PHILADELPHIA SEEKS POLICE WHO CAN OUTWITT CRIMINALS

Philadelphia.—Brains, more than physical prowess, will be sought hereafter in recruits for the Philadelphia police department, under a recent ruling of the Civil Service Commission. The decision, announced after investigations by the commission and Director of Public Safety Smedley D. D. Butler, will become effective with the next batch of candidates.

Criminals are keen-witted and quick-thinking policemen are needed to keep abreast of them, the commission said. A new code of tests for prospective blue-coats will be put into practice, designed, as far as practicable, to "predict the efficiency of a policeman.

Under the old system a candidate was given three points for physical qualification, three for training and experience, and one each for practical questions, observation and personal interview. The revised code will rank physical qualifications at two points; training and experience, two and one-half; practical questions two; personal interview two and one-

Most important, the new code will measure the prospective policeman's thinking ability.
