TEACHERS CONFERENCE WILL BE HELD HERE ON SEPTEMBER 10 AND 11

The Consolidated and Long Term Rural Schools of Pitt County Will Open September 14; Plans for Work to Be Discussed at Conference

The consolidated and long term rural schools of Pitt County will open on September 14th. Approximately two thirds of all the rural white children of the county will be enrolled in these schools. On Thursday and Friday, September 10th and 11th, the teachers from these schools will gather in Greenville for a two days' conference. At this conference, the plan of work for the entire year will be fully gone into and every teacher made acquainted with it. This conference will be of untold benefit and help to the teachers in their work.

Members of the State Board of Education as well as representatives from the college in this city, together with representatives from the county school system will take part. Two conferences, morning and afternoon, will be held daily. On Friday afternoon Mr. A. T. Allen, state superintendent of Public Instruction will speak to the teachers. The district committeemen from the rural schools have been especially invited to attend this conference and it is hoped that many friends of the schools in Greenville will take advantage of the opportunity to hear him. These conferences are scheduled to be held in the new high school building. In case this should not be ready, it will be held in the Administration Building of East Carolina Teachers College. The conference will open promptly at 10:30 Thursday morning, September 10th. Detailed program for the conference is given below.

COOLIDGE ASSUMES NAVY WILL WANT A NEW DIRIGIBLE

The Los Angeles Cannot Be Used for Military Purposes, Therefore American Built Ship Must Be Provided

New York, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Investigation of the wreck of the Navy dirigible is being continued on the scene at Cardwell, Ohio, tempered by the fact that curious seekers have looted the debris. Meanwhile the body of most of the 14 victims of the disaster are on their way to burial at hero graves at Arlington cemetery, or to the homes of relatives. Comment on the cause of the disaster is world wide, as are expressions of sympathy and speculation as to the future of dirigibles. President Coolidge has let it be known at the Summer White House that he assumes the Navy will want to build a new dirigible for military purposes. The Los Angeles, the only such craft left in possession of the United States, can not be used for such purposes under the Versailles treaty. Secretary Wilbur has his doubts about the building of a new ship, however, indicating that it depends upon the budget.

Mrs. Zachery Landsdowne, widow of the Commander of the Shenandoah, now says she was misunderstood in statements credited to her that the ship was sent on a trip for political purposes over protests her husband had made because of his knowledge of Ohio storms. Secretary Wilbur stated that the commander himself fixed the time for the flight.

In Berlin, Dr. Hugo Eckener, head of the Zepplin works and builder of the Los Angeles, expressed surprise that the Shenandoah had no warning of the storm's approach and said he considered the tornado regions of the United States the worst in the world for airships. The unofficial opinion of the investigators is that when the radio and control cabin were wrenched loose by the storm, holes were torn in the hull and the ensuing rush of air caused the craft to buckle.

MITCHELL CHARGES DISASTERS OF AIR GOVT. NEGLIGENCE

Former Asst. Chief of the Army Air Service Declares Incompetency and Criminal Negligence Cause of Recent Disasters

San Antonio, Texas, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Predicting that he would be placed under military arrest by Monday because of his assertion, Colonel William Mitchell, air officer of the 8th area and former assistant chief of the Army Air Service, today issued a statement denouncing the War and Navy Departments in connection with the disaster to the Shenandoah and the loss of the PN-9, No. 1 in the Honolulu flight.

A statement was issued, he said, "after mature deliberation and after sufficient time had elapsed since the terrible accident to our naval air craft to find out what happened."

"These accidents are the direct results of incompetency, criminal negligence, and almost treasonable administration of the National Defense by the War and Navy Departments."

"Charging that both the Army and Navy Departments have gone to the utmost lengths to keep down the developments of aviation and to maintain aeronautics as a part of the two departments. Colonel Mitchell said that all Aviation Departments are operated by non flying officers, who know nothing about flying and that the lives of air men are being used merely as pawns in their hands."

The stormy Petrel of the air service made a direct slap at the war department for the treatment accorded him when he said:

"The air men themselves are bluffed and bulldozed so that they dare not tell the truth, knowing full well they will be deprived of their future careers, sent to the most out of way places to prevent them telling the truth, and deprived of all chances for advancement unless they subscribe to the dictates of their non flying bureaucratic superiors."

Colonel Mitchell asserted that the "conduct of the War and Navy Department has been so disgusting in the last few years as to make any self-respecting officer ashamed of the cloth he wears."

Colonel Mitchell asserted that the determination of the members of the flying service to place the issue squarely up to Congress and the people, date from the killing of Lieutenant Pierson and Please Turn to Page Six)

BAROGRAPH USED ON DIRIGIBLE MAY AID INVESTIGATION

Barograph and Records of the Shenandoah Found in Hands of Souvenir Seekers; Will Check Up Reading Barograph Record

Cardwell, Ohio, Sept. 5.—(AP)—The much thought of barograph and records from the Shenandoah have been found and may aid the Naval authorities in determining the cause of the smash up. The barograph was located at Cambridge, and the log sheets were found a short distance away. They were in the hands of souvenir seekers. The authorities have not had time as yet to check up on the reading of the barograph record. The record is to be photographed and enlarged so that the authorities may determine the altitude during the storm and before the storm. The barograph record will show air pressure, atmosphere moisture, and temperature.

From the draft drawn on the automatic draft by the moving stylus, it will be possible also to compute how rapidly the Shenandoah rose in the storm before the wreck occurred.

If found necessary Captain George Steele, Commander of the Lake Hurst Station, who arrived here today for an investigation, will follow over land the path taken by the drifting prow of the ship after it left the aft portion and departed. Should they follow that course they would be obliged to climb hills and cross ravines. It is expected the investigation will last most of today.

Oldest Steamer Burned.
Koepping, Sweden.—The steamer Fenix, which, it was claimed, was the oldest in the world in active service, recently was destroyed by fire. Built in 1848 at Motala wharf, the boat had been making regular trips between this city and Stockholm. Since its launching it had been rechristened several times and was rebuilt in 1900.

KIWANIANS IN INTERESTING MEET HERE LAST NIGHT

Kiwanian Rowlett Explains Activities of Merchants Association; Jimmie Keech Gives Interesting Facts Concerning Local High School

Old time "pep" prevailed throughout last night's meeting of the Kiwanis Club, and in the absence of President Charlie Laughinghouse, "skule tauter" Ralph Deal presided. After the filling of the inner man from the once heavily laden table and the disposing of the fun side of the program, including "Chasie" Forbes, the remainder of the hour was turned over to Billy Woodard, the much sought friend, who was in charge of the program.

Kiwanian Clinton Rowlett who has recently been made secretary of the Merchants Association, was called upon to explain the activities of his organization, and to say what his association hoped to contribute to the movement of making Greenville bigger and better. Kiwanian Rowlett first told of the lines along which an association is operated, and the benefits its members derive, including the credit bureau which carries the correct credit rating of practically every man and woman who does a credit business in the city. He further said "that since he had assumed his position with the Merchants Association, that he had been made to realize more than ever before, the dire need of an organization that will serve all business interest of Greenville. And there being no such body in existence, the association of which he was secretary had assumed the responsibility of talking of at least a portion of the work of a Chamber of Commerce. In closing his remarks Mr. Rowlett solicited the support and co-operation of every interest in the city to the end that Greenville may demand and receive its well deserved place among the best cities of the state.

Jimmie Keech, who succeeds Victor Davis as principal of the local high school was a guest of the club, gave the members many interesting facts concerning the institution, and what the school authorities hoped to accomplish the coming session through the earnest co-operation of teacher, parent and student.

The club endorsed the suggestion offered by Rev. L. R. O'Brien that the various organizations of the city exert their efforts to the end that the telephone service hours be lengthened two or three hours in the evening. Such service has long been needed here, and consensus of opinion is that the business during those hours would justify the officer of the Telephone Companies remaining open.

Bob Fitzgerald announced that the publicity and ticket committee for the appearance here of the U. S. Navy band on October 19, had practically all their plans perfected, and that the forces would begin their work within a few days.

A duet of musicians, descendants of Ham, furnished several peppery numbers at the conclusion of the evening's program.

GREAT WEEK IN HISTORY PITT CO. COURTS CLOSES



Criminal Court Featured by the Hearing of Over 135 Cases, in Day and Night Sessions, and Presided Over by Judge Albion Dunn, Breaks All Records

Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases, Judge Albion Dunn, presiding, was concluded this afternoon after more than 130 cases had been disposed of. In addition to the record-breaking number of cases disposed of, the court established a new record when sessions totalling 72 hours were held in the five and one half days.

Judge Dunn at the beginning of the sessions declared his intention of clearing the docket, and by continuing less than a dozen cases and by holding night sessions, he was able to carry out his plans. More than thirty-five persons have been added to the road force, in addition to a number sent to the state prison to serve terms ranging from four to thirty years.

At the conclusion of the final session today the following endorsement of the work of Judge Albion Dunn and Solicitor Davis, in this term of court was signed by the members of the Pitt County Bar and presented to the court:

"We the undersigned of the Pitt County Bar do herewith express our appreciation of the dispatch, fairness and ability with which his Honor Judge Albion Dunn and Honorable Jesse H. Davis, Solicitor have tried and disposed of the largest number of criminal cases ever tried in one week of the Pitt County Superior Court, and we think these able and efficient officers deserve the gratitude of the citizenship of this county."

Leander Gardner, charged with selling liquor, was adjudged guilty and sentenced to jail for a term of 6 months, to be assigned to work public roads.

John L. Horne was sentenced to 30 days in jail on charge of being drunk and disorderly, and sentenced to jail for 6 months on charge of resisting officer. Term to begin at expiration of 30 days sentence. Defendant gives notice of appeal to Supreme Court, under appearance bond of \$1000.00. Appeal bond fixed at \$50.00. Defendant allowed 60 days in which to make up and serve case or appeal. State allowed 30 days thereafter to serve counter case or exceptions.

B. Pilgreen pled guilty of the charge drunk and disorderly. Judgment suspended upon payment of cost.

Walter Dupree charged with assault with deadly weapon, pled not guilty and pled under sixteen years of age. Jury finds defendant 16 years or more and guilty of assault with deadly weapon. Judgment suspended.

Walter Dupree pled guilty of larceny and was sentenced to 6 months to be assigned to work public roads.

Frank Langley was adjudged guilty of receiving, possessing and selling whiskey, and was sentenced to jail for 6 months, to be assigned to work county roads.

Sam Mooring pled guilty of assault with deadly weapon. Judgment suspended upon payment of cost.

J. M. Williams pled guilty of having whiskey for sale and was sentenced to 6 months in jail, to be assigned to work roads.

Glout Moore was adjudged not guilty on the charge receiving stolen goods.

H. H. Proctor, Jr., charged with larceny was adjudged not guilty.

John Scarboro charged with allowing dog to run at large was found not guilty.

Corra Eason and John Bullock charged with fornication and adultery.

LARGE EFFORTS BEING PUT FORTH FIND SEA PLANE

Surface Ships, Submarines and Airplanes Are Pursuing An Intensive Search for PN-9 No. 1

Honolulu, Sept. 5.—(AP)—New and larger efforts are being put forth by naval forces in this district in the search for the missing sea plane PN-9, No. 1, which disappeared nearly ninety hours ago some where on the broad Pacific near the Hawaii Islands.

Faint hope for the safety of Commander John Rodgers and his four companions were aroused when the tender Whippoorwill reported that three widely separated flares had been seen on Tuesday night.

A naval scout plane piloted by Lieutenant Peterson was forced down yesterday off the coast of the Island of Kauai. The identity of the plane was unknown for many hours and led to a report that it probably was the missing PN-9, No. 1. This was corrected by Navy officers last night when they identified the Peterson plane.

Surface ships, submarines, and air planes are pressing an intensive search. A submarine screen, after covering hundreds of square miles without sighting the missing plane, or any wreckage, is proceeding southward with the hope that the plane may have drifted in that direction. Destroyers accompanying the fleet which is returning from Australia, are being rushed to Hawaiian waters to join in the search in the faint hope that the ocean may give up its secret.

Belle Valley Gives Up Last of Her Shenandoah Dead

Cardwell, O., Sept. 5.—Belle Valley gave up the last of her Shenandoah dead today.

Fully realizing the duty crushed so suddenly, the 300 quiet folk of the village sought to bar the more curious and otherwise to maintain reverence for the victims of the dirigible's final crash with the elements, which early Thursday morning broke her asunder. Flag draped and flower adorned, the last four caskets this morning were started on their final journey.

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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

"Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is." Hebrews 10: 25.

NO. II

Last Saturday night we thought of some of the excuses for non-attendance at Church. Let us, to-night, look at some legitimate reasons.

1. One good reason for absenting oneself from Church is unrepented sin. You cannot always tell what people are by looking at their faces. If one who seems to be living a clean life has some secret and shameful sin, still persisted in, still loved, hidden behind his appearance; he has a reason for not associating with Church people.

The Church wants all sinners to come in—but they must leave their love of sin outside. Many otherwise good men are outside the Church because they are not willing to part with their sin. And as long as they remain thus unwilling to give up the wrong they are right in "forsaking the assembling of themselves" with those who are earnestly and honestly trying to overcome the evil within them.

2. Another good reason for non-Church attendance is indifference to the Church's claims.

The Church professes to be the depository of Divine Truth: the living Body of Christ; the organism through which God is working out His purpose and plan for the redemption of the world.

Now, there are many people, some in Greenville, who do not particularly care whether God works out His plan or not. They are not at all interested in religious things. They think more highly of their stomachs than of their souls. They live without prayer. They hear the whistle calling them to work on Monday morning, but are deaf to the bells calling them to worship on Sunday. They really expect to live—and live—and live. They rarely think of death; they dis-

miss the thought as unpleasant. They rise in the morning, eat, and go to work; come home at night, eat, and go to bed as if this routine could never end. And it is not only poor people who exhibit this indifference. We find business men who think Salvation is spelt with the dollar mark, Salvation; politicians and magistrates, like Gallio, whose brother, the famous philosopher Seneca said:—"he was a most good-natured, popular, and affectionate man," yet when St. Paul told him of the glad tidings of a Risen Saviour, "Gallio cared for none of these things." On all sides of us rich and poor seem to think sensual enjoyment and material possession to be the chief and only aim of life.

Well, if they do not care, they have a good reason for staying away from Church. The Church opens her arms to receive all who do care—all who have caught the vision of a spiritual life—all who have begun to realize that a man's life does not consist in the abundance of the things that he has.

3. There are others who give as their reason for absence from Church in words like these:—"I work all the week, and on Sunday I like to go out to the country, and worship God in Nature. I can be as good a Christian and go to Heaven outside the Church as in it."

There is something in that. With a few qualifications I could admit it's truth. God forbid that all who have not joined the Church should be lost! A man may be generous, kind, helpful, true, clean and honest, in all his relationships as father, friend and business man; and yet live his life outside the Church. Everyone admits that he is "good," and that his place should be with the family of God. His portion, we hope, will be Heaven, because Jesus said:—"Whosoever shall do the will of My Father which is in heaven, he is my brother, and sister, and mother."

But something more must be said than this. Such a man may be doing the will of God, isolated and alone, outside the Church; but he is not fulfilling all God's will. It is a part of God's will that He should be known; that His truth should be proclaimed in all the earth. If the Church has done, or is doing, anything, is it not this one thing? Its sole object is to keep and glorify the things of God, and to spread His knowledge through every age and land. No perfectly good man could refuse to co-operate in this mission of the Church. All we know of God has been preserved for us through the ages by the Church. The extension of His Kingdom has been the result of the associated effort of His followers—not by any individual activity.

A true, patriotic soldier may be placed in the territory of the enemy alone; like St. Paul at Athens. But, also like St. Paul, he will not accomplish much after all. It was the one place where the Apostle practically failed. And a good man outside the Church, unassociated with the efforts of other good men, is like a lonely soldier combatting a host single-handed. He may go to Heaven—yes; but his one regret there will be that he missed the union and communion of the Christian Church on earth.

FAKE CALL TO SETTLE BOUNDARY DRAWS IRISH FARMERS TO TOWN

Belfast.—Farmers on both sides of the Tyrone-Donagel border have been the victims of a boundary commission hoax. Letters which had been posted in Strabane summoned them to a meeting to give evidence regarding the proposed transference of this particular district and instructing them to prepare a statement giving particulars bearing on the question.

All shades of politics were represented in those getting communications and the recipients, foolscap sheets in hand, flocked to Strabane on the appointed day. They were greatly surprised to discover there was no one at the Town Hall to receive them and it then dawned upon them that they had been hoaxed. They rapidly disappeared and their explanation to their friends was that their visit to Strabane was connected with something entirely different.

Governors Clash Over Bridge



What the Governor of North Carolina said to the chief executive of South Carolina is something else to the verbal passages between Gov. Silzer, of New Jersey, and Gov. Pinchot, of Pennsylvania. The former wants to charge tolls on the interstate bridge, while the Keystone executive insists there must be no charge for the use of the span and tunnel.

Latin America Draws \$4,000,000,000 Total Investment From U. S.

Washington.—A study to determine the total and character of investments made by United States citizen in Latin-American countries has been undertaken by the Commerce Department, and completed so far as the first country on the list, Argentina, is concerned. Government securities of that nation have been purchased by North Americans to a total of \$292,800,000, while investment and ownership in private industry and enterprise accounts for \$100,000,000 additional.

A preliminary estimate of the capital taken out of the United States for investment in Latin America places the total at \$4,000,000,000. England, with an estimated total investment in Latin-America of \$6,618,000,000, the department found, is the only nation more heavily interested financially in the Latin-American republics than the United States.

"The conditions in the English money market, the most important source of investment funds for the Latin-American countries," the commerce report said, "since the beginning of the war, compelled the latter to look upon the United States for financial assistance. The past few years have witnessed a considerable growth in American financial interest in Latin America, this report discloses, which are now conservatively estimated at upwards of \$4,000,000,000 or about two fifths of our present total foreign investments."

"This amount is represented by the ownership of public utilities and the proprietorship of, or participation in a wide range of enterprises such as mining companies, public utilities, industrial plants, land and cattle enterprises and miscellaneous commercial undertakings.

"In Argentina alone, with which the report specifically deals, American participation has risen from a minor position to one of importance. Great Britain, which early took the initiative in investing in Latin America, has long maintained the lead in the financing of Argentine enterprises, especially railroads and other public utilities. The United States with its banks, meat packing plants, oil companies, and a variety of other undertakings, has reached a comparatively strong position."

Japanese Dentist Honored.

Tokyo.—The honorary degree of doctor of laws recently was conferred upon Dr. Morinosuke Chiwaki, president of Tokyo Dental College, by Loyola University of Chicago. It was the first time such a degree has been conferred upon a Japanese dentist.

Dr. Chiwaki, known as the "father of dentistry in Japan," received the degree in the presence of a large assemblage of Japanese and Americans. It was presented to him by the late American Ambassador, Edgar A. Bancroft.

ELDERLY BICYCLIST ON TOUR AIMS TO SEE EVERY AMERICAN CAPITAL

Olympia, Wash.—E. D. Bowen, 66 who is touring the country on a bicycle, reached here recently from his home in Galesburg, Ill., having covered 7,000 miles in the 103 days he was on the road. He characterized the tour as a "pleasure jaunt," and declared that because he traveled on a bicycle he was able to "see all the sights."

Olympia is the 25th capital Bowen has visited, and he plans to see every one in the Union before returning home.

Twenty-five years ago Bowen made a similar trip abroad, visiting nine European countries.

ARMY SPENDS MORE THAN \$10,000,000 IN PHILIPPINES

Manila.—The United States army in the Philippine Islands spent \$10,147,386 in cash sent from the United States during 1924, a statement prepared by the Philippine department shows.

This sum not include all of the money spent during the year to meet the needs of the army in the Philippines, but simply represents the actual cash disbursed here. In addition to this sum much more was spent in the United States for supplies and materials which were sent to the islands during the year.

Of the total expended here in cash, \$5,567,163 went for the pay of officers and enlisted men, field clerks and army ures. The balance was expended for forage for the several thousand horses and mules, subsistence stores, coal, gasoline and many other articles.

ROME NEWSPAPER SUPPRESSED FOR PUBLISHING ERRONEOUS ITEM

Rome.—Reformers who urge that newspapers be forbidden to print gruesome details of crimes or sensational news, tending to influence legal investigations or trials, won a signal victory recently when the Prefect of Rome exercised the powers vested in him under the Fascist Press Law to suppress an important newspaper which asserted erroneously that the perpetrator of a sensational crime had been identified.

An edition of the Tribuna, one of Rome's leading evening newspapers was seized and the next day the prefect announced the suppression had been caused by the paper's publication of a statement that a criminal who had brutally killed a little girl had been found. This, the prefect explained, was untrue and its widespread publication, he asserted, tended to frustrate the ends of justice.

LABOR DISPUTES CAUSE LOSS OF MILLIONS OF DAYS IN ENGLAND

London.—Over 8,000,000 working days were lost during 1924 in England owing to labor disputes, which numbered 709 and involved 612,000 work people, says the Ministry of Labor Gazette. The annual loss of working time owing to industrial disputes during 32 years averaged 12,400,000 days, equivalent to less than one day per head of the whole employed population. During 1919-22 the figures were much above the average, but in 1923 and 1924 as well as the first six months of 1925 they have fallen to considerably less than an annual average of one day per head of the employed population.

In 191 nearly 86,000,000 days were lost through disputes mostly in the coal trade.

Lake Arrowhead, Cal.—One of the valuable aids to the United States forestry service in this mountain resort section is a pine tree nearly 200 feet high, on the north shore of Lake Arrowhead. The tree serves the ranger lookout even as it served Indian warriors scores of years ago in tribal wars. At the base of the pine signs blazed in the past by the Indians may be seen dimly.

Today keen-eyed rangers keep continual watch in the upper branches for forest fires. They are equipped with powerful glasses and telephones in modern contrast to the sharp eyes of the aboriginal lookout and his crude wig-wag system.

British Students to Fly.

London.—Two university air squadrons at Oxford and Cambridge for the training of a certain number of undergraduates, were predicted by Air Minister Sir Samuel Hoars in a speech recently. 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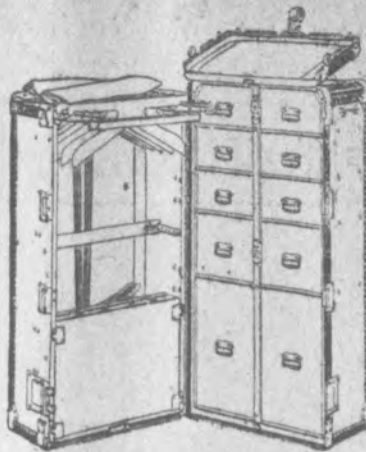

CANNOT COMPLETE WITH U. S. AUTO TRADE, SAYS GERMAN

Berlin. — A number of reasons were expressed recently by Dr. Carl Reichstein, automobile industrialist, why, in his opinion, Germany never can compete with the United States as an automobile market. Explaining the necessity for a protective automobile duty, he pointed out that Germany never will be in a position attaining anything like American prices because of the impossibility of turning out the same number of cars, and even if this were feasible there would be no means of disposing them.

An automobile in Germany is a much greater luxury than in America, Dr. Reichstein declared, and even in the event of a general increase in incomes no person with an annual income of 10,000 marks would dream of buying a car for a price even as low as 2,000 marks.

EDUCATIONAL AUTHORITIES STUDY TENDENCIES OF JAPANESE YOUTHS

Tokyo. — While the rising generation of Japan appears to be little affected by "radical thoughts," there is unmistakable evidence of general moral decadence brought on by the world war and aggravated by the 1923 earthquake disaster, is the conclusion recently reached by the Department of Education after studying papers collected from the students of 199 middle schools and girls high schools throughout the country.

The department started its investigation last year with the view of obtaining the mental reactions of young Japan on various moral and ethical questions. The students, it was said, apparently were quite frank in answering the questions put to them. One of the officials, summing up his conclusion, said it was particularly noticeable that many boys and girls seemed to lack the power of judging between right and wrong.

WAR OF SHELLS MORE BARBAROUS THAN GAS, FRENCH DOCTOR

Paris.—The war in Morocco—for must be recognized as war now that Marshal Petain, who is really the commander-in-chief of the French army, has revived discussion in the Paris press whether gas ought to be used in warfare.

There seems to be no question of the state's right to use gas against individual disturbers of the peace, as the police have recently employed or prepared to employ gas to arrest criminals, locked in their rooms, without any protest being raised.

A prominent surgeon, Jean Louis Faure, who saw much service during the World War, writing to the Figaro, says that the use of poison gas is extremely mild "if anything can be called mild in warfare. It alone allows a military object to be gained without excessive massacres and bloodshed.

Men will hold a position to the last against explosive shells but a few well-placed gas shells will oblige them to evacuate before the losses are heavy.

"Gas does but little damage. The famous flood of gas at Prosnas, the

most fatal case of its use during the war, hardly made more than 200 victims, less than a few well-placed explosive bombs would have made.

"Men who have been gassed, however sad their fate, were not, in general, objects of pity than those who had been permanently maimed, mangled or blinded.

"War is a terrible thing, but if we have to draw a distinction between two forms of barbarism, gas barbarism is less than shell barbarism. It is less deadly and yet more efficient."

EARLY ACTION BY CONGRESS EXPECTED ON REVENUE BILL

Reduction of Tax On This
Year's Income Expected to
Speed Early Action

Swampscott, Mass., Sept. 5.—(AP)—President Coolidge's plan to have the next reduction in taxes applied on income of this year, on which levies will be paid during the next year, is expected to result in early action by Congress on the Revenue Bill.

First tax payments on the new year are due March 15. Administration leaders believe a tax reduction bill can be passed by that time and Chairman Greene of the House Ways and Means Committee has called that Committee to meet next month to start on a tax bill.

Determined also to have Congress approve in the next session a proposed reorganization of Executive department, Mr. Coolidge is standing firm against any modification of the principal features of this proposal if presented to the next Congress. He also urged at a conference yesterday with educational leaders of this state to recommending separate department of education.

Mr. Coolidge replied that he favored the proposed department of educational and welfare, including bureaus outside of educational work, as provided in the proposed organization.

Negro Trustee of State Prison Listed 'Among the Missing'

Raleigh, Sept. 5.—Will Lemmons, negro trustee of the state prison, is listed "among the missing," and a prison automobile is gone as the result of the incident which occurred late yesterday afternoon.

Lemmons, who was serving a four year sentence after conviction in Gaston county of forgery, was delegated to proceed to the prison farm on the Gary road a few miles from Raleigh. He was provided with an automobile and being a trustee was unaccompanied.

Late today the negro had not shown up at his destination and the automobile still was missing.

Murphy, Sept. 5.—(AP)—The pastures in Cherokee county have given out, and many of the cattle will have to be sold, R. W. Gray, county farm agent reports.

Wrong Girl; Poses Search
for Kidnapper

Montclair, N. J., Sept. 5.—Poses today intensified their search for a little white girl kidnapped by a negro who presumably killed another negro in order to get an automobile for the abduction. Apparently having planned to kidnap the niece of a wealthy banker, the fugitive seems to have found that he got the wrong girl.

The kidnapping plot, police believed, was aimed against Joseph A. Bowers, vice-president of the New York Trust Company, whose seven year old niece was visiting him. Instead, the negro grabbed Mary Daly, six year old

daughter of a hardware merchant, who was playing in front of the Bower home yesterday afternoon. John A. Pierce, a negro chauffeur was killed by the abductor in order to get the man's automobile.

Last night Mrs. Bower was called on the telephone by a man, who demanded \$4,000 for the return of her niece. But her niece was safe in bed at the time and the man hung up when Mrs. Bower asked him his name. The kidnapper grabbed Mary from several of her playmates and sped away in a sedan, choking the girl's screams with one hand and driving with the other.
