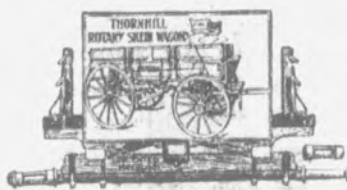

NEED GLIBE TONGUE IN CALLING ROLLS AT INDIAN SCHOOL

Lawrence, Kas., Oct.—(AP)—Infiltrations of Spanish and French, reminders of the successive waves of explorers and traders who mingled with the tribes of the Louisiana Purchase and the great southwest territory, tincture the student register at Haskell Indian Institute here.

A glib tongue, practiced in the twist of four score tribal dialects as well as those of the mellow Romance languages, is required of the professor who would call the roll of his class.

To the invasion of the Spaniards may be traced such names as Diego Gomez, Lupe Garcia and Manuel Tdujilla. They came from the reservations of Arizona and New Mexico. The French soldiers of fortune brought with them such names as Eddie Archambeau, Louis Gauthier, Madeline Jeunesse and Myrtle La Framboise, of the Grosventure, Sioux and Menominee tribes of Montana, the Dakotas and Wisconsin.

But the origin of some other names on the Haskell register is more obscure. There is a Scotch-Irish flavor to some names, Celt and the true American mingle in others while there also are frequent evidences of Hebrew

influence. The most angle tongued of the uninitiated would pause before some of the true Indian names. But the sleight of tongue experts on the Haskell Institute staff readily call for recitations from Bahe Yazza, the Navajo and Martha Kolonubekie, Cherokee maid from North Carolina. Grace and Ruby Kewaygoshik of the Ottawa tribe in Michigan; and from the Kansas Potawatomis, Lorenzo Mat-twa-osh-she Edward M-j-s-sepe, Leroy Kitchkum-m'e and Alice Wah-qubb-osh-kuck.

Most picturesque are the descriptive names given by some incident of the Indian career, or following some ancestral tradition. There are Irene Watchman and James Soldier, Angeline Whitefish and Frank Laundry, Joseph Bull Weasel, Ignatius Stiffarm who should star on the gridiron if he believes not his name, Daniel Hummingbird, Robert Doublehead and Leonard Fivekiller-and Dora Sixkiller.

Eliza Big Pond and Dora Roasting Ear are Creek and Cherokee lasses and the Cheyennes contribute the symphony Joe Antelope, Mark Bear Bow, Laura White Turtle and Blanche Redskin.

SILK TARIFF MAKES WOMEN SMUGGLERS MORE CAREFUL

(Daver, Oct.—(AP)—Women are much keener about smuggling silk into England than they were before the passage of the recent tariff. A gown which costs \$50 in Paris now carries about \$35 in English duty. The same ratio prevails for lingerie and silk stockings, which can be had at a low price in France because of the exchange situation.

Laces and perfumes were the chief articles that English women would try to smuggle in from France, but silk has now leaped to the fore.

GERMANY'S OIL PRODUCTION ONLY 0.05 PERCENT OF NEED

Nuerberg, (AP)—Germany's share in the world's production of oil is but 0.05 per cent, which barely covers five per cent of the country's requirements, said Prof. F. Schondorf before the German Society of Chemists.

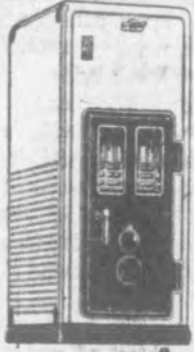
After Germany lost its oil wells in Alsace-Lorraine, with their annual yield of 70,000 tons, the wells of Wize, in Hanover, turned out to be of greatest promise. For the first time existing derricks were replaced by a regular pit having a depth of 825 feet. With a single pit these wells now turn out the same production as with 600 derricks formerly, and far surpass the Alsatian output of pre-war days.
