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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

A LESSON FOR THE HOUR

in your patience possess ye your souls."-St. Luke 21:19.

Whether we accept these words as a precept, or prefer the translation which makes them a promise-"By your patience you shall gain (or win) your souls"-they seem as apthem, and indeed, particularly appropriate to-day.

He, Himself, has set us the example of patience in the midst of the prejudices and passions of men. Matthew Arnold, one of the greatest among modern critics, wrote:-

"Was Christ a man like us? Ah, let

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
