Mrs. F. J. Diener Takes High Score Yesterday; Votes Decrease and Entry List Closes October 8th

Just four more days left of the big vote giving period in The Daily Reflector's subscription campaign. Another Body is Recovered From the Sunken Submarine

On Board the U. S. S. Camden, off Block Island, October 3.—(AP)—Divers today recovered another body from the sunken submarine S-51. The identity was not immediately established.

The body later was identified as that of Paul D. Berk, engineer, second class, of Philadelphia, Penn. The body was fully clothed and Berk apparently had been on watch.

The body found today made six of the crew who have been accounted for. As several of the men lost on the submarine were washed away as the ship sank after being rammed by the City of Rome a week ago last night, the exact number of bodies still within the hull was unknown but it was presumed to be 26. Discovery yesterday by divers that the submarine was flooded from bow to stern, snapped out all remaining hope that some of the men might be found alive.

New Port, R. I., Oct. 3.—The entire fleet working under the direction of Sea Admiral Christy seeking to recover the bodies from the wreck of the S-51 has suspended operations for the day because of rough weather and has been ordered to port, according to a wireless message intercepted here.

Great Britain Will Launch Its Biggest Prohibition Campaign

London, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The biggest prohibition campaign yet attempted in Great Britain is about to be launched after many months of secret preparation. The Daily Mail said the methods about to be adopted are similar to those which preceded the introduction of prohibition into the United States. The organization of the movement will not begin by advocating outlaw prohibition but will stress local option. The key note of the campaign will be an appeal to the women of the country. The movement will be inaugurated in Manchester on October 19.

Robinson Assumes Supreme Command United States Fleet

San Francisco, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Brief but impressive ceremonies aboard the flag ship Seattle, were to mark the assumption here today by Admiral Samuel S. Robinson of Supreme Command of the United States fleet succeeding Admiral Robert Coontz, who today completed his tour of duties as Chief of America's sea forces.

Train Is Derailed Fireman, Brakeman Reported Killed

Birmingham, Ala., Oct. 3.—(AP)—A fireman and a brakeman of the Atlanta, Birmingham and Atlantic freight train were reported killed and the engineer seriously scalded and suffering from a broken arm, while other members of the crew were injured today when a train was derailed at Parkwood.

SAYS FRANCE WILL DO ALL POSSIBLE TO PAY WAR DEBTS

Joseph Caillaux States That He Will Return In Six Months to Resume Negotiations

New York, Oct. 3.—(AP)—After a final appeal to "the heart of America," Joseph Caillaux, Minister of Finance of France, and members of the French Debt Commission were sailing home today on the liner France.

"Grievously disappointed over the failure to effect a settlement of France's \$4,200,000,000 debt to this country, Mr. Caillaux said his country would do everything within the limits of her strength to pay the debt. He said he might return to Washington in six months to resume the negotiations.

Tears were in the eyes of the statesman last night as he spoke in reply to tributes to France from Nicholas Murray Butler, President of Columbia University, and Ambassador Miriam T. Herrick. "There is something higher than the question of interest between man and between nations," Mr. Caillaux said, "and that something is a common friendship between our peoples. To the heart of America he appealed with no other thought than to ask of the people of America to look at my country with the same sentiment expressed here."

"In settling our obligation," he stated, "we will do what we must to the limit of our strength. My country is a country of labor and a country of pride. We will do everything we can."

He was uncertain whether the French Parliament would accept the five year temporary agreement with payments of \$40,000,000 a year proposed by the American Commissions. He had power only to sign a "complete funding agreement," he said.

Huge Airplane Carrier, Lexington, Launched Today

Quincy, Mass., October 3.—(AP)—The huge airplane carrier, Lexington, slid smoothly into the water today at the Fore River yard of the Bethlehem Ship Building Co-operation while Secretary of the Navy, Wilbur, and a party of navy officers stood by. Secretary Wilbur directed an address in which he defended the navy against "unreasonable conservatism," and praised the navy's spirit.

RELIGIOUS WORKERS OF JAPAN BANNED FROM POLITICAL PARTIES

Tokyo.—Religious workers of Japan are complaining against what they term "unjust discrimination" shown them in the field of politics. While they are given a vote, under the new manhood suffrage law, an existing police regulation prohibits all religious workers, including Buddhist, Christian and Shinto priests, from joining any political party.

There are said to be more than 20,000 religious workers in Japan and it is reported they are planning to send two representatives to the Diet in the next general election.

THREE PERSONS NOW MISSING RESULT OF TUNNEL CAVE IN

Known Death List In Churchill Tunnel Cave In Stood at One Early Today

Richmond, Va., Oct. 3.—(AP)—The known death list in the Churchill Tunnel cave-in stood at one early this afternoon while the list of five persons missing was reduced to three with the discovery of two negroes laborers, who safely escaped the falling earth.

Rescue workers using steam shovel in addition of squads of negro workers, had not been able to penetrate the slide today to the cab of the locomotive. It is believed to have been trapped and killed. Little rescue work was possible at the eastern entrance of the tunnel but a close watch was kept in the hope that some of those believed to have been entombed by the slide may work their way out as did most of the train crew yesterday. Plans were being laid to sink a shaft through the fissure in Jefferson Park in order to reach the cab of the locomotive where Mason was last seen by his fireman, Benjamin F. Moseley, who worked himself out of the debris only to die of scalds and other injuries a few hours later.

Loss of W. F. Pate Will Be a Distinct Blow State College

Raleigh, Oct. 3.—(AP)—The loss of W. F. Pate by State College will be a distinct blow to the school of Agriculture, officials of State College say.

Mr. Pate, who resigned his position with the College, to become agronomist in charge of the Raleigh office of the soil improvement committee of the National Fertilizer Association, with offices in Raleigh, had been with State College for 15 years, in charge of soil fertility investigations of the North Carolina Experiment Station and associated on the agricultural teaching staff of the State College of Agriculture. His resignation became effective October 1.

Local Tobacco Market Averages \$22.54 for Week

Official figures of Secretary K. W. Cobb, show that the local tobacco market sold for the week 2,550,960 pounds for \$574,976.69, at an average of \$22.54.

For the season the market has sold 13,267,992 for \$2,472,091.81 at an average of \$18.63.

The average this week is 54 cents per hundred higher than for the corresponding week of last year.

Hold Up Diamond Merchant, Escape Gems Val. \$150,000

St. Paul, Minnesota, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Three men held up a New York diamond merchant and seven other persons in a jewelry store here early today and escaped with gems valued at more than \$150,000.

KIWANIAN WILL DIRECT EFFORTS BEAUTIFYING CITY

Kiwanian W. E. Hooker Tells of His Tour of European Countries; Meeting Proves Interesting

Having kept their promise to the childhood of Greenville in the equipment of the city's playground, the Kiwanis Club in its meeting of last night decided to direct their thoughts to the beautifying of the residential districts of the city, which has been neglected by the property owners in many of the principal streets. With the proper co-operation of the city authorities and the citizenship the club feels that this can be accomplished at a small cost.

Last night's meet was in charge of Luther Herring and was featured by a talk from Will Hooker who has recently returned from an extensive tour of the European countries. Mr. Hooker related some interesting experiences with the people of the eight countries visited on his itinerary. Mr. Hooker stated that the principal thought in the minds of the hundreds of people who were representatives to the Stockholm Conference on life and workers was that of bringing all nations closer together in business and governmental activities, and that great religious belief realized that the only solution for the world today was for the United States to become a part in the world peace program.

Bob Fitzgerald in charge of the various committees who are actively engaged in advertising and boosting the Navy Band concerts here on the 19th of the month stated that tickets would go on sale on the 10th.

The club voiced their hearty endorsement and pledged their support.

Battle Parolled for Remainder of 60 Day Sentence

Raleigh, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Turner Battle, of Edgecombe county, was today parolled for the remainder of a 60 day road sentence on a conviction of violation of the prohibition law. The Governor parolled the prisoner on recommendation of Hoyle Sink, Pardon Commissioner, and the trial Judge Solicitor and a number of citizens. It was alleged that there had been discovered evidence. Battle was convicted in September at the Edgecombe County Superior Court.

WILL RESTORE LOG CABIN BIRTHPLACE OF BUCHANAN

Chambersburg, Pa.—The weather worn old log cabin in which James Buchanan, fifteenth president of the United States, was born on April 23, 1791, is to be restored and preserved as a memorial to Pennsylvania only president.

Built originally by the president's father in the mountains of southern Pennsylvania, the cabin was moved nearly a century ago to Mercersburg, where it has since stood, used much of the time as a tenant house. Now it is being torn down and moved again; this time to Chambersburg, where it will be rebuilt on a lot near the center of the town.

17,716,709 Motor Vehicles Registered From Jan. to July 1

Washington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Motor vehicles registered in the United States during the first six months of 1925 totaled 17,716,709, which represents an increase of 13.9 percent over the registrations during the same period last year.

This is shown by figures announced by the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Department of Agriculture. The figures do not include 70,000 official vehicles owned by the states, on which no registration fees were required.

Total gross receipts from registration fees, licenses, permits etc., amounted to \$226,899,709, of which \$183,700,371 is applicable to highway work under the supervision of the state highway departments.

Alabama showed the greatest increase in registration over the same period in 1924, the percentage of increase for that state being 53.6. Florida was next with 41 percent, followed by Oklahoma, 35.0 percent, and Mississippi, 32.6 percent.

The total registration represents 15,519,647 passenger cars, 2,114,750 trucks, and 82,312 taxis, buses and cars for hire. The figure on buses, taxis, etc., is, however, under the actual figures, says the department, as only 20 states register these vehicles separate from other vehicles.

Would Fine People for Attending Fires Spend Money on Sts.

Concord, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Fining people for attending fires and putting the money so collected on new streets is the novel idea advanced by Mayor Henderlite, of Salisbury. "Before my administration as mayor of Salisbury has expired," Mr. Henderlite is quoted as saying here recently, when practically the whole town was out to witness a fire, "I am going to pass a law making it a \$50 fine for any person to go to a fire. Then I am going to take the money I get from that source and build more streets."

COLE CLAIMS THAT HE HAD A RIGHT TO KILL BILL ORMOND

Throughout Rigid Cross Examination by Clyde Hoey, Murdered Maintains Double Reason for Killing

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 3.—(AP)—A determined effort to draw from W. B. Cole the admission that he killed W. Ormond to "shut his tongue," and not to protect his own life marked a rigid cross examination of the wealthy cotton manufacturer here today.

The witness maintained throughout the examination his double reason for the killing, that he wished to defend himself and to protect his family from Ormond in the future. Each question of the state aimed to draw the admission that he intended to kill Ormond and then killed him deliberately.

"Why did you kill Bill Ormond?" "I killed him to keep him from killing me, and having my family at his mercy."

The answer was the same Cole had given several times before. Clyde Hoey, of the prosecution, tried to get Cole to say how much of the killing was to stop Ormond's tongue, and how much to protect Cole's life.

"I love my family more than forty lives."

"Then you killed Ormond forty times more to shut his mouth than to protect yourself?"

The witness would not commit himself.

The witness then was asked about the three "slander letters" he entrusted to Fred Rynum to be given in the event of his sudden death only to his attorneys.

"Wasn't it your purpose in doing that to keep the slander from getting to the public?"

"Yes."

"Then after you killed Ormond, why did you bring these slander letters to be published to the world? Didn't you do it to try to save your life? Didn't your attorneys tell you with this answer of yours? Didn't they tell you that an insanity plea would not save you?"

The questions came rapidly. Cole denied that his attorneys had said he must plea self defense and insanity. "When you killed Ormond you believed you had a legal and moral right?"

"Yes, and a spiritual right."

"Then you realized that you had done the right thing?"

"Yes."

"Then you were sane?"

"That is for someone else to say. I was all to pieces."

"You are sane now?"

"I think so."

"Don't you know you are sane?"

"I believe I am."

"Don't you know that you killed Ormond without a shadow of justification and brought out those letters to protect yourself?"

"I believe I had a right to do what I did. I thought he was going to kill me."

Every question asked the witness during the cross examination sought to destroy Cole's given reason for killing Ormond, to protect himself and family. The cross examination ended at 12:05 p. m.

Mr. Hoey drew from the witness every answer that might tend to show Cole was a man of decided opinion with a long practice in doing what he wanted to do. He brought out that Cole's attorneys had forbidden him to accompany him to Raleigh to interview Ormond, and that Cole then said he would go. "You took their advice when you wanted too and then when you wanted to do different you did?"

Mr. Cole replied, "I went to Raleigh."

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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

"THE HOLY BIBLE" (2)

"WHAT IS THE BIBLE."

I intimated, in our Meditation last week, that the Bible is a Library rather than a volume; a collection of books by various authors.

It is a History:—a certified record of God's dealing with men. There have been many histories written since the days of Herodotus, "the Father of History," but none of them have greater accuracy than the historic portions of the Bible. Most of them are warped by prejudice, and facts are construed or misconstrued to conform with the bias of the narrator. The Bible, on the other hand, is singularly free from this fault. Even to-day the latest archaeological discoveries in the regions of Bible lands confirm, in every important particular, the statements of the Book.

It is a Revelation from heaven, but not the only Revelation. God reveals Himself in Nature and in Conscience, as well as in the Bible and the Church. These Revelations are not contradictory, but supplementary. The Truth has the testimony of more than two or three witnesses.

Longfellow, in his poem on "The Sixtieth Birthday of Agassiz," sang:—

"And Nature, the kind old nurse
Took the boy upon her knee,
Saying, 'Here is a story book
Thy Father has written for thee...
Come wander with me,' she said,
'Into regions yet untrod,
And read what is still unread
In the manuscript of God.'"

In the Nineteenth Psalm you have a fine illustration of these Revelations. It begins with Nature as God's book:—"The heavens declare the glory of God," and passes on to the fuller light of "the Law of the Lord" which is "perfect, converting the

soul."

When Queen Victoria was crowned in Westminster Abbey, three presents were made to her: first, the Sword of State; second, the Imperial Robe; and, lastly, the Bible; these words accompanying the gift: "Our gracious Queen, we present you with this book, the most valuable thing the world affords. Here is wisdom: this is the royal law; these are the timely oracles of God. Blessed is he that readeth, and they that hear the words of this book; that keep and do the things contained in it. For these words are the words of eternal life, able to make you wise and happy in this world, nay, wise unto salvation, and so happy forevermore, through faith which is in Christ Jesus, to whom be glory forever. Amen." The young Queen put the words to the test and after long years of a most eventful reign, she testified to the fact that it was the Bible that had made the British Empire great.

Take another testimony: Huxley, the great scientist, whom some of you may have been misled to believe irreligious, said: "The Bible has been the Magna Charta of the poor and of the oppressed. Down to modern times, no state has had a constitution in which the interests of the poor are so largely taken into account; in which the duties, so much more than the privileges, of rulers are insisted upon, as that drawn up for Israel in Deuteronomy and Leviticus. Nowhere is the fundamental truth, that the welfare of the state, in the long run, depends upon the righteousness of the citizens, so strongly laid down. The Bible is the most democratic book in the world."

The Bible is the sign-post to the traveller from time to eternity. It is the spiritual Baedeker, the guide-book to heaven. "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet; and a light unto my path." But it is not the way: Jesus is the Way. It is the chart on which are marked the sunken reefs and shifting sand-bars where many a soul has found shipwreck. It is the friendly beams from the lighthouse, and the warning bell-buoy on the shoals, given for our safety. But it is not the ocean, and certainly not "the desired haven." The ocean is Life; the desired haven, Heaven.

If we are children in the faith, the Bible has the "sincere milk of the word for us; if we are strong men, it is "the meat" intended for our nourishment and growth in grace. It is a means to an end. It is not the end. The end is our redemption through faith in the Son of God, and our adoption into the home-life of Divinity.

An old preacher once said that he found many Bibles in the homes of his people, but that he could write the word "Damnation" in the dust that had settled on some of them.

If what we have said about this Book is true, ought we not to spend a few minutes every day in its study?

Is it too much to ask that to-night we resolve henceforth to give at least as much time every day to the reading of God's Word as we do the newspapers? If this Book can "make us wise unto salvation," what is your opinion of the sagacity of the person who neglects it?

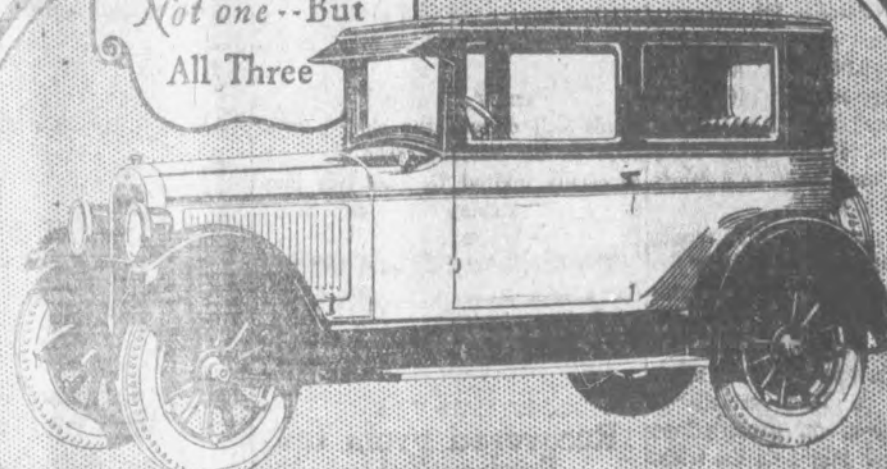

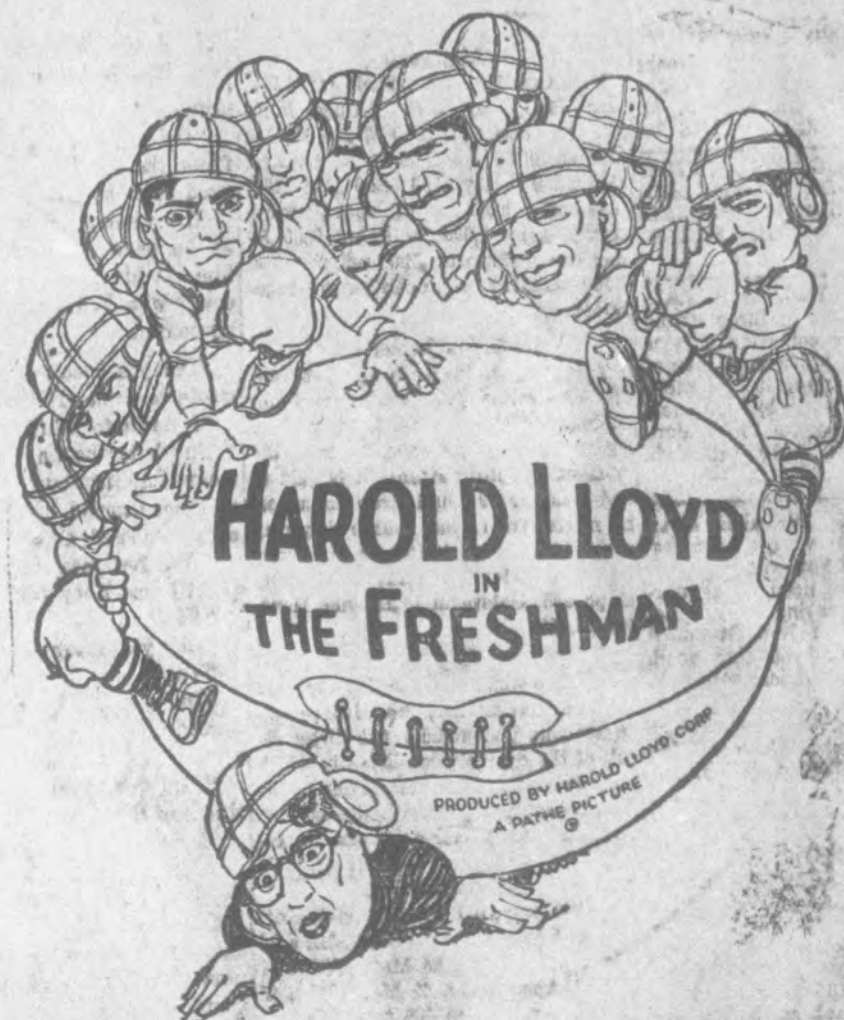

mond "to keep him from killing me and having my family at his mercy."

Cole's testimony followed introductions of letters that passed between the men in which Ormond had declared relations of "man and wife" had existed between him and Cole's daughter. Cole's one reply had threatened to shoot Ormond "full of lead" if ever he heard any derogatory remarks about his daughter from Ormond or through him.

"Were you sane when you killed Bill Ormond, or were you crazy?" was Clyde Hoy's first question. "I think that is a question for some one else to answer."

Hoy attempted to get the witness to say he never intended to plead insanity, and Cole said he had nothing to do with his defense.

"Did you not go to Ormond's car from the rear?" Cole insisted he fired after he got to the car.

The witness testified that so far as he knew Ormond had not seen him or his daughter, or communicated with him since he signed the agreement.

"Did you mean the letter you wrote to Ormond?"

"I meant to bluff him."

The letter began "You damnable, mean, insulting cur" and threatened to shoot Ormond "full of lead" if he ever slandered Cole's daughter.

"Did you mean the damnable part?" was Hoy's next question.

"Yes."

"Did you mean the cur part?"

"Yes."

"Did you mean the full of lead part?"

"I meant to bluff him?"

"Do you mean you meant two thirds of it and not the other third?"

"I meant to bluff him."

"Do you think Bill Ormond should know which part you meant?"

Cole said he supposed he could not. The witness was becoming nervous under the rapid fire of questions.

Ormond's war record came to the front in Hoy's later question when a question was asked about a letter from Cole to W. N. Everett, Secretary of State, April 26, 1923, asking him to help Ormond.

"Bill is a good fellow," the letter said. "There is not much force to Bill, but something should be done for him. He was gassed, and shell shocked, and almost everything else but killed."

"He was everything but killed in the war and you killed him?" was Hoy's next question.

"Yes."

Cole was asked if he had not

known Ormond was deaf in the right ear more than in the left (Cole shot Ormond, approaching from the right side). Mr. Hoy was attacking every detail of Cole's testimony.

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, Oct. 3—Taking the stand yesterday afternoon in his own defense W. B. Cole, wealthy cotton manufacturer, on trial for the slaying of W. W. Ormond, declared he killed Ormond to save his own life and the honor of his family.

Relating that he had known Bill Ormond for two years during which time Ormond had gone with his daughter the witness declared that he had never considered them engaged. His story led up to Ormond's moving to Raleigh and to letters received by him from Ormond in which Ormond referred to immoral

relations between himself and Cole's daughter.

Cole declared that after reading the letter he called his daughter and gave it to her to read. She branded the letter as a "lie" and offered to submit to medical examination to prove her statement.

Cole told a story of intense suffering brought on by what he termed the "damnable slanders" of Ormond, spoke of days and nights of torture when he could not eat or sleep and days when he lived in constant fear of meeting Ormond on the streets of Rockingham. He testified he was constantly in fear of the scandal Ormond told spreading among his neighbors and friends here. At 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon when court adjourned Cole's direct testimony was incomplete and the witness again took the stand this morning.
