Training School for Sun. School Workers Be Held Next Week

KIWANIANS PRESENT UNIQUE PROGRAM LAST NIGHT'S MEET

Because of Unusual Nature Program Proves Most Enjoyable; Endorse Special Thanksgiving Service

Last night's program of the Kiwanis Club was unique in nature, being entirely different from any ever before presented by the program committee. And because of its being unusual in nature it was most interesting throughout.

Ralph Deal in charge without a word of warning called on different members to briefly state what one thing had been most helpful in their respective business or profession during the past ten years. Dr. Chas. O'H. Laughinghouse presented modern method of transportation as the outstanding benefit to the medical profession. E. G. Flanagan stated that the building of a substantial credit system was essential for the progress of any business. Modern mechanical devices have proven a great help to the banking business stated W. H. Wollard. B. W. Moseley stated that business perseverance was the successful course to pursue in the insurance game. Henry Rivers said that scientific development was responsible for the advancement in civil engineering. Bruce Sugg contrasted Greenville's tobacco market of ten years ago with that of today, presenting various improvements.

The scene was then shifted and other members were required to express themselves as to the city's greatest need. Dr. W. I. Wooten wanted to see in Greenville a Y. M. C. A., or some like organization for clean, wholesome recreation for our young people. Luther Herring favored renewing our efforts for the erection of a union railway station. Will Hooker having already observed what the new playground meant to the childhood of the city, made a strong plea for the erection and maintenance of a public park and recreation center for the young people. M. L. Wright presented one of the greatest needs mentioned, and that being the erection of a million dollar hotel. He stated there were several cities and towns of the size and larger than Greenville in the eastern section that could not meet the demand of the traveling public because of the need of modern hostilities, and due to the fact that this city is recognized as the "Hub of Eastern North Carolina," that here is the place for such a hotel, and its patrons could serve their trade better from this point than from any other town or city of this part of the state. Ed Griffin wants more manufacturing enterprises, and Pen Watson responded with "Greenville looks good to me." Ed Batchelor favored a public swimming pool.

At the conclusion of these suggested needs Chairman Ralph Deal urged the membership to keep before them each of these as goals yet to be attained.

Burt James, chairman of the ticket selling committee for the Navy Band which musical organization appeared here on Monday, matinee and night at the Teachers College stated that the seat sale was very satisfactory and from present outlook the band would play to capacity audiences at both concerts.

The club members voted their hearty endorsement of the special service of thanksgiving which will be held at the Fair Grounds in this city on Friday of next week.

EUROPE SECURITY CONFERENCE ENDS IN BLAZE OF GLORY

Signing of Five Pacts With Idea of a New Europe Arising From Old Europe of Discord Celebrated Thru-Out Night

Locarno, Switz., Oct. 17.—(AP)—Europe security conferences ended early today literally in a blaze of glory. Throughout the night there were fire works, music, and dancing to commemorate the signing of five pacts which the allied and German statesmen have formulated with the idea of a new Europe arising from the old Europe of discord.

The delegates have shown their belief that real friendship and co-operation and the burial of past dissensions easily can be achieved by continuing the good spirit which was given birth at Locarno. All the statesmen are unanimous that the results obtained at the security conference exceeded the secret expectations.

The five treaties concluded are as follows:

The Rhine pact by which France, Germany and Belgium agree to refrain from attacking one another, with Great Britain and Italy agreeing to act against a violation of the pact.

Arbitration convention between Germany and France, Belgium, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

In addition there is an understanding that Germany shall join the League of Nations.

Dr. Stresemann, the German Foreign Minister joined M. Briand, France's Foreign Minister, in declaring that Locarno must mark the beginning of a new era in the peaceful developments of the lives of Nations based on mutual confidence and good will.

EIGHT LEADERS OF BAND CRIMINALS ARRESTED TODAY

New York Police Attribute Bank Robbery, One Murder and Numerous Hold-Ups to the Band

New York, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Police today arrested a woman and seven men as leaders of a band of criminals responsible for many crimes including murder and robberies over a period of six years. The leaders are alleged to have made a specialty of providing their subordinates with pistol silencers.

A bank robbery, at least one murder, and numerous hold-ups are attributed to the band by the police. The round up was considered one of the most important in many years. Other arrests are expected.

Bodies of Coupe Found Murdered Sent to Homes

Kenosha, Wis., Oct. 17.—(AP)—The body of Madalynne Latimer, who with her fiancé James Sears was shot and killed near here Thursday, was sent to her home at Appleton, Wis., today, while that of Sears was on its way to his family's home in Ahoskie, N. C.

The bodies were found huddled together under a mound of leaves and grass after each had been shot twice in the head. The only person held in connection with the case was released yesterday when he provided an alibi.

Nice, France, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Finance Minister Caillaux lost the first phase of today's financial battle in the conference of the radical party when the fiscal commission of the conference voted in favor of a resolution embracing the principal of the levy on capital.

TAX REDUCTION BILL FIFTEENTH DISTRICT TO BE GIVEN RIGHT OF FEDERATED CLUBS WAY IN CONGRESS MEETS WEDNESDAY

Green Expects to Cut at Least \$300,000,000 From Tax Payers' Toll Next Year

Washington, Oct. 17.—Definite agreement has been reached among administration leaders to give the prospective tax reduction bill right of way upon the opening of Congress in December.

Chairman Green of the House Ways and Means Committee which meets here Monday to prepare the bill expected to cut at least \$300,000,000 from the tax payers' toll next year. He declared today a measure will be ready for presentation on the opening day of the session.

The House will be able to pass the bill before the Christmas holidays. Mr. Green predicted. Whether Senate leaders plan to rush action at their final enactment of a measure by March 1, fifteen days before first payment in the new year due, is believed probable.

Interest centers mainly in the proposal reduction in income taxes with leaders of both parties prepared to ask slashed in both the normal rate and sur taxes.

President's Air Board Retires to Its Own Counsel

Washington, Oct. 17.—The President's Air Board retired to its own counsel today as judge in the much disputed question of America's prowess in the air. Satisfaction that every angle of the question has been amply explored in the bulging volumes of testimony before it, the Board turned to the harder task of drawing conclusions from the mass of controversial opinions and proposals presented during its three weeks' hearing. Conclusions of the hearing last night after final day and night sessions marked by the same conflict of views among army and navy witnesses that has characterized the whole inquiry brought the Board today to the question of procedure in preparing its report to the president.

The president's decision to have the report in hand before Congress meets in December and so informed Chairman Morrow and other members of the Board when he appointed it to make the exhaustive inquiry now concluded into both the military and commercial phases of the question. The Board was appointed at the suggestion of the then acting Secretary of War, Dwight F. Davis, as a means of clearing the atmosphere after Colonel William Mitchell's sensational criticism of the army and navy air service administration.

In his original circular to the fertilizer manufacturers, the commissioner called attention to the fact that the companies must put on printed matter on the tax-paid tags issued by the State Department of Agriculture.

"I am very much gratified," concluded Commissioner Graham, "at the spirit shown by a large majority of the fertilizer companies in acquiescing to the new rules. A naturally, make enforcement much easier and will eliminate what might otherwise, be disagreeable situations, as the rules will be rigidly enforced."

WILES FOUND NOT GUILTY OF MURDER OF RALPH GORDON

Jury Deliberates 20 Hours; Charge of Murder of Wife is Notprossed

Durham, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Robert H. Wiles, of Columbia, S. C., this morning was found not guilty of the murder of Ralph B. Gordon on August 8. The jury rendered its verdict at 7:30 o'clock today.

Three ballots were taken by the jury during its 20 hours of deliberation. The first and second ballots were even to one for acquittal.

The jury announced at 7:00 o'clock this morning that it had reached a decision, but Judge Henry A. Grady ordered them to breakfast before reporting to the court. Only court officials were present when the verdict was announced.

Following the jury's verdict of not guilty in the case of Gordon's murder, Solicitor Louis P. McLendon asked for a nol pros in the case charging Wiles with the murder of his wife. The prisoner was dismissed from the jurisdiction of the court.

"Gentlemen, I thank you, May God bless you," explained the defendant after the verdict was announced.

The case against Wiles grew out of the killing of his wife and Gordon when he found the two together after following them from Columbia, S. C., the home of the trio. Wiles based his defense on the "Unwritten law" and self-defense. He testified that he believed when he surprised the two that Gordon was about to shoot him.

NEGRO MURDERER SENTENCED TO DIE IN CHAIR DEC. 16

Fred Jones Sentenced to Chair for Second Time for Murder of Monroe King, White Man

Winston-Salem, Oct. 17.—(AP)—Fred Jones, negro convicted of murder in the first degree for the killing of Monroe King, a white man in a hold up in this city last June 13, this afternoon was sentenced to die in the electric chair in Raleigh on December 16. The negro made no statement when called before the court for sentence. The jury's verdict was returned late Thursday night, and sentence was postponed until today.

This is the second time Jones has been sentenced to the chair. He was convicted during the June term of court. On the grounds of newly discovered evidence Judge Shaw granted the prisoner a new trial. Insanity was the plea advanced by the negro.

Prohibition Agents Freed on Charge of Murder Today

Charleston, S. C., Oct. 17.—(AP).—Alonso B. Seabrook and Frank J. Harrington, prohibition agents, were freed of a charge of murder in Federal Court here today when Judge Ernest E. Bashrin delivered a verdict of "not guilty."

The two officers Seabrook, a Federal Agent, and Harrington, a State Agent, were charged with murder as the result of the death of John G. Pittman in a raid on the latter's house boat near Beaufort some months ago by the officers. The defendants pleaded self-defense.

MR. LESLIE HUMBER ILL RALEIGH HOSPITAL

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OUR SATURDAY NIGHT MEDITATION

"God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."—St. John 3:16.

This is the best known and most frequently quoted verse in the Bible. Yet the half of its glory, like that of Solomon's has never been told.

I don't think we have been quite fair to Nicodemus who "came to Jesus by night." We have accused him of cowardice, of slyness, and of all kinds of temperamental weakness, because he did not visit the Master in the daytime. Now, I do not think that Nicodemus paid a night visit to Jesus because he was afraid of his standing with his fellow-members in the Sanhedrim; nor because he thought more of his reputation with the Jews than of his desire for information.

Jesus was a busy man. All day long the throngs followed him. Few were the occasions on which He might be interviewed alone. The ruler, Nicodemus, was also a man of affairs, whose days were occupied with hearing complaints and in dispensing justice in the Court of the Sanhedrim. I surmise that most of his hours were well-filled with the public duties appertaining to his class and position.

Tell me: when two busy men make an appointment in Greenville to-day, do they not often set an evening hour, after the regular routine and press of daily duty have been attended to? I have frequently gone to business men at night, not from cowardice, but from convenience. Let us give Nicodemus the benefit of the doubt. Let us give him credit, too, for coming to Jesus at all. There were 69 other members of the Sanhedrim who never did as much.

Now, imagine yourself, like Nicodemus, on the couch opposite our Lord, as He said those imperishable words:—"God so loved the

world."

Put yourself in his place, and think what the announcement meant to him. This verse, St. John 3:16, had three new truths for Nicodemus of which he had never dreamed before.

1st. **God so loved the world.** Nicodemus had been taught from his childhood up that God loved the Jewish race, if not only, yet chiefly. They were His "chosen people." Those outside the Jewish pale had no part in the convenancing mercy of God. In order to share in these promises one must unite with the circumcision race by circumcision. Jesus says, "God loved the world." "God so loved the world"—equally and impartially, "that He gave His only begotten Son" for all. I am not sure that you and I have yet grasped the fullness of this truth. We think that God loves America best; we find it no easy thing to believe that the soul of the negro is as precious in His sight as the soul of the white man. Our nationalism and patriotism receive a rude shock when we think that the United States are not a bit better loved by God than China or Siam.

2nd. The second strange truth to Nicodemus was contained in the words:—"That He gave his only begotten Son." The Jews never that He who sat on the couch beside him was believed that God had a Son. And to believe the Son of God must have been hard for this teacher in Israel. Many find it hard to-day. They believe in the superb humanity of Jesus, but deny His divinity. Yet He "overlooks" humanity because of that very fact. He is not only the Son of Man the peerless leader of the race, but He is this because He is the Son of God: "the only begotten Son;" the universal and eternal representative of the Father, "in Whom dwelleth the fullness of the godhead bodily."

3rd. The third new truth to Nicodemus is found in the assurance:—"That whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." Nicodemus, in common with the Jews, believed that eternal life was to be found in adherence to the Mosaic Law, and in the observance of all the ceremonial ritual of the Temple. Works, not faith, punctilious conformity to the teachings of the Rabbis, not "Believing," was to him the sure way of salvation. And there are many among us to-day who still think that correct ritualistic formality will carry them through, rather than faith in the loving and saving Lord.

What effect did the words of Jesus have on Nicodemus? We cannot say that he became openly a follower of the Savior: but from St. John 7:45 and St. John 19:39, we learn that he defended Jesus before the Sanhedrim, asking:—"Doth our law judge any man before it hear him, and know what he doeth?" and that at the tomb he brought one hundred weight of myrrh and aloes to embalm the body of this "teacher sent from God."

The greater and more important question is "what effect has this revelation on you? Do you really believe it? Will you conform your life to it, and to all it implies?"

Eugene, Ore. — Reforestation in the Mount Hebo Douglas fir area of the Siuslaw National Forest in Western Oregon has proved successful. Trees planted from 1912 to 1916 are eight to 16 feet high, the average height being 10 feet.

In addition to the replanting started in 1912, approximately 180,000 fir were set out two years ago. Four out of five of these trees are growing, except on the highest mountains. All efforts will be concentrated on where there is little protection from the elements.

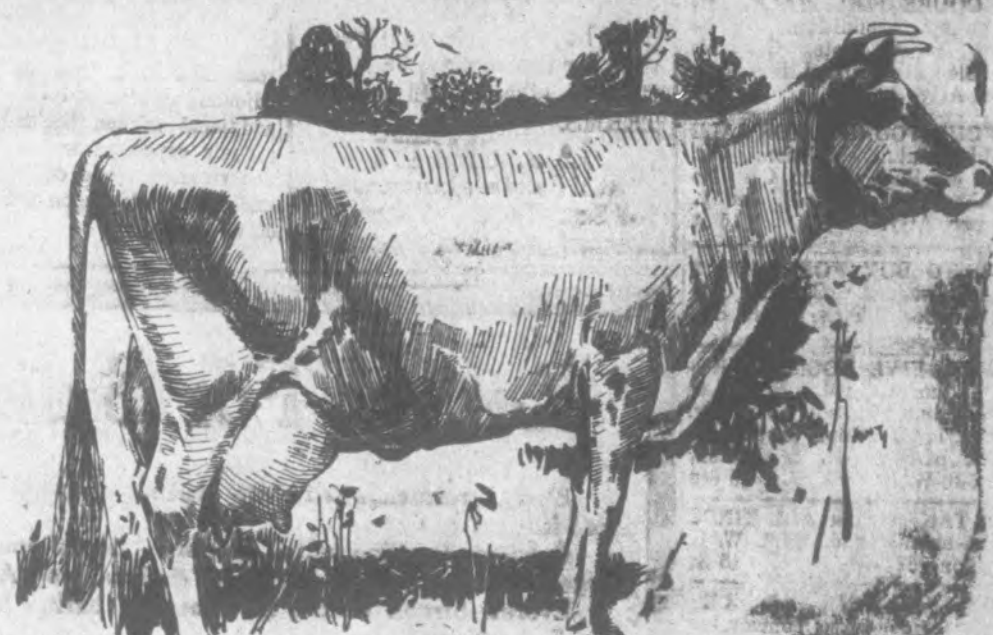

NEW ISLANDS DISCOVERED BY JAPANESE EXPLORER

Tokyo.—The newspapers report that a group of more than ten coral islands, the total value of which is estimated at about 200,000,000 yen, has been discovered in the South Seas by a Japanese explorer, M. Inouye.

The Japan Geographical Society has started a technical survey of the island, it is said. They are situated about 350 sea miles off Mindanao Island, Philippines, and the actual position will be made public after the discovery is reported to the International Geographical Association, he states.

These coral islands are not described in the sea-charts, and the largest one is reported to be some fifteen miles in circumference. They are uninhabited.

SAYS AN AMERICAN INVENTED FIRST PRACTICAL TYPEWRITER

Herkimer, N. Y.—Austrian claims that the typewriter is an Austrian, not an American, invention, which were given concrete form by the recent unveiling of a memorial tablet at Innsbruck, Austria, to Peter Mitterdorfer as the inventor of the typewriter, are challenged by John W. Vrooman, president of the Herkimer County Historical Society.

Mr. Vrooman declared that "the outstanding and important fact is that Christopher Latham Sholes' machine was the first practical machine made available to the world." The American Sholes' model was patented by the Remington-arms factory in 1873.

Vrooman credited Mitterdorfer with being one of a long list of individuals who "had been trying to devise a practical typewriter" ever since the first patent was granted by the British Patent office in 1714.

LONDON EXPECTS TO HAVE WORLD'S FINEST AIRDROME Croydon—A scheme, which it is stated will make the London terminal airdrome the finest commercial station in the world and which will cost nearly a quarter of a million pounds, has now been begun in earnest.

Much work will have to be done before the airdrome is complete. Trees and hedges are being removed and a road diverted in order to take in an adjoining stretch of land. When this additional ground becomes available the air expresses will have a clear unobstructed space of between two and three miles upon which to take off and alight.

EXPERIMENT WITH WIND AS SOURCE FOR RURAL POWER

Ames, Ia., — The possibility of using wind as a source of farm power is being experimented with by the agricultural engineering faculty at Iowa State College.

A windmill on the top of a 100-foot steel tower with the generator attached, generated 200 kilowatt hours in thirty days. The average farm home does not use more than 25 kilowatt hours a month.

The velocity and distribution of the wind will be the determining factor, said Fred C. Fenton. Power generated by the windmill can be used for almost any activity on the farm.

TIED OF BEING A STENO, SO SHE ENTERED MAN'S FIELD

London.—Kathleen Britter has become London's first woman conveyancer. And she does not see why any capable woman could not do her sort of work if she was interested in it.

"The trouble with so many girls is that they get into a groove and stay there," she said. "I got tired of being a stenographer, studied real property and persuaded a firm that was advertising for a male conveyancer that a woman who had had that sort of work for solicitors for years could fill the place as well."

Miss Britter is 24 and has been a business woman for about five years. Her mother was housekeeper for the late Lord Leverhulme, who took an interest in the ambitions of the young stenographer and encouraged her to study law.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 17.—(AP)—Commenting on the death of James B. Duke, whose recent gift to Duke University is said to have been the largest single gift to an educational institution in the history of education, Dr. Stonewall Anderson, head of the board of education of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, here at the annual conference of the Western North Carolina district of the church, spoke with feeling concerning Mr. Duke.

"The announcement of the death of James B. Duke... was a great shock to hundreds and thousands of Methodist people."

"Mr. Duke was not only a great business man of America and the world; he was a great philanthropist. His father and he and his brothers have been benefactors of Trinity College for more than a generation besides Trinity College, they have supported other benevolent enterprises in North Carolina under the auspices of the Methodist church."

"Something like a year ago Mr. Duke enshrined himself in the hearts and memories of all Methodist people and all other lovers of mankind by his magnificent gift, which has been estimated as at least \$25,000,000, to Trinity College, the name of which has been changed to Duke University."

"I have understood that Mr. Duke had been giving personal attention to the splendid building program now under way on the new campus of the university. Many of us hoped that he would live to see his great building scheme completed. But this was not to be. However, the work will go on. Mr. J. B. Duke, the business man, is forgotten, Duke University, by its service to men, will proclaim the name of J. B. Duke, the lover of his kind, to all coming generations."

"Tess" Pleases Mrs. Hardy.
London.—Thomas Hardy was unable to come to London for the first presentation in England of his dramatization of his novel, "Tess of the D'Urbervilles," but Mrs. Hardy made the trip to London and after seeing play expressed her approval of the portrayal of Tess by Miss Gwen Ffrangcon-Davies. Mrs. Hardy said her husband is only slightly indisposed and is ordinarily enjoying good health in spite of his 85 years.
