## DEATH RINCESS ENDS LINE ROYAL FAMILY

Honolulu.—(AP.)—In a modest bungalow in the unpretentious residential section of Kalia in Honolulu the death occurred recently of the Samoan princess Slopola Tuimanna (Mrs. H. A. Rose). She was the only daughter of the last of the royal line which had ruled the little island for generations until 1900.

King Tuimanna abdicated when he ceded the islands to the United States in the first year of this century. In Mrs. Ross' cottage was hung a letter signed by the late President Roosevelt thanking the king for his action.

On the death of her father in 1908 Princess Slopola was adopted by Governor Stearns, the American administrator of Manua, and Mrs. Stearns. When she was 18 years old the princess met Ross, a chief petty officer in the United States Navy, and they were married at the home of the governor. Ross was transferred in 1923 to Honolulu and was accompanied by his wife and their four children.

From 1900 to 1908, King Tuimanna served as native ruler of the Manua group under the United States. He had control of the four higher chiefs, Misa, Tufele, Tulosega and Asoau. Upon the king's death, Tufele was chosen to succeed him, being credited with having been the most faithful to the United States during the political trouble in American Samoa. His son, Faatoia Tufele, was sent to Hawaii by the government to be educated in American life. An athlete of more than ordinary ability, he rowed several years on Hilo crews and also appeared several times as an amateur boxer. When the elder Tufele died Faatoia was chosen to succeed his father as the native ruler of Manua.

The home of Mrs. Ross in Honolulu was the center of Samoan activities in Hawaii. Here the transplanted natives of the South Sea Island gathered, mostly from the Mormon settlement at Laie, revived their native customs and held their celebrations

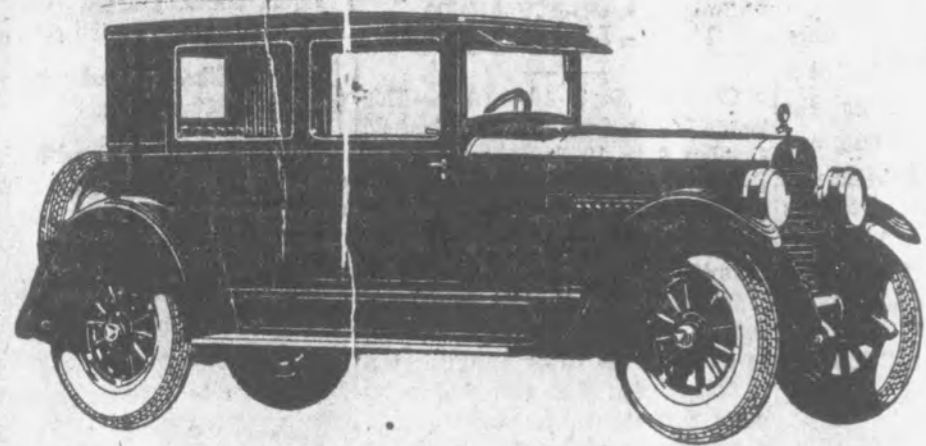
