JUDGE W. A. HOKE DIED SUNDAY FROM HEART FAILURE

Funeral Services Will Be Held
In Lincolnton Tuesday Afternoon

Raleigh, Sept. 14.—(AP)—North Carolina today mourned the passing of one who had given 34 years of his life to his service as a jurist. William A. Hoke, former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, died here yesterday morning of heart failure, while apparently recovering from a slight and successful operation upon the thyroid gland. Death came peacefully to the aged jurist, who was in his 74th year. He had been talking to a nurse at the hospital when he turned his head slightly to one side and died instantly. Heart block, the stoppage of blood flowing from the main artery to the heart, was given as the cause of death. Today funeral arrangements had been completed, which provide for burial at Lincolnton, N. C., his former home, on Tuesday at noon in St. Luke's Episcopal Church. The body, accompanied by relatives and friends and the entire membership of the Supreme Court, will leave here tonight on a special train for Lincolnton. This afternoon the body will lie in state under the dome of the Capitol, while the public buildings of Raleigh will be draped in mourning. Judge Hoke had retired from the bench less than a year ago. On March 16, 1925 he voluntarily retired from the Chief Justiceship because of ill health but had recovered to such an extent that he advised Governor McLean he would be available for emergency duty this fall. He had served as Chief Justice since June 2, 1924, being appointed by Governor Morrison to succeed the late Chief Justice Walter Clark. Prior to that time he had served on the Supreme Court as an Associate Justice for 20 years, and as a Supreme Court Judge for 13 years. Expressions of grief and tribute were heard today on all sides. Governor McLean issued a statement expressing his personal grief and the state's, while other public officials also joined in expressing their sorrow.

Judge Hoke is survived by one daughter. His wife died four years ago.

Eastern N. C. Faces Serious Situation Regards Cotton Pick

Raleigh, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Eastern North Carolina faces the most serious situation in its history as regards the picking of cotton, said Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing.

Mr. Grist is making strenuous efforts to secure entire families from Western and Piedmont North Carolina to go to the eastern part of the state to help harvest the cotton crop. At least 5,000 pickers are needed during the next 30 to 60 days and hundreds of them are needed now.

Mr. Grist today has been calling various points in the state over long distance telephone with a view of securing cotton pickers. Arrangements are being made to transport entire families in trucks to Johnston, Duplin and Sampson counties.

17 Persons Meet Death By Accident Or By Violence

Chicago, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Seventeen persons met death throughout the country over the week-end in accidents or by violence. Automobile fatalities lead the casualty toll with six. Three persons met death under mysterious circumstances, while two were burned to death. Two fell from an air plane, two were drowned, and two committed suicide.

Hold Up Jewelry Store Escape With

New York, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Four robbers held up the jewelry store of D. Bick and son in Third Avenue today and escaped with diamonds valued at \$50,000. Four employees were bound in a rear room greater in the latter part of the year, the Census Bureau announced today.

CHURCHES OBSERVE CHILDREN'S WEEK DURING OCTOBER

Plans Being Made for Largest
and Best "Children's Week"

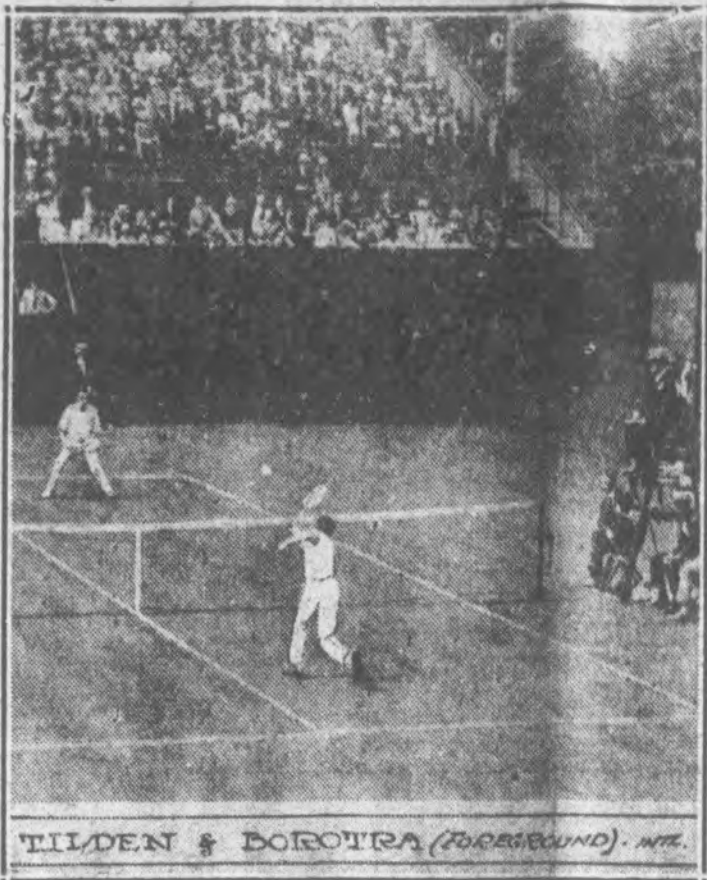
CAILLAUX COMING WITH AUTHORITY TO SETTLE WAR DEBTS

No Intimation of General Plan
of Settlement Which Caillaux
Will Propose Has Been
Given

Washington, Sept. 14.—Information conveyed in Associated Press dispatches from Paris yesterday that Finance Minister Caillaux was coming to Washington with full authority to negotiate a funding settlement for the French debt to the United States was received by members of the American Debt Commission with considerable satisfaction. A Debt Commission spokesman declared the announcement that Mr. Caillaux had received instructions only of a broad character from Premier Painleve and that his acting would be such only to the ratification of Parliament, had considerably clarified the atmosphere. The Paris reports gave no intimation of the general plan of settlement which M. Caillaux will propose, but it was said that he would bring with him a memorandum representing the concrete result of the conversation, which Jules Jusserand, former French Ambassador to the United States, had in January with Charles E. Hughes, then Secretary of State and Secretary Mellon. The gist of the memorandum was reported to be that France should propose to amortize its debt to the United States by paying one half of one percent of the principal annually for 62 years the American Debt Commission would consider in the most liberal spirit the question of interest.

While treasury officials here were unwilling to discuss the Jusserand memorandum under Secretary Winston, the Debt Commission Secretary said the one half of one percent amortization rate mentioned must have referred to the initial payment made by several of the foreign powers under the 72 year settlement plan. ACCEPTS CALL TO THE MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH

Rev. H. Frederick Jones Will
Arrive First Sunday in Nov-
ember to Take Up Pastorate

Rev. H. Frederick Jones, of Portsmouth, Va., has accepted a call to the Memorial Baptist church, of this city, and will arrive the first Sunday in November to take up his pastorate.

Rev. Mr. Jones a native of Mecklenburg county, Va., was educated at the South Side Military Academy, Chare City, Va., University of Richmond, Richmond, Va., and the Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Va. During his twenty-two years ministry he has only held three pastorates, Lawrenceville, Va., Fulton Baptist Church, Richmond, Va., and the West Portsmouth Baptist Church, Portsmouth, Va. He has traveled extensively, his itinerary including a tour of Europe. While abroad he continued his studies, and is well informed concerning the Holy Lands and other factors necessary for the making of a great preacher and pastor.

Mr. Jones has held several important positions with the Virginia State Board of Missions and education, serving for two years as moderator of the Portsmouth Association, and for four years as president of the Baptist Council of Norfolk and Portsmouth. He is chairman of the Missionary committee of the Portsmouth Association and chairman of the College committee of the Portsmouth Association.

At present the Portsmouth Association has under consideration a co-ordinate College and Mr. Jones is giving to the movement his undivided support.

Mrs. Jones was educated at the Blackstone Female Institute and is one of the few women who has completed all the courses in Mission study classes of the Southern Baptist Convention. She is interested in church work and has been a great help to Mr. Jones in all phases of church work.

SHENANDOAH BOARD INQUIRY APPOINTED BY WILBUR TODAY

Work of Board Will Supple-
ment That of Board Ap-
pointed to Delve in Nation's
Air Policy

Washington, Sept. 14.—(AP)—A court of inquiry to investigate the Shenandoah disaster with Rear Admiral Hilary P. Jones, chief of the Navy's general board as to President, was appointed by Secretary Wilbur.

The work of the board will supplement that of the special board of nine men appointed by President Coolidge to delve thoroughly into the broad question of the nation's air policy, which has been the subject of bitter controversy since the Shenandoah disaster.

At the time Mr. Wilbur was announcing the Shenandoah Board of Inquiry, the War Department made plans to have Colonel Mitchell chief figure in the whole controversy available as an expert witness for the President's Commission when that body began its inquiry.

It was explained at the War Department that neither disciplinary proceedings which have been initiated against Colonel Mitchell, nor his official duties as chief of the air service in the 8th corps area, would be permitted to interfere with his appearance before the special board. The War Department will make it clear to the board that it does not wish to restrict in any way in the testimony Colonel Mitchell may be asked to give and that the board itself will be the only body with power to control the scope of its inquiry into the charges Colonel Mitchell has made.

MITCHELL'S CHARGES DRAW FROM MOFFET VERBAL BROAD SIDE

Characterizes Criticisms on
Navy Air Administration as
"Absolutely False," and
"Unscrupulous Self Seekers"

Washington, Sept. 14.—(AP)—With the broad question of the Nation's air defense organization to be turned over to a special board of inquiry, the specific charges made by Colonel William Mitchell, former Assistant Army Air Chief, against the Navy's air administration have drawn a verbal broadside from Rear Admiral William A. Moffett, of the Navy Air Craft Bureau.

Replying categorically to the charges of Colonel Mitchell respecting the Shenandoah and the flight of the PN-9, No. 1 would be quoted without mentioning the author's name, and of other critics on the Navy Air Administration, Rear Admiral Moffett denied them with such emphatic characterization as "unqualifiedly false," "absolutely false," "unscrupulous self seekers" and "vultures."

NEW YORK'S MOST EXCITING CAMPAIGN DEVELOP TUESDAY

Sensation Over Nomination of
Mayor Likely to Continue
Until Election a Month
Hence

New York, Sept. 14.—(AP)—One of the most sensational campaigns in the history of New York City will develop tomorrow into the nomination of Democratic, Republican and Socialist, candidates for mayor, and the sensation seem likely to continue until the election a month hence.

The fire works have been largely on the Democratic side. John F. Hylan, elect-mayor for two four year terms with Tammany support, is opposed for renomination by State Senator James J. Walker, a Tammany candidate who has had the active support of Governor Smith, but both Republican and Democratic spokesmen at campaigns has been interpreted as a battle between Governor Smith and William Randolph Hurst for control over the Democratic party in the state with a view to Presidential Politics in 1928.

Republican hope of electing the executive over the heavy Democratic city runs high. The Republican candidate is Frank W. Watterman, the Fountain pen manufacturer and he has attacked both Democratic candidates and says that they have been telling the truth about each other and that Tammany which supported Hylan for two terms, has been just as responsible as Hylan for eight years of misrule.

In the United States, historians must always dwell upon the success of Mr. Wilson as a peace-time President; upon the great reforms in the pattern of the Government which he led in adopting. Abroad, the point of view shifts. With very few absentees, among them his own country, more than fifty nations are working upon his plans the problems for which he designed them; and upon their success or failure his chief life-work will be, in all those nations, assessed and totaled. To every one who thinks upon the things of real importance, there is the great drama of Geneva; to the silent figure in the gallery of guests it must be drama of deep interest and poignancy.—N. Y. 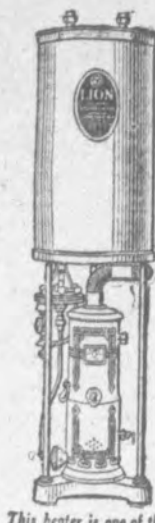

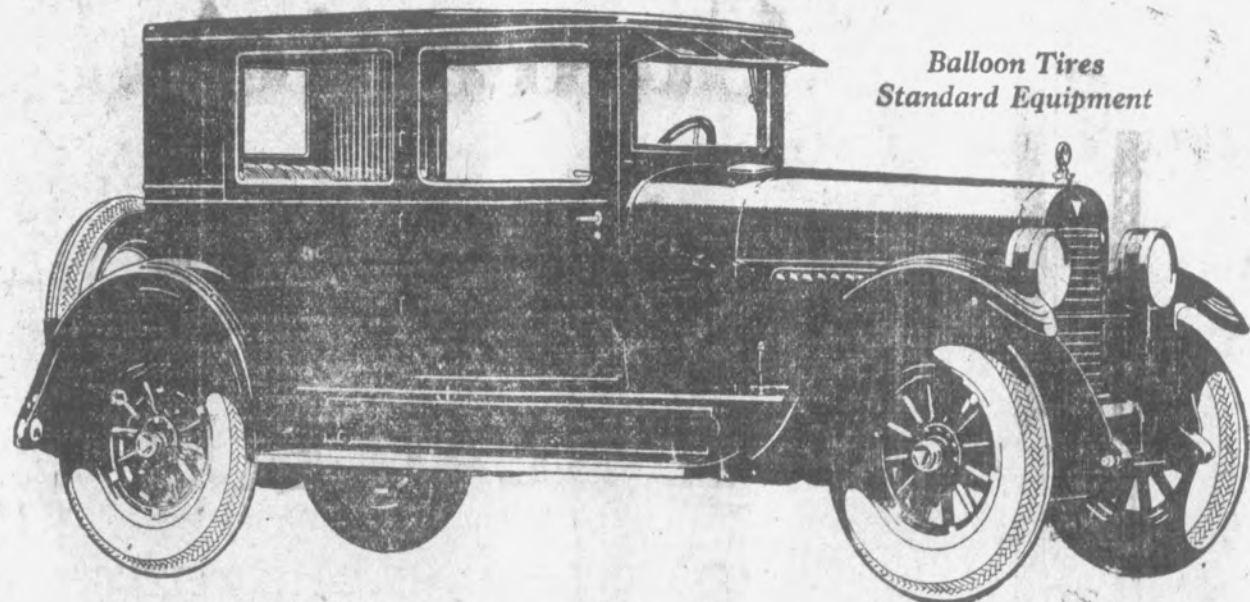
