SHENANDOAH SNAPS IN TWO MID AIR

Frank Frizzelle Found Guilty Second Degree Murder

NEGRO SLAYER OF DR MOSELEY GETS 30 YEARS

Tears Fill Eyes of Hundreds of People When Widow of the Murdered Man Tells the Gruesome Story of Her Husband's Untimely Death

Frank Frizzelle, negro, was en route to the state prison shortly after noon today to begin a thirty years' sentence for the killing of Dr. Herbert P. Moseley, of Farmville, on the night of July 20.

Following the testimony of the witnesses for the state, counsel for the defense moved for non suit of the charge of first degree murder on the grounds that the state had failed to present evidence of premeditation and deliberation on the part of the defendant. The motion was sustained by the court and counsel for the defense then entered a plea of guilty of murder in the second degree. Judge Albion Dunn after ordering guards stationed at all exits from the court room to prevent the passage of persons out of the room, sentenced Frizzelle to thirty years in prison, the maximum sentence for second degree murder and the prisoner was removed to a waiting automobile which departed immediately for Raleigh.

The selection of a jury for the trial of the case was begun at 3:30 yesterday afternoon and at 5:30 the special venire of fifty persons had been exhausted and only eleven jurors had been chosen. Another special venire of twenty-five persons was summoned for this morning and by 9:30 o'clock the last juror had been selected and the trial was under way.

Mrs. H. P. Moseley, widow of the murdered man, was the first witness to take the stand for the state. Tears filled the eyes of the hundreds of people who crowded the court room, as the witness in a breaking voice related the gruesome story of the tragedy that snaped out the life of her husband. She testified that on the night of the murder she was in front of her husband's office when he received the request to pay a professional visit to Frank Frizzelle. She related how she had accompanied her husband to Frizzelle's house and waited for him as he went to the back door which was nearest to the spot where he had stopped his car. She heard him as he knocked at the door and called out to Frizzelle to come open the door, she said, and a few moments later she heard a slight noise at the door followed by the report of a gun shot. Immediately she called out to her husband and upon receiving no reply she alighted from the car and ran around the corner of the house toward the door. She noted first the partially opened door but in the next moment she received her husband crumpled on the ground a few feet away in a pool of his own blood. When he failed to respond to her calls to him she immediately ran back to the paved road a few feet away and stopped a passing automobile and informed them of the tragedy. As she and the men started back toward the house Frizzelle came around the corner of the house carrying a shot gun in his hands and apparently pointing it at them. The three immediately ran back toward the car in an effort to escape the expected fire.

MEMORIAL BAPTIST EXTENDS CALL TO REV. H. F. JONES

If Call is Accepted Rev. Mr. Jones Will Arrive Probably About October, to Assume Duties

The Memorial Baptist Church has extended a call to the Rev. H. F. Jones, of Portsmouth, Va. If Mr. Jones accepts he will in all probability arrive about October first, to assume his duties.

The church has been without a pastor since June, at which time the Rev. J. W. Smith, after serving a four year's pastorate, resigned.

Rev. Mr. Jones visited Greenville last Sunday and at 11 o'clock preached to a large and appreciative audience. He possesses a magnetic personality and is a splendid speaker. The members of the church who heard him in this service were so favorably impressed that at a business meeting last night the pulpit committee recommended him to the church. The recommendation was accepted by an unanimous vote.

Rev. H. F. Jones is a native of Mecklenburg county, Va. For several years he held a pastorate in Richmond, Va., and for the past eleven years has been pastor of the West Portsmouth Baptist Church. He is considered one of the strongest preachers of Virginia and the local church will consider itself quite fortunate if he accepts the call to become its pastor.

Marowville Resigns Mgr Chicago Clubs

Chicago, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Walter "Rabbit" Marowville today resigned as manager of the Chicago Club, George Gibson, coach of the club, was immediately appointed acting manager for the remainder of the season.

In presenting his resignation Marowville said he was anxious to relinquish the reign as manager as he felt the duty of managing the club and playing to strenuous. He will continue with the team as short stop.

N. C. Automotive Trade Ass'n to Meet Wilmington, Sept. 7-8

Wilmington, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Preparations for at least 125 delegates to the summer convention of the North Carolina Automotive Trade Association here September 7 and 8 are being made, according to S. G. MacMillan, district vice-president in charge of arrangements.

Headquarters of the convention will be at the Cape Fear hotel. Orders have been received here assigning the U. S. Coast Guard Cutter Madoo to the convention for a trip down the Cape Fear River and out to sea on the afternoon of September 8. A well balance program has been arranged, it is stated.

N. Carolina Enjoys Its Greatest Year of Tourist Travel

Greensboro, Sept. 3.—(AP)—North Carolina this season is enjoying its greatest year of tourist travel.

The statement is borne out by observation of the increased number of foreign license plates on all main highways, and by the number of calls for information at headquarters and branch offices of the Carolina Motor Club, with headquarters here.

During the months of July and August there were 49,000 calls for information and routings at the Greensboro office of the club and at its 60 branches. Two clerks were constantly on duty at headquarters, supplying routings, the night shift often remaining on duty until 10 p. m. and later.

Calls for license and title information at the Carolina Motor Club and its branches totaled 265,000.

While many of the requires for touring information came from other states, the great bulk of date was supplied native Tarheels, who vacationed by auto. The number of persons making extended trips, especially to the East and Canada, showed at tremendous increase this year, according to the information bureau, but by far the majority of routing supplied were "to Florida."

Hands Officer Two Pints of Liquor Is Now Under Arrest

High Point, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Charles Heflin, white man, has been arrested here on a charge of violation of the prohibition law—all because he mistook an officer of the law for one of his customers.

That is the opinion of Officer B. C. Woodwell, and the other officers.

In any case, Heflin, the officers say, walked straight into the officer's arms and handed him two pints of liquor. The officers found six more pints on the man's premises, it is alleged.

Yadkin River At Its Lowest Within Last 20 or 30 Years

Salisbury, Sept. 3.—(AP)—The Yadkin River is at its lowest within the last 25 or 30 years, the government gauge at the old toll bridge five miles north of Salisbury shows.

J. T. Yarbrough, who keeps these records, and whose father kept them before him, states that there is no record of the gauge ever showing lower water since it was established 30 years ago. The gauge is read four times daily, and reports made.

Although the drought in this section has not been nearly so severe as it has farther west, lack of rain in the mountains, it is explained is partly responsible for the low water mark of the river.

SEARCH CONTINUES FOR THE MISSING NAVAL SEA PLANE

The PN-9 No. 1 With Crew Disappears in Mid Pacific While On a Non-Stop Flight From San Francisco to Honolulu

San Francisco, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Search for the missing naval sea plane PN-9, No. 1 and its crew which disappeared in mid Pacific Tuesday afternoon while on a non-stop flight from San Francisco to Honolulu continued today after overnight reports to Naval headquarters from craft and air craft searchers brought only routine messages and no work of the missing sea plane.

Without any word upon which to allay the fear that the missing plane and its crew of four might not be found, Naval officers today had explored the field of conjecture in surmising what happened to the plane after it was forced down by lack of fuel.

The most favorable theory advanced was that the plane had made a successful landing in the ocean less than 300 miles off the Hawaii coast, and had drifted out of the search area and was beached on some abandoned island point. The Navy withdrew from further attempts to make a non stop flight to Honolulu from San Francisco, when announcement was made here late yesterday of the abandonment of the projected flight of the PB-9, No. 1, which was scheduled to start for Honolulu today.

CALIFORNIAN ON TWO-YEAR HIKE TO WIN BIG FINANCIAL REWARD

Winnipeg, Man.—J. E. McCoy, of San Francisco passed through here recently, relating that he was returning from Halifax, N. S., on a hike to that place and back which he must complete in two years to win \$10,000.

The prizehead vbqkv vbqkv thrdl McCoy started from San Francisco October 25, 1924, and was ten days ahead of his schedule when here. He is bound to travel vehicular roads. Inasmuch as he could not take to railroad tracks and there was no highway along the north edge of Lake Superior, he left Canada at Sault Sainte Marie, Ont., and journeyed through the United States on his way here.

He was bound to touch at Winnipeg, Calgary, Alta., and Vancouver, B. C. He must not accept a lift.

Rotary Convention to Be Held Durham On April 13 - 14th

Durham, Sept. 2.—(AP) Durham Rotarians are already at work making preparations for the convention of Rotary clubs of the 37th district, which will meet in Durham next April 13 and 14.

Plans were set on foot for caring for the convention at a meeting of the local Rotary club held a few days ago, and a directors meeting, at which the details of caring for the convention were to be taken up was arranged for. Appointment of committees to handle the situation growing out of acceptance of the invitation of the Durham club was expected.

The Kiwanis Club here has tendered its assistance in caring for the convention, and other local civic organizations are expected to come forward with offers of aid.

North Carolina State Fair Will Be Held Week Oct. 12

Raleigh, Sept. 3.—(AP)—The North Carolina State Fair, to be held during the week of October 12, will make a bid for large attendance this year by those pioneers who attended the early fairs held immediately after the State Fair was reorganized in 1869.

The fair will offer a first prize of \$5 and a second of \$15 for the oldest person attending the fair this year who attended the first fair held after the reorganization following the War Between the States, Manager E. V. Walborn announces.

He states that the North Carolina Agricultural Society was organized October 18, 1868, when less than 50 of the leading farmers and planters of that time met together to promote a state fair. The first president was John L. Dancy, of Edgecombe county.

In 1860 the fair was discontinued and the promoters were not able to reorganize the institution until the fall of 1869. Since that time, the fair has been held continuously and has given a faithful record of the state's agricultural and industrial advancement.

In an effort to bring back to the State Fair some of those who attended the State Fair in 1869 and saw the space and exhibits then used, Mr. Walborn is offering the prizes of \$25 and \$15 for the oldest person, man or woman, who attended this first fair.

The outlook for the fair this year is exceedingly good, Mr. Walborn says. It is expected that a large part of the exhibits will come from Eastern Carolina, on account of the havoc played in the piedmont, and western sections by the severe drought. Guilford county, however, has already entered an exhibit in the county contest and other entries are expected.

THIRTEEN DIE IN DIRIGIBLE SMASH TODAY

HABOURN TRIAL IS CONTINUED TO OCT. TERM COURT

Caleb McCaffety, Confessed Slayer of John McKinley, Draws Sentence 15 to 18 Years in Pen

The case against R. G. Habourn, of Rocky Mount, charging him with the killing of Robert Cooper and B. L. Wilkerson in an automobile accident near here on the night of June 8 which was to have been heard in Superior Court here this afternoon has been continued until the October term of criminal court which convenes in this city on October 21. The continuance, granted at the request of the defense, was due to the absence of one of the material witnesses, Charlie Wells, who is still confined at his home in Rocky Mount from injuries which he received in the accident that took the lives of Cooper and Wilkerson. Wells is said to have been riding on the front seat of the car with Habourn at the time the accident occurred.

Caleb McCaffety, negro, must serve not less than 15 and not more than 18 years in the state prison for the killing of John McKinley, negro, under a sentence imposed by Judge Albion Dunn last night at the close of the third day of the August term of Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases here. The homicide was committed near Grimesland about four years ago and McCaffety had been at large since that time until a few weeks ago when he was imprisoned in Elizabeth City on another charge. While being held there for trial he was recognized by a former acquaintance as the slayer of McKinley and the authorities here were informed of his whereabouts.

Officers from this county went to Elizabeth City for the prisoner and enroute here McCaffety confessed to the killing. He entered a plea of guilty of second degree murder and the court after hearing the evidence so adjudged sentenced the defendant to from 15 to 18 years in prison.

Several other cases were heard of during yesterday's sessions bringing the total number of cases disposed of during the first three days of the term to more than seventy.

The case of Dewey Smith for carrying a concealed weapon was continued. Jerry Grimes charged with the manufacture and possession of liquor was called and failed and a bias was issued.

J. J. Redding pled guilty to the charge of having whiskey for sale and was sentenced to serve six months in jail assigned to work the county roads. Hugh Lewis, Fred Lewis, Claude Jones, Herbert Evans and Dalton Parker charged in two cases with trespass were adjudged not guilty. The same defendants were tried on a charge of drinking and disorderly conduct and at the conclusion of the evidence the judge ordered a verdict of guilty as to Hugh Lewis and Evans and the other defendants not guilty. Pride of Navy Breaks In Two 3,000 Feet Above Earth Near Cambridge, O., Early Today; North Carolinian Among Those Killed Or Missing

Cambridge, Ohio, EOS Bulletin, Sept. 3.—(AP)—The Naval airship Shenandoah broke in two over Ava, the small village near here, early this morning, according to reports received here. A severe wind and electrical storm raged in this vicinity last night.

The great ship was sighted near Wheeling, West Virginia on its way to Ohio shortly before two o'clock this morning. Maintaining its scheduled 30 miles an hour, it should have passed over Zanesville, 70 miles west of here shortly before 4:30 o'clock. The crash probably occurred shortly after four o'clock as Ava is approximately fifty miles from Wheeling.

Efforts to find a trace of the ship after it was seen near Wheeling were fruitless. The first news of the crash was received by the Associated Press from the telephone operator at Zanesville at six o'clock.

One section of the Shenandoah is reported to have landed in a corn field, while the other is said to have floated away in an easterly direction.

Washington, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Some fragments of information brought in from many sources sought today to piece out the story of the tragedy, whose full import can not yet be assessed.

Coming immediately behind the disappearance in mid Pacific of the Naval Plane, PN-9, No. 1 in her attempt to fly to Hawaii, the loss of the Shenandoah cast a shadow of uncertainty over the hope of those Naval officers who have endeavored to build up on practical lines of naval aviation.

Washington, Sept. 3.—(AP)—The cruiser Shenandoah Senior surviving officer reported to the Navy Department today that 13 were killed, two injured and one remaining unaccounted for in the wreck.

The message transmitted to the Navy Department by the Western Union Telegraph Company read as follows:

"Shenandoah down eight miles north of Cardwell, Ohio. Reported a total wreck. Cardwell is two miles north of Belle Valley, Ohio. A wind storm caused the wreck." Another message received from Columbus, Ohio gave the number of dead, and listed among those who had been killed Lieutenant Commander Zackary Landsdowne, of Greenville, Ohio.

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Commander Zackary Landsdowne, commander of the Shenandoah, was killed when the giant ship crashed near Cardwell, Ohio, early this morning, according to a report received here at 9:10 a. m.

JAPAN IS OPTIMISTIC DESPITE DEPRESSION IN TRADE CONDITIONS

Tokyo.—(AP).—While Japanese trade conditions during the first half of the present year were not all that had been hoped for, and the industrial situation just now is extremely bad, the authorities, in the official report to the Department of Commerce and Industry, state that no pessimism need be entertained for the future. The report shows that during the six months 22 articles out of 30 chief exports of the country increased in value over the corresponding period of last year and only eight articles decreased in value. The report states that raw silk valued at \$34,845,500 yen exported during the first half of this year shows an increase of 70,913,000 yen over the corresponding period of last year. Cotton cloth exports totaled 199,647,000 yen, an increase over the corresponding period of last year of 46,385,000 yen.

Among exports which decreased in value from the corresponding period of last year are counted silk fabrics, which totaled 53,718,000 yen so far this year, a decrease of 5,040,000 yen from the year before. Silk waste and floss silk exports totaled 11,150,000 yen this year, showing a decrease of 1,264,000 yen from 1924. Marine products, machinery, beans, buttons, iron and beer also decreased in export value.

As to imports the first half of this year witnessed an increase of 14 articles out of 30, compared with the corresponding period of last year, and 16 articles showed a decrease in value. Among the imports which increased in value are raw cotton, totaling 601,070,000 yen, showing a rise of 56,20 per cent, or 216,568,000 yen, over 394,502,000 yen of the corresponding period of last year. Wool imports totaled 84,635,000 yen during the first half of this year, an increase of 43.7C per cent or 25,728,000 yen over a year before. Woolen fabric imports this year totaled 35,050,000, an increase of 8,421,000 yen over a year before. Rice and bran imports totaled 65,796,000

yen this year, an increase of 64.40 per cent or 25,537,000 yen, over the corresponding period of last year. Beans, bean cake and crude sugar imports also increased in their volumes and value.

The fluctuation in imports is far larger than the increase or decrease in exports, which is responsible for the adverse trade balance. Silk exports were favorable this year, due to

the continued active demand for this class of goods in the United States and cotton fabrics and yarn exports were also supported well, despite the recent anti-foreign agitation in Shanghai and other parts of China.

So the North and South Carolina Public Utility Information Bureau answers the question, based on an expert analysis of gas consumption.

Custard pie—Ten cubic feet of gas will bake one or more pies, according to even size.

Bread—Twenty-five cubic feet will bake from one to eight loaves at once, depending on the size of the oven used.

Roast chicken—Thirty-five cubic feet will roast one three-pound chicken.

Bean soup—Six cubic feet will cook a quart.

Coffee—One and a third cubic feet will prepare one quart.

Hot water—Twenty cubic feet will heat 20 balloons to a boiling point, enough water for an average family wash.

Less than 100 cubic feet of gas a day is used to do the cooking and heating for an average family of five persons.

Nine Cities Show Decrease in July Bld'g. Operations

Raleigh, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Building operations in nine North Carolina cities during the month of July were slightly less than they were in the same cities during the month of July, last year, it is shown by figures compiled by the statistical department of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond.

Although six cities — Charlotte, Durham, Greensboro, High Point, Salisbury, and Winston-Salem — showed greater building operations during July of this year than in the same month in 1924, the decrease in operations in Asheville, Raleigh, and Wilmington were great enough to show a total decrease in the nine cities. Building operations in the nine cities during July of this year totaled \$2,336,420 as compared with a total for the same cities in July, 1924 of \$2,397,898. The record for July, 1924, therefore, was \$61,478 better than that for the same month.

this year. Durham showed the largest percentage of gain in July over the same month last year. This year's building operations were \$206,256 greater than last year, a gain of 299.8 percent. The figures for new construction in Durham jumped from \$67,000 in July, 1924 to \$252,506 during July of this year. The figures for alterations and repairs were \$1800 for July, 1924, as compared with \$22,550 for the same month this year.

Other North Carolina cities showing increases over July of last year were: High Point, 88.4 percent gain; Salisbury, showing a gain of 43.9 percent; Winston-Salem, with a gain of 41 percent; Charlotte, 38.5 percent gain; and Greensboro, gain of 33.2 percent.

Raleigh, with a decrease in building operations of 71.6 percent, dropped in new construction from \$685,097 in July, 1924 to \$191,893 for the month this year. Wilmington with a decrease of 67.7 percent came next. Asheville, the third city in which this year's July record was less than last, showed a decrease of 23 percent.

QUEER REPLIES MADE BY SOME APPLICANTS IN CIVIL SERVICE TEST

A. A piece of paper held against property for borrowed money.
Q. What does habeas corpus mean?
A. The red corpuscles in the blood.
Q. What is a kleptomaniac?
A. A person with a mania causing him to lie unnecessarily.
Q. What is a moron?
A. A man who has more than one wife.

Answers found in the examination papers of another class revealed that the motor truck still holds mysteries for some, even in this mechanical age.

"What causes heavy black smoke to come out of the exhaust pipe of a truck?" the class was asked.
"It is the only place it can come out," replied a candidate.
"What is the purpose of a fan on a motor truck?" was another question.
"To supply fresh air to the carburetor," was one answer.
"Give a reason why a motor truck fails to start when cranked," directed the examiner.
"A motor truck will sometimes fail to start if the driver is too weak to crank it," answered one job seeker.
"If you found a man with a severe

cut on the head that was bleeding freely, what would you do?" another class was asked.

"I would put a tourniquet on his neck," announced one student of first aid.

Irish Bank Deposits Decrease.
Dublin.—A feature of all the Irish bank reports for the half-year ended June 30 is a considerable fall in the deposits, and an increase in advances to customers. Net profits are maintained as well as the usual high dividends. The National Bank pays a dividend of 14 per cent. The Munster and Leinster Bank pays 18 per cent free of income tax, and the Provincial Bank 14 1/2 per cent.

WAR DEPRESSION AND U. S. FILMS EMBARRASS SWEDISH PRODUCER

Stockholm.—A long period of economic depression which followed the World War, and which still prevails in Sweden, and the importation of American films are the chief reasons given which compelled Albert Ranft, owner of seven theatres in Stockholm and Gothenburg, to put his affairs in the hands of a committee of his creditors.

Ranft started in the theatrical business 25 years ago as managing director of one of the leading Stockholm theatres and gradually increased his influence until he obtained control over a majority of the theatres in Stockholm. For many years his theatrical ventures were successful. The after-the-war depression, which materially decreased attendances, followed by the importation of American films created competition too strong for the Ranft theatres.

THIRTEEN DIE IN DIRIGIBLE SMASH TODAY

(Continued from page 1)
Mander, Hancock, Lieutenant Hough, G. Fred Allen, Chief Radio Engineer Smitsen; Machinist Mate Moore, and Machinist Mate Joffrey; Lawrence and four unidentified men. The number of dead actually accounted for is said to be twelve. Among those killed or missing, according to other reports, was Colonel Chalmers G. Hall, of Salisbury, N. C., who was liaison officer of the Shenandoah.

Moondaville, Tenn. Sept. 3.—(AP.)—Officials at Langin Field this afternoon denied reports from Washington that they had reported the Shenandoah was struck by lightning. Captain Arthur E. Simonin, in charge of the field, said they had heard lightning reported as a cause of the wreck, but said that he had made no report to that effect to Washington.

Cardwell, Ohio, Sept. 3.—(AP.)—The giant dirigible Shenandoah is no more. It went down in three pieces here early today and killed its Commander Zackary Landsdowne, and at least twelve of the officers and men making up her crew.

The air ship struck a line squall, a variety of storm most feared by air men, shortly after five o'clock this morning near this village while traveling at an altitude of 3,000 feet enroute from Lake Hurst, N. J., to the west.

There was no explosion. The big ship simply met winds of a strength it was unable to combat. After encountering the storm at the high altitude the ship headed heavenwards at an altitude of approximately 5,000 feet, when it suddenly came down again and broke into three pieces.

One piece, 450 feet or more in length, fell in the fields about one and one-half miles from Ava, Ohio. The control compartment, in which the commander and navigating crew were riding, fell 50 feet away and the third section, 150 feet long, drifted through the air like a balloon for twelve miles, landing near Sharon, Ohio.

Most of the dead were found in the tangled wreckage of the control cabin, where a full crew was on duty attempting to ride out the buffeting winds, which resulted in the complete destruction of the giant of the air. Ambulances and other conveyances which carried physicians and others to the scene immediately following the accident, were transporting the dead and injured to near by towns.

The story of the disaster is one of the heroism of the crew pioneer interest of the development of lighter than air transportation. The story is best told by Colonel Charles Geo. Hall, United States Army observer aboard the ill-fated ship, who at first was reported missing. Colonel

Hall is a native of Salisbury, N. C. At the time of the crash Colonel Hall said four of the six engines which propelled the air monster, were going full speed. The craft simply met air current which she could not survive. Colonel Hall voiced high praise for the Naval crew of the dirigible. Even after the crash he said the crew's behavior was remarkable. Each man took the situation quietly and attempted to bring the craft to the ground in the best possible manner.

In all there were eight men who made the perilous ride on the portion of the ship which Colonel Hall found himself. It drifted or the better part of a half hour, and covered a distance of ten miles or more before coming to earth.

"We were traveling west at an altitude of about 3,000 feet when we encountered a storm," Colonel Hall said in describing the accident.

"By changing our course a dozen or more times we dodged the storm, only to encounter the line squall which sent us to an altitude of 5,500 feet before we realized what had happened. We opened the valve to let out gas and lower the ship and were drawing away from the storm at a 50 mile per hour rate when the storm enveloped us and broke the ship into three pieces. I exclaimed to Commander Landsdowne, 'everyone beat it.' When the crash came I was on the ladder speeding from the control cabin to the rear portion of the ship. As I started to fall I clutched a girdle to which I hung suspended, finally swinging my body over it and crawling 40 or 50 feet back into the ship."

When he reached the ship proper, Colonel Hall said that he found other members of the crew preparing to open the valves in order to bring about a descent. Colonel Hall added that the catastrophe was in no way attributed to any defects in the ship. Meteorological advices warning the navigators of the storm would have saved the ship. But since there were no meteorological stations in the vicinity, these advices were not available.

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PAN-EUROPEAN COMPETITION URGED AGAINST U. S. FILMS

charge and the presentment of arguments on the motion.

When the jury was recalled Judge Dunn addressing that body called attention to the fact that in first degree murder the burden of proof of premeditation and deliberation was upon the state and that in this case the state had failed to bring out such evidence. Expressing regret at the untimely death of Dr. Moseley and sympathy for his family and friends, Judge Dunn stated that he was under oath to administer impartial justice to rich and poor alike and that he had no apologies to make to anyone in sustaining the motion of the defense to non suit the state in its charge of murder in the first degree, and to accept in its stead the plea of the defendant of guilty of murder in the second degree.

From Frizzelle's gun but Frizzelle turned and entered the corn field nearby. In the meantime other persons had arrived upon the scene and a physician had been summoned. Upon examination of the body physicians stated that death had no doubt been almost instantaneous.

Other witnesses testified in corroboration of the latter part of Mrs. Moseley's statement and Officer Hobbard told of the discovery and arrest of Frizzelle in the field about four hundred yards from the house and of his being carried first to Wil-

son and later to Raleigh for safe-keeping. When asked if he knew he had killed Dr. Moseley, Frizzelle replied no, the witness said, and when asked why he had shot him he replied that he was pranking with the gun and it must have gone off. Several witnesses testified that for years Frizzelle had been a heavy drinker and that he was a person of low mentality.
