BOTTOM OF OCEAN

Submarine S-51 Rammed By
Steamer City of Rome, On
Voyage From Savannah to
Boston

Washington, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Revised estimates received from New London at the Navy Department today placed the number of missing in the sinking of the submarine S-51 at 34. A check of the record showed that there were 37 aboard the craft and with the three members saved by the City of Rome, there were left unaccounted for 28 men and six officers.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Thirty-six members of the crew of the Submarine S-51 lay imprisoned at the bottom of the Atlantic today after the vessel was rammed last night by the steamer City of Rome of the Ocean Steamship Company on her voyage from Savannah, Ga., to Boston. Three survivors were picked up by the steamer and it was a matter of conjecture as to whether the remainder were drowned or were alive in the under water vessel.

While fleet of rescue craft from New Port, R. I., New York City, and New London, Conn., the submarine base, was rushed out to the point 20 miles east of Block Island where the disaster occurred, those on board eagerly awaited news of the crash. The City of Rome was proceeding to Boston and Captain Diehl, her Commander gave no details on his first terse message to officers of the company. He was due to arrive at Boston some time this afternoon. Hope that the 36 men who went down with the S-51 might still be alive was increased when the destroyer, Putnam, sent to the scene from the Naval Training Station at New Port, sent a wireless message saying they had discovered what apparently was a buoy made up of life preservers. Naval men at New Port expressed the hope that the buoy had been floated out of the submarine craft by members of the crew, who might be alive and wanted to give their position beneath the water. The men rescued by the City of Rome were Dewey Kille, Mathew Sam Lira, and Arthur Gibr, all members of the engine room force, according to a message received at the Boston Navy Yard. "Nothing else could be found," said the message. "An oil spot showed up where the S-51 went down."

At New London, from where the S-51 sailed on September 20 for a practice cruise, naval officers said that the fact oil showed on the surface of the water did not necessarily indicate that the craft was totally wrecked. They said she might lie at the bottom of the 125 feet depth of water with all of her hatches closed and many of the men in her alive.

Ships were being rushed to the aid of the submarine and included a salvage ship with diving and hoisting apparatus.

Efforts were being made to communicate with another salvage ship which is somewhere at sea. It was not believed that the City of Rome sustained any damage from the crash with the submarine. Her Captain's message indicated she was in good condition and was proceeding to Boston.

Boston, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The submarine S-51, which was sunk in a collision with the steamship City of Rome last night, was running without side lights, and was nearly into the ship before she was sighted, Captain Diehl of the City of Rome reported in a wireless message to the Charleston Navy Yard today.

At 10:40 a. m. the City of Rome had arrived in the harbor and it was arranged that Commander Cooke should go to the Navy Yard to board the steamship on her arrival and that the three survivors of the S-51 should be taken to a navy hospital at Chelsea. If they were found physically fit they will be sent back to New London at once.

Washington, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The steamship City of Rome should have remained on the spot unless urgently impelled to leave after ramming the submarine S-51 last night,

Funeral Services
Conducted Yesterday

The conduct of the captain of the City of Rome, the Secretary added, would be inquired into in connection with the investigation that would be ordered and if it was found that there had been any criminal act or negligence on his part, action would be taken against him.

Apparently the City of Rome, when she saw the submarine go down regarded all on board as lost, he said, where as such is not necessarily the case with a submarine.

Reports from steamer indicated to him that the three survivors were injured and the captain of the City of Rome may have felt that it was his duty to get the men to shore as soon as possible.

The navy, he said, is proceeding on the theory that there are men alive in the submarine.

New Port, R. I., Sept. 26.—(AP)—The position of the submarine S-51 sunk off Block Island last night in the collision with the steamship City of Rome, was located today by rescue craft searching for the vessel. It was reported in a radio message to the New Port Training Station. There were no signs of life, the message said, but crews of the rescue ship were optimistic that some of the 24 men who went down with the submarine might be alive.

Commander Charles H. Shaw, commanding officer of the Putnam, one of the rescue ships, stated that when he returned to port that in his opinion the men in the submerged submarine had enough air to last them twelve hours.

A message said the S-51 had been located by Lieutenant Charles S. Hawkins, piloting the sea plane which had been flying over the vicinity of the disaster. The submarine lies in 43 fathoms of water.

Commander Louis D. Causey, executive officer of the Torpedo Station here, said that "it looks bad" for those aboard the S-51 as air bubbles

Two Negroes Held in
Pasquotank Jail for
Separate Murder

Elizabeth City, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Two brothers are being held in Pasquotank county jail; at the same time, for separate murder, committed at different times. It is said to be the first time it has ever occurred in the history of the county, and perhaps of the state.

General Jacobs, negro, is being held in connection with the death of Nehemiah D. Pendleton, elderly Weeksville storekeeper, on April 9, 1923. And recently his brother, Lawrence Jacobs, was brought here from Ayden, and lodged in the jail with his brother. He is charged with the murder of Mack Wichard, aged negro painter, in 1921.

Freight Depot at
Wilson is Burned

Wilson, Sept. 26.—Fire destroyed the Atlantic Coast Line freight depot number two here early tonight, a loss estimated at between \$75,000 and \$100,000 being sustained. The fire was discovered a few minutes before 7 o'clock and was at its height a few minutes later and was still raging at 9 o'clock, although it was well under control.

The storage depot, a brick building about 150 feet in length, valued at \$25,000 and well covered by insurance, was completely destroyed. Nothing but the brick walls remained standing. The building was filled with hogheads of tobacco, it being estimated that around 250 of these were in the building. Hundreds of bales of straw and cotton were also stored in the building. These were also totally destroyed.

Sixth Assembly of
League of Nations
Adjourned Today

Geneva, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The annual election by the League of Nations assembly of the six non permanent members of the League of Council today resulted in no change in the composition of that body. Belgium, Brazil, Spain, Sweden, Czechoslovakia, and Uruguay will continue as the non permanent members.

The sixth assembly of the League of Nations adjourned sin die this afternoon at five o'clock.

CONGRESSMAN AND
WIFE BOTH DENIED
DIVORCES TODAY

Frank D. Scott and Edna
James Scott Separated Since
1922, Denied Divorce

Alpena, Mich., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Frank D. Scott, Michigan Congressman, and Edna James Scott, his wife, both were denied a divorce in a decision handed down today by Circuit Judge Frank D. Emerick.

Congressman Frank Douglas Scott and Edna James Scott, his wife, separated during Christmas week, 1922, after an all night conference in Scott's Washington apartment had failed to bring a reconciliation of their differences.

It was a year later before Frank Scott filed a petition for absolute divorce in the Alpena circuit court, charging extravagance and misconduct, both under the heading of extreme cruelty.

In a cross bill Mrs. Scott denied all the charges made by her husband and countered with allegations that the congressman gambled "for high stakes" and that his conduct in other ways was of a nature making continued living together impossible.

Mr. Scott, in attempting to substantiate his charges of misconduct, named three men: Captain Wilbur "Jazzie" Summers of the air service Harry Wyckoff, a clerk at the Wardman park apartment hotel, Washington, and an unnamed man with whom Mrs. Scott is alleged to have become acquainted while traveling in Europe in the summer of 1922.

The hearing of the case before Judge Frank Emerick at Alpena early this year was interrupted to permit both sides to obtain additional data and was resumed early in August. The testimony was riddled with stories of liquor-drinking and gambling parties at Washington and the names of several congressmen or former congressmen were heard.

On the congressional trip to Panama aboard the steamer Cristobal, Mrs. Scott charged that her husband and other congressmen gambled and drank. There was testimony that a quantity of liquor was taken aboard the steamer at Panama and that what was not consumed was unloaded from the boat at Norfolk, Va., and taken to the Washington homes of some of the congressmen. It was testified that some of the liquor went to the Scott apartment, although Mr. Scott denied this.

That Mrs. Scott was "indiscreet" in entertaining men guests in her apartment during the absence from Washington of her husband was charged by the congressman. This was denied by Mrs. Scott for whom witnesses testified that her conduct was orderly.

The Scotts were married in 1914. Mrs. Scott prior to her marriage was a graduate nurse. Pending a decision on the petition, Mrs. Scott has been allowed \$50 a month temporary alimony, in addition to special allowances to enable her to obtain depositions which were used at the trial.

Additional Testimony
Indicates Failure
Gas Cells of Airship

Lake Hurst, N. J., Sept. 26.—(AP)—Additional testimony, indicating a failure of gas cells in the airship Shenandoah, was given today to the Naval Court of Inquiry here, which is to ascertain the cause of the disaster to that craft.

August C. Querenham, one of the survivors said he saw one cell in the afterpart of the ship deflated before he heard the cracking of the ship. Similar testimony was given yesterday by James H. Collier, chief brigger on the Shenandoah.

"It is possible the ship had broken at frame 105 before that time," Querenham said. "It would have been difficult for me to hear sound that far away."

"Describe the character of the deflation," directed Judge Advocate Foley. "The lower part of the gas cell was cupped up as one does when deflated," Querenham said. "Then the whole cell dropped down to the axial cable. After that I did not take much note of it."

"This was slightly before I heard the cracking of the ship, but I think the ship had cracked before that time because Coleman, who was either on the ladder, or at the ladder, came up into the ship from an engine car aft and told me he had seen number four engine car carried away. It was after the gas cell had become deflated."

REVIVAL SERVICES
FREE WILL BAPTIST
SHOWS PROGRESS

Services to Continue Through
Next Week; Rev. L. R. Ennis
Bringing Timely Messages

The attendance at the series of evangelistic services conducted this week at the Free Will Baptist church by Evangelists Ennis and Hinnant, has been good, and the results of the meeting is already being felt in the community.

Rev. L. R. Ennis has brought some very timely and helpful messages, most of them directed to church members. On last evening, however, the preacher changed the trend of the messages somewhat, preaching especially to the unconverted on the subject "The Great Gift of God."

The speaker will be Rev. J. C. Wallace, of West Asheville. Rev. Mr. Wallace is a speaker of power, and the members of the church are especially urged to hear him.

Tomorrow evening the second week of the revival opens. During this week Evangelist Ennis will deliver a series of sermons on "The Great Questions of the Bible." Statement Attributed
Ruchdi Bey, Head of
Turkish Delegation

London, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The statement that Mosul is Turkish and that the Turkish Army, the peace strength of which is 150,000, is prepared to enforce this claim in warfare, is attributed to Ruchdi Bey, head of the Turkish delegation to the council of the League of Nations. The correspondence of the Daily Express in Geneva quoted the Turkish statesman as announcing that it is the determination of his country to possess this province in Mesopotamia, which is rich in oil land, and to repudiate the British claim that it must be given to the Kingdom of Iraq.

Commissions Discuss
Their Differences
Over the Teapots

Washington, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The American and French war debt negotiations have adopted a policy of discussing their differences over the teapots. With the formal negotiations at a standstill over the week-end Secretary Mellon today accepted an invitation to luncheon with M. Caillaux and others of the French Commission at the French Embassy.

The function was arranged as the first of a series of daily luncheons at which the principals of the negotiations will seek the common ground of understanding that have not thus been discovered in the thus far exchange in the conference room.

M. Caillaux apparently found the new method of negotiations more to his taste than the form of sharp passages through which the discussions have passed since they began two days ago. He made no effort last night to conceal his disappointment at the tenor of the American reply to his first proposal of settlement but today he seemed more cheerful.

"THE HOLY BIBLE"

The name "Holy Bible" dates back to the middle ages. The book was previously known as the "Scriptures" or "Writings," or by its several divisions, as the "Five Books of Moses," or the "Pentateuch;" "The Law of the Prophets;" "The Gospels;" "The Epistles;" "The Old Testament," or "Covenant;" the "New Testament" and the "Revelations."

The name "Bible" is derived through the Latin from the Greek, and means "The Books." It is actually a collection of some 66 volumes written by over 40 authors, separated from each other by several hundred years.

Some of the authors were highly educated, like Moses, the Jew-Egyptian prince, and St. Paul, the Doctor of Laws. Some came from lowly stations in life, as James and John, the Galilean fishermen; others from professional life, as Luke, "the beloved physician."

Some wrote in Hebrew, some in Chaldee, and some in Greek.

Some wrote history; some poetry; others clothed their message in dramatic form; and still others, with their faces turned to the future, wrote in prophetic strains.

It is called "The Holy Bible" because through all these authors, so diversified in style and talent, covering so vast a period of time, there runs a connecting thought and purpose.

It is said that in the British Navy every piece of rope has a red thread running through its center, so that it can be identified as government property. Whether so or not, there is a blood-red thread running through this Book, from Genesis to Revelations. It starts in the Garden of Eden with the first promise that "the seed of the woman shall bruise the serpent's head;" runs through all the sacrifices, from Abel's to Christ's on Calvary; and through His open tomb to the Throne of Paradise where sits "a Lamb as it had been slain, from the foundation of the world." It is its primary and fundamental purpose to reveal the relations between God and man.

To-night I want you to think on "What the Bible is not."

1. It is not a fetish to be worshipped. The Rev. Dr. Thomas Richey says:—"It is just as bad to make too much of the Bible as to make too little of it—There is a Protestant Bibliolatry that is as bad in its way as Roman

Mariolatry."

Good people who believe that the very punctuation marks of the Bible are inspired; and that the chapters, verses, and marginal dates are of Divine origin, are superstitious and ignorant of the well-known facts that there was practically no punctuation in the ancient languages in which the books were written, and that the division into chapters and verses are the innovation of quite modern convenience.

2. It is not a kind of "Ouija Board" to answer all kinds of questions. I have seen good people, in times of distress or curiosity, close their eyes, open the Bible at haphazard, place their finger on a verse, and expect to find some solution to their trouble, some intimation to satisfy their desire to peer into the future. Such a use of the Holy Bible is unworthy of any man's intelligence, and prostitutes the Word of God to unholy and impious inquisitiveness.

3. It is not an Encyclopedia of universal knowledge. There are people who insist on going to the Bible with all manner of hard questions, and are disappointed if they do not find the answers there. Now this is, again, to expect more from the Bible than it was ever intended to give. The Bible addresses itself primarily to Faith, not to reason. It does not teach Geography, Grammar or Arithmetic, though some of each may be found in its pages.

4. It is not a treatise of Science. In speaking of the earth, the solar system, and of man, it does not use technical language. Its psychology is primitive. It speaks of the "reins" or kidneys as the seat of desire and of the emotions; "the bowels of compassion;" and "thought" was located in the heart rather than in the head; "as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he."

But we ourselves talk of the sun's "rising" and "setting," when we know it does nothing of the kind.

The Bible uses everyday language, and the colloquialisms of the period in which it was written.

Similarly, it does not treat of the Science of Ethics. It deals with moral culture just as it deals with physical science. It contains the facts upon which morals as a science rests, but leaves the science to be developed by succeeding ages of fuller light and increased moral culture.

5. It is not a substitute for the Church and her Holy Sacraments. The read Word can never take the place of the spoken Word in God's plan of salvation. When a man gives it as an excuse for not going to Church, that he can say at home and read his Bible, there is surely a monstrous delusion somewhere. The ear, as the instrument of hearing and obedience;—not the eye, as the symbol of intelligence;—is the organ of Conversion. Preaching is of the very essence of Christianity. Jesus conquers, not by the sword, but by the Spoken Word. He gave no commandment to His Apostles to write—He did not write Himself, except once on the sand—but He bade all His disciples to preach and teach.

The Bible is of infinite value as a witness to Christ, but it can never take the place of a moral agent sanctified and filled with the Spirit, in drawing men to Him. Even the angels cannot do this work as effectually as redeemed men. The angel could not deal with Cornelius, so Peter was sent; and Philip was likewise sent to the Ethiopian Treasurer of Queen Candace.

The Bible is wonderful; but God wants your living testimony to its truth.

"THE TEN COMMANDMENTS" BROKE LONG RUN RECORDS

The picture which broke all long run records at road show prices is coming to White's Theatre Monday when Cecil B. PAIN MAKES CHINESE OPIUM VICTIMS, SAYS MISSIONARY

Oklahoma City.—Chinese smoke opium because they know no other way to banish pains or fatigue, said R. A. MacLeod, who recently returned from seven years as a missionary of the Disciples of Christ in Tibet, and who will make one of the principal addresses at the International convention of the church here, October 6-11.

The Chinese are of great self-control but, "like the rest of the human race, they are subject to the pains and ills of life," Mr. MacLeod declared.

In Yunnan province, which is as

large as California and with twice the number of inhabitants, the missionary pointed out, there is only one dentist and two doctors. If a man has a tooth ache he knows no other means of relief except to smoke opium.

Transportation facilities in the province are such that goods have to be carried by the people from one town to another. Sometimes a man will carry a burden of 100 pounds 25 miles a day for 15 days, said Mr. MacLeod, and at the end of each day's journey finds relief from his

exhaustion smoking the opium pipe. "So it is," the missionary explained, "that from pain which cannot be relieved by any other known means, and from fatigue and exhaustion, the Chinese have become victims of the opium habit."
