Divers who have been exploring the submarine S-51 deep down in the waters of the Atlantic deserve more recognition than they are likely to get. Peace tests their courage quite as severely as war tests the valor of the soldier and sailor, but day after day they quietly and indifferently play their hazardous and adventurous trade.

Members of both the navy and the army, in time of war, sometimes are subjected to greater dangers than these under-sea workers. The difference, however, is not great and is more than balanced by the fact that the perils of battle usually are faced by large groups of men, who give each other courage and support, and the fierce excitements of battle have an anesthetizing effect which is lacking for the diver in the dark and silent ocean depths.

The diver risks his life alone, and the danger that ever threatens him is the more fearful because it is so quiet. Yet men daily undertake these tasks as calmly and deliberately as an elevator man drops his car into the subbasement.






