining 25 per cent. The bulk of the incoming traffic was during the morning hours and the outgoing traffic in the afternoon.

The incoming traffic according to the check up included 3,334 automobiles, 237 trucks and 449 animal drawn vehicles bringing the total incoming traffic to 4,020 vehicles. The outgoing included 3,194 automobiles, 243 trucks and 440 animal drawn vehicles or a total of 3,877. These totals bring the total traffic movement to 8,047 vehicles during the twelve hours which does not by any means include all the vehicles in this city yesterday many having entered before the hour when the check was begun and others not leaving the city until long after the checking had

ceased.

IMPORTANT FACTS FOR PARENTS AND PUPILS OF SCHOOLS

Supt. J. H. Rose Again States Registration Hours and Tells Where Pupils of Different Schools Are to Meet

On Friday morning Sept. 4, at the Evans Street School from nine o'clock until twelve, there will be the registration of all first grade children who have not already been registered, also the registration of all children entering grades 2 to 7 inclusive for the first time in the Greenville Schools. Miss Keeter, the principal of the Intermediate and Evans Street Schools, Miss McClelland, the principal of the Model School, and Mrs. Vincent the principal of the West Greenville School will be present at the registration.

At this same time, the principals of these schools will give out book lists to any members of the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades who care to call for them. This is something new. But it is being done this year so that some of the Monday's rush at the bookstore can be avoided. The school principals are very anxious for most of the members of these grades, four to seven inclusive, to get their books this week and bring them to school Monday.

Parents are urged to keep in mind the following:

First: All the sixth and seventh grades of the city will meet Monday in the old high school building.

Second: All children, grades 1 to 5 inclusive, in the West Greenville school zone will report to the West Greenville School Monday.

Third: All children, grades 1 to 5 inclusive, in the Evans Street and Model schools zone will report to these schools as follows: All children who attended the Evans Street School last year will report back to the Evans Street School, all children who attended the Model School last year will report back to the Model School this year, with the exception that those children who attended the Annex at the Model School will report this year to the Evans Street School.

Cooper's Appeal to Be Heard Richmond Term October 3rd

Wilmington, Sept. 2. — (AP) The appeal of W. B. Cooper, former lieutenant governor of North Carolina, who was recently convicted on charges of violating the national banking laws and sentenced to serve 18 months in the Atlanta penitentiary, before the circuit court of appeals will be heard in Richmond at the term beginning October 3.

This is the information contained in a letter received here from H. H. Ford, deputy clerk of the U. S. district court of East Carolina. W. B. Cooper, and his brother, Thomas E. Cooper, were convicted at a special term of federal court some time ago, and the latter, sentenced to serve three years in the Atlanta prison, began his sentence last February.

Case of Slayer of Dr. H. P. Moseley Called At 3:30 O'Clock This Afternoon; Grand Jury Returns True Bill Against Dick Habourn for Killing Bonnie Lee Wilkerson and Robert Cooper

At 3:30 o'clock this afternoon in the Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases, Frank Frizzelle, negro, who on the night of Aug. 20, shot to death Dr. H. P. Moseley, went on trial for his life. The greater portion of the afternoon will probably be taken up with the selection of the jury and the Judge's charge.

Dr. Moseley called on the negro to pay him a professional visit. The negro according to reports was drunk, crazy and shot and killed the physician as he reached the rear of the house, being unable to gain admittance at the front door.

The negro had sent for Dr. Joyner, who was out of town and Dr. Moseley was asked to pay the visit. He was accompanied by Mrs. Moseley who remained in the auto while Dr. Moseley went to the house.

A double tragedy which probably would have resulted in the death of Mrs. Moseley, also, was averted by two men who were passing, and who arrived on the scene in time to throw themselves between the gun and Mrs. Moseley.

The negro was arrested and rushed to Raleigh for safe keeping. He was brought to Greenville yesterday and arraigned before Judge Dunn. A venire of fifty men was chosen.

The trial has created quite a bit of interest due to the prominence of Dr. Moseley and when the trial was called this afternoon the court room was filled to its capacity with hundreds on the outside.

The second day and night sessions of the Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases, Judge Albion Dunn, presiding, was again featured with the hearing of a large number of cases and the docket was cleared of a number of cases of long standing.

The following cases were disposed of: Louis Kornegay charged with felony, not prossecuted with leave. Major McDaniel Burke, charged with rape, not prossecuted.

Lias Moore charged with having whiskey for sale, pleaded unlawful possession of whiskey. State accepts plea and defendant is sentenced to six months in jail to be assigned to work on county roads.

Bell Peyton pleads guilty of assault and was fined \$10.00 and costs.

The grand jury returned a true bill against Elmer McLawhorn, white for the killing of Mack Brown, negro.

CHAPTER XVI (Continued)

"It had been hoped that the proceedings would end there, and that a vote of thanks and congratulation, moved by Professor Sergius, of Upsala University, would be duly seconded and carried; but it was soon evident that the course of events was not destined to flow so smoothly. Symptoms of opposition had been evident from time to time during the evening, and now Dr. James Illingworth, of Edinburgh, rose in the center of the hall. Dr. Illingworth asked whether an amendment should not be taken before a resolution.

"The Chairman: 'Yes, sir, if there must be an amendment.'

"Dr. Illingworth: 'Your Grace, there must be an amendment.'

"The Chairman: 'Then let us take it at once.'

"Professor Summerlee (springing to his feet): 'Might I explain, your Grace, that this man is my personal enemy ever since our controversy in the Quarterly Journal of Science as to the true nature of Bathylus?'

"The Chairman: 'I fear I cannot go into personal matters. Proceed.'

"Dr. Illingworth was imperfectly heard in part of his remarks on account of the strenuous opposition of the friends of the explorers. Some attempts were also made to pull him down. Being a man of enormous physique, however, and possessed of a very powerful voice, he dominated the tumult and succeeded in finishing his speech. It was clear, from the moment of his rising, that he had a number of friends and sympathizers in the hall, though they formed a minority in the audience. The attitude of the greater part of the public might be described as one of tentative neutrality.

"Dr. Illingworth began his remarks by expressing his high appreciation of the scientific work both of Professor Challenger and of Professor Summerlee. He much regretted that any personal bias should have been read into his remarks, which were entirely dictated by his desire for scientific truth. His position, in fact, was substantially the same as that taken up by Professor Summerlee at the last meeting. At that last meeting Professor Challenger had made certain assertions which had been queried by his colleague. Now this colleague came forward himself with the same assertions and expected them to remain unquestioned. Was this reasonable? ('Yes,' 'No,' and prolonged interruption, during which Professor Challenger was heard from the Press box to ask leave from the chairman to put Dr. Illingworth into the street.) A year ago one man said certain things. Now four men said other and more startling ones. Was this to constitute a final proof where the matters in question were of the most revolutionary and incredible character? There had been recent examples of travelers arriving from the unknown with certain tales which had been too readily accepted. Was the London Zoological Institute to place itself in this position? He admitted that the members of the committee were men of character. But human nature was very complex. Even Professors might be misled by the desire for notoriety. Like moths, we all love best to flutter in the light. Heavy-game shots liked to be in a position to cap the tales of their rivals, and journalists were not averse to sensational coups, even when imagination had to aid fact in the process. Each member of the committee had his own motive for making the most of his results. ('Shame! shame!') He had no desire to be offensive. ('You are! and interruption.) The corroboration of these wondrous tales was really of the most slender description. What did it amount to? Some photographs. Was it possible that in this age of ingenious manipulation photographs could be accepted as evidence? What more? We have a story of a flight and a descent by ropes which precluded the production of larger specimens. It was ingenious, but not convincing. It was understood that Lord John Roxton claimed to have the skull of a pterodactyl. He could only say that he would like to see that skull.

"Lord John Roxton: 'Is this fellow calling me a liar?' (Uproar.)

"The Chairman: 'Order! order. Dr. Illingworth, I must direct you to bring your remarks to a conclusion and to move your amendment.'

"Dr. Illingworth: 'Your Grace, I have more to say, but I bow to your ruling. I move, then, that, while Professor Summerlee be thanked for his interesting address, the whole matter shall be

regarded as "non-proven," and shall be referred back to a larger, and possibly more reliable Committee of Investigation.'

"It is difficult to describe the confusion caused by this amendment. A large section of the audience expressed their indignation at such a slur upon the travelers by noisy shouts of dissent and cries of, 'Don't put it! Withdraw!' 'Turn him out!' On the other hand, the malcontents—and it cannot be denied that they were fairly numerous—cheered for the amendment, with cries of 'Order! Chair! and 'Fair play!' A scuffle broke out in the back benches, and blows were freely exchanged among the medical students who crowded that part of the hall. It was only the moderating influence of the presence of large numbers of ladies which prevented an absolute riot. Suddenly, however, there was a pause, a hush, and then complete silence. Professor Challenger was on his feet. His appearance and manner are peculiarly arresting, and as he raised his hand for order the whole audience settled down expectantly to give him a hearing.

"It will be within the recollection of many present," said Professor Challenger, "that similar foolish and unmanly scenes marked the last meeting at which I have been able to address them. On that occasion Professor Summerlee was the chief offender, and though he is now chastened and contrite, the matter could not be entirely forgotten. I have heard tonight similar, but even more offensive, sentiments from a person who has just sat down, and though it is a conscious effort of self-effacement to come down to that person's mental level, I will endeavor to do so, in order to allay any reasonable doubt which could possibly exist in the minds of anyone." (Laughter and interruption.) "I need not remind this audience that, though Professor Summerlee, as the head of the Committee of Investigation, has been put up to speak tonight, still it is I who am the real prime mover in this business, and that it is mainly to me that any successful result must be ascribed. I have safely conducted these three gentlemen to the spot mentioned, and I have, as you have heard, convinced them of the accuracy of my previous account. We had hoped that we should find upon our return that no one was so dense as to dispute our joint conclusions. Warned, however, by my previous experience, I have not come without such proofs as may convince a reasonable man. As explained by Professor Summerlee, our cameras have been tampered with by the apemen when they ransacked our camp, and most of our negatives ruined." (Jeers, laughter, and 'Tell us another! from the back.) 'I have mentioned the apemen, and I cannot forbear from saying that some of the sounds which now meet my ears bring back most vividly to my recollection my experiences with those interesting creatures.' (Laughter.) 'In spite of the destruction of so many invaluable negatives, there still remain in our collection a certain number of corroborative photographs showing the conditions of life upon the plateau. Did they accuse them of having forged these photographs? (A voice, 'Yes,' and considerable interruption which ended in several men being put out of the hall.) 'The negatives were open to the inspection of experts. But what other evidence had they? Under the conditions of their escape it was naturally impossible to bring a large amount of baggage, but they had rescued Professor Summerlee's collections of butterflies and beetles, containing many new species. Was this not evidence? (Several voices, 'No.' 'Who said no?'

"Dr. Illingworth (rising): 'Our point is that such a collection might have been made in other places than a prehistoric plateau.' (Applause.)

"Professor Challenger: 'No doubt, sir, we have to bow to your scientific authority, although I must admit that the name is unfamiliar. Passing, then, both the photographs and the entomological collection, I come to the varied and accurate information which we bring with us upon points which have never before been elucidated. For example, upon the domestic habits of the pterodactyl—'

(A voice: 'Bosh,' and uproar.) 'I say, that upon the domestic habits of the pterodactyl we can throw a flood of light. I can exhibit to you from my portfolio a picture of that creature taken from life which would convince you—'

"Dr. Illingworth: 'No picture could convince us of anything.' "Professor Challenger: 'You would require to see the thing itself.' "Dr. Illingworth: 'Undoubtedly.' Professor Challenger: 'And you would accept that?'

"Dr. Illingworth (laughing): 'Beyond a doubt.'

PENNSYLVANIAN WHO BECAME

PROMINENT PHILIPPINES DIES

Bagulo, P. I.—George F. Haight, native of Pennsylvania, Haight came to the Philippines in 1890 as a soldier in a volunteer regiment and served during the insurrection.

Taken ill after his discharge from the army he believed he was suffer-

ing from tuberculosis with little chance of recovery. He went to Mount Pawin, 8,000 feet above sea level, where he eventually regained his health and determined to spend the rest of his life in the mountains. Haight established a rest house, which became known throughout the islands. It was visited by many persons, notwithstanding it required a 30-mile ride on horseback to get there. He leaves a widow and three sons.
