OPENING ASHEVILLE
SCHOOLS POSTPONED
WATER SHORTAGE

Situation Throughout Eastern
and Western Carolina Be-
coming Critical; Various
Sections Offering Prayer for
Relief From Drought

Charlotte, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Various sections of North Carolina today continued to feel the long summer drought with no promise of relief to any except the North east portion, where showers are predicted for tonight by the weather bureau. Western North Carolina is feeling the lack of rain severely with the opening of the city schools at Asheville being postponed from today until September 14. This action was taken upon recommendation of the city commission because of the water shortage situation. Connecting of additional water mains, however, is promised to relieve the scarcity within a week.

Children today attended public school at Snow Camp, in Alamance county, with their drinking water in bottles, because of the drought having effected the source of supply at the institution. Streams and wells in that section are reported to be low and the situation in that section is a serious matter.

Citizens at King's Mountain yesterday were called upon by their Mayor to offer prayer for the dry section, although no shortage is reported there.

The lack of rain has caused no great inconvenience in Charlotte, and surrounding territories. But from Hickory comes the report that the farmers in that section are forced to feed their cattle at night because the pastures do not give them sufficient grazing during the day. Caldwell county also reports serious damage in crops and a similar situation exists in Durham county.

Fire Prevention Week
Set for Oct. 4-10

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The week of October 4 to 10 has been set aside as Fire Prevention Week in North Carolina, Stacey W. Wade, insurance commissioner, has announced. The Governor is expected to issue a proclamation shortly officially designating it as such, Mr. Wade stated.

The department is already at work making plans for Fire Prevention Week, and getting in touch with municipal officials and civic organizations, through which the fire prevention program will be made effective, Mr. Wade says.

The commissioner has written the civic organizations and clubs throughout the state, asking their co-operation. Pointing out that "343 lives and five and a half millions lost in property is too great a toll for one state to pay," the letter continues:

"Our citizenship must be impressed by the fact that five and a half million dollars has to be paid out of North Carolina's resources, and that unless the men big enough to take the lead in civic activities take the proper attitude toward the rigid enforcement of our building laws, better equipped fire departments, safe electrical installation, better and safer school building, dormitories and hospitals, we can reasonably expect this enormous toll to increase from year to year. It is indeed a challenge to every civic organization in North Carolina."

Hope of Finding
Lost Flag Plane is
Virtually Given Up

San Francisco, Sept. 7.—(AP)—An announcement that he "virtually had given up hope" that the crew of the lost PN-9, No. 1 flag plane of the San Francisco to Hawaii flight would be found alive, was made here today by Captain Sam E. Moses, United States Navy Commander of the Flight project.

"We virtually have given up hope of regaining the crew," Captain Moses said. "We now have 11 destroyers fueling at Honolulu for the purpose of engaging in a final survey of the waters where the PN-9, No. 1, came down. We have done all that could be done."

BINGHAM TERMS
MITCHELL'S CHARGES
AS EXAGGERATED

Commander Largest American
Flying Field in Europe During
World War Defends
Army and Navy Against
Scathing Denunciation

San Antonio, Texas, September 7.—(AP)—Colonel Wm. A. Mitchell flew today with his latest statement of criticism of what he termed "gross defects in the management of the air service" issued Saturday, was resounding in echo throughout the country. Friends and supporters of the Eight Corps Area Air officer, and former Assistant Chief of the Army Air Service poured telegrams of support and congratulations at his home here on his scathing denunciation of alleged incompetence and negligence in the conduct of army and navy aviation.

No official communication from Washington had been received at his quarters, it was said. At Swampscott, President Coolidge made no comment but it was indicated he would leave the matter to the War Department officials and support them in any action they might see fit to take.

That Colonel Mitchell thought he had gone about the limit, was made plain in his statement upon issuing his charges that he expected to be under arrest by Monday. He stated that he would welcome arrest and trial by court martial if by his trial he could develop facts to sting the conscience of the American people so that they would force correction of the "gross defects in the management of the air service."

The colonel's statement was not received entirely with approbation of silence, however, for Hiram Bingham, United States Senator and commander of the largest American flying field in Europe during the world war, replied with a defense for the army and navy in which he termed many of Mitchell's charges as "exaggerated," he said, "and that his attack on the army and navy is very unfair to many who are as loyal and patriotic officers to the grave problems of National defense as he is. I would be better satisfied, however, if the navy placed its flying schools, airplane carriers and aeronautical operations in the hands of flying officers."

At Port San Houston this morning General Ernest Hinds, 8th corps area Commander, declined to make any statement regarding Colonel Mitchell. Asked if he had received instructions from Washington, General Hinds answered "I have no statement to make."

11 Negroes Arrested
In Connection Negro's
Death Are Released

Henderson, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Officers are still seeking clues which will lead to the arrest of the person responsible for the death of Ed Davis, negro, whose body was found in the woods near Elwood cemetery sometime ago.

Eleven negroes arrested in connection with the negro's death have been given a hearing and all have been discharged.

Defendant Tells
Lawyer That He Will
See Him After Court

Durham, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Indignant over an inference that "you stole the balance," made by Attorney Hugh Scarlett in Recorder's court here, J. L. Gaitley, defendant, warmly told the lawyer that he would see him after court. The inference came in connection with the cross examination of the defendant. Gaitley was told in no uncertain terms by Judge Graham that such threats could not be permitted in the court.

Clam Season Opens
Oct. 1, Oyster Season
Opens October 15th

Wilmington, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The clam season will open October 1, and the oyster season on October 15, J. Herbert Stone, fish commissioner, has announced. Mr. Stone made the statement in connection of an erroneous report that the oyster season would open October 1. The law fixes the dates, Mr. Stone says, the oyster season opening 15 days after the clam season.

EXECUTIVE BOARD
OF WOMAN'S CLUB
HOLDS MEETING

New Constitution Approved
By the Board; Building
Committee to Conduct "Buy
a Brick" Campaign in Near
Future

The Executive Board of the Woman's Club met at Mrs. J. K. Brown's on Friday, Sept. 4, with 12 present. While the club, as a whole, has been idle this summer, various committees and department chairmen have been at work.

The circles for Ways and Means have made good returns for the summer months, having served in Horne's Drug Store once each month, canvassed the town on commission for Country Gentleman, and in other ways raised money to keep the Librarian paid and other obligations met.

The Constitution Committee submitted a new Constitution, which the Board approved and will submit to the Club at its meeting October 1st.

The House Committee reported that meetings of the Club will be held this year in the Annex to the Model School on Cotach Street. This building is arranged to seat 150 people, with heat, electric lights, piano and a raised platform, ideal for all purposes of the Club for the present, and Superintendent Rose has granted permission for its use gratis to the Club. For the past several years the Club has been meeting in a class room at the Memorial Baptist Church, which room has also been generously donated to our use, and we wish publicly to express our gratitude for this favor.

The Library Committee reported on the removal of the Library to the Evans St. School, which is a pleasing location, the room being commodious and on the ground floor. This room is also given to the Library by the School Board. A large increase in patronage is expected, although the daily patronage of the Library throughout the summer months has been good. The Library Committee have great plans for the future of the Library.

The treasurer of the Tuberculosis fund reported \$35 expended during the summer.

Chairman of Civics reported that rooms would be furnished through the Club to the County teachers who are to meet here on Sept. 10 and 11, and the Sept. circle will serve two 35 cent lunches to these teachers.

Building Committee reported several new pledges, and plans for a "Buy a Brick" campaign soon to be carried on.

Membership Committee presented two new names. This committee is also to conduct a membership campaign. Attention of the women of Greenville is called to this article which has always been in our constitution, and which is to be enforced this year.

"Members shall not invite as guests residents of the town to any meeting, but may invite non-residents."

Residents may be permitted to attend any regular meeting upon payment of a regular fee.

FORMER PREMIER RENE
VIVIANI DIED TODAY

Paris, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Former Premier Rene Viviani died today. Death occurred at 8:56 a. m. in a Sanatorium where M. Viviani had been confined for the last two years suffering from a general breakdown. The end came peacefully after a long period of feebleness.

Supreme Court to
Hear Appeal of
Henry D. Griffin

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The Supreme Court of North Carolina on Tuesday will open the second week of its fall term and will hear appeal coming up from the second district. During the past week the court heard a number of first district cases.

The most important case on the docket for this week will be that of Henry Dennis Griffin of Williamson, Martin county. Griffin is appealing from a 30 year sentence imposed upon him last May by Judge N. A. Sinclair following his conviction of being the leader of a mob which mutilated Joseph Needleman, a tobacco salesman, after the mob had removed Needleman from the Martin county jail. The young man had been incarcerated charged with an attack upon a young white woman. The charge was later thrown out of court and Needleman was given his freedom.

Number of Births in
State Continues Grow
Deaths on Decrease

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The number of births in North Carolina continues to grow, while the deaths are on the decrease.

This is shown by figures compiled by the State Bureau of Vital Statistics. The first six months of this year showed an increase of births over the same period in 1924, and the comparative figures for the two periods show that there were fewer deaths in the state during the first half of this year.

The bureau's figures show a total of 42,030 births in North Carolina during the first half of 1924 as compared with 42,197 for the same period this year, the increase being 167.

The deaths during the first six months of 1924 numbered 17,746. Deaths the first half of this year totaled 16,828, a decrease over the same period last year of 918.

Of this number of deaths for both periods—the bureau estimates that 3,000 were infants, that is babies under one year. In other words, of the 42,030 babies born during the first six months of 1924, 3,000 of them are dead now.

And not less than 250 of the mothers of these 42,030 children born during the first six months of last year have died during the year, the bureau figures show.

YOUTH CONFESSES
TRIPLE KILLING IS
NOW HELD IN JAIL

Former College Student and Inmate of Insane Asylum
Lead Officers to Body of His
Last Victim

Monclair, N. J., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Having confessed that he kidnapped and murdered six year old Mary Daly, Harrison Noel, 18 year old son of a New York Lawyer, and formerly a college student and an inmate of an insane asylum, was held in jail today. The motive for the kidnapping was ransom, but why the girl was killed was not clear. Part of the confession made by the boy is withheld by authorities. Noel confessed that he also shot and killed Raymond Pierce, a negro taxi driver, to get an automobile for the kidnapping, and then shot and killed another chauffeur who gave chase after the kidnapper.

Grinning and with a tinge of boastfulness, he stood over the body of the girl in a clump of bushes near Little Falls, N. Y., to which he had led the police. Noel said: "Well, I put two bullets into her."

The body was lying face upward. Mary's hands were crossed on her breast and there were bullet holes in her head and neck. The boy said he led the girl out of the car at 2 o'clock Saturday morning. Too frightened to utter a sound, she was left standing while he backed away and fired many shots as if at a target. Then he dragged the body into an underbrush. Noel escaped June 28 from the S. X. County Insane Asylum at Overbrook, where he had been confined at the request of his parents. He was believed to have suffered a mental breakdown from overstudy. For a short while he had been a student at Harvard, but had left by the request of the University.

The confession came after twenty-three hours of questioning by Detectives. Noel said that Mary was safe and offered to return her for \$4,000. He would not accept a check, and officers hunted up the sum in cash. When they returned Noel had changed his mind, but later he confessed and took the police to the spot where Mary was hidden. He said he determined last Tuesday to kidnap a girl for ransom, and noted the residence of Joseph A. Bower, vice President of a New York Trust Company. On Thursday he called a taxi and after killing the taxi driver, drove his car away and the next day grabbed the 14 year old girl from her playmates in front of the Bower home and drove off.

That night he telephoned the Bower residence and told them that he had kidnapped a girl with a pink dress on, who he offered to return for \$4,000. He hung up when Mrs. Bower asked for his name.

Suspicion first was attached to Noel when the license number of his own abandoned automobile, which he left when he entered the taxi cab, was reported to the police. The police went to his home and noticed blood stains on his suit, and a revolver and cartridges were found in his room.

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AMERICAN LEGION
CONVENTION OPENS
IN FAYETTEVILLE

Already Over 1,000 Ex-Service
Men Registered; Rev. John
Cook Delivers Address of
Welcome

Fayetteville, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The State American Legion Convention opened here today at 10 o'clock when Sargents Greene, Dean, Grist, Bryan dressed in Olive Drab, preceded by Major Charles Stedman, of Greensboro, advanced down the aisle of the Lafayette Theatre, while the Fort Bragg band played Dixie. Following the Star Spangled Banner sung by the audience, the invocation was delivered by the Rev. Robert E. Gribbin, of Winston-Salem. Miss Virginia Huffy, of Raleigh, who had delighted thousands during the world war with her voice, sang "Keep the Home Fires Burning," and gave several encores.

A short address of welcome was delivered by Rev. John Cook, who is himself a legionnaire. Mr. Cook stated there is no reason for welcoming the Legion and Auxiliary since they had been welcomed since the first news of their coming was heralded. It was Fayetteville's desire to give the men a good time which could never be equalled.

The response was delivered by Bryce Little, of Wilson, who spoke of the pride in the state in historic and hospitable Fayetteville.

Already 1,000 ex-service men have registered at the Legion headquarters, and a hundred at the Auxiliary headquarters. Cars are continuing to come into the city in a steady stream. The headquarters of the newly 40 and 8th Society will be on Hay Street, a small box car with "40-Hommes et Eight Chevaux" painted on the side.

Four Men of Crew
of Destroyer Nova
Killed in Explosion

Shanghai, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The Destroyer Nova, United States Navy, reported by radio tonight that four men of her crew had been killed in explosion.

The Navy Department had no further information today regarding the explosion on board the Nova. The destroyer is one of the first line vessels and has been on duty out of Shanghai. At the time of the explosion she was in temporary command of Lieutenant Robert J. Tobin.

Japanese Freighter
Radioed Message
She Was Sinking

Shanghai, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The Japanese freighter Yino Shino Maru today radioed a message that she was sinking after being caught in the center of a typhoon between Formosa and Japan. The typhoon has disorganized all shipping.

Two Bullet Punctured
Bodies Found in
Summer Cottage

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Rumors of gangdom, hatred and feud today enwrapped the mysterious double killing of Dorothy Taylor, 19 year old widow and Ben Tesmer, alleged narcotic peddler, whose bullet punctured bodies were found in a St. Louis county summer cottage yesterday.

Clerk Superior Court
New Hanover County
Has Served 20 Years

Wilmington, Sept. 7.—(AP)—After 20 years in the office of the clerk of the superior court of New Hanover county, Major W. N. Harris, now clerk of the court, sees little improvement in conditions during the two decades he has been in the office.

One exception was noted by the veteran officer. "Before prohibition was enacted, there were usually five murder trials on the docket to every one now," he said. "Otherwise, I do not see much improvement. And he pointed out that now there are more cases other than murders on the docket than ever before."

Major Harris entered the office 20 years ago as deputy clerk. He became clerk six and a half years after entering the office, and has held the position ever since.

SCOUTING MAKES
RAPID PROGRESS
SOUTHEAST STATES

Local Scout Executive Returns
From Conference of Executives of Region Six and
Makes Splendid Report

Scouting has made remarkable progress in the southeastern states, according to John H. Wilcox, Scout Executive of the Pamlico Council, who returned yesterday from a conference of the executives of Region Six at Charleston, S. C. Especially heartening is that the number of troops in this region has been practically doubled during the last 12 months and that nine tenths of all the troops are being sponsored by churches. H. O. Hunter of Macon, Ga., regional executive of Region Six which is comprised of the Carolinas, Georgia and Florida, was in charge of the conference.

The camping program has taken rapid strides and most of the councils reported that their camps have been filled with different groups of Scouts all summer long. That the strict precautions taken in Scout camp pay is shown by the splendid record of no accidents and no serious illness in camp.

Among the Scout leaders of international fame attending this conference were Dr. Geo. J. Fisher, National Field Director, Ray O. Wyland, director of the Bureau of Church Relations, and Wm. C. Wessel, who was in charge of the American troop that captured the world's championship in Denmark last summer. Forty executives of local councils and a large number of lay members attended.

Ground-Breaking of
New Fleetwood Hotel
Be Great Occasion

Hendersonville, Sept. 7.—(AP)—The formal ground-breaking ceremonies for the new Fleetwood Hotel on Jump Off Mountain, Laurel Park Estates, on September 8, will be marked by what is expected to be one of the biggest barbecues ever held in western North Carolina.

Preparations are being made to feed 5,000 people from all over this section of the state. The presidents and secretaries of civic organizations and mayors of towns throughout Western Carolina have been extended invitations to be present. Governor John W. Martin, of Florida will participate in the ground-breaking ceremonies, and Governor McLean has been invited.

Trial of Men Held
In Connection Wreck
Be Held Tuesday

Sanford, Conn., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Trial of the four men arrested on charges of murder growing out of the wreck of a Louisville and Nashville passenger train No. 24, four miles from here Saturday night in which the engineer was killed and fifteen passengers slightly injured, will be held in county court here tomorrow morning. The men were placed under arrest on charges of murder after railroad officers, detectives and local policemen said the purpose of the wreck was to rob the train.

NEGRO COMMITS SUICIDE
IN FALKLAND TOWNSHIP

Sylvester Williams, negro, early yesterday morning shot and killed himself at his home in Falkland township.

According to information Williams had in time past signed the Co-operative Tobacco Contract. Recently he moved to a farm which was owned by a man who was not a member of the Association. Knowing that he depended entirely on the man for whom he worked, the negro worried considerably over his predicament. Then, too, he was afraid of the Klu Klux Klan and was afraid that if he failed to comply with his contract, they would visit him. It is believed that these two matters worried him until he became deranged, taking his own life.

WORTHY OF IMITATION

Prisoners in "Death Row" Prefer Life Sentence to Death

Raleigh, Sept. 5.—(AP)—Would the average person, if convicted of a capital crime, prefer death to a life sentence in prison?

Prisoners in "death row" here, by their actions, invariably answer the question in the negative. Pardon Commissioner H. Hoyle Sink said today.

"I have heard a great many people say that, if they had to serve the remainder of their lives in prison they had rather just die and get through with it, but when the electric chair is near, it becomes a very different matter," said Mr. Sink.

"I have yet to see or learn of a prisoner condemned to death who failed to accept a communication to life imprisonment, and they never fail put off the fatal day, if they can."

"The nearest I ever knew of a man

failing to accept a commutation was in the case of a prisoner who had only six more weeks of a sentence to serve. He learned the Governor was going to parole him for the remainder of the term, and indicated that he would prefer to finish the sentence, rather than to be free with the remainder of his sentence hanging over him, in case of misconduct. "But when the papers were actually signed and he saw them, he quickly changed his mind and availed himself of the opportunity to secure his liberty six weeks earlier."

PHILADELPHIA SEEKS POLICE WHO CAN OUTWIT CRIMINALS

Philadelphia.—Brains, more than physical prowess, will be sought hereafter in recruits for the Philadelphia police department, under a recent ruling of the Civil Service Commission. The decision, announced after investigations by the commission and Director of Public Safety Smedley D. D. Butler, will become effective with the next batch of candidates.

Criminals are keen-witted and quick-thinking policemen are needed to keep abreast of them, the commission said. A new code of tests for prospective blue-coats will be put into practice, designed, as far as practicable, to "predict the efficiency of a policeman."

Under the old system a candidate was given three points for physical qualification, three for training and experience, and one each for practical questions, observation and personal interview. The revised code will rank physical qualifications at two points; training and experience, two and one-half; practical questions two; personal interview two and one-half.

Most important, the new code will measure the prospective policeman's thinking ability.

Heart Disease Killed One Ninth People of State During 1924

Raleigh, Sept. 7. — (AP)—One ninth of all the people who died in North Carolina during the year 1924 died as a result of heart diseases. And deaths from diseases of the heart increased by more than 60 percent from 1923 to 1924. And diseases of the heart cause more deaths in this state than any other disease, pneumonia in all forms coming second.

Figures compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health show the various causes of death in this state. The figures show a total of 33,234 deaths in the state during the year 1924. Of this number 3,661 deaths were the result of heart diseases. And deaths from heart disease increased from 2,887 in 1923 to 3,561—or an increase of a little over 60 percent in 1924.

Pneumonia is an easy second as a cause of death, with a total of 2,925 deaths charged to that disease in all its forms in 1924. This is an increase of 178 over 1923.

Deaths to the number of 2,694 occurred during the year in which the cause was "not specified or ill-defined." The next highest cause of death, the bureau's figures show, is pulmonary tuberculosis, with 2,462 deaths last year from that cause.

Next comes 2,267 deaths resulting from cerebral hemorrhage or apoplexy, and that is followed, in the order of numbers, by diseases of the kidney which are charged with 1,874 deaths during the year.

Other death causes, listed in the

order of the number who died as a result of their ravages last year follow.

Premature birth and injury at birth 1,846; diarrhoea and enteritis under two years of age, 1,484; accidents of all kinds, 1,413; cancer, 1,289; influenza, 757; and paralysis without specified cause, 626.

These are the only causes which took more than 500 lives, each during the year, the bureau's figures show. The figures do not include deaths under one year of age, however. More infants, under a year old, die each year than from any of the causes mentioned.

The figures show increase in both homicides and suicides. The figures for homicides climbed from 56 in 1922 to 299 in 1924, which those who took their own lives number 103 in 1922 as compared with 108 last year.

Cause of death that shows a marked decrease is pellagra. The deaths resulting from that disease decreased from 306 in 1922 to 273 last year. Typhoid deaths are also on the decrease. They were 299 in 1922 and only 270 in 1924.

Whooping cough last year is held responsible for 425 deaths, measles with 427, and diphtheria 323.

EXPENSES Y. M. C. A. WERE \$40,000 MORE THAN YEAR'S INCOME

New York.—Expenditures for service to young men and boys through the Young Men's Christian Association of the United States and Canada have doubled since the World War, the year book and official roster for 1924-25 revealing a turnover of nearly \$52,000,000. The book, compiled by George B. Hodge, was issued by the National Councils of both countries.

Total income for the year was \$51,874,400, derived as follows: Contributions, 26 per cent; membership dues 12 per cent; tuition fees and other departmental activities, 12 per cent; property and endowments, 7 per cent; business features, dormitories, camps and restaurants, 43 per cent. The total cost of operation was \$51,914,400 or \$40,000 more than the income.

Participating in this service were nearly 100,000 business and professional men, serving without compensation on boards and committees, state organizations and training schools. Serving under these leaders were 5,258 employed secretaries. The total membership is given as 968,929; a decrease of two per cent from the membership of 1923-24.

Gains were recorded in attendance at all physical activities, while there was a decrease of 31.2 per cent in the number of students taking educational courses. The 239,390 men and boys affiliated with P. M. C. A. Bible classes represent an increase of 2.7 per cent, but there was a slight decrease in the total attendance at Bible classes and religious meetings. Likewise there were slight decreases in the number of decisions for the Christian life and in the number uniting with the church.

Teaching North Carolina Going to Be Popular in Schools

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—(AP) — That teaching North Carolina is going to be quite popular in the public schools this season is indicated by the numerous requests for maps and other information about the state received by the Department of Agriculture during the past few days. Numbers of teachers have applied for copies of the agricultural map distributed by the department and for copies of "North Carolina, the Land of Opportunity."

The calls indicate that teachers throughout the state seem interested in teaching the rising generation facts about North Carolina, with especial emphasis on the state's agricultural opportunities. A number of calls, however, have been received by the department for "anything of interest about North Carolina."

These requests for information come from all sections of the state. Interest is confined to no one locality.

From a teacher in a town near Winston-Salem came a request which read:

"A few years ago you sent me a map of North Carolina that I used very successfully in teaching. I am writing to ask if I may have another to use in the same way. The children seem much interested in the geography of the home state when a good map is before them."

Another teacher wrote: "Please send me any material that you have that may be used in the school room."

North Carolina Creating Interest As A Home State

Raleigh, Sept. 7.—(AP)—North Carolina, as a home state, is creating interest.

Numerous inquiries concerning North Carolina, for example, have recently been received by the Department of Agriculture, it was stated today. They come from persons interested in locating in this state. Two such inquiries were pointed out as examples. One came from a professional man now living in a small city near New York. The other was from a resident of a suburb of Chicago.

In each instance, the writer expressed an interest in this state, and asked for information as to the agricultural advantages to be found in North Carolina.

The New York State inquirer named two sections specifically, and asked for information in agricultural conditions in each. He wanted to know about the Wilmington district and Moore county. He was interested in trucking and fruit growing. Information available at the Department of Agriculture was forwarded to him, and his request was passed on to those in Wilmington and Moore county who could likely supply him with additional information. He said he was looking for a place where the climate was mild and the winters were not too long.

"I am thinking about coming to North Carolina," the Chicago inquirer wrote. "In about a year and am interested in the farming conditions and general conditions in the rural districts." He was supplied with the department's handbook and other information.

The department has also received requests for information on North Carolina from several foreign countries.

FAMINE VICTIMS ON ISLAND IN JAPAN EAT GROUND BARK

Tokyo.—A commission which recently returned from the Loochoo Islands, which lie between Japan and Formosa, reported that the inhabitants have been reduced to abject misery because of the scarcity of food this year. Many of them, it was stated, are eating the bark of banana palms ground into powder. It is now proposed that the unfortunate residents be permitted to use the sugar and sake taxes, amounting to about 3,000,000 yen, for the purchase of food.

During the war boom the Loochoo Islanders waxed prosperous and were able to buy rice. Their usual diet is sweet potatoes, part of which they grow and the remainder of which they import from Satsuma. The sugar price this year, however, was such that the inhabitants could make no profit whatever and were unable to import their usual sweet potato rations. In addition the bonito catch was also very poor. Consequently the Japanese commission reported a serious food shortage and recommended that steps be taken by the government to ameliorate the condition of the islanders.

WASHINGTON COACH CONDUCTS SCHOOL FOR FOOTBALL MENTORS

Seattle.—A school where the finer points of football are taught ran six weeks this summer at the University of Washington under Coach Enoch Bagshaw.

Bagshaw had 30 pupils, youths and men. Most of the older men were high school coaches in small towns or men appointed to conduct physical education departments where football coaching was necessary.

Three days a week Bagshaw gave oral instruction in theory. On the

other two days he took his pupils to the gridiron and illustrated what he had told them in class.

One man was bunked on the ground that it would be wrong to let him teach what football he knew.
