DOES NOT SPEAK WELL

The publication of income tax figures does not speak well for the prosperity of the average man and family of this state.

North Carolina boasts that it is the fifth state in the Union in the amount of money paid into the Federal treasury. It paid \$166, 814,586.12, but of this sum only \$15,850,039. 23 came from incomes. Most is cigarette tax which is transferred to the ultimate smoker.

The returns show there are only 73,847 people in this state who reported that they were receiving an income of over \$1,000. The census of 1920 gives the number of males over 21 years of age as 603,683. There are almost as many females, but most of them do not work for wages or salaries. It does not speak well for prosperity well distributed that only one-eighth of the males earned \$1,000 a year. It is doubtless true that there are several thousand earning over \$1,000 who made no returns. If we count that there were 27,000 EVANS STREET KINDERGARTEN slackers, we would then have only one male over 21 out of every six who earned as much

The report states that raw silk valned at 334,845,500 yen exported dury ing the first half of this year shows an increase of 70,913,000 yen over the corresponding period of last year. Cotton cloth exports totaled 199,647,-000 yen, an increase over the corresponding period of last year of 46,385,-

Among exports which decreased in value from the corresponding period of last year are counted silk fabrics, which totaled 53,718,000 yen so far this year, a decrease of 5,040,000 yen from the year before. 
