CROSSROADS ARE REACHED BY AUTO CONTESTANTS

Mrs. F. J. Diener High for Yesterday While Miss Irene King of Winterville Takes Second

All contestants in The Daily Reflector's subscription campaign are now at the crossroads in the race for seven valuable prizes and several commissions checks that will be awarded on Thursday night, October 29th. They have arrived at that part of their campaign where the going is not so good. Up till within a few days ago they had smooth sailing. One Hundred Men Have Tried Out for Davidson Glee Club

Davidson, Oct. 14.—(AP)—One hundred men, 40 upper classmen and 60 freshmen, including 19 of last year, have tried out for the Davidson College Glee Club.

Mrs. R. H. Daugherty, assisted by D. G. Wilson president of the club, Frank Hudson, and T. C. Barr took charge of the try out. From the 100 aspirants for places in the club, 46 were retained as likely material, and this number is to be reduced to 40, the quota of members set for the coming season.

Scout Rally Held At Fair Grounds A Great Success

Eager smoke-filled eyes watched the progress of the contestants in the fire-building race of the Scout meet held at the Fair yesterday afternoon, for this was the final event of the meet and on its outcome depended the awarding of first honors. After much coaxing and with the persuasion of human bellows the flames of the fire built by the team from Troop 3 of Greenville burned thru the tapes above it. The team of Troop 1 of Ayden ran a close second in contest and throughout the meet.

Winners of the various contests were as follows: Signalling, Troop 3 Greenville; First Aid, Troop One Ayden; Knot-tying, Troop 3, Greenville; Antelope Race, Troop 1, Ayden, and Fire building Troop 3, Greenville.

This was the first Scout Rally ever held in this section of the state and now that both spectators and Scouts have had a taste of an inter-troop meet it is safe to say that future rallies will be even more closely contested.

SCOUTING MAKING RAPID PROGRESS IN EASTERN CAROLINA

Executive Board Pamptico Council, Boy Scouts of America, Hold Interesting Meeting in Local High School

Reports of the various committees of the Pamptico Council, Boy Scouts of America, made at a meeting of the executive board of that body last night show that Scouting in eastern North Carolina is progressing rapidly. J. E. Winslow of Greenville, who is president of the Pamptico council presided over the board meeting which was held in the Greenville High School.

The Pamptico Council was organized in December of last year to introduce and give supervision to the Scout program in Beaufort, Martin and Pitt counties. On Jan. 1st, of this year the council showed an enrollment of 55 Scouts. It was decided at that time to set an enrollment of 250 Scouts as the goal for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1925. This number was reached however, in August and still the numbers have increased until now the council shows an enrollment of 325 Scouts which is thirty per cent more than the objective for the entire year. These Scouts are of the following rank: Tenderfoot 244, Second Class 47, First Class 6, Merit Badge 3, Star 4, and Eagle 1.

Troops are now established in Ayden, Grifton, Farmville, Fountain, Bethel and Greenville in Pitt county, in Washington, Pantego, and Belhaven in Beaufort county, and in Williamston in Martin county. Present plans call for establishing troops in Winterville, Grimesland, Bath, Aurora, Jamesville, Everetts, and Robertsonville before the end of the present year.

At present Greenville has three Scout troops and Washington two. Three additional troops are in process of organization in Washington. Scoutmasters for these having just completed their course of training for this work.

Announcement was made that a training course for Scout leaders similar to the one conducted at Washington will start in Greenville on Oct. 26 and it is the hope of local friends of Scouting that at least one new troop will be a result of this training course.

The report of the finance committee showed that the finance campaign for the present year has never been completed and it was decided that the local committees would within the next few days complete the soliciting to secure funds to offset the present indebtedness of the council and to insure the permanency of the Pamptico Council.

Work Begin on '26 Quips and Cranks

Davidson, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Work has already begun on the 1926 "Quips and Cranks," the Davidson College annual, it has been announced by H. L. Shaw, editor-in-chief. Mr. Shaw declares that the annual covering the present school year will surpass any every put out at Davidson.

While the book will be the same size as formerly, it is hoped to make it superior in material, and there will be a radical change in the cover, Mr. Shaw says.

483,266 Bales of Lint Consumed During September

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Cotton consumed during September totaled 483,266 bales of lint and 70,068 bales of lint, compared with 448,665 of lint and 63,583 of lint in August this year, and 438,373 of lint and 50,781 of lint in September last year, the census bureau today announced.

FINAL GAME OF WORLD'S SERIES POSTPONED TODAY BECAUSE OF HEAVY RAIN

The seventh and final game of the World's Series scheduled to be played in Pittsburgh this afternoon between the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Washington Senators was postponed until tomorrow on account of rain and the wet condition of the field. Hope for the final game today was abandoned after the game had been delayed for more than thirty minutes while efforts were made to get the grounds into shape for play. Announcement of the postponement was made after a conference between Commissioner Landis and officials of the opposing clubs.

CONVICT GUARD IS KNOCKED IN HEAD UNKNOWN PARTY

Mr. Sam Johnston Looking for Escaped Prisoners at the Fair Grounds Attacked From Behind, In Hospital in Critical Condition

Mr. Sam Johnston, one of the guards over the Pitt County chain gang is in the Pitt Community Hospital in a critical condition as the result of a blow which he received on his head last night and which was inflicted by unknown parties.

During yesterday two prisoners escaped from the chain gang, and Mr. Johnston thinking that perhaps they would visit the fair grounds last night, went out for the purpose of watching. He was stationed near the entrance so as to see all who went in and out of the gates, when, suddenly some one approached from behind and hit him with a heavy club or stick.

Mr. Johnston was found a short while later and rushed to the hospital. At noon today he was still in an unconscious condition.

Election of Primate Principal Business Before House Bishops

New Orleans, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Election of a primate, the first in the history of the church, was the principal business today before the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church in the United States, beginning the eighth day of sessions of the 48th triennial general conference of the Church.

With eight Bishops nominated for the office, which will be for an elective term of six years, balloting was expected to be centered upon these nominees although voting is not confined to those nominated. With a majority vote of 67 requested for election, the possibility of a deadlock for the House of Bishops, which might delay the election of the Primate, occupied the attention of the delegates to the conference. Veteran Prelate freely predicted that not less than 30 ballots would be cast before the election was completed.

A memorial presented to the general conference yesterday and introduction for consideration in the House of Deputies proposed elimination of the right of re-marriage granted by the church to divorced persons even of the innocent party. The memorial, which was presented by the Reverend Caleb R. Stetson, Rector of Trinity Church, this city, advised several reasons why such action should be made effective. Devoting the first 6 reasons to scriptural grounds, the seventh reason is based upon the United States annual report which Dr. Stetson said shows this country to lead all countries in divorces.

MRS. J. N. HODGES DIED YESTERDAY

Funeral Services Conducted This Afternoon at 3 O'clock By Rev. R. F. Pittman, of Ayden

Mrs. J. N. Hodges, 73, died yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock from heart trouble at her home on Evans street after an illness of only two hours. Funeral services were conducted from the home this afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Rev. R. F. Pittman, of Ayden. Interment followed in the McLawhorn burying ground near Red Banks.

Mrs. Hodges has been suffering for several months from heart trouble but was apparently enjoying good health until about 1 o'clock yesterday. She prepared her dinner and was taking her usual afternoon rest when she suffered the attack from which she died a short while later. Mrs. Hodges was beloved by a host of friends. She was a member of the Free Will Baptist church and attended its services when health permitted. The deceased is survived by her husband, nine sons, Jesse W. Hodges, Washington, D. C.; O. C. Hodges, Asheville; R. C. Hodges, Baltimore, Md.; Matthew Hodges, Beaufort county; Joe J. Hodges, Washington; Fate, J. A. Geo. R. Hodges, Greenville; Oscar H. Hodges, Farmville; four daughters, Mrs. H. A. Campbell, of Grimesland; Mrs. A. D. Boyd, and Mrs. Frank Taylor, of this city and Mrs. Carrie Harris, Farmville. The sons will act as pall bearers.

FAIR PROGRAM IS HELD UP BECAUSE OF BAD WEATHER

Record Crowds in Attendance Opening Day; Fair to Continue Throughout the Week

Owing to bad weather conditions today officials of the Pitt County Fair found it necessary to postpone the entire program one day, making the Fair come to an end Saturday instead of Friday as scheduled. While this postponement includes the races and free acts, the midway attractions and exhibit halls will remain open this afternoon and tonight as usual and a good time is assured for all those who attend. Neither does the postponement affect the Ku Klux Klan parade demonstration which will be staged Friday night as already advertised.

One of the largest afternoon and evening crowds ever attending the Pitt County Fair were present yesterday and everyone was pleased with this year's Fair. The free attractions, including the funniest Ford in the world, were all that could be asked while the fireworks display, the midway and exhibits were larger and better than ever before seen here. McDonald's Band and the other free acts also shared in the honors for high class entertainment. As a whole the Fair this year is the best ever staged here and no doubt the best County Fair ever staged in the state.

Crop and Weather Conditions Were Summarized Today

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Crop and weather conditions in the southern states for the week ended yesterday were summarized by the Department of Agriculture today. There was considerable rain fall in the central, northern and north western portion of the cotton belt from Tennessee and northern Mississippi westward and picking was interrupted in that area.

Dublin.—The cost of living figure in the Free State is officially reported as 88 per cent higher than in 1914. The figure for Great Britain and Northern Ireland is 73 per cent higher.

London.—Sucking sugar-sticks or candy is again popular with members of the Stock Exchange now that business is becoming somewhat slack. During the war this 40-year-old custom lapsed because of the difficulty of getting sugar.

DECLARES BROOKS APPEARED INSANE BEFORE SHOOTING AIR BOARD TODAY

Mrs. Charles E. Brooks Says Defendant Acted Strangely Six Weeks Before Killing Bryson

Hendersonville, N. C., Oct. 14.—(AP)—Cross examination of the prosecution this morning failed to break down the testimony of Mrs. Charles E. Brooks, wife of the brother of Bonnie L. Brooks that the defendant on trial for the murder of Sam Y. Bryson, former Mayor had acted strangely while living at her home shortly after the estrangement arose between him and his wife.

Mrs. Brooks had declared that the defendant would go days without eating more than an egg and could not sleep at night. She stated that for six weeks before the shooting the defendant appeared to her to be insane and apparently had no idea of the crime he had committed until he had been placed in jail.

This testimony appeared to be offered by the defense in substantiation of the theory that the defendant was insane and did not know what he was doing. Mrs. C. E. Brooks also testified that she had never heard the defendant say he was going to kill Bryson.

Edward C. Lyda, who was standing near the railroad station when the killing took place, also was put on the stand this morning by the defense and also C. E. Brooks, brother of the defendant. Lyda claimed to have seen the shooting, but on cross examination by the state it was brought out that he did not see the pistols in the hands of the men in the battle and did not know who they were until after the event.

Charles E. Brooks testified that the defendant is around 40 years of age and had been married for sixteen years. The defendant he said, also had two children and apparently a happy home up to the time of the circumstances which led to the shooting.

Indications pointed today that the defense witness will be placed on the stand throughout the afternoon session of court and it is unlikely that arguments in the case will be reached before late tomorrow.

Plans for Cooperative Payment Doctors' Bills Attempted in Greece

Wilson, Oct. 14.—(AP)—A plan for co-operative payment of doctors' bills which has been developed in a North Carolina town is now being attempted in refugee districts of Greece, with the approval of the Greek government, it has been learned here.

In the mills at Roanoke Rapids, the plan in vogue is a contribution by each person top ya the doctor. Then all bills are automatically paid from the fund so collected, and the doctor saves himself time and work by keeping the community well. Roanoke Rapids is said to have made a remarkable record in health statistics by this method, and now the same plan is being transplanted to Greek soil for testing.

Do-Right Chorus Stokes Christ Church Visits Farmville

Farmville, Oct. 14.—The Do-Right Chorus of Stokes Christian Church was guest of the Farmville Christian Endeavor on Sunday, October 11, at the evening hour. The program of the local society was that of a recreation period of stunts and games, followed with refreshments. Hot chocolate and sandwiches were served.

The regular C. E. program was led by Emily Tyre of Farmville, on the theme, they "First gave themselves." Professor Mattox, of Atlantic Christian College, and minister of Stokes Church, could not be present on this occasion.

Stokes Do-Right-Chorus was organized by D. C. Gordon of Farmville, while in a meeting with Stokes Church, last July. Miss Ruth Pittman of Dendron, Va. served as pianist during that meeting. Miss Pittman accompanied the Chorus here last Sunday evening.

W. S. SIMS TESTIFIES BEFORE PRESIDENT'S AIR BOARD TODAY

Declares Naval Air Development is Hampered by a "Kind of Conservatism Which is Almost Unbelievable"

Washington, Oct. 14.—(AP)—Rear Admiral William S. Sims, retired United States Navy, told the President's Air Board today that "It is well known" that the navy has no definite air policy and "that naval air development is hampered by a kind of conservatism so extraordinary it is almost unbelievable."

The Admiral believed that to attempt to manage "an affair like the Shenandoah" trip from the Navy Department was an example of violation of "the age old principal that is destroying the navy's moral," and was unreasonable, unscientific, and unilitary.

"Why is it allowed to continue?" He asked, and added "It is because the American people do not feel the pressure of war."

Present dissatisfaction and unrest in the navy, he said, is due "to a lack of confidence" in naval leaders and he pointed to the Shenandoah disaster as "a case in point."

"It may be premeditated," he added, "that the commander of the Shenandoah and his assistants were the best men the Navy had, but if they were not it would have been a criminal act to put them there."

Without a fear of war, he added, there is lack of intelligent public interest which enables "national and service politics to determine appointment to the highest naval positions." "For example," he said, "I refer to Josephus Daniels, Secretary of the Navy in the Wilson cabinet and his advisors, uneducated men. The Daniels cabinet and its friends are still in the saddle."

"This group of men because they have the authority had to exercise control of a mass of details which is one of the big troubles with the Navy."

"The Navy has been controlled for many years by uneducated men and untrained officers who have been appointed to the most important positions."

"This is at the root of our present troubles and the present low moral is due to lack of confidence in leaders."

"This lack of trained leaders explains why the Navy Department is administering the Navy in violation of Military principals—particularly in violation of the fundamental principles of command."

Naval Air Service matters again engaged the attention of the President's air board after hearing the views of ranking officers of the army and its general staff on proposed changes in the nation's air defense. Lieutenant Commander Edward Byrd, Jr., who commanded the naval section of the McMillan Arctic Expedition, was one of the naval officers ready to appear before the board today.

Appearing at the first night session to speed up completion of the hearings, Major General Henson E. Ely, commandant of the Army War College, told the board last night that what the Army Air Service needs is not a separate air corps, which he opposed, but a quality of leadership that will make for "loyalty and discipline" among subordinate personnel.

Major General Charles P. Summerell, commandant of the Second Corps Area at New York, and Senior Officer of the Army told the board he was "an ardent admirer of aviation," but "that it can't fight a war alone."

Brigadier General Frank Parker, of the Second Corps Area, also held the view of the general staff in opposition to the separate air Corps proposal.

Ballot Will Be Taken Tomorrow on the Unification Proposal

Statesville, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The Western North Carolina conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South today voted to take a ballot tomorrow on the unification proposal of the Southern Church with the northern body. The hour for the vote was set at 11:00 o'clock.

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BENEFITS WIDESPREAD

Against professional sports and even against amateur sports as exemplified in college games, it is urged sometimes that the benefits are confined to too narrow a class, that the players are the only ones who get the exercise which justifies indulgence in such activities. This position is hardly tenable. While the players occupy the center of the stage when the games are in progress, in some instances the efforts made by spectators to be present involve more personal exertion than is expended by those taking part in the sports. The long vigil kept by no small number of persons of both sexes in order to secure tickets for the World's Series is indicative of what a non-player may be called on to endure in baseball.

In the matter of college football certainly there is no want of activity on the part of the student body not members of the squad. With the "pep" meetings and parades in advance of the games and the jubilation of the victors after a game, it cannot be sustained that whatever of benefit exercise affords is withheld from the non-players. Observations of college sports would seem to bear out the statement that those not on the team get rather more of it than those who play. The latter are rather carefully guarded, while there is not much restraint placed on the former, other than what the human frame can endure. In the matter of celebrating a victory over a hated rival there apparently is not much limit to the endurance.

The roars that go up from the grandstand in applause of a brilliant play offer evidence that even spectators may exert themselves, though they do it in a manner at variance with the players. It might be desirable to have direct part in games more widely distributed, but it cannot be successfully contended that spectators do not get a deal of exercise too.

Tonopah, Nev.—A recent cloud-burst on the land of L. L. Loony, of Rochester, Nev., washed away a good portion of the ground around his house. When the storm was spent, a vein of mineral was exposed.

He started to dig. At a depth of 20 feet he opened up a vein of one assaying \$80 to the ton. He was soon on his way to the smelter with the first carload.

SAVANT WORKS ON ARTIFICIAL PROPAGATION OF OYSTERS

Bellingham.—The problem of artificial propagation of oysters may have been solved by Professor Trevor Kincaid of the University of Washington zoology department on the beds of Samish Bay near here this summer. He has kept the young of Eastern and Japanese oysters alive for two weeks and believes that the process can be worked out successfully.

The discovery would be a boon to Pacific Coast oyster beds, most of which are in Puget Sound and in other inland waters of the state, local oyster growers say. So far it has been necessary to import the seed of the bigger oysters from the Atlantic and Japan beds, as the cold water here would kill the spawn at once.

LETTER CARRIERS TO MARK ROUTE OF OLDEST RURAL MAIL DELIVERY

Hope, Ind.—The Indiana Rural Letter Carriers' Association has planned to erect a monument to mark the site of the oldest rural free mail delivery in the United States, which was started 29 years ago.

Two experimental routes were started a year before the Hope project, but they since have been abandoned while the route out of here has been continued without interruption.

Not a record is available in the Home postoffice that establishes the exact date of starting the route. All postmasters who knew the story are dead was killed in an automobile accident a year ago.

RESCUE OF CREW TOLD IN FEWER WORDS THAN PRAISE

New Orleans.—Capt. Robert Laird of the Honduran steamship, Atlantida, is a man of few words.

The master of the Honduran vessel required fewer words to log the rescue of a crew from an American vessel in distress than needed by the President of the United States in inscribing the appreciation of the government in a watch presented Captain Laird.

"Much lightning, 8 a. m. Sighted Timpson in distress, 2 p. m. Rescued. Crude oil to quiet waves," says the Atlantida's log.

Captain Laird sailed from his New Orleans home wearing a watch bearing the inscription: "From the President of the United States to Robert Laird, master of the Honduran steamship, Atlantida, in recognition of his humane service in effecting the rescue at sea on October 18, 1924 of the master and crew of the American motorship, James Timpson."

John R. Kennedy, second officer and Lionel Buckley, wireless operator were presented with binoculars, and medals will be presented to three members of the crew who manned the small boat, with Kennedy and Buckley, in which 22 members of the crew of the Timpson were transported through hurricane seas from their crippled ship to the Atlantida.

LEGENDS OF SANSKRIT PUT IN NEW ENGLISH VOLUMES

Chicago.—A new translation from the ancient Sanskrit by Arthur W. Ryder has just been published by the University of Chicago Press.

Under the name "The Panchatantra," the book contains some of the world's oldest fables, first gathered more than 1,500 years ago in the Vale of Kashmir and now presented in English. Without footnotes and glossaries, the volume is rich in epigrams and verses from which the Oriental flavor has not been lost.

Weird legends of lions who hold court like kings, scheming jackals and birds which talk with fishes, are told in the five books of the volume. The opening yarns tell of the broken friendship of Bull Evely and Lion Rusty and inserted therein are numerous stories which dovetail into one another.

Every paragraph or so is broken with a bit of sprightly verse, many of which are introductory to a separate legend or allegory. The reader is sent awandering from the original plot for a time but eventually another rhyme brings him back to the main thread of the story.

The tales originated in British India and were told by Buddhist monks more than 2,000 years ago. In the sixth century they were translated by a Persian physician and during the eighth century they reached Bagdad. Later the stories were translated into Greek, Latin, Hebrew, German and French. La Fontaine is said to have relied upon them extensively as a source of his fables.

SHE IS GIRL'S GOLF CHAMP BUT WHACKS MAN'S BALL

London.—Miss Enid Wilson, who won the girl's golf championship of Great Britain, is only 15 years old, but she lacks only two inches of being six feet tall, and weighs more than 150 pounds. None of the other girls, and only a few women, can whale into a golf ball as she can, or

send it scotting such long distances. As yet there is little grace in her game, for she is at an awkward age and growing rapidly. But of power there is plenty. Several times during the championship play at Stoke Poges she reached greens of 430 yards or so with her second shots. And the grass was wet, giving little run to the ball.

Miss Wilson wears her hair in a pig-tail, which, when playing, she tucks down the back of her jersey.

The young champion took up golf at the age of nine. Her instructor in recent years has been Arthur Havers the open champion of 1923. She made her debut among the women players last May in the British ladies' championship, being beaten by Mrs. W. A. Gavin on the 17th green.

In 1900, only a dozen cities were making provision for recreation while now 711 communities have systems of playgrounds under direction.

The public recreation movement which was cradled in New England, has reached into all sections. At least a quarter of American cities now having year-round recreation under leadership the South is alive to a greater need.

COMMERCIALISM ROBBING ART AND ARTISTS CONDUCTOR SAYS

Denver.—The money a part of the public is paying to "hear a name sing or play" rather than an artist, is held to blame as an item in a "commercialism that has taken the heart and soul from music."

Robert Slack, noted concert director, sighed as he said it. "It's money-money-money. The public makes and breaks artists—unfortunately—and part of it pays to hear a name sing or play rather than an artist."

It's public to which Mr. Slack referred pays to see the chosen few and in doing so, in his opinion, thereby is keeping hundreds of names from the electric sign boards that are equally his good. "But Commercialism—Commercialism, that's what has taken the heart and soul from music," he added.

Mr. Slack has had an association with choirs, choruses and operatic stars over a period of nearly 40 years.

NATIONAL GOOD ROADS WEEK

Raleigh, N. C.—(AP)—Observance of "Good Roads Week" throughout the United States in conjunction with the annual convention of the American Road Builders' Association at Chicago, next Jan. 11-15, is the aim of Charles M. Upham, state highway engineer, and manager for the road convention.

Governor McLean has been requested to so designate the week in North Carolina and governors of the other states and President Coolidge will be asked to issue similar proclamations.

The purpose is to center the attention of the citizens on road problems while the road convention is in session, where the latest contributions to the science of roadbuilding will be on display and prominent speakers will tell of road improvements.

JAPANESE GIRL'S TONGUE ATTACKED BY STRANGE COLONY OF MICROBES

Tokyo.—Strange things in medicine and surgery are often reported from Japan, but one of the strangest is the recent case of a girl whose three-inch tongue was teat eaten up to one inch by microbes. By cauterization, the surgeons report, they were able to restore one inch of the organ so that the girl now has a tongue two inches in length.

The patient, Miss Sonoko Torii, 18 years old, found while she was attending school that her tongue apparently was getting shorter. Within a few months the tongue had decreased to such an extent that the girl had difficulty in talking. She consulted a number of doctors who said they could do nothing for her. Finally one of the most prominent Japanese surgeons decided the tongue was "colonized" by unknown microbes. He tried cauterization and a "cure" apparently was effected. Japanese scientists say there is no record of a similar case.

DEATH SIGNS STARE AT COOK COUNTY'S RECKLESS MOTORIST

Chicago.—"On was killed here." Five hundred of these grim signs have been placed on Chicago streets in the campaign against further deaths of children from automobiles. There were 545 deaths from automobiles in Cook County for 258 days this year or an average of more than two a day. Many of these tragedies involved children as thousands of Chicago's youngsters have no other place to play but in the street.

In 1923, the year before the signs were erected, 602 were killed in Chicago by motor cars. In 1924 there were 564 deaths. This year's total is expected to mount to much higher figures.

BORN IN BARN, LITTLE CHURCH NOW IS A MODEL

Chicago.—Thirteen families met in a barn nearly 60 years ago and organized the parish of the Episcopal Church of Our Savior. Through fire wars and hard times it survived. Today it is a modern, fully equipped and beautiful little house of worship for 500 communicants, pointed out by Diocesan officials as a model of church living. Weekly pledges have doubled, open offerings have tripled and special offerings amounting to \$8,000 paid for the improvements.

Canadian Butter Exports Swell

Winnipeg, Ont.—Exports of butter from Canada to countries of the world increased 100 per cent in the twelve months ending August 1, said a report issued by the Dominion bureau of statistics. Shipment totaled 28,830,307 pounds with a value of \$10,317,819 compared to 14,474,211 pounds valued at \$5,278,479 in the year ending August 1 1924.
