### FIRST WOMAN MINISTER BANS THE SINGING OF THE STATE ANTHEM

Copenhagen.—Ever since Miss Nina Bang became the first woman Danish minister, and as such also the head of the board of education, she has done the unexpected and startling.

First the singing of the national anthem was banned, which she claimed was too war-like to benefit the public good. And when despite her prohibition, the anthem was inadvertently sung in a theatre in which she happened to be, the minister remained seated and moreover, pulled her colleagues of the cabinet back into their seats by their coat-tails.

Miss Bang plans complete reconstruction of the Danish school system according to the German method.

Lost Record of Unanimous Vote Santa Barbara, Cal.—(AP)—One of Santa Barbara county's most treasured documents—a record of its only unanimous election—was partly destroyed in the earthquake.

The transcript, which had been carefully guarded for more than 75 years, related that every qualified elector residing in the county cast his vote on April 1, 1850, and the result was 20 to 0 in favor of California entering the Union and the ratification of the state constitution.
