WASHINGTON SENATORS WIN THIRD GAME FROM THE PITTSBURG PIRATES

Bulletin: Lead—Griffith Stadium, Washington, 10.—(By The AP).—Washington in a sensational finish, won the third game of the world series from Pittsburgh today, 4 to 3, before President Coolidge and a crowd of 35,000 that shivered in a frigid gale. The victory gave the Senators a lead of two games to one.

Batteries were Ferguson, Marberry and Ruel for Washington and Kremer and Smith for Pittsburgh. Washington made ten hits and one error while Pittsburgh made eight hits and two errors.

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP).—With the temperature at 40 degrees more resembling football weather than baseball weather a capacity crowd thronged the park here today to witness the third game between the Washington Senators and the Pittsburgh Pirates in the series which is to decide the world's champions for 1925.

Just prior to the opening of the game the players formed in a semi-circle in front of the President's box as a bugler sounded taps for the late Christy Mathewson who was buried this afternoon. Attorney General Sargent was in the Coolidge party along with Frank W. Stearns, of Boston, while behind them sat Secretary Kellogg and Commissioner Landis. Secret service men and the President and Mrs. Coolidge accompanied the party. They two clubs were grouped near the presidential box and after they had been photographed by a battery of cameramen they retired to their dugouts, while umpires discussed the ground rules with the rival managers. Then police then began to clear the field of cameramen and spectators and after the batteries had been announced Umpire McCormick called the Senators to the field. The wind was sweeping over the field when Moore first batsman for the Pirates walked to the plate.

M'LEAN DECLINES PAROLE JOHNSONS

Convicted of Murder Refused
Permission to Attend Fun-
eral of Relative

Raleigh, Oct. 10.—(AP).—Governor McLean acting on recommendation of Pardon Commissioner Sisk, today declined to parole R. M. Johnson, and Perry Johnson, of Wilkes County, convicted of murder, in order to allow them to return home to attend the funeral of a relative.

In explaining his action, Mr. Sisk said that these two men who are serving sentences of from five to eight years in state's prison, were convicted in a very serious murder case occurring in Wilkes County several years ago, and that the men escaped and were brought back to this state at great expense several years after the crime. Their brother is a fugitive from justice now in connection with the same case, he stated, and three other men convicted in this same case are now serving sentences of 30 years each.

Wight Weevil With Airplane

TOBACCO MARKET AVERAGES \$29.16 FOR FRIDAY'S SALE

Sells During the Week 2,497,284 Pounds for \$690,032.22, Averaging \$27.63.

According to an official report given by Secretary K. W. Cobb, of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade, Friday was the best day since the opening of the market. The sales for the day totaled 571,830 pounds for \$166,945.14, averaging \$29.16.

During the week the market sold 2,497,284 pounds for \$690,032.22, averaging \$27.63.

For the season 15,765,276 pounds have been sold for \$3,162,124.02, averaging \$20.06.

The sales on Monday will begin at 8:30 o'clock.

NATIONAL BANK IS IN NEW QUARTERS

Remodeling and Enlarging of
Local Banking House Now
Nearing Completion

The work of remodeling and enlarging the quarters of the National Bank of Greenville is now nearing completion and already the firm is occupying most of the newly constructed portion. When completed it will be one of the most up-to-date banking houses in the state.

For the past several years the bank has occupied a portion of the ground floor of the National Bank building owned by Higgs, Hardee and Laughlinhouse but during this year officials of the bank realized that more commodious quarters were needed and the bank purchased the building from its owners and began the enlarging of its banking quarters.

With the new improvements the bank now has entrances on both Fifth Street and Dickinson Avenue as well as the corner intersection affording easy access from all directions. The equipment within includes the adding of several windows for the convenience of patrons and the separation of each department with easy access to each. A new vault has been installed and the former money vault has been converted into a safety deposit box vault. This vault contains already 300 safety deposit boxes with room for increasing that number to a thousand should they be needed and the location of the vault makes it convenient to the lobby of bank. There are also private offices for the officers of the bank. One of the great additions to the bank from the standpoint of the customers who reside outside the city is the ladies' rest room. This room is being furnished with every convenience for the wives and families of the out of the city customers and will lend much to their comfort.

The new banking quarters are up to the minute in appearance and convenience and officials of the institution are extending a cordial invitation to the public to visit the bank where the employees will take pleasure in showing you through.

Case Against W. B. Cole Was Given To The Jury During This Afternoon

After Final Arguments by Counsel and Judge
Finley's Charge, Cole's Fate Placed in Hands
of Union County Men

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 10.—(AP).—The case of the State versus W. B. Cole, wealthy cotton manufacturer, charged with murder was given to the jury at 12:40 o'clock today. After 36 hours of argument, Judge T. B. Finley read the court charges and the jury retired to decide the guilt or innocence of Cole, who killed W. W. Ormond, formerly the sweet heart of his 24 year old daughter Miss Elizabeth Cole.

The court room was packed. The doors were closed to the coldest day of the two week's trial and winter garments vied with bright color clothes of warmer days as the room settled back to await the verdict.

The defendant, nervous through the appeal of Solicitor Phillips for "even handed justice," sat with his family. To their right somewhat removed sat the Reverend A. L. Ormond, father of the dead man, and his two daughters. They were silent and undemonstrative.

Richmond County Court, Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 10.—(AP).—The case of the State against W. B. Cole, charged with the murder of W. W. Ormond was given to a jury here at 12:40 o'clock today.

"It is your duty to pass upon the real question at issue and not be misled into a consideration of any extraneous matter that would tend to cloud your mind as to the real facts in the controversy and you can only consider the evidence in this case as it tends to support a theory of the defendant as to insanity and self-defense, or as it tends to support the State's contention of murder in the first degree, murder in the second degree, or manslaughter."

"If you exercise good common sense and judgment and unprejudiced conscience in determining the truth of the matter, then you have a verdict and if your verdict is based on the truth, then you may not have any fear of any just criticism, because the more you see the truth the better it looks and in the end will also prevail."

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 10.—(AP).—The trial of W. B. Cole, wealthy cotton manufacturer, charged with the murder of W. W. Ormond, approached an end today with the last argument of the state. Solicitor Don Phillips, appealing for an "even handed justice," declared that the mothers of North Carolina are listening for the verdict. Cole, who last August 15 shot and killed W. W. Ormond, formerly his daughter's sweetheart, heard the prosecution charge that the unwritten law was painted in bold letters across the "smoke screen" of his defense.

Solicitor Phillips closed his argument at 10:20 o'clock and the court declared a brief recess while Judge Thomas B. Finley conferred with the court stenographer about his charge to the jury. The jury left the room a buzz of conversation filled the court room as the crowd awaited the formal close of the two week's trial.

Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 10.—(AP).—The three subjects in the trial of W. B. Cole about which were centered the bitterest arguments were not issues in the wealthy manufacturer's trial for murder, Judge T. B. Finley charged a Union county jury today.

The character of Miss Elizabeth Cole, the war record of W. W. Ormond, formerly her sweetheart and the man her father killed, and the financial positions of the Cole and Ormond families are extraneous matters, Judge Finley said.

One of four verdicts will be returned by the jury that today began its deliberation after one of the most sensational trials in the state. W. B. Cole may be found guilty of murder in the first degree, or murder

in the second degree of manslaughter, or he may be declared not guilty. After giving the laws, defining each, the Judge outlined a jury's proper attitude toward the two defenses offered by Cole, self defense and insanity.

"If you should find from the evidence that the defendant entered into the fight willingly and that the deceased started to get his pistol and then the defendant had reasonable ground to believe and would believe that he was about to be killed, or receive some great bodily harm at the hands of the deceased, he would at least be guilty of manslaughter."

"The defendant pleads transitory insanity. As to whether the defendant was insane at the time of the homicide is a matter of fact for you to determine. I charge you that before the defendant can be justified in killing the deceased on the grounds of insanity that he should show to the satisfaction of the jury that at the time of committing the deed he was insane and did not know right from wrong, or did not know he was doing wrong at the time of committing the deed."

"By interposing the plea of insanity of transitory, the defendant says by his plea that he did the killing but the act is not one for which he can be held responsible. The court charges you whether the defendant had a mental disease or not is one question of fact to be determined by the jury; that it is as much a question of fact as to whether he had a bodily disease, or not, if the question was raised."

"The court charges you, gentlemen of the jury, that no man has a right to kill another man in North Carolina for slandering his family. Slander is a crime and the law provides a penalty for it, but it is not the death penalty. The court further charges you that no man has a right to kill another because he has been threatened by him; a threat alone not being sufficient to justify killing, but you are to try the case under the law and evidence."

"The law is no respecter of persons. It is the something in its application to all, whether they be high or low, rich or poor, prince or pauper, white or black, Jew or Gentile, Greek or Barbarian, even in the exact justice as its meted out to all alike."

"It does not make any difference whether the defendant is a man of property or whether he is a man of limited means; neither does it make any difference whether the deceased was a man of property or not."

"There has been much discussion in this case by counsel of both sides as to the statement in a letter written by the deceased, which reflected upon the daughter of the prisoner. Also there has been much comment on a letter written by the prisoner to the deceased."

"These letters with certain other letters were permitted to be in evidence to throw what light they may throw upon the guilt or innocence of the defendant, and the court charges you that the truth or falsity of these statements is no material in this case except if it aids you to reach a proper verdict."

"The court charges you further that the chastity of the daughter of the prisoner is not an issue in this case. It is for this reason that the evidence of the doctor's proposed to be offered by the defense was excluded and likewise for the same reason that the number of letters received by the deceased from the prisoner's daughter were not permitted

OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

THE HOLY BIBLE No. 3

What then should be our attitude of mind in studying the Bible?

Some approach it with suspicion if not with skepticism. They say they cannot understand "miracles," and so do not believe in them.

Perhaps they are to be pitied rather than condemned. With wonderful inconsistency they are ready to believe in atoms, ether, and a hundred other postulates of Science, none of which they understand because none of them have ever been seen, tasted, smelt, handled, or heard.

But the days of miracles are not over. Turning water into wine is an insignificant thing compared to the transformation of a sinner into a saint; a child of Satan into a child of God. Jesus could open the eyes of the blind, or still the raging of the sea, in an instance: it took years to change Saul into Paul and Simon into St. Peter. Christ never called His acts "miracles." They were His "mighty works" — as natural to Him as our deeds are to us. He told His wondering disciples:—"Greater works than these shall ye do also." Those of us who have had some insight into the marvelous cures effected in our hospitals to-day, can well believe the promise.

We may not understand "miracles," but thank God, many of us can say, like the man born blind:—"One thing I know, that, whereas I was blind, now I see." And that personal experience is our all sufficient evidence.

Others, with superfine purism, say that the Bible is not a fit or proper book for general use, and certainly not for women and children. If certain passages were expurgated, it might be tolerated.

There are ugly things in the Bible, just as there are filthy and disgusting creatures in Nature. There are typical bad men in the Holy Scriptures, just as there are typical good men. The mystery of evil is permitted to reveal itself along with the mystery of redemption. Nor are all the good men ideal characters. They have their faults, which are, for the most part, exaggerations of their virtues; and their virtues, at the last, are won by the overcoming of their faults.

The inclusion of the dark side of human nature as well as the bright side is overwhelming testimony in favor of the Book's honesty and truthfulness, and of its Divine origin.

Some go a step farther, and say it is a dangerous book to place in the hands of the common people. Our large section of the Church even would keep the Bible away from men. That is its policy. It would rather the masses

should accept the interpretation of its priests than read it for themselves. It may be a matter of self-preservation, because, reading the Book, the people would learn the Truth, "and the Truth would set them free" from all priestly domination.

Yet again, others view the Bible with suspicion because of apparent contradictions in it. There are difficulties in the Bible, but none that are surprising when we remember the number of authors and the length of the period covered by their writings. Their unanimity on all important points makes their discrepancies insignificant. Any judge or lawyer will tell you that he doubts the veracity of witnesses who agree verbatim.

Many so-called contradictions are easily reconciled when we are possessed of all the information available. They should not discourage us, for they are of intense interest when courageously faced and understood.

Let us come, then, to the study of the Bible with open minds, not blinded by prejudice, not emasculated by doubt, not with a false purism, and not with fear; but with intelligent loyalty to the Truth as we shall discover it.

We shall find some things within the Book that are not inspired. Balaam was a false prophet, and he gave utterance to many elevated sentiments, as, for example, "Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his;" but we are not to think on that account that all Balaam said and did was the result of Divine inspiration.

Job's friends were "miserable counsellors," but they spoke much that was true and good for Job to hear.

Jeremy Taylor, in one of his most beautiful sermons—that preached at the funeral of the Countess of Carberry—took as his text the words of the Woman of Tekoah, (2 Samuel, 14:14), "For we must need die, and are as water spilt on the ground, which cannot be gathered up again; neither doth God respect any person, yet doth He devise means that His banished be not expelled from Him;" and the preacher used the words throughout his sermon as if they were the words of one speaking by the Spirit of God!

It was the Pharisees who blasphemously asked, "Who can forgive sins but God only?"

St. Paul says that even among inspired men there are things by "authority," and things which are spoken only in the way of advice. In one place (1 Cor. 7:25), he says, "Now concerning virgins, I have no commandment of the Lord, yet I give my judgment;" and at another time he said, "I speak as a fool."

From all of which we may gather that some parts of Scripture are more weighty and important than others. This fact should impress us with the necessity that reverently, fairly-mindedly, and joyfully we should seek the Truth. "Search the Scriptures, for they are they which testify of Me," said Jesus. Let us be like the Bereans who were "more noble than those in Thessalonica," for they "searched the Scriptures daily, whether these things were so." And let us rejoice in our possession of the Book, for "all Scripture, given by inspiration of God is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, instruction in righteousness; that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works."

We shall find, if we are honest, that the Bible is a safe guide for life, and that our forefathers were right when they pillowed their heads on the promises it makes for dying grace in the dying hour.

"For all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass. The grass withereth, and the flower thereof falleth away; but the Word of the Lord endureth forever. And this is the word which by the Gospel is preached unto you."

EXPERT WILL ENDEAVOR TO SAVE TREE PLANTED BY WASHINGTON

Fredericksburg, Va.—Martin Davey, famous tree surgeon and congressman from Ohio, has volunteered his personal services to help save for posterity the last of the 13 horse chestnut trees which George Washington planted here to represent the 13 original colonies.

The tree, slowly dying because of its great age and the inroads of the chestnut blight, is located on the property of John F. Scott, which was formerly a portion of the Kenmore estate, the home of Betty Washington Lewis, sister of George Washington. It has been viewed by thousands of visitors during the course of more than a century.

Congressman Davey has made a preliminary examination of the tree and stated that he would gladly undertake the work of ministering to its ills at his own expense. The cost

of restoring the tree is estimated at about \$400.

IMPOVERISHED KOREAN PEERS NOW EMPLOYED AS CART PULLERS

Seoul, Korea.—The Korean nobility, with the exception of a few privileged peers is reported to be suffering from extreme poverty. Several of the nobles, who were once wealthy, are now working as cart pullers and performing other menial tasks as the only means of escaping starvation.

At the time of the annexation of Korea by Japan, about 60 of the leading nobles were created peers and given property by the Japanese government. Most of them ran through this property rapidly. Recently 30 of the impoverished Korean nobles sent a petition to the Japanese government asking for financial assistance.

Harris also took a power boat built in sections, and when he left the railroad, he planned to put the boat together, transfer the automobile engine to the boat, and proceed under that power as far as possible.

Harris said he would have no trouble running the automobile over the hard packed snow as he made his rounds in trading with the Eskimos.

Paul Plants the Church in Corinth. Acts 18:1-11.

After these things Paul departed from Athens, and came to Corinth; And found a certain Jew named Aquila, born in Pontus, lately come from Italy, with his wife Priscilla; (because that Claudius had commanded all Jews to depart from Rome); and came unto them.

And because he was of the same craft, he abode with them, and wrought: for by their occupation they were tentmakers.

And he reasoned in the synagogue every sabbath, and persuaded the Jews and the Greeks.

And when Silas and Timotheus were come from Macedonia, Paul was pressed in the spirit, and testified to the Jews that Jesus was Christ.

And when they opposed themselves and blasphemed, he shook his raiment, and said unto them. Your blood be upon your own heads; I am clean; from henceforth I will go unto the Gentiles.

And he departed thence, and entered into a certain man's house named Justus, one that worshipped God, whose house joined hard to the synagogue.

And Crispus, the chief ruler of the synagogue, believed on the Lord with all his house; and many of the Corinthians hearing believed, and were baptized.

Then spake the Lord to Paul in the night by a vision, Be not afraid, but speak, and hold not thy peace. For I am with thee, and no man shall set on thee to hurt thee: for I have much people in this city.

And he continued there a year and six months, teaching the world of God among them.

The Lesson Connection.

After the famous sermon on Mars Hill, Paul continued for some time in Athens, preaching and teaching. Opposition seems to have arisen and the apostle turned to Corinth where a more fruitful field for his labor awaited him. In it, there was an opportunity such as Athens did not afford. It was a center for commerce. It was in touch with the whole civilized world. Athens was a staid university city in which the fires of evangelism would kindle slowly. 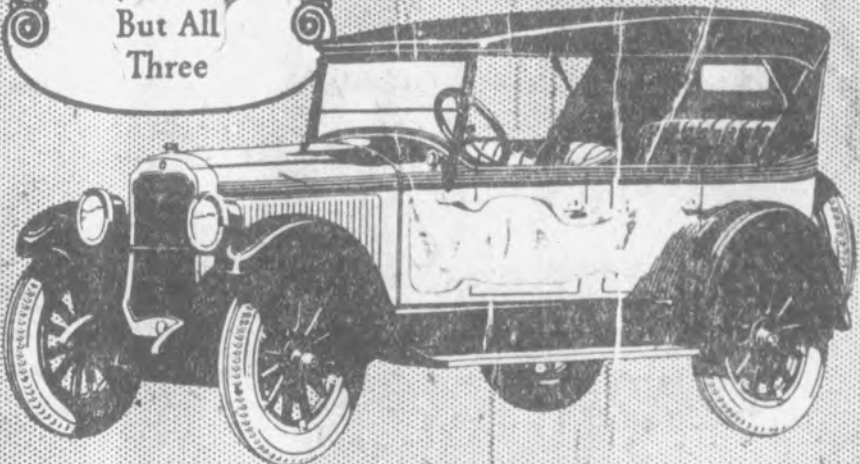

Funds for the project are being furnished by subscriptions from school children of the South and Longfellow-Evangeline associations everywhere.

CROSS ROADS OF NATION
LOCATED AT INDIANA-
POLIS STREET CORNER

Indianapolis, Ind.—A downtown street intersection—Washington and Meridian streets—is to be designated "the cross-roads of the nation."

Two important national highways, the National Old Trail road, running from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and the Dixie Highway, beginning at Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., and terminating in Miami, Florida, intersect at this Indianapolis corner.
