CONTESTANTS PUSH ON AS CLOSE OF BIG VOTE PERIOD NEARS

Miss Margaret Cook Takes High Honors Yesterday While Miss Helen Joyner and Mrs. F. J. Diener Tie for Second

The close of the most important voting period in The Daily Reflector's subscription campaign is but a few hours away. Thursday night at 8 o'clock sharp will witness the close of that period in the campaign known as the First Period. This period dates from the start of the campaign, Sept. 10th to Thursday night, Oct. 8th.

TWO WHITE MEN ARRESTED WHILE OPERATING STILL

W. E. Terry and Chester Terry Arrested, While Operating a Still in Carolina Township

W. E. Terry and son Chester Terry, white men of Carolina Township, were arrested Monday night on a charge of manufacturing whiskey. W. E. Terry was released on bond while Chester Terry, unable to give the required bond, was placed in jail.

Deputy Sheriff H. D. Gurganus, T. L. Perkins and J. R. Carrington, arrested the men while they were operating a still. The still which was of a 60 gallons capacity and 10 gallons of whiskey were captured. Seven men were at the still but five succeeded in escaping.

On Sunday evening Mr. Gurganus visited Pactolus Township and captured a 100 gallon capacity copper still.

COOLIDGE SPEAKS AMERICAN LEGION IN OMAHA, NEB.

Declares Result of World War Will Be Lost Unless Universal Attitude of Tolerance Is Created

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 6.—(AP)—President Coolidge, addressing the American Legion convention here today, declared that the result of the World War will be lost and the nations of the world will prepare for another conflict unless racial antagonisms are demolished and a universal attitude of tolerance is created.

"If our country is to have any position of leadership," he added, "I trust it may be in that direction, and I believe that the place where it should begin is at home."

Asserting that no nation ever had or ever will have any army large enough to guarantee it against attack in time of peace or to insure its victory in war, the president said that "peace and security are more likely to result from fair and honorable dealings and mutual agreements for a limitation of armaments among the nations than by any attempt at competition in squadrons and battlefleets."

"No doubt this country," he continued, "could, if it wished to spend more money, make a better military force, but that is only part of the problem that confronts the government. The real question is whether spending more money to make a better military force would really make a better country."

"I would be the last to disparage the military art. It is an honorable and patriotic calling of the highest rank. I can see no merit in any unnecessary expenditure of money to hire men to build fleets and carry munitions when international relations and agreements permit the turning of such resources into the making of good roads, the building of better homes, the promotion of education and all the other arts of peace which minister to the advancement of human welfare."

Avoiding direct reference to any specific situation, Mr. Coolidge expressed the opinion that military power should be subordinated to and governed by civil authority, and continued:

"It is for this reason that any organization of men in the military service bent on influencing the public mind for the purpose of forcing government action through the pressure of public opinion is an exceedingly dangerous undertaking and precedent. This is so whatever form it might take, whether it be for the purpose of influencing the executive, the legislative, or the heads of departments."

"It is for the civil authority to determine what appropriations shall be granted, what appointments shall be made, and what rules shall be adopted for the conduct of its armed forces. Whenever the military power starts dictating to the civil authority by whatever means adopted, the liberties of the country are beginning to end. National defense should at all times be supported, but any form of militarism should be resisted."

Charles J. Smith, Governor of 37th District Delivers Inspiring Address to Rotarians and Guests

Last night's Rotary meeting was featured by an address by Charles J. Smith, of Salem, Va., Governor of the 37th District of Rotary International, who was here for his official visit to the local club. The meeting was attended by a number of the Rotarians' wives and a few visiting Rotarians.

Mrs. Sam White, at the piano, rendered the accompaniments for the songs throughout the evening which added much to the enjoyment of the occasion.

In addressing the meeting Governor Smith complimented the local Rotarians for the real Rotary spirit he had found here and expressed pleasure at being privileged to deliver a talk in the only Rotary owned club building in the world. With the Ideals and Spirit of Rotary as his theme he delivered an inspiring message which meant much to the Rotarians and their guests. RAILROAD EMPLOYEE FATALLY INJURED IN ACCIDENT TODAY

Motor Car Overturns Near Morehead City Killing Supt. Henry Oliver and Injuring His Companion

New Bern, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Henry W. Oliver, Superintendent of bridges and building for the Norfolk-Southern railway in this district, was fatally injured in an accident near Morehead City early this morning.

A railroad motor car, which he was driving along the track, struck a dog and overturned, Oliver and a companion, John A. Zigler, of this city, were pinned beneath the car and Zigler stated Oliver died in a few minutes after the accident from his injuries. The two men were found about 5:30 this morning by a negro and brought here by an early train. Zigler sustained only minor injuries. The men were enroute from Morehead City to New Bern after completing a business trip, when the accident occurred.

STATE RESUMES TESTIMONY TRIAL OF COLE TODAY

Judge Finley Rules That Letters of Elizabeth Cole to Bill Ormond Cannot Be Entered in the Records of the Trial; Says Character of Woman No An Issue of Trial

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 6.—(AP)—The letters written by Miss Elizabeth Cole to W. W. Ormond, for whose death W. B. Cole, her father, is being tried for murder will not be entered in the records of the trial, Judge Finley ruled today. The testimony of two physicians whose examination of Miss Cole satisfied them that her character was of the best also was not allowed. Judge Finley's ruling was that the character of the young woman was not an issue of the trial.

The state offered the young woman's letters for the purpose of impeaching her as a witness. She testified that she broke off her relations with Ormond of her own volition. The state contends that Miss Cole was forced by parental objections to break off with Ormond because he had no money and no position. Judge Finley said that his decision was final. On two previous occasions he had ruled against bringing in evidence as to her character and that since the letters were admitted to touch upon her character he could not let them be entered.

Rockingham, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The defense in the case of W. B. Cole, charged with the murder of W. W. Ormond, rested its case today after the introduction of two or three witnesses.

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 6.—(AP)—The defense of William B. Cole rested its case at 11:10 today and the prosecution called its remaining witnesses to rebut the contention that the wealthy cotton manufacturer did not deliberately kill William W. Ormond last August 15. Two physicians, Dr. Hubert H. Dodson and Dr. John T. J. Battle, both of Greensboro, testified to a physical examination of Miss Elizabeth Cole they conducted September 9. They were the last witnesses for the defense.

In the event the prosecution takes new position in its rebuttal testimony, the defense will be permitted to put other witnesses on the stand.

The physicians testified that from their examination of Miss Cole it was their opinion that "she is as pure as a newborn baby."

Their testimony will not be admitted unless the state takes the position that Ormonds charge of "man and wife relations" with Miss Cole are true. The state has declined to be committed.

The character of Miss Elizabeth Cole, daughter of the defendant, came to the consideration of the court after the state declared rigorously that it was not an issue in the trial of her father for murder.

Ormond's letter to Cole last February mentioned relations of "man and wife" with his daughter, and the defense charged today that the state took the position the letter was written "to right a wrong." The state served notice that the letters identified by Miss Cole as having been written to Ormond would be introduced as the impeachment of her testimony. She testified she broke off with Ormond on her own accord and not as the result of her father's objection. Cole does not know the contents of the letters the state holds.

The defense surprised the prosecution when it rested its case and after three witnesses were called, court was adjourned until two o'clock. In its examination the state concentrated on its effort to prove that Ormond was seated within the car when shot. Two of the witnesses testified to that effect.

John M. Ledbetter, who passed W. W. Ormond on the street within 20 minutes of his death, took the stand for the state in the afternoon. The witness testified that he was riding

PROBE INTO RECENT FLOGGING NEGRO HAS BEEN STARTED

Solicitor Davis Investigating Flogging Near Farmville at Request of Governor McLean and British Vice Consul

Solicitor Jesse H. Davis, of New Bern, was here today enroute to Farmville, to start an investigation into the flogging several days ago of a negro doctor in that city by a mob alleged to have been members of the Ku Klux Klan.

Following the alleged flogging reports were to the effect that Collins, the negro doctor, had become enraged at a Ku Klux Klan parade and demonstration and had taken upon himself the mission of delivering speeches attacking the Klan, branding its members as "white trash" and inciting the negroes against such organizations and persons. His tour of speeches carried him to the negro school where he preached social equality to his hearers and the principal of the school advised authorities that such would surely bring serious trouble and disaster if permitted to continue.

That night, according to the story, the negro was called from his residence, flogged and ordered to be out of the city before sunset the next day. An effort was made to interview the negro following the report of the flogging but the only information that could be obtained, as reported by the would-be interviewer, was that the negro was "eating off the mantle."

Nothing further of the affair was heard of here until today when Solicitor Davis arrived in this city enroute to Farmville, under orders from Governor McLean to investigate the alleged flogging by members of the Ku Klux Klan.

Since the time that the alleged flogging is said to have taken place it has developed that the negro is a British subject and the affair has been reported to government officials at Washington and in turn to the British government. Solicitor Davis, in addition to requests from Governor McLean to investigate the affair, has also received a telegram of protest from the British Vice Consul, at Wilmington, who urged that the solicitor make every effort to see that British subjects in his district be given every protection against unlawful violence.

Unreasonable Demand Caused Cancellation of Lloyd Film Here

Commenting upon why the "Freshman" featuring Harold Lloyd was not shown in White's Theatre yesterday as scheduled, Mr. Jack Marcus, manager of the play house, declared that on yesterday he was advised that in order to show the picture he must run it for a period of three days. In view of the fact that Mr. Marcus had already arranged a feature program for this week including Frank Silver's Banana Orchestra and 1925 Revue tonight.

Mr. Marcus declared that he desired to give his patrons the best that could be had at all times in the way of amusement and his attitude toward the occurrence that caused the temporary cancellation of The Freshman was that he would not take from his patrons the privilege of witnessing the performance of Silver's Orchestra and other attractions for the first three days of this week and show only one picture to meet the last minute demands of the film owners. Mr. Marcus declared that he had advertised the exhibition of the "Freshman" in good faith and but for what he considered the unreasonable and unfair demand made by the film owners at the last minute the film would have been shown as scheduled.

Everything Ready for the Opening in Pittsburgh Tomorrow; The Pirates to Use Same Line Up Which Won the Pennant; Harris Says the Senators Are "All Ready"

Pittsburgh, Penn., Oct. 6.—(AP)—The hopes of two championship base ball clubs have been placed in the arms of right handed pitchers. Stanley Harris, manager of the Washington Senators, has announced Walter Johnson as his choice for the opening game of the world's series at two p. m. tomorrow, while Bill McKechnie, the Pirate leader, has nominated Lee Meadows and Vic Aldridge for the two opening games. McKechnie has not decided upon the order of his pitchers appearances. All indications however, point to a clash between Johnson and Meadows on the opening day.

In case of rain, the Coast man, in line for Pittsburgh Meadows should appear, will be the first time in a series that a spectacled pitcher taken the mound.

Injuries may play a part in drama about to be unfolded. Two second base men, Manager Harris of the Senators, and Eddie Moore, of the Pirates, will be handicapped by lame fingers. The Senators face the Pirates tomorrow with the sterling reserve corps, which includes the record making Everett Scott, veteran of championship battles. "My men will be ready," said Harris as he left his men on arrival here last night. "They are confident, but they figure that any team which wins a national league pennant is just as good. In the first game will start a young fellow we have down there Walter Johnson."

"The same line up that won the pennant will play for us in the world series," McKechnie said. "They are the best we have."

The Pirates manager's statement settled the fact that Moore would go to second base and Grantham to first with Stuffy McInnis in an utility role.

Extra seats have been piled up in almost every section of the enclosure and it is expected that 45,000 can be accommodated at the games here. 500 press seats have been constructed in the open behind the catcher, plans having been made to entertain that number of newspaper representatives.

More than 20,000 have applied for the 45,000 seats. An enthusiasm pent up for 16 years is about to burst forth as the hope of Pirate rooters follow their favorites into a lion.

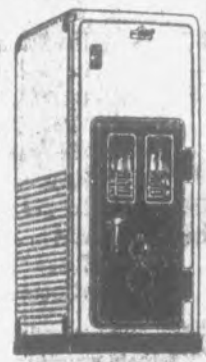

POPE WITHSTANDS A TORRID SUMMER AS DUTIES ARE TREBLED

Rome. (AP)—While most officials and professional Romans have taken a respite from the stifling heat, according to custom, Pope Pius XI not only deprived himself of a vacation,

also according to custom, but his duties as head of the Catholic Church have trebled because of Holy Year pilgrimages. When hundreds of his subordinates were enjoying the cool mountain breezes or refreshing sea bathing, the Pontiff remained at his post in the Vatican, receiving hundreds of thousands in audience. His day's program has been filled from early until late, virtually every minute being devoted to imparting blessings to members of his Church.

The Pope is one of the first of the 3,000 inhabitants of the Vatican to be astir, and the light in his study is always burning some hours after his

SEES STURDIER AND IMPROVED CRAFT IN LOSS SHENANDOAH

Washington. (AP)—Destruction of the Shenandoah will point the way immediately to several important changes in dirigible construction, in the opinion of Ralph H. Upson, former international balloon champion and now chief engineer of the Aircraft Development Corporation.

He and others of the Corporation told government officials they were prepared to build a dirigible of a new type. Mr. Upson outlined three lessons which he said should be learned from the story of the Shenandoah. The next dirigible, he said, should be covered with thin, light metal instead of fabric, should have a much greater diameter compared to its length, and should have its control car fastened more securely to the frame.

"The Shenandoah's loss of life was not large relative to the total number on board, and the fatalities would have been almost eliminated had the control car been more rigidly attached to the hull," he said.

"The fact that the airship broke in two is an equally direct result of its excessive slenderness. It used to be thought that a long pencil shape was necessary for speed, but recent studies and experiments show conclusively that air resistance can be reduced with more compact shapes. The most improved hull shape has only one-third the Shenandoah's length, compared to its diameter. Experiments also show that it is possible to make an airship completely stable."

"Improvements in stability alone would greatly reduce the requirements for safety valves, capacity, although there is no good reason for not having plenty of safety valves. Another important requirement is to allow plenty of pressure range from valve operation. The Shenandoah could stand safely a pressure of only 10 millimeters of water or about one one-thousandth of an atmosphere. Airships can now be built to stand many times that pressure."

"Perhaps the greatest disadvantage of the Shenandoah was its fabric cover—easily torn, inflammable, loose and flapping when dry, staining the framework when wet, soaking up thousands of pounds of water, and soon worn out. Before long this 'kite construction' will be a thing of the past, replaced by metal clad airships, with rigid metal covering."

"The faults of the Shenandoah are no discredit to the men who designed and built her. They took the best that was available at the time."

OKLAHOMA STARTED OIL HISTORY WITH 30 BARRELS YEARLY

Tulsa, Okla., Oct. (AP)—Where years ago the North American Indian roamed the hills of eastern Oklahoma and the broad prairie of the western section, oil wells now appear, bringing to the surface the "black gold," for which eastern Oklahoma is famous.

The first well in Oklahoma was drilled in 1884 by Michael Cuduhay of Omaha, Neb. When the well was at a depth of 1,120 feet, an oil sand was penetrated and there was a small showing, but not in paying quantity. The drillers were instructed to drill deeper but at 1,800 feet, with no further trace of oil, the well was abandoned.

The showing of oil led many prospectors to Oklahoma although as late as 1891 only 30 barrels of oil was produced. But there was considerable drilling.

Production continued to slump the next two years, only 10 barrels of oil being produced in all of Oklahoma territory in 1893, but it increased to 6,474 barrels in 1900.

A well sunk just outside of the city of Red Fork in 1901, proved to be one of the largest producers, and caused many "wildcat" wells to be put down. The big oil play started in 1904, however, when the Glen pool was uncovered.

From a small Indian trading post, Tulsa became a city of 7,000 in a year. Oil offices were brought to the city, hundreds of persons became wealthy from oil and built fine homes, stores, factories and all types of business establishments sprung up. Tulsa today is a city of 125,000 people in a state

Palmer Removed Today as President

E. Fleet Co-operation

Washington, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Leigh C. Palmer was removed today as President of the Emergency Fleet Co-operation, and Elmer Browley, of Boston, was named to succeed him.

Mr. Browley is described as a practical shipping man and previously he was employed under Mr. Palmer as assistant director of operations. The vote by which Mr. Palmer was removed was four to nothing. Those for the motion were Commissioners Benson, Haney, Plummer and Thompson. Chairman O'Connor, the only other commissioner present, would not vote.

The action was taken by the shipping board and marked another step in the tangle which this Government's agency has been enmeshed in during recent months.

Mr. Palmer's resignation has been on file since he was made head of the co-operation with wide power at the instance of President Coolidge. Today the board, which cancelled these powers several days ago, merely voted to accept the resignation. It then appointed Mr. Palmer as Vice President of the Fleet Co-operation in charge of European operations.

Dr. C. D. Grinnells Assumes Charge Work State College

Raleigh, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Dr. C. D. Grinnells, who succeeds Vernon M. Williams at the Agricultural Experiment Station at State College, in charge of research work in dairying has already reported at the College, to familiarize himself with the work being done by Professor Williams, before the latter's resignation becomes effective on October 15.

Dr. Grinnells, like his predecessor, is a graduate of the University of Minnesota. He has the degree of Bachelor of Science from that institution. Since his graduation, he has taught both in Minnesota and in South Dakota, and during the past year took work at the University of Minnesota under Professor C. H. Eckles, leading to a Master's degree in dairy science.

Professor Williams is leaving State College after a service of about two years, to return to the University of Minnesota as assistant dean of students. A substantial increase in salary and the opportunity to work with the young men of the University are given as his reasons for resigning.

Mr. Williams, who was a star football player at the University of Minnesota, has been helping coach the State College football team this season.

Officials at the College have expressed regret at his leaving, pointing out that during the short time he has been in Raleigh he has done good work and become known as a popular and efficient worker with the livestock people.

Winant Addresses Recreation Ass'n. of America Convention

Asheville, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Special section meetings followed by the general session at 11 o'clock when John G. Winant, Governor of New Hampshire, made an address, were the features of today's activities of the play ground and recreation association of America in annual convention in this city.

The subject of the section meetings which started at 9:30 o'clock included instituted methods, recreation life for girls, camping problems and other topics. The subject of Governor Winant's address was responsibility of Government in promoting community recreation.

The association held its first open session last night when Joseph Lee,

of Boston, Mass., father of the play ground movement, made the principal address of the evening. He voiced a warning to America lest it die for lack of art like the ancient Republic of Sparta. He pointed out, while this nation is not dying perhaps for the lack of art, it is a certainty that she is pretty sick.

DORTMUND CONSTRUCTING LARGEST SPORTS HALL

Dortmund.—The largest exhibition and sporting hall of Europe is being constructed at Dortmund. Its dimensions are almost double those of the Berlin Sport Palace, and even exceeds that of the Century Hall of Breslau.

The valued roof is constructed entirely of wood instead of iron, according to a new system. The hall will seat 11,000 persons, besides offering standing room for 1,500 more. Annexed to the main building is a special hall intended as a hippodrome and additional stabling accommodations for 15 horses. Another feature is to be a bicycle race course 200 metres in length, which is also to be used for motor cycle races.

The dimensions of the hall are such that it will be possible to hold simultaneous competitions in sprinting and gymnastics bicycle contests and equestrian exhibitions. Other features are tennis courts a large banqueting hall suites of offices training quarters and a restaurant.

The area of sport buildings will be further enlarged by the municipality of Dortmund and converted in to a public park including a football oval and a large swimming pool.
