DEMPSEY-WILLS TO FIGHT NEXT YEAR

Champion and Negro Challenger Sign Agreement to Stage Fight in September 1926

South Bend, Indiana, Sept. 30.—(AP)—In a country doctor's office above the corner drug store in the little city of Niles, Michigan, a new chapter in glove fighting was written when Jack Dempsey signed the article to defend the world's heavy weight championship against Harry Wills, negro challenger, in Michigan City, Indiana in September 1926.

Los Angeles, Sept. 30.—(AP)—News of the actual signing of the Wills-Dempsey article evoked but a tired ripple of interest in this city where the champion runs a hotel and makes occasional motion pictures. Afternoon papers barely mentioned the event. Morning papers contained among their routine sport news modest headlines such as "Dempsey and Wills sign to meet in the sweet by and by."

JOHN K. ROBINSON COMPLETES TERM AS BUREAU HEAD

After Four Years As Chief of Navy Bureau of Engineering Reverts to His Regular Rank as Captain

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Rear Admiral John K. Robinson, a storm center in the Senate Oil Investigation concluded his four year term as chief of the Navy Bureau of Engineering today and reverted to his regular rank as captain. He had requested permission to retire before relinquishing his Bureau post, but this was refused by President Coolidge. Had the permission been granted he would have retired as a Rear Admiral, the rank he held as chief of the Bureau. Although in line some time ago for promotion from captain to a permanent Rear Admiral, his name was passed over by election boards. He will retire automatically in a year under the age limit law. Admiral Robinson was the officer selected by Secretary Denby to represent him in many of the negotiations conducted by the Interior Department under Secretary Fall for leasing the Naval Oil Reserve. He contended throughout the oil inquiry that his course was placed entirely on condition of National Defense.

What assignment he will be given has not been determined, nor has a successor yet been selected to head the bureau.

Weather Conditions Causes Suspension Rescue Operations

New London, Conn., Sept. 30.—(AP)—All rescue operations on the submarine S-51 have been suspended because of unfavorable weather conditions. Rear Admiral Henry H. Christy reported in a message today to the submarine base here. The message from Admiral Christy, who is in charge of the fleet working over the spot where the S-51 went down last Friday night after being rammed by the City of Rome, said present weather conditions at S-51 made operations "impossible."

This was the first word to come from the rescue fleet since last night with the exception of the brief weather report, which indicated that diving operations at least could be resumed today.

Plans to make another attempt to raise the submarine by the two giant cranes, Monarch and Century, had been thwarted when the cranes were forced to return to New Port early today after a midnight attempt to join the rescue fleet. The cranes were being held in readiness however to proceed today if conditions moderated sufficiently.

New London, Conn., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Rough weather having caused a suspension of work at the scene of the wrecked submarine S-51, officers at the submarine base today said that it might be necessary to stop the efforts to rescue and try to salvage the boat. The beginning of salvage operations would mean that efforts to lift the stern of the sunken submarine, which has been the object of the wrecking lighters, would be abandoned and divers would try to patch the hole punched in the hull by the steamer, City of Rome, perhaps putting pontoons under her and attaching her to barges to be towed to the surface. The time it would take for such work would be uncertain, for it has not been determined how far the S-51 has settled in the sandy bottom of the ocean. It would be a matter of days, however.

Such a step, however, would have to be ordered by the Navy Department at Washington, and probably would be taken only upon recommendation of Rear Admiral Henry H. Christy in command of the rescue work, who so far has refused to give up hope that some of the 31 remaining men who went down with her more than four days ago might still be alive. Two bodies are all that have been recovered of the 33 that went down.

PLACES BLAME FOR RECENT DISASTERS NAVY DEPARTMENT

Mitchell Declares Sending of Dirigible Into Middle West "In Direct Violation of Law"

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—Responsibility of the Shenandoah disaster and failure of the Navy Air plane PN-9, No. 1 to reach Hawaii was placed directly on the heads of the Navy Department today by Colonel William Mitchell in testimony given before the President's air board.

The sending of the big dirigible into the Middle West was "in direct violation of law," he asserted, and arrangements made by the PN-9 flight like the work of "bungling amateurs."

The former assistant chief of the army air service criticized the work of the navy in arranging equipment for the Navy contingent accompanying the McMillan Arctic Expedition, declaring "flagrant" mistakes made in preparations for the three aeronautical events made it impossible for air men to remain silent. By sending the Shenandoah to the Middle West, he insisted the Navy violated the law, because in time of peace land activities, belong to the army.

The big dirigible, he charged, was not equipped with parachutes.

This is like sending a ship to sea without life boats, he added. Emergency date, he asserted, showed the PN-9, No. 1 could not possibly have reached Honolulu without refueling enroute and that the planes sent to the Arctic were designed and built for service in the tropics and along the Atlantic Coast.

Yet these planes, he added, were sent to the Arctic region where officers in charge of planing the expedition expected them to give satisfactory service.

BOB LA FOLLETTE ELECTED SENATE

Son of Former Presidential Candidate Receives Majority of 134,000 Over Opponent

Milwaukee, Wis., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Wisconsin again placed stamp of approval on the name of LaFollette, the thirty year old son of the late Senator, was chosen at a special election yesterday to represent the Badger State in the Senate. Large majorities were given young LaFollette in nearly every county. With 317 precincts of the 2692 in the state missing, LaFollette showed a majority of 134,544 votes over Edward F. Dithmar, the Independent Republican candidate.

Like Father Enjoys Campaign.

Madison, Wis., Sept. 30.—Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., 30-year-old Republican nominee for United States senator, enjoys campaigning as well as his late father.

Already experienced in the steering of political campaigns, he takes a delight in the tours that candidates make, particularly by automobile. If young Bob has a hobby, it is driving an automobile.

Young Bob followed his father's career closely. Characteristic LaFollette imannerisms are employed to some extent by the son, although his platform style differs somewhat from that of the senator.

The first important appearance of young LaFollette in the political spotlight was at the Cleveland conference in 1924, where he delivered his father's speech accepting the presidential endorsement of the Conference for Progressive Political Action.

Unusual bonds existed between the father and son. In 1918, when Bob Junior was critically ill, Senator LaFollette familiarized himself with the diet and other treatments and helped administer them. On one occasion, at least, the senator held Young Bob in his arms until the crisis was passed.

Illness, from which Bob apparently recovered with robust health, was responsible for the interruption of his university education, and resulted in devoting himself to a training based

COLE DISPLAYS KEEN INTEREST IN SELECTING JURY

Nine Members of Jury Selected at Noon; Family of Slain Man Attend Trial; Cole Appears Nervous

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Eight members of the jury that will decide the fate of William B. Cole, charged with the murder of W. W. Ormond, were selected during the first three hours of the trial here today. The early selections came as a surprise.

Twenty-four veniremen were examined and of those excused the majority were opposed to capital punishment. Three had formed opinion of the defendant's guilt. Cole displayed keen interest in the proceedings. He seemed nervous and would not talk with his attorneys. Judge T. B. Finley, presiding, called for order at 9:56 o'clock and preparations for the selections of the jury from among 200 special veniremen began. Mrs. W. B. Cole, wife of the defendant, was seated in the gallery.

Accompanying her were Mrs. Elizabeth Cole, the 24 year old daughter about whom has been woven the situation of which this trial is the climax. Also present were Catherine, another daughter, and Robert, a son.

Cole entered the court room at 9:30 o'clock, kissed each member of his family and took a seat at the defense table. Reverend Arthur L. Ormond, father of the dead man, and four years pastor of the Methodist church in which Cole held membership, was seated near the defense table. With him were Misses Myra and Ophelia Ormond, daughters, and Allison, a son. The women were dressed in deep mourning.

Rockingham, Sept. 30.—Judge Finley called recess at one o'clock until three o'clock and the prospective jurors were cautioned by the court not to discuss the case and were turned over to Sheriff Baldwin. At the time of the recess nine jurors had been selected.

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THE NAVY ON TRIAL

It is ten years since the American Navy suffered a submarine disaster comparable with the loss of the S-51 in the sinking of the F-4 at Honolulu and the death of twenty-six gallant men. But it is not a month since the crash of the dirigible Shenandoah; not three weeks since another tragedy was barely averted by the arrival of the seaplane PN-9 No. 1 at Kauai, miles off her course and in the nick of time.

Before the official inquiries into the loss of the Shenandoah are more than well begun, and while a definitive air policy is being sought by the Coolidge commission, the new Block Island tragedy further demands investigation. Without such disturbing issues as those raised by Col. Mitchell, there are reasons enough for deep questionings as to the management of our navy.

When on a clear night at sea a submarine running on the surface is cut down by a passenger ship specific questions as to lights, equipment and the duty of the surviving vessel to stand by may be left to expert judgment.

ment. But such an accident, like that when a whole group of destroyers dashed upon the rocks in a Pacific Coast fog, raises doubts among the expert whether our naval commanders are not needlessly constrained to take risks which might in time of war be necessary but which in peace have no adequate value as training to compensate for the danger they involve.

Such questions concern the technicians of the department. They are important; yet they are less important in the sure instinct of a democracy than certain moral issues inescapably brought forward by the story of the Shenandoah.

The hapless crew of that doomed airship were sent to their death against the advice of the experienced commander, who asked for a later date. He was sent off a week in advance of the date he preferred in order that the Shenandoah might be seen above five great State Fairs upon her trip to and from Minneapolis. Secretary Wilbur himself said that "Commander Lansdowne never protested against the flight either in person or by communication to me or any one in the department." Error or untruth in that statement is established by the official correspondence. The Navy Department was playing State-Fair politics with the Shenandoah, against her commander's best judgment, when she broke and fell.

We misread the temper of the American people if there is not widespread among them the opinion drawn from a record of costly disasters of which the sinking of the S-51 is the latest, and of fibbing excuses and denials, that there is need of a change in the conduct of the navy. Not a change in the gallant men who risk their lives with eager daring; a change in technical efficiency; a change in purposes, excluding political considerations; above all, a higher regard for truth and frankness in accounting to the people for the conduct of their first line of national defense. —N. Y. World.

French, American Debt Negotiations Nearer Together

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP).—The debt negotiations between the French and American missions seeking to fund the \$4,000,000,000 French war debt moved rapidly today with the negotiations nearer together than they have been since the discussion began.

It was indicated that it had been agreed that a clause should be inserted in any settlement for a revision of payments in the event that it should become evident on both sides that the French capacity to pay had been over estimated and in addition the American Commission has reduced the proposed annuities from \$150,000,000 to \$130,000,000. Both of these plans are considered of great importance by the French delegates.

All work is suspended on the campus and appropriate exercises are held. The alumnae take an important party, many of them returning to the college for the occupation.

This year all over the state meetings of the local alumnae associations are to be held during Founder's Day week. Literally from the mountains to the sea, and outside the state, alumnae will be meeting together, honoring their alma mater, and enjoying fellowship of one another.

Summary Shows Rainfall General Over Cotton Belt

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP).—Crop and weather conditions in southern states for the week ended

yesterday were summarized today by the Department of Agriculture. Rain fall was rather general over the cotton belt during the week except in parts of the eastern states and picking and ginning were considerably retarded in the western half with damage to open cotton by frequent rains. In eastern sections of the belt the harvesting of crop made better progress without material harm from showers.

The cutting and curing of tobacco progressed in the Middle Atlantic states.

For North Carolina the report said the weather was favorable in the east but the drought was unbroken in the west, though showers in the mountains offered temporary relief.

Earthquake Reveals Valuable Paiting in Historic Monastery

Los Angeles.—(AP).—The Santa Barbara earthquake, which did great damage to the historic mission there, resulted in the restoration to the Franciscan padres one of the mission's greatest treasures, a portrait of St. Francis of Assisi, revered saint and founder of the Franciscan Order of Monks.

When the earth tremor rocked the walls of the old monastery, the painting of the saint came crashing to the floor. In a niche of the walls this painting had been lost to sight for years behind coats of varnish, shellac and other preservatives.

The mission fathers rescued the picture from the debris. Inspection proved it worthy of restoration. It was sent to Los Angeles, and Theodore N. Lukits, portrait painter, member of the American Federation of Arts, was engaged for the task.

First, Lukits explained, the portrait will be fastened, face down, to a sheet of paper. Then, a thread at a time, the ancient broken canvas will be removed from the precious film of paint and a new canvas, prepared to resist heat and cold, will be glued to the back of the picture. The new canvas in place, the artist will reverse the work and with utmost care remove layers of dirt and preservatives.

"Under the varnish," Lukits said, "I hope to find the artist's name. We know that a master did the work, but his name has become invisible below the dirt. The painting is worth conservatively \$20,000 and will undoubtedly be one of the assets of the Pacific Coast art world."

The portrait, known to be 150 years old and for 130 years in the Santa Barbara monastery, is five feet by three feet ten inches. It shows the saint in an attitude of prayer. A Bible is open before St. Francis. His eyes are raised to a crucifix, while back of the Bible lies a human skull, apparently a grim reminder of the fleeting nature of temporal things. The

saint is clad in sackcloth, the fabric still plainly depicted through the film of a century and a half, and the hempen rope gathered about his cowl traces a clear line across the darkened background.

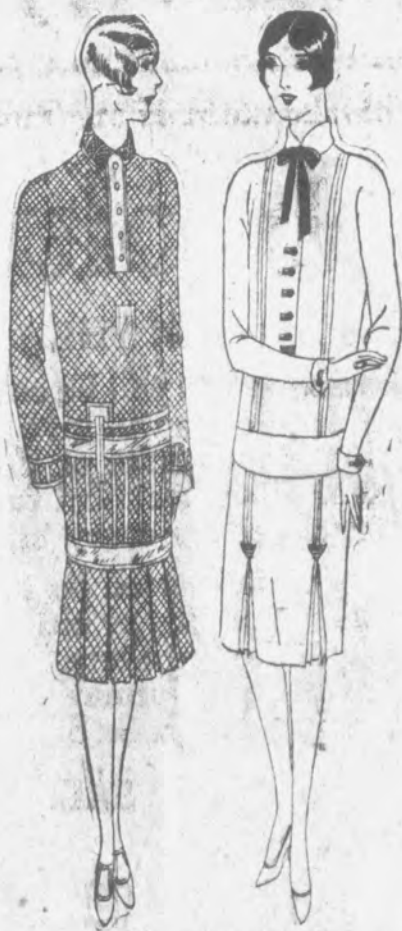
