PRACTICE MONDAY

Hard Schedule Will Face the High School Football Squad This Season; Stars From Last Season's Team Missing When Practice Begins

Practice will begin at the New Athletic Field in West Greenville Monday afternoon for foot ball candidates of the Greenville High School. Uniforms will be issued in a few days and the grid will begin to mould an eleven which will represent the Red and White in a hard schedule.

The prospects are looking fine for a well balanced team and with the co-operation of the town and all parties concerned there seems to be no reason why Greenville High School will not have one of the best teams in her history.

Several of last year's back field men were lost upon graduation. Mike Mayo, quarter; Dick Crisp, half and Douglas West full back will not be able to report when the call is given. This will leave the back field to be built around ex-Captain Harvey, a bulwark on both offense and defense, Bob Forbes a combination back and end, and Fred Forbes a promising youngster who will be called upon this year for his first performance. With these men as a nucleus it will be possible to build a fast combination back field.

All the varsity line men are eligible for their positions this fall. This includes the entire varsity line as none are lost upon graduation. Much is expected of these men to carry the brunt of the battle into the enemy's territory. The old men who are expected to report are: Bicks, center; Turnage and Laughinghouse, guards; Capt. Calloway and Rice, tackles and Smith and Denton ends. Billy Brown who was out on account of an operation last year, will more than likely be seen in the regular line-up before the season is over. With the return of these men and the rising of the raw material Coach Crater feels confident that he will be able to develop one of the best teams in this section of the state.

A hard schedule is being planned and will be ready for the press in a few days. The season will open Sept. 25th with Tarboro as the opponents. So with only a few days to work it will be necessary for each candidate to begin some form of daily work outs in order to be more fit for the daily grind which is to follow.

All candidates who are planning to report will see the county physician before Monday and be examined and get your health certificate. It is any important that you do this as it is a safety measure to you as well as the school.

It is expected that at least forty candidates will be present on the first day of practices and that work will start with a rush and continue to gain momentum the whole season through. All boys of the High School are urged to report, especially the boys who are entering for the first time. The success of the team is not on the varsity but upon the second string or scrub players. So come out and help build the best team for the best town in Eastern North Carolina.

COMMENDS DUNN
FOR EXPEDIENT WAY
HANDLING COURT

Grand Jury Report: County Institutions in Excellent Condition; Finds Jail Crowded But in Clean and Sanitary Condition

To the Honorable Judge Albion Dunn, presiding at the August term of court, Pitt county, Greetings:

We, the Grand Jury of this term of court, beg to submit the following report:

We have passed on all bills and matters coming before us in which we are able to secure witnesses.

We have visited the offices of the Sheriff, the Register of Deeds, the Clerk of Court, the Auditor, the Treasurer, the Board of Education, and the Welfare Department. We find the offices and records in each office well kept and in good condition. We especially desire to commend the work that Auditor Coppedge is doing. His office and records are especially well kept, the records of expenses and other financial matters of the county are easily available.

We visited the jail and find it very much crowded at this time, yet clean and in a sanitary condition. We visited both the county home and the convict camp. We find the county home in good condition, the inmates well cared for and satisfied. The convict camp is in especially good condition, the team well fed and in good working shape, the prisoners' beds are clean and the whole camp well kept. We are gratified to find that Superintendent Fancher is paying particular attention to the sanitary condition of the camp. We feel that his care of the prisoners and the team not be improved on.

Our attention has been called by Mr. R. E. Futrell, superintendent of Welfare, to the fact that there are several orphans in the county whom he is unable to place in the various orphan homes throughout the state, owing to the crowded conditions. He is placing them in the North Carolina Children's Home Society, a Children's placing agency. He stated that our county is at present contributing one hundred dollar per year to this society, and feels that in view of the many calls that he is making upon them that our contribution should be increased. We recommend that the Commissioners consider this matter and, if they deem it advisable, to increase this contribution.

We are also advised by Mr. Futrell that there are a number of indigent tubercular patients in the county who are a menace to the health of others by spreading the disease among others around them. Three of these cases are in the town of Greenville and are being cared for by the Welfare Department. We would recommend that the Commissioners consider some means of providing for these pauper tubercular patients to be isolated.

We wish to thank Judge Dunn and the court officials for the courtesy consideration shown us during this term.

We feel that Judge Dunn is rendering a great service to the state of North Carolina, in the expedient manner in which he conducts his courts, and that Pitt county is indeed fortunate in having him preside at this when the docket is so very much crowded. We appreciate greatly his excellent charge to us on Monday morning, which is an inspiration to us, and we feel to all who were present and heard it.

GIANT SEA PLANE
PROBABLY IN LIMBO
SHIPS LOST AT SEA

PN-9 Number 1, Pride of the Navy Still Missing "Without a Trace" As to Its Location

Honolulu, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Into the limbo of ships lost at sea "without a trace" probably has gone the giant sea plane PN-9, No. 1, pride of the navy, and commander John Rodgers, who with four companions set forth fearlessly from San Francisco for Honolulu last Monday and disappeared Tuesday afternoon. In spite of the unwilling feeling that it would be a miracle if the plane were discovered and the occupants rescued, new searching detachments were speeding toward where the Arrow took her place in the line of guard ships and where the plane is believed to have fallen to the surface of the ocean.

Here new searches are being organized today and their efforts intensified by the attempts of other searching vessels. Some of the navy snips engaged in the search are running short of fuel and will have to return to port, while the number of air planes assisting has been reduced to four, one having been forced down last night. Commander Wilbur Van Auken, of the Arrow took, reported last night that the vessel had scouted over the territory and had found "no news from any vessel."

San Francisco, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The Navy Department has instructed Admiral Robinson to dispatch 18 destroyers which left Samoa September first for Hawaii to the search zone to participate in the hunt for the missing PN-9, No. 1 and its crew.

In announcing that the ships which were returning from the Australian cruise would be used in an endeavor to find Commander Rodgers plane, the flight commander here stated that "There is a ray of hope" in the telegram which the Whipperwill sent that it had seen a flare of rockets last night.

DECLARES REMOVAL
OF SAFETY VALVES
CAUSE OF DISASTER

Constructor Advisor in Building the Shenandoah Says Victims Gave Their Lives to Save the Precious Helium

Tom River, N. J., Sept. 4.—(AP)—Captain Anton Heinen, former German dirigible pilot and constructor advisor in the building of the Shenandoah said today that the removal of 80 of the safety valves on the dirigible gas bag was the cause of the disaster yesterday, and that "the victims of the crash gave their lives to save this precious helium."

"In the storm the craft rose to fast for the remaining valves to let off sufficient gas," he said. "The upward movement of the ship caused rapid explosion of the gas bag which broke the shell of the ship in the middle." "I would not call it murder," said Captain Heinen, "but I can not put it too strongly that if it had not been for the foolishness in cutting down the number of safety valves, the crash would not have occurred."

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Navy Department officials declined to comment today on the assertion of Captain Anton Heinen, consulting engineer in the construction of the Shenandoah, that the reduction in the number of safety valves in the bag of the dirigible was responsible for the wreck.

At the Bureau of aeronautics, however, it was said that the reduction was made recently by direction of the officers at Lakehurst, and had not gone directly before the Bureau in any way. The information here was that the new arrangement was working perfectly.

PRISON SENTENCES

SESSION OF COURT

Louis Powell, Mary Howard and W. F. Modica Found Not Guilty On Charge of Robbery and Larceny; Fannie Lassiter, Negress, Not Guilty of Manslaughter

Louis Powell, Mary Howard and William F. Modica who a few days ago were brought from Hartford to Greenville to answer to a charge of robbery and larceny in this county, were found not guilty in this morning's session of Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases.

The following cases were disposed of in yesterday's session of court: Bud Jenkins, charged with rape, not prosed.

Bruce Boyd pled guilty of being drunk and disorderly. Judgment suspended upon payment of costs. Harvey Barrington charged with larceny, was sentenced to serve 2 years in county jail to be assigned to work on roads. Capias not to issue unless it be found as a fact by the court at a subsequent term within said 2 years, that defendant has failed to be law abiding and of good behavior. Defendant required to give bond of \$100.00 for his appearance at the January '26 and April '27 terms of court to show that he is law abiding. Defendant allowed until October to pay costs.

Leslie Peadar, L. R. Peadar, charged with larceny. Leslie Peadar was adjudged not guilty while L. R. Peadar was adjudged guilty and sentenced to 12 months in jail to be assigned to work on roads.

V. L. Johnson was adjudged not guilty of driving a car while drunk. Frances Hardee, charged with abandoning crop was found not guilty.

Frances Hardee charged with false pretense, not prosed.

James Best, charged with embezzlement, not prosed.

Herbert Strong charged with murder, was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to 5 years in penitentiary.

The case against Jack Blount and Dewitt Smith charged with aiding and abetting in manslaughter, not prosed.

Italy's Capacity to
Pay Be Based Upon
Business Conditions

Rome, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Italy's capacity to pay, based entirely upon business conditions, will be the sole determining factor of the proposal to be made by the Italian War Debt Commission to Washington next month. Count Volpi, the Finance Minister, said to the Associated Press today.

"Italy desires to conclude as soon as possible a just settlement of her war debt to the United States, based completely upon the realities of her industrial, economic and financial situation," the Finance Minister said.

"We have every reason to be hopeful. I am a business man and will be dealing with business men of my own type like Secretary Mellon, who I am sure will approach the problems with an eye to reality."

"I have successfully carried out many similar missions in my career, and I trust this one will have a satisfactory conclusion."

REMAINS OF GIANT
DIRIGIBLE BEING
TORN BY WINDS

Proud Mistress of the Skies and Pride of Navy Resting On Gently Sloping Hill Sides; Survivors Do Not Believe Dirigible Could Have Been Saved

Cardwell, Ohio, Sept. 4.—(AP)—On gently sloping hill side some 12 miles apart, winds today whipped through flapping yards of torn silk and broken aluminum of the Shenandoah until yesterday proud mistress of the skies and pride of the United States Navy.

The remains of the only American built dirigible, which met disaster in a thunder squall near here yesterday morning, was being broken up by the winds in much the same manner as an ocean going ship aground is broken up by the waves. Fourteen dead members of the crew, including Lieutenant Commander Zuckery Landsdowne, lay in an improvised morgue in Belle Valley, their faces uncovered to the view of the visiting hundreds.

Twenty two of the surviving are enroute to Lake Hurst, N. J., from whence the Shenandoah embarked Wednesday afternoon for her voyage into the heart of the continent. Two injured members of the crew are in a Marietta hospital.

Last night a guard was thrown around the approachers to the wreckage in a belated effort to stem the tide of visitors, who had thronged to the scene by thousands. Nothing could have saved the dirigible in its battle with the storm, according to the consensus of opinion of nearly all surviving members of the crew.

Lieutenant Rosendahl made positive denial that the ship was flying too near the ground and that its gondolas caught on the tree tops causing the disaster. Other officers have concurred that it was at an altitude of at least three thousand feet when it was struck by the squall.

The survivors were unanimous in ascertaining that the fact that the gas chambers were filled with helium, was all that prevented an explosion. Reports that lightning had struck the ship and as partly responsible for the crash, were denied by survivors and witnesses of the catastrophe.

Officers of the dirigible explained the tragedy, said the ship encountered a severe wind storm over Cambridge and struck headwinds which held the giant making it almost stationary for fifteen minutes, although the engines were going full speed ahead.

After making more than a dozen attempts to elude the storm center by changing its course, the ship apparently nosed its way squarely into the center of the squall and was abruptly shot upward for more than 2,000 feet and then dropped precipitately, the structure cracking and breaking into three parts under the tremendous strain. Attached to the foremost section was the control cabin in which Commander Landsdowne and twelve other officers and men navigating the ship were at their post. The Gondola broke away, crashing to the ground from an altitude of several thousand feet and killing all of its occupants. Seven others, who were in the forward section of the ship, but not in the control car, drifted with the part of the bag and landed safely nearly 12 miles away. The main section landed almost immediately after the break and only one of the 23 men who were in it was killed.

ON OPENING DAY

Superintendent Rose Announces Schedule for Opening of City Schools; Intermediates and High Schools to Operate in Old High School Bldg.

Due to the fact that the new High School building will not be ready both the Intermediate and High Schools will operate in the old High School building Monday on the following schedule:

The Intermediate School, grades 6 and 7, will meet at nine o'clock in the auditorium. Following a short meeting there, these grades will go to their rooms for regular work until 11:30 when they will be dismissed for the day. The High School, grade 8 to 11 inclusive will assemble in the auditorium at 12:30. Following their assembly period, these grades will go to their rooms for regular work, and will be dismissed at 3:00.

Grades 1 to 5 inclusive in all the three other schools of the town will assemble in their respective building at 9 o'clock Monday and will begin regular work. They will be dismissed at 11:30. The following day all grades will move out on full time.

The following announcements are repeated for the benefit of the public.

All children in grades 6 and 7, regardless of where they live, will attend the Intermediate School in the old high school building.

The Evans Street School, the Model School, and the West Greenville School will contain only grades 1 to 5 inclusive.

All children in the West Greenville School Zone, grades 1 to 5 inclusive, will attend the West Greenville School. (This includes all children in these grades who attended either the Evans Street or the Model School last year, but who now live in the Greenville school zone.)

The children who attended the Annex at the Model School last year will report to the Evans Street School this year. (This does not apply to those living in the West Greenville School Zone.)

Asheville's Water
Supply Shortage
Practically Solved

Asheville, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Asheville's water supply shortage problem have been practically solved, by cutting into the city mains of sources from North Fork, Beaver Lake, Asheville School Lake, and other places. The city now has a water supply of 3,000,000 gallons a day, which is said to be sufficient, if reasonable conservation of water is practiced.

FUTURE POLICY OF
NAVY NOW IN STATE
OF UNCERTAINTY

Disastrous Loss of the Shenandoah Apparently Has Caused Great Uncertainty; Wilbur Considering Best Course to Pursue

Washington, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The disastrous loss of the dirigible Shenandoah apparently has thrown the Navy's whole future policy with respect to lighter than air craft developments into a state of uncertainty. Out of this may come the decision to close down the Navy's air station at New Jersey. Secretary Wilbur is now considering the best course to pursue and has a definite plan in mind, but will not discuss the matter with Naval experts before making any statement. The collapse of the Shenandoah occurring in the shadow of the failure to find any trace so far of the loss of the PN-9 No. 1 plane of the attempted non-stop flight to Hawaii has not broken the Navy's determination to carry forward air craft developments to the utmost. But Secretary Wilbur has decreed that the rewards must be equal to the risk. The Secretary has ordered that the second attempt at a non-stop flight to Hawaii be abandoned for the present at any rate.

"We have had enough trouble for a while," the Secretary said, "and we don't want to hazard the lives of other men until we have some definite reason for doing so." As its third reverse in recent weeks the Navy also is contemplating the failure of its plane to achieve their major mission with the McMillan Expedition in the Arctic from all of the 4, however, Secretary Mallon draws the reassuring conviction that in the expense of the Atlantic and Pacific, the United States has a bulwark of which there need be little fear of penetration by present day enemy air craft operating from overseas bases.

Radio Amateur
Says He Has Found
Missing Seaplane

St. Augustine, Fla., Sept. 4.—(AP)—The St. Augustine Record says a local amateur was in radio communication with an Australian station early today and had learned the missing sea plane PN-9 No. 1 had been found with all on board safe. No confirmation of this has been received. The paper says the amateur also learned the plane would be refueled to continue its journey. The amateur stated he heard from the Australian station every morning by appointment, and that when he heard today that the PN-9 No. 1 had been found he asked if all aboard were safe, and the Australian station replied in the affirmative.

Collections Auto
License Bureau
Were \$896,954.46

Raleigh, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The collections for August of this year by the Automobile License Bureau of the State Department of Revenue showed an increase of \$117,196 over collections by the same bureau for August, 1924.

This year's collections were \$896,954.46, as compared with \$779,758.46 for August last year. The tax on gasoline jumped from \$398,872.03 during August, 1924 to \$510,085.12 last month, a gain of \$111,213.09. The tax on gasoline was increased by the last General Assembly from three to four cents per gallon.

THE ONLY COURSE

Regrettable as is the fact that a prominent citizen of our county and faithful servant of humanity should lose his life at the hands of a drink-crazed negro, the action taken by the Court here yesterday in accepting the plea of second degree murder and meting out the maximum sentence of thirty years was the only course to be followed if justice was to be administered according to the laws of our state. In sustaining the motion of the defense counsel that the charge of first degree murder be non suited, Judge Dunn explained that in first degree murder the burden of proof of premeditation and deliberation of the crime was upon the state and that in this case the state had failed in such proofs. On the other hand the evidence tended to show that the

negro was a constant and heavy drinker as well as of low mentality and that his crime was the result of lack of his capacity for reason.

We admit that it seems unfair that the slayer of an innocent person should be permitted to continue to live but under the laws of our state justice was done and there should be no criticism of the action taken here yesterday.

GET A BROADER VIEWPOINT

Because our country is so large, we are often inclined to narrow our views regarding its various activities to the more immediate sections in which we live. Californians may think their state is a leader in road work, New Yorkers that they have the only modern buildings and Florida that it has the principal recreation resorts.

To show the narrowness of such views, consider the road question alone. The Southern states, which have been generally advertised as having bad roads, are rapidly forging to the front in the construction of new paved motor roads. Reports from the highway departments of 16 southern states show that under their direction, a total of \$170,000,000 is available for new roads this year.

Including the construction work under way by counties and townships, the sums being spent in the South this year for road improvements will aggregate approximately \$400,000,000.

As it is with roads, so it is with other lines of activity. The whole country is growing. We should all know more about its resources and realize that its development is not confined to any one favored section.

Declares Outlook Good, Tobacco Prices Promising

The price of good tobacco on the opening sales of the Eastern Carolina Tobacco Markets was lower than expected and while farmers in consequence are more or less disappointed and depressed, I do not believe the first sales are an index to future prices. On the contrary I rather think it is a pretty good indication of much better prices when tobacco of quality as well as color comes on the market in quantity. Therefore I would encourage farmers to look forward hopefully and with confidence to profitable returns from this crop nor do I believe they will be disappointed in doing so for many good and strong reasons, chief among which is the fact that Eastern North Carolina has the best crop of tobacco that has been grown here since 1919.

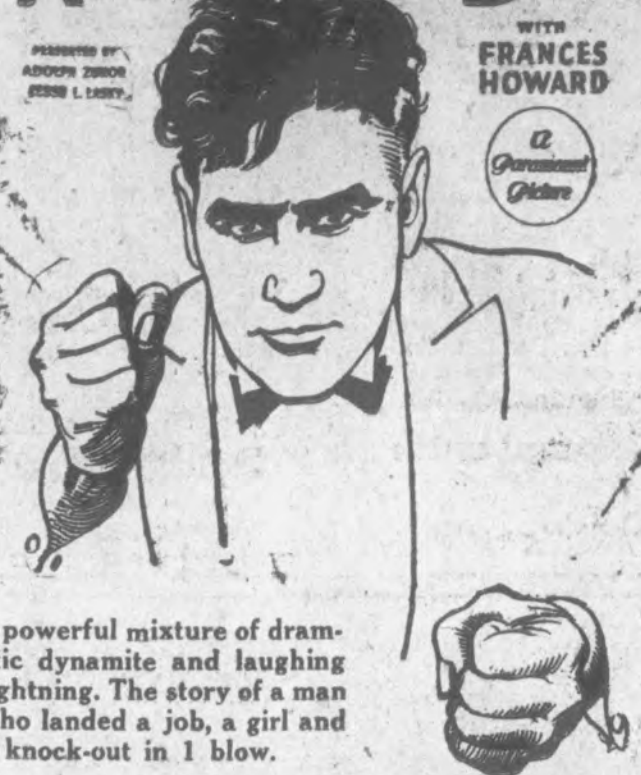

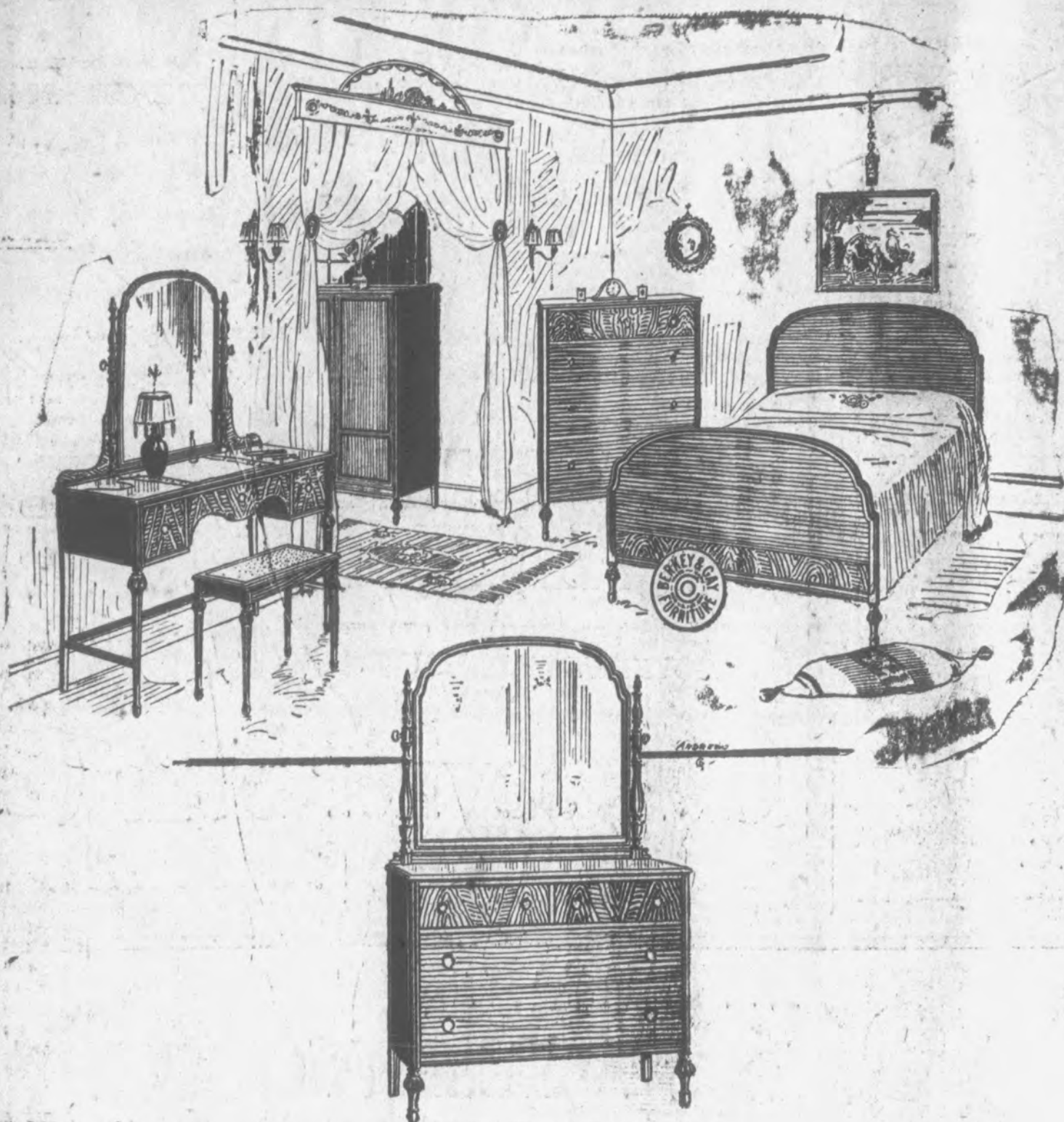
