Brooks Case May Not Go to the Jury Before Wednesday

Hendersonville, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Arguments were resumed today in the case of Bonnie L. Brooks on trial here for the murder of former Mayor Samuel Y. Bryson, last August. John E. Shipman opened for the defense, and was expected to continue his argument to the jury throughout the greater part of the day in an effort to save Brooks from a death sentence. Robert B. Reynolds for the prosecution was to follow Mr. Shipman.

It is not believed by court officials that the case will go to the jury before Wednesday morning.

Air Plane Accidents Figured Three Times In Sunday's News

Chicago, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Air plane accidents figured three times in Sunday's news reports with one fatality. Automobiles took a toll of 17 lives; in the Middle West, five persons were killed by trains and more than a score were injured in various kinds of accidents.

LESLIE M. HUMBER DIED THIS MORNING RALEIGH HOSPITAL

Popular Young Man of This City Dies in Rex Hospital Following Operation for Appendicitis; Funeral Arrangements Not Announced

Mr. Leslie M. Humber, 18, died in Rex Hospital, Raleigh, this morning at 11 o'clock from peritonitis, following an operation which he underwent Sunday night for appendicitis. Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

Leslie M. Humber was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Humber of this city. He was a student at Wake Forest College, this being his second year. On Friday Mr. and Mrs. Humber received a message stating that he was ill and was on his way to the Raleigh hospital. His parents left for Raleigh Saturday and were with him when he died.

Leslie numbered his friends by the score and news of his death was a shock to the entire community.

The deceased is survived by his parents, one sister, Miss Lena Humber, two brothers, Dr. J. D. Humber, San Francisco, Cal., and Mr. Robert Humber, Oxford, England.

A message from Mr. Humber today, stated that the remains would reach Greenville on the 1 o'clock train tonight.

NEGRO STRUCK BY AUTOMOBILE AND INSTANTLY KILLED

Elias Coward Run Down by Auto While Walking Along Washington - Greenville Road; Driver of Car Unknown

Elias Coward, 46, negro, was instantly killed Saturday night while walking along the Greenville-Washington road, when an automobile struck him, knocking him to the pavement. His skull was crushed, left leg broken and right leg badly cut.

According to information two cars, going in opposite direction, passed each other and the bright lights and rain blinded the drivers. It is believed Coward was knocked down by the car going east. Evidently the driver wasn't conscious of the fact that he had struck the negro as both cars continued on their way.

Coward who it is reported was drinking, came to Greenville Saturday afternoon with David Fleming and when the car reached the river bridge he got out and walked to town.

Just why he was on the Washington road is not known but it is believed that he was going to see somebody for whom he had formerly worked.

Says Crime Has Increased 100 Pct. in N. Y. Since 1900

Chicago, Oct. 19.—Crime in Chicago cost the city so much each year that it could well afford to pay each of its estimated 30,000 crooks \$20,000 annually, or a total of \$600,000,000 to leave town, Charles R. Holden, President of the Chicago Crime Commission told a church audience yesterday. He estimated that approximately one per cent of the city's 3,000,000 population is engaged in criminal pursuit and asserted that crime had increased here 100 per cent since 1900.

Earthquake Believed to Be 550 Miles From N. Y. Recorded Today

New York, Oct. 19.—(AP)—An earthquake believed to have been centered only about 550 miles from New York was recorded on the Fordham University Seismograph beginning at 6:01 this morning and reaching a maximum at 6:05 o'clock. The Fordham experts described the disturbance as of moderate proportions. They said the records indicated it was on the North South line of New York, but in which direction they could not state. The after-tremors were recorded until 7:06 o'clock.

TRAINING SCHOOL S S TEACHERS OPENS METHODIST CHURCH

Four Courses Being Offered to All Sunday School Workers in the City and Vicinity

Sunday school and church workers and prospective workers of Greenville and vicinity, between 75 and 100 in number, attended the opening session of the Greenville Standard Training school which began at Jarvis Memorial Methodist church at 7:30 last night. Methodist, Presbyterian, Christian, Baptist, and perhaps other denominations were represented in the enrollment of this training school, which is being promoted by the Methodist and Presbyterian Sunday School Boards.

Rain prevented some from attending, it is thought, and an invitation is extended to those who could not be present at the opening to join the school this evening at 7:30. Four courses are being offered, as follows:

"Sunday School Organization and Administration," Prof. H. E. Spence, of Duke University, instructor; "Principles of Religious Teaching," Mr. C. T. Carr, of Mooresville, head of Sunday school work for the Presbyterian church in North Carolina, instructor; "Junior Department Administration," Mrs. H. E. Spence, of Durham, instructor; and "Primary Department Administration," Mr. L. L. Gobbel, of Durham, superintendent of Sunday school work of the North Carolina Methodist conference is directing the school. Rev. Wm. P. Watkins, pastor of Jarvis Memorial church, is chairman of the board of managers, which is composed of Rev. W. S. Harden, J. S. James, Norman Warren, Rev. B. B. Slaughter and J. T. Thorne, of Farmville, and Rev. L. L. Smith, and J. B. Bunting, of Bethel.

In addition to workers from Greenville churches, representatives of churches in Farmville and Bethel are attending.

Preliminary to the opening of the school, Prof. H. E. Spence, of Duke University, preached a stirring sermon at Jarvis Memorial Sunday morning.

House of Bishops Resumes Consideration Revision Prayer Book

New Orleans, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Beginning its final week of general convention, the Protestant Episcopal Church today inaugurated a series of extended sessions to dispose of the accumulation of vital matters demanding the attention of Bishops and Deputies. Additional hours were added to the working day of the church men in order to get through their business.

The House of Bishops today resumed consideration of the revision of the prayer book. The House of Deputies has spent many hours in studying changes in the Prayer Book and had ready for consideration by the Bishops the changes recommended by the last General Convention.

The Bishops were prepared today to convene in executive session for preparation of the triennial pastoral letter. In the House of Deputies the budget program was to be taken up in detail and the Deputies also had before them the ratification of six Missionary Bishops chosen by the House of Bishops Saturday.

Cabinet Counsel Receives Report of Security Conference

Berlin, Oct. 19.—(AP)—A cabinet counsel under the chairmanship of President Von Hindenburg this morning received a report of the German delegation to the Locarno Security Conference. The ministers adjourned without reaching a decision until this afternoon.

Three Men Killed When Air Plane Falls Today

ONE MAN IS KILLED SEVERAL INJURED IN AUTO COLLISION

James Craddock Killed and Three Cars Badly Smashed in Collision on Mount Olive Highway

Goldsboro, Oct. 19.—(AP)—James Craddock, 26, of Piney Grove township, Sampson county, was killed, several others were injured, and three cars were badly smashed up last night in a collision on the Mount Olive highway six miles from Goldsboro.

Craddock had his back broken and died early today at a local hospital. The most serious of others injured was Miss Bessie Carter, a school teacher of Seven Springs, who lost one ear and the end of her nose. The accident is said to have occurred when one car stopped along side the road for repairs and a truck ran into it and another car ran in behind the truck.

U. D. C. Convention to Be Held Elizabeth City During Week

Elizabeth City, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Delegates to the 29th annual state convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, which will officially open here Wednesday morning, have already begun to arrive. Between 175 and 200 delegates are expected by the D. H. Hill chapter, of this city, which will be host to the Daughters during the convention. The convention this week will be the first ever to be held in the Albemarle section.

After preliminary meetings today and tomorrow, a reception welcoming the delegates will be given tomorrow night. The convention proper will get under way at 9:30 Wednesday morning, but all delegates are expected to be here for the reception tomorrow night. The convention will close Friday at noon. All meetings are to be held in the First Methodist church.

The banquet of welcome Tuesday night will be held in the reception hall of the church, with addresses by Mrs. C. D. Bell, president of the local chapter; Mrs. W. R. Cowper, of Gatesville, director of the sixteenth district; and Walter L. Cohoon, of this city, in behalf of Mayor McCabe.

Other speakers of the occasion are expected to include Mrs. J. Edwin Gregory, of Salisbury, State president of the organization; Mrs. J. J. Yates, of Raleigh, state president of the Confederate Memorial Association; Dr. W. C. Galloway, of Wilmington, state commander of the Sons of Veterans; Miss Matherine Robinson of Fayetteville, president of the State Business and Professional Women's clubs, and a representative from the state department of the American Legion.

The response to the address of welcome will be delivered by Mrs. Sidney P. Cooper, of Henderson, former president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs. One of the major events of the evening will be the formal presentation of the new state president, Mrs. J. Dolph Long of Graham. Mrs. Marshall Williams, of Faison, will be mistress of ceremonies incident to the presentation.

Business sessions will be held morning and afternoon, Wednesday and Thursday. On Thursday, Mrs. John I. Bridgers, of Tarboro, state chaplain, will preside at the annual memorial hour for the Confederate heroes.

A boat trip down the Pasquotank River Thursday afternoon and an automobile ride to the historic town of Edenton on Friday, after the concluding session of the convention will feature the entertainment features of the convention.

CLYDE LINE SHIP DESTROYED BY FIRE SATURDAY NIGHT

One Man Missing in Disaster Which Resulted From the Burning of the Steamship Comanche

Jacksonville, Fla., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Clyde Line officials today were bending every effort toward finding some trace of William J. Lawler, of Winthrop, Mass., contractor, who is the only person missing in the disaster which resulted on Saturday night from the destruction by fire of the steamship Comanche, of May Port, Florida.

Early reports which said ten persons were missing, were ascribed to the confusion in taking the passengers and members of the crew off the burning ship. In this confusion several persons were thrown into the water and were later rescued by crafts which were nearby. On reaching May Port the passengers quickly scattered and all day yesterday officers were checking the list with difficulty to locate those supposed to be missing.

Ten persons were injured, some of them seriously, when a life boat which had been lowered, was crushed between the burning vessel and a rescue ship, the Reaper, while a heavy sea was rolling.

While the search for Lawler goes on other officers of the Company are prepared for an investigation with the hope of determining the origin of the fire. The useless steel hull of the ship has been beached on the bank of the St. John river where it will be visited today.

The origin of the fire is a mystery. There were no combustibles in her cargo, which consisted of lumber, naval stores, and merchandise. The blaze started in the forward hold and quickly ignited the naval stores and then spread to proportions which could not be controlled. S. O. S. calls from the Comanche brought quick response from the Reaper and the Meta, a tug, both of which did noble work in rescuing the passengers and crew and bringing them to land.

True to the traditions of the sea the last man to leave the burning ship was her skipper, Captain Edward E. Curry, who suffered slight injuries.

FORD COUPE PROVES TO BE 'BLIND TIGER'

White Woman and Man Arrested With Thirteen Gallons of Whiskey in Auto

Elsie Wright, white woman, is in the Pitt county jail charged with transporting liquor, while Roland Farmer is under bond on the same charge. Joe Barber, another member of the party succeeded in evading arrest.

The arrests were made near Stokes Saturday. A Ford Coupe with the woman and two men went to Stokes Saturday and Deputy Sheriff H. D. Gurganus and J. H. Roberson suspecting they had whiskey followed them out of town. After a long chase Baker jumped out of the car and succeeded in making his getaway. The woman and other man were finally caught and a search of the car revealed thirteen gallons of whiskey. The woman gave her name as Elsie Wright, of Rocky Mount, and gave the name of Farmer, as being from Martin county.

Sup. Court Upholds Constitutionality of the Volstead Act

Washington, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The constitutionality of the Volstead Act was upheld again today and its provisions discussed in detail by the Supreme Court.

A formal opinion in the Druggan case from Chicago in which an appeal by the defendant recently was dismissed was made the occasion for the court's re-defining of its support of the validity of the dry law.

FIRST STEP SLASH NATION'S TAX BILL WAS TAKEN TODAY

House Ways and Means Committee Assemble to Consider Downward Revision of Present Levies

Washington, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The first step toward another slash in the Nation's tax bill was taken today with the assembling of the House Ways and Means Committee to consider a downward revision of the present levies.

Marking the third time in six years that the committee has set its hand to the welcome task of chopping off some of the tax burden, the gift to the tax payers this time will probably be in the form of a reduced bill for next year, the reduction being somewhere between \$300,000,000 and \$500,000,000. All hands were ready to advocate reduction today, including the treasury, and members of both major bodies in Congress. Republicans want cuts totaling between \$300,000,000 and \$400,000,000, while Democrats as represented by the ranking members of the Committee, Representative Garner, of Texas, believe reductions can be made up to \$500,000,000.

The committee waited first however for the views of Secretary Mellon, asked to appear as the first witness at the public hearing opening this afternoon and to continue for two weeks before the work of drafting of a new revenue bill by the committee.

Preceding the public session, the committee met in executive session. Prior to appearing before the committee, Secretary Mellon carefully refrained from advancing any definite tax reduction scheme, but the treasury has estimated that a surplus of at least \$250,000,000 would be available for reduction of tax rates. There also has been some definite indications that the treasury would favor a maximum sur tax rate of 20 percent instead of the present 40 percent as well as cuts in the normal rate.

Secretary Mellon further made clear before going before the committee that he is opposed to increasing income exemption as advocated by Representative Garner and also suggested by Senator Edge, of New Jersey. In a letter to the New Jersey Senator replying to his suggestions that all persons with income of \$5,000 or less be exempted from taxes, Mr. Mellon declared "The sole result of such a change would be an enormous loss of revenue to the Government without a single compensating advantage."

Telegraphers of A. C. L. R. R. Ready To Strike Today

Wilmington, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Members of the Order of Railway Telegraphers in the employ of the Atlantic Coast Line Railway System were ready to strike at four o'clock this afternoon. Union officers stated this morning. The action, the result of a demand for an increase of seven cents an hour in salary, will affect approximately 12,000 men. The walk-out will include transportation operators, agent operators, lever men, telephone operators, and lower men. Train dispatchers will not be included. Local officers of the A. C. L. Railway said that the road would be able to maintain uninterrupted service during the strike. The demand of the Telegraphers for a raise of wages is now before the Railroad Labor Board for a decision.

Pastoral Assignments Will Be Made Today

Statesville, October 19.—The end of the annual Western North Carolina Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, South, today was in sight with the announcement of Pastoral assignments for the coming year, which will be made today.

In addition to the appointments many details of business were before the gathering which will close finally tonight. While no hour for the appointments had been named, it was believed they would be announced at the morning session. A number of reports also were to receive attention.

THE IRON HEEL

As Italy's old constitutional form of government has been completely ignored by Mussolini ever since his abortive rise to dictatorship, there is little cause for concern in the Italian dictator's arbitrary abrogation of the constitution of the Italians. He has at least legalized his dictatorship and he had already deprived the Italians of the last vestige of self-government.

By a stroke of his pen Mussolini has substituted for the local representative governments commissioners of his own appointment who will administer local affairs in accordance with the dictates of the national government. Suffrage will be granted to only two classes—the workers and employers—and their organization into syndicates or corporations will be under Mussolini supervision. The obvious object

of the scheme is to abolish local self-government, further reduce the powers parliament and increase the power of the central government which is Mussolini himself.

Here is something new in the way of government. It is different from sovietism only in that it deceives two minorities instead of one into thinking they are governing themselves and the other classes. And Mussolinism is fully as destructive of representative government, of democracy, of human liberty, and even more destruction of local self-government, than the Russian brand of communism. One readily can see why the communists in the Italian parliament shout at Premier Mussolini, "We understand each other." The flags of Rome and Moscow differ in color only.

The farce was written by Brandon Thomas and first produced in England in 1892. The remarkable thing about the play was the fact that it has run continuously for the last thirty-three years and still shows evidence of going strong.

"Charley's Aunt" is also credited with being the funniest play ever written and in making the picture the producers have designed the scenario to keep all of the biggest laughing sequences in the play intact. Syd Chaplin plays the title role of "Charley's Aunt" from Brazil, where nuts come from" and he is said to do the best work of his career.

Chaplin is undeniably developing into one of our stellar comedians. There are critics who maintain that his "Submarine Pirate" film, made when feature movies were still young still stands as the funniest film ever made. 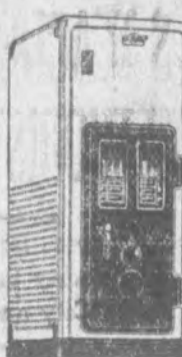

Official notice has been served on this Company that a strike has been ordered by the General Committee of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers among its members employed by the Atlantic Coast Line, to become effective at four p. m., October 19. This is the culmination of the refusal of that organization to accept a decision by the United States Railroad Labor Board denying the demands of the organization for a general increase in wages and for annual vacation of two weeks with pay.

Throughout the negotiations which led up to the present situation the Atlantic Coast Line has scrupulously complied both with the letter and the spirit of the law with the orders of the Labor Board which is the agency created and authorized by Congress for the settlement of disputes between the railroads and organizations of their employees.

The Order of Railroad Telegraphers agreed readily enough to submit the case to the Railroad Labor Board for settlement but refused to accept the decision made by the Board after exhaustive investigation and has ordered a strike because the decision which they had asked the Board to make did not satisfy them.

The Labor Board decided that the demands of the organization for a general increase of wages and for a vacation rule were not justified. It instructed both parties to look into the question of eliminating inequalities in the pay of some positions. For this purpose conferences were held by the Atlantic Coast Line with representatives of the Telegraphers in an effort to reach an amicable settlement of this issue, remanded by the Labor Board, and The Atlantic Coast Line, after negotiations lasting for a period of five weeks made an offer to adjust the rates of pay of a substantial number of positions involved.

This offer was refused by representatives of the Telegraphers who on September 16 broke off negotiations with the statement that they would not further discuss the question of removing inequalities but would demand again a general increase and vacation for all men, both of which demands had been found to be unwarranted by the Labor Board. When the Atlantic Coast Line suggested that the matter should be referred again to the Labor Board in accordance with directions by the Board that this be done if no settlement was reached, the representatives of the organization refused to join in such action.

The Atlantic Coast Line, therefore, informed the Labor Board of its failure to reach a settlement, and the Labor Board immediately assumed jurisdiction over the controversy and ordered both parties before it at Chicago for a hearing on October 9th. Officers of the Atlantic Coast Line appeared as ordered, but the Telegraphers organization declined to comply with the Board's instructions and did not put in an appearance. In view of this the Labor Board decided to send three members to the property to investigate the whole situation; one member representing the public, who is vice-chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board, one representing the organizations and one representing the railroads. This section of the Board conducted hearings at Wilmington October 12th and 13th.

Prior to this time a strike ballot had been distributed among the members of the organization. At the Wilmington hearing representatives of the organization informed the Labor Board members that while the Telegraphers would cooperate with the Board in making the proposed investigation, such cooperation would not be allowed to interfere with the program which the organization had mapped out for handling the matter on their own account.

The representatives of the Labor Board have been on the property for the past week getting the facts in regard to the situation, so that a report can be sent to the full membership of the Labor Board, following which the Board has decided that a prompt and final decision would be made, and the Company will be bound by that decision. The strike has been called without waiting for this action of the United States Railroad Labor Board. It is in direct defiance of the law.

In the event of a walk-out the Atlantic Coast Line will maintain service to provide for uninterrupted service to the public.
