Cole Arraigned Today for Murder of W. W. Ormond

Union County to Furnish Jury With 200 Veniremen Reporting Wednesday Morning; Grand Jury Returns True Bill

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Union county will furnish the jury for the trial of W. B. Cole, charged with the murder of W. W. Ormond. 200 veniremen from that county will report here Wednesday morning.

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Sept. 28.—(AP)—An indictment charging William B. Cole, wealthy cotton mill owner, with the murder of W. W. Ormond, was returned by the county grand jury here today.

In the language of the indictment the jury found that "W. B. Cole did kill, slay and murder" W. W. Ormond on, or about August 15th, last. The grand jury deliberated less than an hour.

Cole, who since the shooting has been in jail without privilege of bond, made his entrance into the court room shortly after the indictment was returned. Sheriff Henry C. Baldwin accompanied the prisoner.

Cole was dressed neatly. After shaking hands with defense attorneys he sat at the defense table. Cole pleaded not guilty to the indictment when arraigned before Judge Thomas R. Finley, presiding. W. B. Cole, wealthy manufacturer of Rockingham shot and killed W. W. Ormond of Raleigh on the street of Rockingham, Saturday afternoon, August 15. The young man was standing near his automobile when Cole approached and fired the shots which resulted in death.

Immediately after the killing Cole returned to his office and subsequently to his home where he was arrested in a few hours and lodged in Richmond county jail. The defendant remained in jail without privilege of bond until his trial opened at Rockingham on September 28.

With the killing there appeared a confusing mass of statements relative to Cole's relations with Ormond prior to the killing. Out of them it was possible to ascertain that Ormond, formerly electrician of State College, had paid considerable attention to Miss Elizabeth Cole, daughter of the defendant, for a number of years. Ormond apparently was received into the Cole home for a lengthy period but recently had been denied this privilege.

A number of letters were said to have passed between Cole and Ormond following the request of the former that the latter cease his attentions to Miss Cole. Prior to the trial the contents of these letters were not revealed though there were vague reports as to what they contained.

On the day of the killing Ormond had left his home near Raleigh for a trip to one of the Carolina beaches and decided to pass through Rockingham. Before leaving Raleigh his parents urged him not to go to Rockingham. It was generally believed he wished to communicate with Miss Cole but it was not known whether he accomplished his purpose before the shooting which resulted in his death. It was later in the day that he was killed while about to enter his automobile. First reports were that he was unarmed at the time and later it was stated there was a pistol in the pocket of the automobile on the side opposite to which he had been standing.

Ormond's funeral, held in Rockingham, was said to have been attended by the greatest throng which had ever gathered in that little city for a similar service. The young man was a veteran of the World War and had been gassed in action and for a number of years suffered as a result.

Governor McLean was requested to call a special term of court for the trial on September 21 but it later decided to hold the term on September 28. The Governor requested former Chief Justice W. A. Hoke of the Supreme Court to preside over the court but the aged jurist replied that he would be unable to meet Wednesday morning. Judge as he expected to enter a hospital for

French, American Debt Commissions In Third Meeting

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The French position in regard to her \$4,000,000 debt to the United States was argued again today by Finance Minister Joseph Caillaux in the third meeting of the French and American Debt Commission.

Meeting at the Treasury shortly after ten o'clock the two missions went into joint session and less than thirty minutes was required to complete the business on hand.

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A new method of "approach" was laid out today at the third joint session of the Franco American Debt Commissioners, who are trying to find a common ground for settlement of the French War Debt.

Joseph Caillaux, French Finance Minister, made new suggestions relating to the French capacity to pay, and presented a defense of the principal of his first offer, which was unacceptable.

This required less than thirty minutes and at a separate meeting of the American Commissioners it was decided that Secretary Mellon should have a reply ready to be presented to the French at another joint session this afternoon at four o'clock.

The statement by M. Caillaux was declared to have been a blunt representation of the French fiscal position and to have elucidated the Minister's declaration last night that his original proposal was considered by him and his colleagues to be the best they felt they should make.

M. Caillaux in the meantime will meet with his own associates to give further study to calculations made by the French experts relative to the effect the suggestions made Friday by Mr. Mellon would have on the French fiscal position. Both sides were tentative today and when M. Caillaux left the joint meeting he said as a general reply to inquiries that Mr. Mellon had requested him to say nothing of discussions which went on in the morning session. Mr. Mellon declared he continued hopeful. He will meet again with his colleagues before the scheduled joint session to go over with them the reply to the French suggestions, which are understood to represent in a measure an improvement of the original French proposal.

Colonel William Mitchell, regarded as one of the most important witnesses to be called, was included among the ten officers. The board's plan to examine the officers in the inverse order of ranks, however, was expected to put off his testimony until tomorrow.

Chairman Morrow has let it be known that the board is not going to be sympathetic with any indulgence of personality in the testimony of witnesses. The board, he says, intends to eliminate any such discussion as much as possible and confine its inquiry to questions that will really contribute to sound conclusion in its report on American Air Activities and the best means of promoting the development.

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Resuming its inquiry into the air craft problems today the President's special board was told at the outset that army red tape hinders the work of the army air service and that operators of the service should be entrusted to flying men. Major Walter G. Kilner, executive officer of the air service, was the first witness and he declared difficulties confronting the service were not one of "personalities" but of organization. The chief of the air service, he stated, in his opinion should at all times be empowered to direct the activities of direct the activities of his men. Reading a long list of army aviators to be heard including Colonel William Mitchell, who is fighting for a unified air service, Major Kilner declared at the beginning that he favored a separate air corps at the army such as that favored by Major General Patrick, chief of the service.

"Have you any constructive suggestions?" Asked Senator Bingham, of the Committee.

"Yes. Turn the air service over to the flyers themselves." Major Kilner then read a prepared statement setting forth the functions of the air service in warfare in which he declared that pursuit and bombardment presented an "air problem" that only air men could develop.

WITNESSES TO BE UNHAMPERED IN GIVING TESTIMONY

Ten Army Air Service Officers Called as Witnesses at Today's Session President's Air Board

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—With renewed assurance from the War Department that they are under no restraint whatever in presenting their individual opinion, a group of ten army air service officers were called as witnesses at the session today of the President's air board.

Chairman Morrow of the board, which was meeting after a three day recess to hear army and navy air pilots as the next phase of its inquiry had in his possession for reading into the record, letters from both Acting Secretary of War Davis and Secretary Wilbur reiterating that army and navy witnesses would be unhampered in giving testimony.

Reports that departmental authorities were not giving a free rein to army and navy officers to express their views before the board, are understood to have brought the letters.

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ROCKY MT. POSTAL CLERK ARRESTED RECENT ROBBERY

Warrant Charging Embezzlement Served on John Burges in Hospital While Recovering From Bullet Wounds

Rocky Mount, Sept. 28.—(AP)—John Burges, local post office clerk, placed under arrest here today on a Federal warrant charging embezzlement of the United States mail. The warrants charged Burges with purchasing three registered packages of mail valued at \$35,000 from the local post office two weeks ago. At the time Burges was wounded and told a story to the effect that he had been attacked by robbers, who took the packages. The warrant was served on Burges at a local hospital where he is recovering from a wound which he suffered. Federal authorities disclosed that several thousand dollars of the money stolen had been found in the basement of the local post office, but would not say the exact amount or whether it was in the original packages. Burges will be arraigned as soon as he is discharged from the hospital. The arrest followed an intensive investigation of the case by post office inspectors. A guard is standing over Burges.

Officers Raid Four Stores in Fountain and Find Whiskey

County officers on Sunday visited Fountain and raided the stores of Stephen Everett, Council Edwards, Fate Edwards and E. B. Gardner. Five gallons of whiskey, paraphernalia necessary for the making of same and containers were found.

In the store of Council Edwards, containers sufficient to take care of at least one thousand gallons were found, according to a statement made by the officers.

Deputy Sheriff Whitehurst visited the store of Stephen Everett and he pulled back the curtains which divided the store into two parts he saw Everett transacting a ten cent drink sale.

All the men are under bond for their appearance here for trial.

Rome.—Cost of living in Italy has been on the increase constantly since 1914 and is still mounting, recently published statistics show. Taking 100 as an index figure in 1914, the cost of living has reached 408.22.

Salvage Vessels Ordered to Nearby Harbors On Account of Conditions of Sea and the Weather in Locality of S-51 Wreck

New London, Conn., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Divices to the submarine base here at noon were to the effect that conditions of sea and weather at the locality of the S-51 wreck were so bad that rescue operations had to be suspended for the time being. The two crane salvage vessels were ordered to come to nearby harbors.

New London, Conn., Sept. 28.—(AP)—When informed by the Associated Press as he came on duty early today that the owners of the City of Rome had an affidavit which stated that the S-51, which was sunk fourteen miles off Block Island Friday night by that steamer, was commanded by student officers, Lieutenant Commander Henry A. Flanagan, executive officer at the Submarine base here denied that any of the submarine affair at the time of the disaster were inexperienced.

New Port, R. I., Sept. 28.—(AP).—Divers have found one of the interior bulkheads of the sunken submarine S-51 bent but not pierced. A radio dispatch received from the scene of the wreck today said. The message did not make clear whether the compartment was forward or aft. The compartment was described in the message only as an "interior" bulkhead.

Rough weather was being experienced by rescue parties, according to radio messages. Two slings were under the submarine and an attempt was to be made shortly with a 800-ton derrick to lift it above the surface.

Commercial Airplane Reliability Tour Inaugurated Today

Detroit, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The Commercial air plane reliability tour over a thousand mile flight through the Middle West, was formally inaugurated at the Ford Air Port this morning when the first of sixteen planes entered took the air signal from Edsel Ford. Others followed at short intervals.

More Auto Fatalities This Year Than for Same Period 1923

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Thirty five of the 65 cities in the United States for which comparisons are possible showed more automobile fatalities during the period January 1 to September 12, 1925, than for the first nine months of 1923.

This is shown by figures compiled by the federal department of commerce, and made public today. The report shows however, that the total automobile fatalities in 37 cities, with an aggregate population of 27 million, showed a slight decrease. The number for the first nine months of 1925 was 3,319, as contrasted with a total of 3,313 for the period January 1 to September 12, 1925. While the figures show a decrease for this year of six deaths, the 1925 figures cover a slightly shorter period—shorter by 18 days.

Of 77 cities of 100,000 population or more, 39 show more automobile fatalities in the four week period ending September 12 than during the previous four weeks. Norfolk, Va., shows no fatalities for the past 3 weeks. In addition, seven cities show no fatalities during the four week period ending September 12. They are Albany, Cambridge, Dallas, El Paso, Fall River, Fort Worth, and Somerville. The latter city, with four deaths so far this year, holds the low record in the country if cities of 100,000 population or more.

Deaths from automobile fatalities in some of America's largest cities during 1925 follows. New York City, 638; Chicago, 410; Philadelphia, 191; Detroit, 183; Cleveland and Los Angeles, each, 154.

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MAKE "FIRE PREVENTION" NATIONAL SLOGAN

The United States destroys more than five times as much property by fire as do European countries, to say nothing of the thousands of lives snuffed out annually. European countries have laws dating back to the Code Napoleon making the tenant or owner of a building liable for fires caused by negligence. W. E. Mallalieu, General Manager of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, who has recently returned from an extensive study of fire insurance problems in Europe, ob-

serves:

"Perhaps in order to reduce losses on this continent to a less reprehensible figure, it may become necessary to supplement the extensive fire prevention work of fire insurance companies, cooperating with many civic bodies, by the widespread enactment and enforcement of personal liability acts, such as already exist in some of our cities. If the man who caused fire by his carelessness or negligence were looked upon, not as an unfortunate, but as one guilty of misdemeanor and subjected to a fine, as he is under the Napoleonic law, doubtless we would be more heedful."

Fire Prevention Week will be observed nationally from October 7 to 10. It is safe to predict that there will be fewer fires during this week than normally. Instead of dropping back into our old habit of "fire carelessness," at the end of the week, why not continue fire prevention as a national habit?

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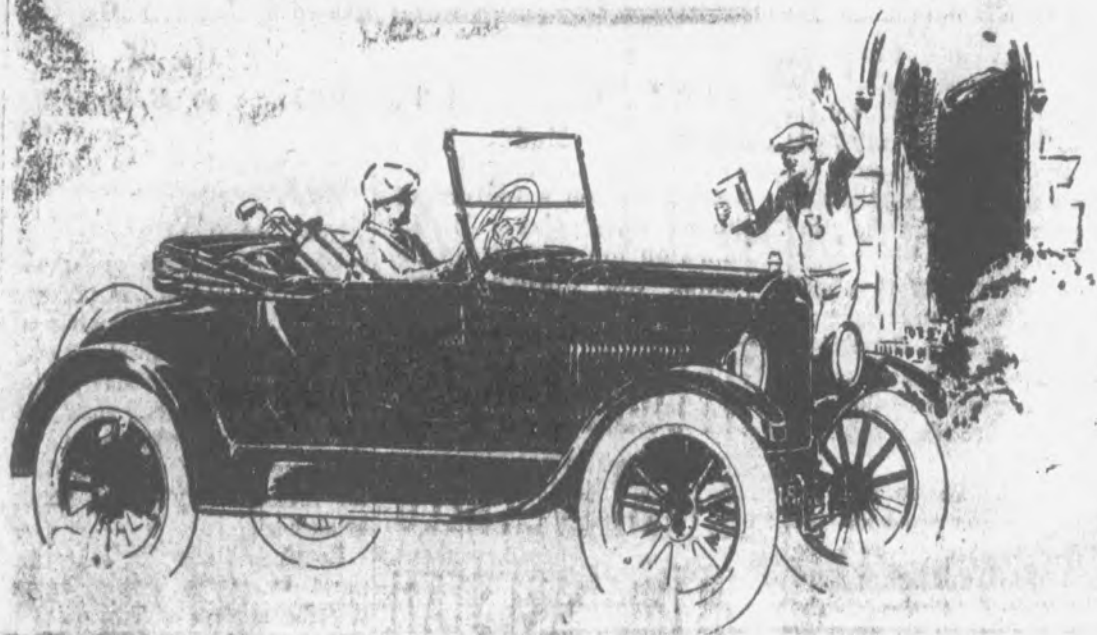

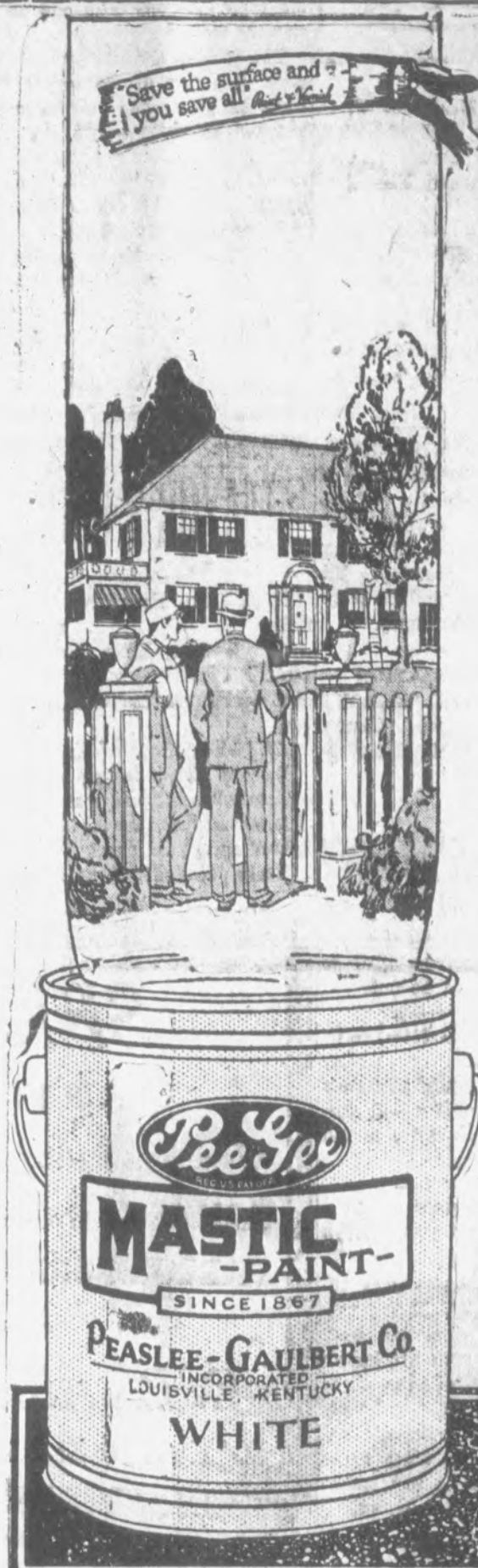

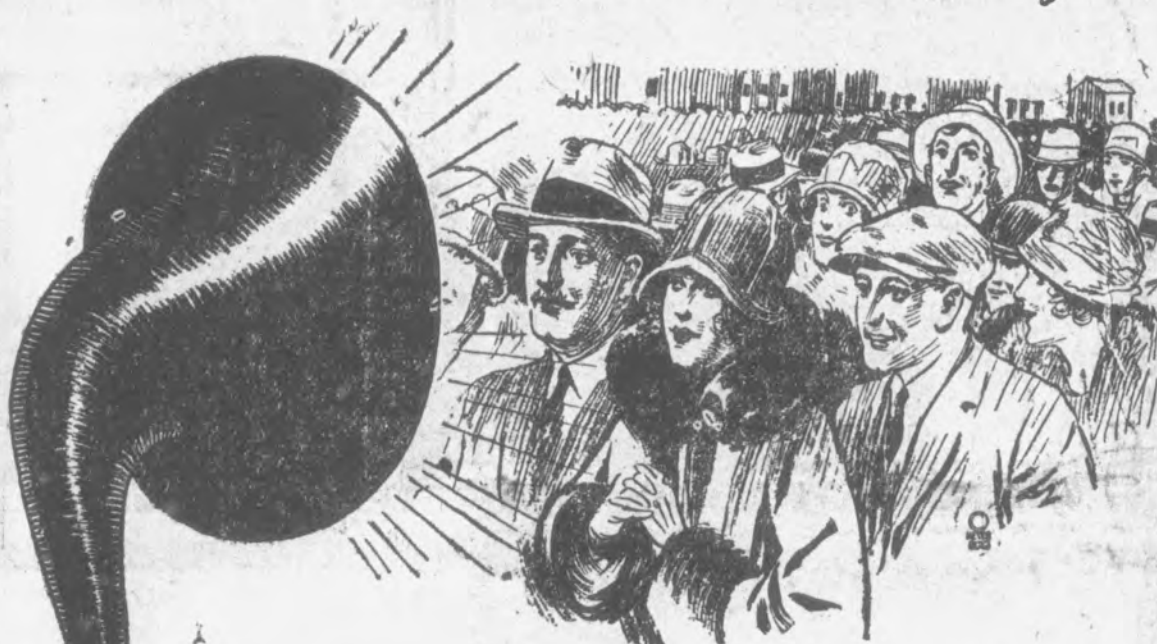

Orthopaedic Clinic To Be Held Kinston Thursday, October 1

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(AP) — The thirteenth of a series of orthopaedic clinics for crippled children held throughout the state in the last three years by the State Board of Charities and Public Welfare and the State Orthopaedic Hospital at Gastonia will take place at Kinston, on October 1.

Examination of all crippled children under 16, with a view to their cure, will be made by Dr. Oscar L. Miller, chief surgeon of the State Orthopaedic Hospital, will be assisted by Mrs. Arthur Holding, of the State Board of Welfare, in making records of the patients.

It is anticipated that the clinic at Kinston will be one of the largest yet held, since children will come from 15 adjoining counties. All names of crippled children reported in the crippled census taken in 1922 have been sent to the county superintendents, and others known to the welfare officials have been asked to come for examination. The hospital has sent out notices to about 50 children who have been treated at the hospital, asking them to appear for re-examination.

Mrs. Edith Solenberger, of the children's bureau of the United States Department of Labor, has asked permission to attend one of the clinics and arrangements have been made by which she will be present for the Kinston clinic. She has recently spent some time in Iowa observing orthopaedic clinics, and is much interested in the North Carolina plan.

Through the co-operation of the county health officials with the welfare office, the Lenoir county health center has been named as the place for the clinic.

It is expected that many negro children will be brought for examination, because of the recent announcement of a gift of \$25,000 from B. M. Duke for a ward to accommodate negro children at the State Orthopaedic Hospital.

At the other clinics, negro children have been examined; but there has been no place at which indigent cases could be treated, except when individuals or organizations arranged for treatment at private hospitals. A waiting list for the new ward has been started, and it is expected that the Kinston clinic will greatly augment the list.

Mrs. Evelyn Nimocks, of New Bern member of the board of trustees of the State Orthopaedic Hospital, expects to be present at the Kinston clinic.

Four Fifths Teachers N. C. Last Year Not College Graduates

Raleigh, Sept. 28.—(AP) — Almost four-fifths of North Carolina's teachers in the white public schools of the state last year were not college graduates.

This is shown by figures compiled and published in the current issue of State School Facts, a publication of the North Carolina Department of Education. The exact percentage, as shown by the figures quoted by the education periodical, was 89.3 non-graduate of colleges; 20.7 per cent college graduates.

The state last year employed a total of 16,948 white teachers in its public schools. Of this number, 3,512 were college graduates.

More college graduates are secured by the city schools than by the rural public schools, it is shown. In

the city schools, 44.26 percent of the white teachers were graduates from colleges, while the percentage in the rural schools was only 12.97—the city school percentage of college-graduate teachers being almost four times that of the schools in the country.

A similar situation exists with regard to the negro teachers, with an even larger percentage preponderance in favor of city schools, in the negro institutions. The percentage of colored teachers who are college graduates is 3.8. In this country schools, the percentage is only 1.38, as compared with 9.54 in negro city schools.

County Welfare Officer Pasquotank County Resigns After 4 Years

Elizabeth City, Sept. 28.—(AP) — Mrs. Anna Lewis, county welfare officer of Pasquotank county for the past four years, will present her resignation to the board of county commissioners at the regular meeting October 5, it has been learned here.

Mrs. Lewis explains that she has accepted a similar position in Wake county. It is anticipated her resignation will become effective November 1.

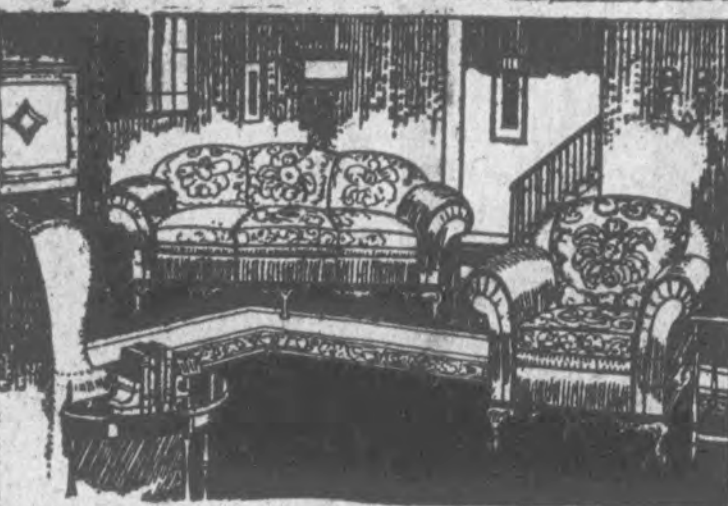
