THE PITTSBURG PIRATES WIN FIFTH GAME FROM WASHINGTON SENATORS

Pittsburgh 6 runs, 13 hits, 0 E.
Washington 3 runs, 8 hits, 1 E.

Griffith Stadium Washington, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Pirates stayed in the fight for the world's championship today by knocking Stanley Coveleski from the box and winning the fifth game of the series from Washington, 6 to 3.

The series now stands three games to two in favor of the Senators and the scene shifts to Pittsburgh tomorrow for the sixth game.

First Inning.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR JAMES B. DUKE BE HELD TUESDAY

Tobacco Manufacturer and Philanthropist Died Saturday Evening in New York; Interment to Take Place in the Family Mausoleum in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham

Durham, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A special train today was bearing the corpse of James B. Duke, tobacco manufacturer and philanthropist, out of the east for burial here where he was born 68 years ago. He died in New York Saturday night.

The body is expected to arrive here early Tuesday morning and funeral services will be held at 11 in the Memorial Methodist Church with Dr. Edward D. Sopher, Dean of the school of Religious education of Duke University officiating. Private services will be conducted this afternoon at the Duke residence in New York.

Interment will be at the family mausoleum in Maplewood cemetery beside the body of his father, Washington Duke.

Tomorrow during the time Duke University's greatest benefactor lies in the local church and while the funeral is being conducted, all work will cease and the student body will join in paying tribute to his memories. A request also has been made public by Arthur B. Carrington, President of the Tobacco Association of the United States requesting every tobacco market now running in the southern states to cease operations for ten minutes tomorrow at 10:30 o'clock out of respect to the late tobacco magnate.

Later in the week the entire student body of Duke University will gather at the memorial service in honor of the institution's benefactor.

Each evening there will be an elaborate fireworks display never equaled by a fair in this state.

University of N. C. Celebrates Semi-Centennial Today

Chapel Hill, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The University of North Carolina today is celebrating the semi-centennial of the re-opening of the University following the war between the states. While the celebration will last only one day, the University is the mecca for a notable gathering of educational leaders from all sections of the country. The story of the University re-birth was told today by President H. W. Chase, who presided over the exercises in Memorial Hall this morning. Approximately 100 educational leaders representing all sections of the country were present to participate in the semi-centennial of the institution's re-opening, over 60 of these being college and university presidents. Among those who delivered addresses this morning were Governor McLean and Dr. Peter P. Claxton, former United States Commissioner of education. Governor McLean lauded the university on the progress which it had made and Dr. Claxton discussed educational progress in the south during the last 50 years.

Leon Trotsky Forced To Take a Rest

Moscow, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Leon Trotsky, who has been working at high pressure ever since he was appointed head of the General Consulate committee of the Soviet Government on May 29, last, has been obliged on the advice of physicians to take a rest.

W. B. COLE FOUND NOT GUILTY SUNDAY MORNING BY JURY FROM UNION CO.

Defendant Sent Back to Jail Pending Hearing As to His Sanity Which Will Be Held Tuesday Morning at Judge Finley's Home in Wilkesboro

Richmond County Court House, Rockingham, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Accquitted of the charge of murder and held in jail was the experience today of W. B. Cole, wealthy manufacturer, who tomorrow must show just why he should not be committed to the state hospital for the insane.

A jury returned its verdict yesterday after deliberating 21 1-2 hours. Cole was charged with murdering William Walter Ormond, formerly the sweetheart of his 24 year old daughter, Elizabeth.

A state law is responsible for Cole's predicament. In his defense for killing Ormond, the manufacturer pleaded self defense and transitory insanity. Under the law a person's acquittal on a capital case on a plea

of insanity must show cause why he should not be committed to the state hospital. Judge Thomas B. Finley cited Cole to appear at Wilkesboro tomorrow for the insanity hearing. He will be taken from the jail by Sheriff Baldwin and at Charlotte will be joined by Arthur L. Brooks, of the defense council.

At the trial Cole testified that he was sane. Attorneys for the prosecution declared in their final arguments to the jury that he is sane and excerpts from their admissions will be quoted at the hearing in the effort to obtain his freedom. Solicitor Frank D. Phillips, who prosecuted the case, will represent the state at Wilkesboro where Judge Finley this week his holding court.

14 DROWNED WHEN BODY OF CHARLES PLEASURE LAUNCH AMES FOUND AFTER CAPASIZED SUNDAY TEN DAYS SEARCH

Among Victims of Fatal Excursion Were Kansas People Who Were Visiting Florida Inspecting Farm Property

Melbourne, Florida, Oct. 12.—(AP)—While fishermen and others were searching today for three missing bodies of 14 drowned persons here yesterday when the Clara A. a forty foot pleasure launch capsized, the bodies of eleven others which had been removed, were being prepared for burial and shipment to their homes. Most of those who lost their lives were Kansas people here on a trip to inspect Florida farm property of the Melbourne Farm Company, whose guests they were on the fatal excursion. The trip yesterday was a part of the company's program of entertainment for their guests.

It was the intention of Captain Edward Arnold, master of the little craft, to take them for a ride on the Atlantic ocean, but after negotiating Sebastian inlet, 18 miles south of here, he decided the sea outside was too rough for his craft, so he attempted to turn back.

Survivors said the boat did not respond to the helm quickly enough and a wave swept over her deck when she was about one fourth around, sweeping several from the deck. She had not recovered from this shock when a second wave hit her, swamping the boat.

Several of the survivors were injured as a result of being washed against the rocks at the mouth of the inlet, but only one was seriously hurt. Most of them suffered however, from exposure. High seas hampered the rescue.

Says \$683,000 Worth of Stolen Jewelry Will Be Returned

All sales on the local tobacco market will stop at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning, for ten minutes out of respect to Mr. James B. Duke, tobacco magnate, who died Saturday evening in New York.

In the Star Warehouse a prayer will be offered by the Rev. W. S. Harden, of the Presbyterian Church; at Joyner's, Rev. W. P. Watkins will offer prayer while at McGowan and Cannon's, prayer services will be in charge of Rev. Leland O'Brian.

CHARGES ARMY AND NAVY SQUANDERING MILLIONS DOLLARS

Madden Says Millions Were Spent in a "Purposeless, Meaningless, Endless Experimental Orgy"

Washington, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Army and Navy were charged today by Chairman Madden, of the House Appropriation Commission, with squandering millions of dollars "in a purposeless, meaningless, endless experimental orgy" in technical aircraft developments.

Testifying before the President's air board which resumed hearing after a recess of several days, Mr. Madden declared technical developments of aviation could not longer be "safely left" to the two military services if the United States was to take its place "among the countries of the world in the air."

If credit is to be given witnesses "who have preceded me" he asserted, the experimental and development work conducted by the army and navy since the war "has been productive of very little, if any, advance toward a plan which might be accepted by Congress."

3. Sermon by Rev. W. H. Horton, D. D., pastor of the First Baptist church of New Bern, N. C.

4. Recess and basket dinner on the grounds. Everyone expected to bring a well-filled basket, and spread it on the table prepared for the purpose.

2:30 p. m. The congregation will re-assemble at the call of the bugle and a few well chosen songs will be sung.

Agreement Practically Reached on Germany's Entrance Into League

Locarno, Switz., Oct. 12.—(AP)—An agreement was practically reached today on the condition of Germany's entrance into the league of Nations, and the delegates to the Security Conference here hopefully predict the success of the conference.

The allies have produced a solution of the German League membership question which Chancellor Luther and Finance Minister Stresemann believe will satisfy German public opinion, and at the same time safeguard the friendly relations of the Reich with Russia.

One big issue remains unsettled—France's guarantee for Poland, and this was discussed privately and progress was made today by France, Germany, and Polish diplomats prior to the plenary session of the conference.

APPROACHING QUAKE MAY BE INDICATED BY JAP INVENTION

Toyko.—(AP)—The reported invention of an apparatus which will indicate an approaching earthquake is attracting the interest of Japanese scientists. The inventor is Dr. Jun Shida, a professor of the Kyoto Imperial University. The apparatus is intended to transform the initial earth tremor into a sound.

The new contrivance consists mainly of a pendulum, an electric coil and an amplifier. The pendulum is so delicately poised that it is susceptible to the slightest horizontal or vertical motion. When it is set in motion, electricity is instantly generated in the coil which affects an apparatus similar to the receiver on a telephone. This sound is amplified and issues through a sort of a loud speaker. The volume of sound is in proportion to the magnitude of the vibration. During the tests even such slight vibrations as those caused by tapping on the table or walking across the room caused the apparatus to function.

Professor Shida made the discoveries which led to the invention while constructing a seismograph delicate enough to register the slightest possible vibration and record it 20,000 times larger than its actual strength. This seismograph provides records of minute disturbances, but an expert would have to watch it constantly to tell instantly when a major shock is on its way.

In the instance of the earthquake in Tajima, Hyogo prefecture, more than 12,000 minute vibrations were recorded by this machine. On such an occasion the addition of the new sound seismograph to the equipment of a laboratory would have been particularly convenient because the vibrations could have been heard without the experts being forced to strain their eyes to see the minute deviations in the ink line.

"The sound may be transmitted by wire or wireless telegraphy," Dr. Shida explained. "If such an arrangement is made, the experts in his laboratory would be informed of earthquakes in other parts of the country instantly. This might lead him to discovering a means of forecasting earthquakes for any one place. If, for instance, a destructive earthquake should take place at Wabayama, the information would travel the 50 kilometers to Osaka by radio and be recorded four seconds earlier than

the arrival of the minor vibration in Osaka. The major shock would not arrive at Osaka until seven seconds after the alarm had been given by my new invention."

DESIRE FOR HOT COFFEE IN BED MADE HIM INVENT

Stockholm.—Difficulty in awakening and his fondness for a cup of hot coffee in bed, were two factors that led Dr. Gustaf Dalen, winner of the 1912 Nobel prize, to become a successful inventor.

Dr. Dalen as a boy, living in a humble country home, was required to arise early, but he found it hard to awaken on time. A discarded old wall-clock was repaired to which was added an alarm mechanism with a piece of tinsplate taking the place of the bell. He combined the clock-work with a little friction wheel covered emery paper that began to rotate 15 minutes before the alarm went off. Friction against the rough surface of the paper lit a match.

The match was attached to a rod that swung over a gasoline lamp, the cap of which was simultaneously removed by another contrivance constructed from a couple of empty spoons and a piece of string. Over the lamp he had placed a coffee urn containing coffee prepared the night before. When the slumbers of the little inventor, then 14 years of age, were interrupted by the alarm going off the room was lighted and his coffee was boiling.

I was during Dr. Dalen's experiments with gas accumulators for beacon lights that he lost his sight through an explosion. His inventive genius, however, did not seem to suffer as he has since then given the world a number of new inventions and still continues to direct the work of his plant in spite of his blindness.

TELL COUNCIL DENSITY OF TRAFFIC EXCEEDS NEW YORK

Detroit.—The city plan and rapid transit commissions told the Common Council that the density of traffic in Detroit now "far exceeds" that of New York in New York's most noted and conspicuous spots.

Throwing generalities out the window and sticking to specific cases the commission reported that: Surface traffic at Grand River avenue and West Grand Boulevard is in excess of what was the last count made at Fifth avenue and 42nd St., New York.

Traffic at Jefferson avenue and St. Antoine street exceeds the traffic at the same New York intersection by 18 percent, and Jefferson avenue at East Grand boulevard is 33 1-3 percent more congested.

The 15 heaviest traffic streets in Detroit carry at their center four percent more than the 15 heaviest traffic streets of New York.

The 15 most important routes reaching the boulevard handle 18 percent more traffic than the 15 New York streets to which reference has been made.

The commission recommended a super-highway 120 feet wide to handle cross-town traffic, this amending the original plans, approved in 1917, of an 8-foot cross-town artery; and the widening of a portion of Second avenue and Hastings street to accommodate northbound traffic around the downtown section.

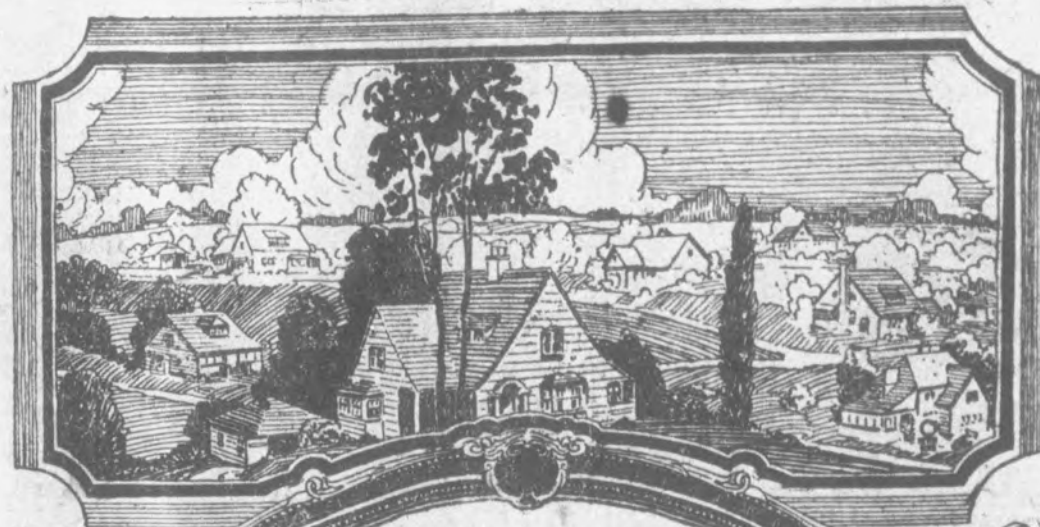

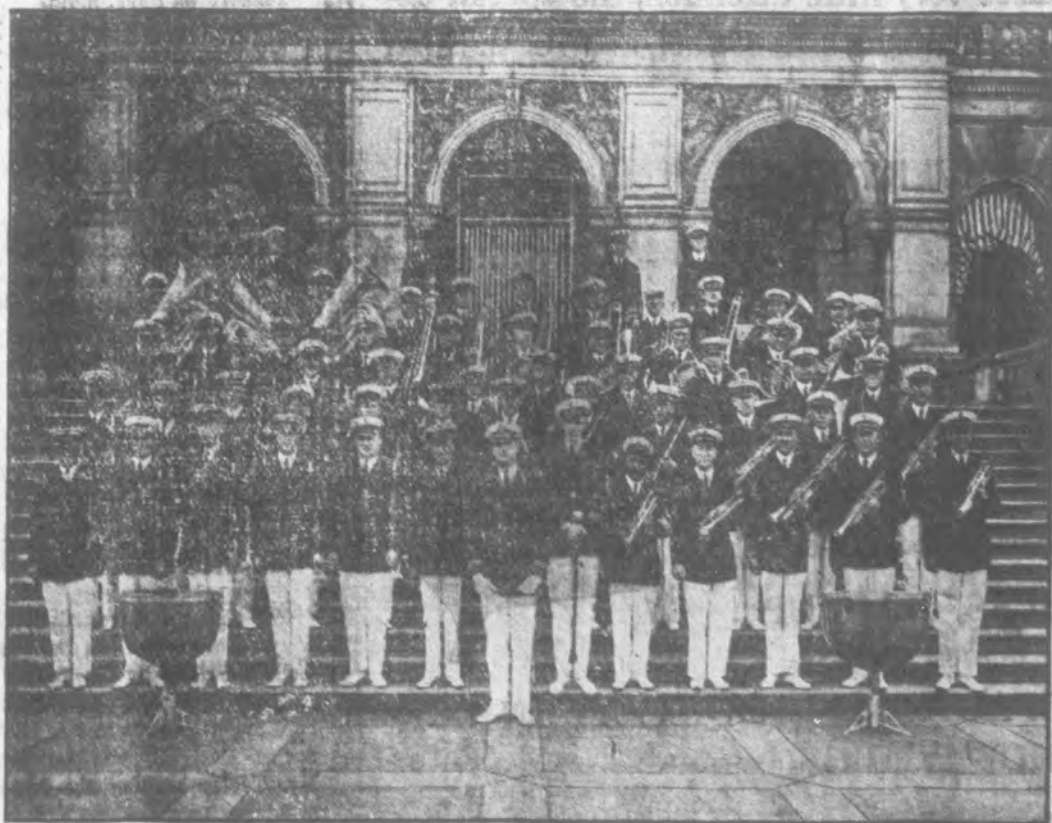

Pres. Robert H. Wright Gives Series Lectures At Teachers College

Mr. Robert H. Wright, President of East Carolina Teachers College, gave a series of lectures during the past week on the church attendance, the religious life of the state and the religious life of the students here in college.

He urged upon the girls to attend church and Sunday school at some church every Sunday. Four Mile Foot Race Be Held State Fair Wednesday

Raleigh, Oct. 12.—(AP)—An added attraction to the North Carolina State Fair has just been announced by Manager E. V. Walborn, to consist of a four mile foot race to be held Wednesday afternoon, October 14, and open to any resident of North Carolina over 19 years of age and of amateur standing.

No professional runner will be allowed to compete, it is announced. The race will be held on the State Fair track at 3:30 o'clock.

This event is sponsored and will be held under the direction of B. A. Horne, manager of the State College track team. Since members of the various college track teams may not accept money and retain their amateur standing, Manager Walborn has announced that prizes amounting to \$10 or its equipment will be awarded.

"Any college athlete may compete in this contest," says Mr. Horne. "We will also welcome any amateur runner not in a college provided in every case that the contestant is over 18 years of age and is a resident of North Carolina. Last year there were about 15 entries in a similar contest and the race was one of the feature events of the fair. This year we hope to have a still larger number of entries. The event this year is linked up with the program of the Students' Agricultural Fair to be held in the State Fair grounds."

General Manager Walborn states that suitable rules will be adopted and judges selected, and that all who enter may expect a fair race. Both college and civilian runners are invited to take part, and those who cannot accept money will be given the equivalent in some other prize, he says.

Paris, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Rioting broke out today at St. Denis, a suburb of Paris, as a result of a general strike called by the Communist. About 30 shots were fired and three policemen were wounded.

Bishop Brown did not answer when his name was called and sentence was pronounced by the Right Reverend Ethelbert Tolbot, presiding Bishop in his absence.

Buddist School for Women.

Tokyo. — Officials of the Sojiji, head temple of the Sodo sect of Buddhism, have decided to establish a Buddhist women's university in Tokyo at a cost of 1,500,000 yen. Work will be started early next year, and completed within two years.

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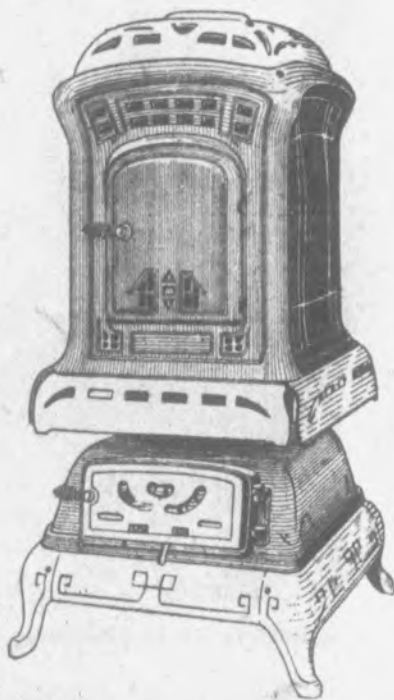


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
